Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, April 6, 1943.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in President Donovan's office at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, April 6, 1943. The following members were present: Governor Keen Johnson, Judge Richard C. Stoll, Mrs. Paul G.Blazer, James Park, Harper Gatton, H. D. Palmore, R. P. Hobson, H. S. Cleveland, Marshall Barnes, Dr. Lee Kirkpatrick and Judge Harry F. Walters. President H. L. Donovan, Comptroller Frank D. Peterson, Secretary of the Board, and Dean Thomas Cooper were also present.

### A. Approval of Minutes.

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1. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the minutes of the Board of Trustees of January 12, 1943, and the minutes of the Executive Committee of January 28 were approved as published.

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The minutes of the Executive Committee of March 30, 1943, were read in their entirety to the Board.

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2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Board approved the minutes of the Executive Committee of March 30, 1943, as read.

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### B. Investment of Haggin Fund.

The question of investing Haggin Fund was raised and, it appearing that the investment of \$50,000 in United States Government Bonds as authorized by the Executive Committee of March 30, 1943, not having been made, it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried to rescind the action taken as of March 30, 1943, and it is ordered that the sum of \$52,500 be invested in real estate.

# C. Purchase of Devereux Property.

The President advised the Board that Mr. C. W. Sulier, president of the Board of Commerce, desired to come before the Board to make a statement concerning the work of the Citizens Committee in assisting the University in acquiring the Devereux property on Euclid Avenue and Adams Street. The Board gave unanimous consent and Mr. Sulier briefly outlined to the Board the work of the Citizens Committee and explained that in his judgment it would be necessary for the Board to increase the offer in order to arrive at an agreement with the Devereux heirs. The Chairman expressed the Board's appreciation to Mr. Sulier for the work of his Committee and expressed the desire that they might be able to bring negotiations to a close in the next few days, whereupon Mr. Sulier retired from the meeting.

Mr. Hobson suggested that the matter be disposed of at this time and made the following motion, which was seconded and unanimously carried; That unless the Devereux property can be bought for \$55,000.00 by 12:00 o'clock noon, April 12, 1943, the attorneys for the University be instructed to file condemnation suit immediately.

# Report of Committee of Fifteen on the University's Administrative Organization

Last September (1942) the Board of Trustees authorized the President to appoint a committee to study the administrative organization of the University. A Committee of Fifteen able men and women representing every college of the University was selected to undertake this study. Under the chairmanship of Dean Thomas P. Cooper, the committee has diligently examined the practices in the best universities of the United States, and it has prepared a report in the light of its investigations that it believes will work effectively and efficiently to promote the educational interest of our University. This report I have examined with great care and I am pleased with the recommendations contained therein.

The Committee is recommending to us a charter. If it is adopted by the Board, I believe the University can live under it for the next half century. The proposed plan separates administrative functions from those known as educational policy-making functions. It provides that the membership of the raculty be composed of both the administrator and the teacher, thereby giving professors and administrators the opportunity to work together for the welfare of the institution. Special talents and abilities of teachers can be capitalized under the proposed organization. It will certainly stimulate professors and cause them to have a greater interest in the University. The plan makes the Faculty a representative group, but through the provision for rotation in office eventually every professor will have an opportunity to be a member of that body. By making the Faculty a representative democracy, its size has been kept small enough to enable it to transact business efficiently and without consuming too much time as a deliberative body.

The Committee became acquainted with the administrative procedures of America's best universities in the preparation of this report. It has drawn freely on the experiences of the best institutions of higher education. It has adopted some of the better features of a number of our leading universities. The proposed organization resembles to a degree the administrative organization of the University of Florida and Ohio State University; however, it does not follow the exact pattern of either of these institutions. It is a plan that fits our needs at the University of Kentucky.

Andrew D. White, the first president and one of the founders of Cornell University, says in his autobiography: "I felt that the university, to be successful, should not depend on the life and conduct of any one man; that every one of those called to govern and to manage it, whether president or professor, should feel that he had powers and responsibilities in its daily administration.

. . . I insisted that the faculty should not be merely a committee to register the decrees of the president, but that it should have full legislative powers to discuss and decide university affairs. Nor did I allow it to become a body merely advisory; I not only insisted that it should have full legislative powers, but that it should be steadily trained in the use of them."

President White, one of the greatest university presidents of all times, in 1868 infused this spirit into Cornell University at a time when other institutions were autocratically administered. Today, however, this is the spirit that is to be found on the campus of every American university that has attained a rank of the first order. It is a policy of this character that I think has largely prevailed at the University of Kentucky and a spirit I hope to see perpetuated so long as I am president of the institution. For this reason, I am anxious to have the Board of Trustees adopt the Committee's report for I am confident it represents the type of organization under which the University will prosper.

The proposed plan does not greatly alter the administrative organization of the University that was adopted by the Board in April, 1941.

The Department of Business Management and Control under the Comptroller has not been changed in any particular. A few additional responsibilities have been added to the office of the Dean of the University. The several colleges retain the maximum amount of autonomy consistent with good university administration. Each Dean retains as much, if not more, control over his college than heretofore.

The points of difference are (a) the Faculty of the University has been enlarged so as to include professors as well as administrative officers and (b) a clear-cut line of demarcation between administrative functions and policy-making functions has been drawn.

I recommend the adoption of the Report of the Committee of Fifteen and that it become effective as of September 24, 1943, the opening of the Fall Quarter.

Dear President Donovan:

On September 17, 1942, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, you named a Committee of 15 to make a study of the University's administrative organization and "report its findings to the President and Board of Trustees" for their consideration.

This Committee met with you for the purpose of organization and to discuss with you the contemplated study. Since that time it has held frequent meetings, either of the Committee as a whole or its subcommittees. It has had the benefit of studies made by individual members of the Committee and of the study made by Dr. Jesse E. Adams for you.

Your report to the Board of Trustees in September suggested three approaches to the problem which you presented. Your primary interest was that not only should there be a sound administrative set—up, but that certain educational functions and responsibilities recognized in all institutions should be retained by a representative University Faculty. It was with these expressions in mind and a study of the appraisal presented by you that the Committee proceeded with the work assigned to it.

Careful attention has been given to the suggestions made in the report of the President to the Board of Trustees entitled, "An Appraisal of the University's Administrative Organization". The Committee surveyed and considered in detail the experiences of the educational institutions of first rank. It was concluded that with minor changes, the suggestions in the President's report would provide a sound basis of organization both from the standpoint of education and of administration. It would also provide the mechanics to meet the problem of promoting a cooperative democratic administration which the President asked for.

The report of the Committee of 15, which was unanimously adopted and signed by each member of the Committee, is transmitted herewith. The main features of the Committee's report are:

- (a) That the President of the University is the executive officer of the institution and of all the work associated with it and ex officio a member of all faculties.
- (b) That the President at his discretion may appoint or have appointed such temporary or standing committees of the teaching, research or administrative staff as he may deem wise, including an advisory or administrative cabinet.
- (c) That the Faculty of the University be expanded by the addition of certain ex officio members and forty members of the rank of assistant professor or above elected by the professorial staff. This body shall exercise jurisdiction over all matters of University educational policy, but shall have no management or administrative functions.
  - (d) That the University Assembly shall be continued and shall consist of all officers, staff and employees of the University.

It is believed that the organization and duties proposed will permit the University of Kentucky to function effectively. The powers, functions and responsibilities of the office of the President are preserved. There is segregated to administration the powers and duties that accrue to it.

The responsibility of educational policy-making is confided to the University Faculty. As great an amount of autonomy remains with the individual College as is consistent with the most effective operation of the institution as a whole.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE UNIVERSITY'S ADMINISTRATIVE ORGANIZATION

### Introduction

The committee's report is submitted in the form of proposed changes in the <u>Governing Regulations of the University</u> published in June, 1936, and amended by the action of the Board of Trustees of April 1, 1941. If adopted by the Board of Trustees, the regulations herein presented would supplant all previous regulations in the areas covered.

There are, however, several sections of the Governing Regulations of the University not touched upon in this report. It will be imperative, therefore, if these proposals are accepted, that a study be made of the entire regulations as published and amended with a view to insuring that there will be one complete and consistent set of governing rules for the University. If this report is approved, it is suggested that the President proceed immediately to request this or a new committee to harmonize the remaining governing regulations of the institution with the organization herein provided.

For the convenience of those who may be concerned, the proposals hereinafter made are summarized as follows:

1. The objective of the proposed organization is to make possible an effective formulation of basic policies and a clear definition of functions, in order that the fundamental purposes of the University of Kentucky may be best achieved. These would seem to be the most effective instruction of all students enrolled and the largest possible contribution to the state in the form of research and public service.

- 2. Administrative or executive functions are separated as completely as possible from educational policy making.
- 3. All administrative and executive functions, including all budgetary, financial and business matters and including the authority to suspend or otherwise abrogate rules in specific cases, are definitely assigned to the President of the University and his administrative staff.
- 4. Educational policy making, on the other hand, is made the responsibility of the University Faculty. This body, which represents an expansion of the present Faculty of the University, is composed of the administrative officials of the institution and a number of elected members of the instructional staff of the rank of assistant professor or higher. It has seemed wise to enlarge the membership of the present Faculty of the University in order that the administration and staff may be kept in closer touch with each other; in order that the fullest advantage may be taken of the wisdom and special abilities of members of the instructional staff; in order to insure the largest amount of coordination of the various colleges and divisions of the institution; and in order to promote the most cooperative and democratic administration of the University.
- 5. Under the proposed organization as great an amount of autonomy remains with the individual college as is consistent with the most effective operation of the institution as a whole.
- 6. Provision is made for a University Assembly which shall consist of all officers and employees of the institution. This body has no administrative or legislative powers. It serves as a medium of expression for all members of the staff, regardless of rank, and offers to the President an opportunity to address all employees on matters of general interest.

### The President of the University

The President of the University is the executive officer of the institution and of all the work associated with it, and ex officio a member of all faculties. As such executive officer, he shall have full charge of the administrative activities of the University; and all deans and directors, the Comptroller, the Librarian, and all other subordinate officers and agents of the University shall be subject to his supervision and direction. He shall also serve as the official medium of communication between the Board of Trustees,

on the one hand, and the University Faculty, administrative officers, individual members of the staff, student organizations, and students, on the other. He is responsible to the Board for administering the educational and business policies of the institution, subject only to the law and the University rules and regulations prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

The President shall call meetings of the University Faculty and of the Assembly and shall preside over them. He may also call meetings of the various college faculties. It is the duty of the President to make recommendations relating to the general policy of the institution and to the maintenance of coordination among its several functions.

It is the function of the President to see that the rules and the regulations of the Board of Trustees and of the University Faculty are enforced. It is also his duty, directly or through the various University officers, to administer (a) all budgetary matters (other than approval of the budget by the Board of Trustees) including all business and financial activities; (b) all personnel matters, including appointments, promotions, transfers, changes of pay, retirement, and staff discipline; (b) the application of University rules relating to studies; (d) the admission and classification of students; (e) registrations and class assignments; (f) curricula and courses of mtudy; (g) research and teaching; (h) all physical facilities, including libraries, laboratories, etc.; (i) University commencements and other convocations; (j) student discipline; (k) student activities; (l) student social life; (m) University publications; (n) the University calendar and modifications in it; (c) public relations; (p) athletics and military training; and to perform all other administrative functions, whether expressly erumerated herein or not, necessary or appropriate for the effective operation of the University.

The President also shall provide for the application of the rules of the Board of Trustees and of the University Faculty to individual cases, and may authorize in extraordinary instances suspending the application to a particular case of a rule of the Uni-versity Faculty, except a condition of admission and except the number of credits and quality points required for graduation. assumed that the authority to suspend rules in individual cases will be delegated by the President to the appropriate administrative officers and that these officials will be responsible for the strict enforcement of the spirit of the regulations in all cases. When a rule is suspended or otherwise abrogated in an individual case, the action shall be taken by the administrative official most If the action directly involves a member immediately concerned. of the teaching staff or another administrative officer, the approval of such person or persons shall be obtained before the suspension In all cases a report of or abrogation of the rule is approved. the special action involving the suspension or abrogation of a rule shall be made to the Recistrar on the regular petition form. Registrar shall record the action in the appropriate manner and shall be prepared at any time to submit to the University Faculty a report on all such actions showing in each case the rule suspended "The word "state" before the word "law" ordered stricken out by an amendment of the Board of Trustees.

and the person or persons approving the action.

In the event of inconsistency between the President's administrative action and the educational policy of the University Faculty, the President shall arrange for a consideration of the matter at a meeting of the University Faculty. He shall then transmit to the Board of Trustees the viewpoints represented together with his recommendation. Action by the Board shall not, however, preclude further communication with the Board by the University Faculty, provided that the Board shall be addressed in all cases through the President.

The President, incident to the administration of the institution, may not only utilize subordinate administrative officers at his discretion (subject to general Board regulations) but may also appoint or have appointed such temporary or standing committees of the teaching, research, or administrative staff as he may deem wise, including an advisory or administrative cabinet. Standing committees shall be appointed annually.

### The Dean of the University

The following personnel shall be under the general supervision of the Dean of the University and shall report to that official; the Dean of Men, Dean of Women, Registrar, Director of Personnel, University Librarian, Director of the Department of University Extension, Secretary of the Y. M.C.A., Secretary of the Y.W.C.A., the Head of the Department of Athletics, the Director of the University Health Service, and the Director of the Department of Public Relations. He shall have general supervision of the summer quarter, administering it through the deans of the several colleges, and he shall perform such other administrative functions as the President shall delegate to him.

### The University Faculty

The University Faculty is the agency through which the educational policy of the institution is determined. It has no management or administrative functions, either in itself or through the instrumentality of its committees, administrative matters being expressly reserved to the President of the University and to such other officers as he may authorize, consistent with the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees. The membership of the Faculty shall consist of the President, who shall be ex officio chairman; the Dean of the University, who shall preside in the absence of the President; the Dean of the Graduate School; the dean of each college; the Dean of Men; the Dean of Women, the Registrar, who shall be ex officio secretary; the Comptroller; the Director of Extension; the Librarian; the President of the Student Government

Association; and of 40 elective members of the teaching and research staff of the rank of assistant professor or above distributed as follows:

After the first term, each member shall be elected for three At the expiration of any term, a member shall be ineligible for reelection until after one year has elapsed. The Faculty may cause this distribution to be restudied and adjusted after three years and every six years thereafter. The election of representatives to the Faculty shall be by letter ballots, and shall be conducted in each group for the representatives from that group by a committee appointed by the President, in the case of the first election, and thereafter, by a committee of the University Faculty. At the first election the length of term of each member shall be The individuals receiving the highest numbers determined by lot. of votes in each group shall be elected with the result of a tie being determined by lot. To fill a vacancy the President of the To fill a vacancy the President of the University shall appoint a member from the eligible members in the group affected to serve until the next election. Individual att endance redords shall be maintained and reported in the minutes. Non-attendance shall be cause for the Faculty's dropping a member. No alternate or substitutes shall attend nor shall there be voting by proxy.

Except as such functions are expressly reserved to the Board of Trustees and the President of the University, the University Faculty has and shall exercise jurisdiction over all matters of University educational policy. It is authorized to make regulations to promote the educational interests of the University as a whole with respect to (a) studies, including schedules of classes,

numbering and classification of courses, credit for foreign languages and extension work, poor work in English, probation, repeated failures, student load, transfer between curricula of different colleges, unsatisfactory scholarship and attendance, examinations, credits, marks, and student standing; (b) admission and classification of students and requirements for graduation; (c) approval of curricula and courses; (d) the University libraries; (e) commencements and other convocations; (f) student discipline, including non-attendance; (g) student social and extra-curricular activities; (h) the awarding of honors; and other matters, whether or not enumerated herein, concerning the educational program of the institution as a whole.

The Faculty may perform these functions directly or through the use of standing or special committees which it may authorize for appointment from personnel eligible for Faculty membership, but neither the Faculty nor its committee shall have authority to perform administrative, as distinguished from policy-making, functions. In case of an issue between a college faculty and the University Faculty concerning jurisdiction over a particular function, the question of jurisdiction shall be determined by the President. No degree, however, shall be conferred except on recommendation of the University Faculty.

The University Faculty may address the President, or through him the Board of Trustees, respecting any University matter.

The Faculty shall hold regular meetings on the second Monday of each month during the school year, and special meetings at the call of the President or at the call of its secretary on written request of ten members.

### The Assembly

The University Assembly shall consist of all officers and employees of the institution, including the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension staffs. It shall meet on call of the President or on written request of ten members. The Assembly may express its view on any matter affecting the University and may make recommendations to the University Faculty, the President, or through him to the Board of Trustees.

Nothing herein shall affect, in any particular, the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on the first day of April, 1941, relating to the creation and functions of the Department of Business Management and Control of the University.\*\*\*

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3. The recommendation of President Donovan that the report of the Committee of Fifteen (15); herein above set out, be approved was considered by the Board of Trustees. It was moved, seconded, and carried to amend the report as follows:

On page 8, paragraph 1, line 5, strike out the word "state" after the word "the" and before the word "law".

In paragraph 2, page 10, line 7, after the word "conducted" and before the word "by" by inserting the following words, "in each group for the representatives from that group."

On page 11, by inserting after the fifth paragraph the following paragraph and words: "Nothing herein shall affect, in any particular, the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on the first day of April, 1941, relating to the creation and functions of the Department of Business Management and Control of the University".

President Donovan stated that it was not the intent of the Committee to change, or alter, the Department of Business Management and Control as created by the Board of Trustees on April 1, 1941. Thereupon the following resolution offered and being duly seconded was unanimously adopted: Be it resolved that the report of the Committee of Fifteen, of which Dean Thomas P. Cooper is Chairman, which is copied herein, be and it is hereby amended by striking out the word "state" on page 8 and inserting the words "in each group for the representatives from that group" on page 10, and inserting the paragraph on page 11, "nothing herein shall affect the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on the first day of April, 1941, relating to the creation and functions of the Department of Business Management and Control of the University", said amendments being inserted, as designated above, and, as so amended, the report is hereby approved and adopted.

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## E. Appreciation of the Board Extended to Committee of Fifteen.

Dean Cooper retired from the meeting after the Board had discussed and adopted the recommendations of the Committee of Fifteen. Upon motion, duly made, seconded and carried, the Board requested the President to express to Dean Thomas Cooper, Chairman, and to each member of the Committee their appreciation for the fine work of the Committee and the splendid report submitted.

# F. Gifts to the University: --Library of Cale Young Rice; Bust of General Cassius Clay; Paintings by Colonel A. A. Anderson; Madden File of STARS AND STRIPES.

President Donovan made the following statement to the Board relative to the gift of the library of Cale Young Rice; the gift of the bust of General Cassius Clay by Mr. and Mrs.W. F. Marsteller of Cleveland, Ohio, and Richmond, Kentucky; the gift of two paintings by Colonel A.A. Anderson, by his daughter, Mrs. Eleanor A. Gampbell, of Scarsdale, New York; and the Madden File of STARS AND STRIPES by Mrs. Winifred Madden of Lexington, Ky.

Cale Young Rice Library. The late Cale Young Rice, one of Kentucky's distinguished literary men, has bequeathed to the University of Kentucky his library, which has already been delivered to the institution by his executor. Mr. Rice said in his will, "To the library of the University of Kentucky, I leave all my books not mentioned above in honor of my dear friends, Frank and Frances McVey."

Bust of General Cassius Clay. I take pleasure in reporting to you that Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Marsteller of Cleveland, Ohio, and Richmond, Kentucky, have presented to the University of Kentucky the bust of General Cassius Clay by Joel T. mart; This is considered one of the finest pieces of work ever executed by Mr. mart. It is a gift in which the University can take considerable pride.

Paintings of Colonel A. A. Anderson. Mrs. Eleanor A. Campbell of Scarsdale, New York, has presented to the University of Kentucky two paintings by her father, Colonel A.A. Anderson. Other pictures by Colonel Anderson have been presented to the Speed Museum in Louisville.

Madden File of STARS AND STRIPES. Mrs. Winifred Madden of Lexington, Ky., has presented the complete files, beautifully bound, of STARS AND STRIPES to the Library of the University of Kentucky. This is the newspaper which was published overseas by the American Expeditionary Forces. It will have considerable value for any student of history who may be studying the first World War.

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4. On motion made, seconded and unanimously carried, the above gifts were accepted and the President was requested to extend to the executor of the estate of Cale Young Rice the appreciation of the Board for the gift of the library; to Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Marsteller of Cleveland, Ohio, and Richmond, Ky., for the gift of the bust; to Mrs. Eleanor A. Campbell of Scarsdale, N. Y., for the gift of the paintings; and to Mrs. Winifred Madden of Hamburg Place, Lexington, Ky., for the gift of the file of STARS AND STRIPES.

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### G. Pedestal for Bust of General Cassius Clay.

President Donovan explained to the Board that the pedestal for the bust of General Cassius Clay was not included as a gift to the University. He stated that it was a very fine piece of Italian marble and should be acquired by the University, if the price was reasonable.

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5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Board authorized the purchase of the pedestal for the bust of General Clay, same to be paid for out of any funds not otherwise allocated.

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H. Resolution on the Death of Dr. James Burt Miner.

The President made the following statement to the Board:

I deeply regret to report to you the death of Dr. James Burt Miner, Professor and Head of the Department of Psychology. Doctor Miner died at his home on March 24, 1943.

Doctor Miner has been a member of the staff of the University for twenty-two years. He would have re-For many years Doctor tired at the end of this year. Miner has been regarded as one of the outstanding professors of the University. He has made a great contribution to this institution both as a teacher and as a He was the author of a number of books research worker. and many articles which have appeared in the psychological His scholarship was recognized among men of journals. He was a man greatly beloved by both students and colleagues. The University has sustained a great loss in the passing of this distinguished teacher and scholar.

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6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the following resolution was unanimously passed and ordered spread upon the minutes and a copy of same sent to Mrs. Miner:

### Professor James Burt Miner

The University of Kentucky on March 24, 1943, through the death of James Burt Miner, Professor of Psychology and Head of the Department, lost a true scholar and a distinguished teacher, and the Commonwealth, a real benefactor.

The pattern of Doctor Miner's life was early determined. As a youth he was in charge of his father's bookstore for months at a time; as a young man he was a newspaper reporter on the St. Paul Dispatch and Spokane Chronicle; as a mature man he taught in the University of Illinois, University of Iowa, University of Minnesota, and Carnegie Institute of Technology. He was completing his twentysecond year of teaching at the University of Kentucky at the time of his death. His activities in the fields of scholarship, teaching, and social betterment made up his Thus he published outstanding articles and books in his chosen field of applied psychology; conducted many studies on ways of improving teaching and helping students find their places in society; and established psychological clinics or service bureaus for children and for adults at the University of Minnesota, Carnegie Institute of Technology and the University of Kentucky.

During his twenty-one years of service at the University of Kentucky, he built the Department of Psychology from a meagre beginning to one of the outstanding departments in the South. His counsel was not only sought by professional psychologists over the United States, but by industrial organizations, state welfare departments, and civil service boards.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky records with sorrow the passing of Doctor Miner, and wishes that copies of this statement be sent to his son, Horace Mitchell Miner, and to his wife, Jessie S. Miner, as a token of the esteem and respect with which the University held a great scholar and teacher, Professor James Burt Miner.

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### I. Enrollment.

President Donovan gave the following facts to the Board concerning enrollment of the University for the current quarter, which the Board received and ordered placed in the minutes.

For the first time in the history of the University, we have more women enrolled than men. For the spring quarter, 1042 women enrolled and 635 men, making a total enrollment of 1677. The enrollment for the second semester last year was 1182 women and 1725 men, making a total of 2907.

Approximately 1000 men left the University at the end of the quarter for military service. Nothing like this has ever happened in the history of the institution.

The following table shows the enrollment by colleges.

### J. Employment of Dr. Logan Wilson.

The following statement was read by President Donovan:

At a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees, I reported a grant from the General Education Board for the purpose of employing a sociologist to become Headof the Department of Sociology. This gift was accepted by the Board and DeanBoyd immediately proceeded to contact a number of men who might qualify for this position. After a careful study of the credentials of some of the most distinguished sociologists in our country, Dr. Logan Wilson, Head of the Department of Sociology of Tulane University, was invited to come for an interview.

Dr. Wilson is a native of Texas. He has received degrees from two southern colleges and his doctor's degree from harvard University. For a time he was a newspaper man, a teacher of English and journalism, and later he taught sociology at Harvard, University of Maryland, University of Texas, and Tulane. He is the author of numerous articles and has recently published a book entitled "Academic Man", which is a notable research contribution.

Dr. Wilson is a man of fine personality and scholarly attainments. I think the University will be fortunate in securing his services. I am recommending the appointment of Dr. Wilson as Head of the Department and Professor of Sociology, effective July 1, 1943, his salary to begin September 1, 1943, on a ten months basis.

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7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the recommendation of the President for the employment of Dr. Logan Wilson as head of the Department and Professor of Sociology, effective July 1, 1943, salary to begin September 1, 1943, was approved.

### K. Promotion of Professor Irwin T. Sanders.

President Donovan also stated that Professor Irwin T.Sanders, of the Department of Sociology, was being recommended to be promoted from Assistant Professor to Associate Professor, with increase in salary, his promotion in rank to become effective immediately, and his salary adjustment effective as of September 1, 1943.

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8. Upon motion, duly made and seconded, the President's recommendation in regard to Professor Irwin T. Sanders was concurred in.

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### L. Combs Lumber Company Building.

The President submitted the following correspondence relative to Combs Lumber Company contract for air conditioning certain parts of the Student Union Building.

In Re: Combs Lumber Company Contract for air conditioning certain parts of the Student Union Building.

Dear President Donovan:

At the Board meeting in January, 1943, the Combs Lumber Company's request for part payment on equipment purchased for air conditioning certain parts of the Student Union Building and not yet delivered or installed was declined at that time. I have conferred with Combs Lumber Company and examined their records and find that they placed an order for the equipment necessary within three days after receipt of Special Order #3418. I am of the opinion that failure to secure all equipment necessary for the installation of this project was not due to negligence on the part of the Combs Lumber Company.

I am, therefore, recommending that the Combs Lumber Company be made a partial payment on their invoice dated November 4, 1942, of \$4,482.74 in the amount of 90% of the invoice price.

I am also attaching hereto a letter under date of April 3, 1943, from Combs Lumber Company agreeing to keep intact all materials now on hand and not installed or delivered, and to complete the contract as soon as it is possible to obtain other materials.

We have the pleasure to enclose for your information and files, statement of account of Security Trust Company, as Executor of the Estate of James K. Patterson, covering the period February 2, 1942 to February 2, 1943. We think the only explanation needed is to state that the account now holds \$80,000 maturity value of United States War Savings Bonds Series F due 1954, which were purchased at 74% of the maturity value and which do not pay current interest, the interest being allowed to accumulate at the rate of 2.53%, compounded semi-annually, the bonds maturing at their face value 12 years from date of purchase. the current income is being reinvested and a larger rate could be obtained on this type of bond than on the others held by the account, we sold about \$47,000 of face value of U. S. Bonds held in the account for a total of \$50,690.63 and reinvested the proceeds in these Series F bonds. We shall probably invest the cash now on hand in the Series F bonds also.

### N. Liability and Theft Insurance.

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of March 30, the Comptroller was directed to make an investigation as to the cost of carrying liability and theft insurance on University and Experiment Station trucks. The following report was made:

Dear President Donovan:

At the meeting of the Executive Committee on March 30, 1943, the Committee requested the Comptroller to investigate the cost of carrying personal and property liability insurance and fire and theft on our trucks.

I submitted the question to two insurance companies on a fleet of twenty-one (21) trucks with coverage of \$5,000.00 property damage and a maximum of \$10,000.00 public liability. The cost for the fleet of twenty-one trucks is estimated at \$528.00 per year. Actually, the University owns twenty-four (24) trucks, but this office did not have information on these three trucks which are located at Robinson Sub-Station and West Kentucky Sub-Station.

O. Purchase of Apartment House on Harrison Avenue.

The President read the following letter to the Board:

April 6, 1943

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

Some two months ago I learned that the apartment house at 343 Harrison avenue, in the City of Lexington, was for sale. This property joins the Campus just northeast of the Girls Dormitory. The building is of rock foundation, brick walls, contains twenty-six rooms and has three full bathrooms, which are said to be adequate to take care of the people housed in the building. It is heated by a steam boiler furnace. The lot has a depth of 148 feet and a front width of 31.1 feet.

I have had this property appraised by several indi-No one, however, has given me a written appraisal. viduals. The building is worth, in the judgment of these people whom I have asked for advice, from \$16,000 to \$20,000. I have purchased this property from Udell Levy, Attorneyin-fact for Alla Vernova, for the sum of \$11,700.00. am definitely of the opinion that the University should own this property which is situated as it is, bounded on the west and south by property of the University and on the east by Marrison Avenue and on the north by property privately owned. I might further add that the seller will pay half of the City Taxes due in 1943 and the purchaser will pay the October half of the City Taxes and all of the County and State Taxes due in 1943. All screens, shades, linoleums, or any other attached fixtures, are included in the sale price of the building.

The Board discussed the advisability of confirming the purchase of the apartment house which joins the campus and later inspected the exterior of the building. Several members of the Board expressed belief that purchase price was exceedingly low and that purchase of the apartment house should be confirmed without delay.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Beard confirmed the purchase of lot and building located at 343 Harrison Avenue, City of Lexington, beginning at a point on the west side of Harrison Avenue, 470 feet and 2 inches south of East Maxwell Street; thence in a westerly direction, 148 feet to Woolley's line; thence in a southerly direction along Woolley's line 31:1 feet to the Patterson Hall grounds; thence in an easterly direction 163.1 feet to the Harrison Avenue sidewalk; thence in a northerly direction along said sidewalk 33.1 feet to the point of beginning, for the sum of \$11,700.00, and under other terms as enumerated in the letter copied herein.

### P. Luncheon at Jewell mall.

The Board recessed at 1:00 o'clock to go to Jewell Hall where they were entertained at luncheon, under the direction of Mrs. Sarah B. Holmes, Dean of Women; Miss Limbach and Miss Lester, and, after luncheon, retired to a conference room in Jewell Hall for further deliberation.

### Q. Comptroller's Report.

The following report was read by the Comptroller and was received with interest, ordered accepted and copied into the minutes.

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

I submit herewith report for the period ending March 31, 1943, covering the Division of Colleges, Experiment Station, Extension Division, Restricted (Trust) Funds, and Agency Funds.

### Division of Colleges

There is an unrealized balance of State appropriations amounting to \$528,818.18. This amount has been allotted since April 1 and is now available for the current quarter. There is an unrealized balance from Federal funds of \$16,570.68. This amount is due from the Smith-Hughes Vocational Education appropriation and will be realized in the form of reimbursement to the University for expenditures made, either during the past quarter or that may be made during the ensuing quarter of the current year. The budget estimate from Student Fees has been exceeded by approximately \$19,000.00. A number of students have withdrawn since registering for the third quarter. Refund of fees will approximate \$3,000.00.

The budget estimate for Sales and Services will not be realized. We estimated receipts from Miscellaneous Maintenance and Operation at \$6,000.00. This item will fall short by approximately \$4,000.00. The estimate for Rent of Institutional Property has been exceeded by approximately \$4,000.00. The University has acquired three apartment houses which are now rented. The budget estimate did not anticipate the acquisition of these houses.

The income for Men's Residence Halls will not equal the estimate. The deficit will be approximately \$4,000.00 due to the rumor on the Campus that the soldiers will be housed in the residence halls during the months of April, May and June. The halls at present are a bout one-third filled. The income from room and board in the Women's Halls will approximate the budget estimate. The Women's malls at this time are operating to capacity.

Page 3, of the Financial Report, gives the condensed statement of the transactions of the Division of Colleges for operation for the three quarters of the current school year. The expenditures and encumbrances for the first nine months of the current year exceeded State allotments of funds by more than \$12,000.00. This overdraft of March 31, 1943, was wiped out on April 1, by new allotments. It was only temporary and could have been avoided if necessary as the College Revolving Fund, on the same date, showed a free balance in excess of \$113,000.00.

The appropriation for Research in Coal is about one-fifth exhausted indicating that more than 50% of this appropriation will revert July 1.

The free balance in the College Revolving Fund amounting to more then \$113,000.00\$ does not reflect registration fees for the current quarter.

The free balance for the total group of Administration and General Expenses, of the Division of Colleges, is slightly in excess of one-fourth of the budgeted funds for these purposes. There is one item, viz: the budget estimate for catalogues, announcements, printing, etc., which has been exceeded by more than \$1,000.00. This deficit, however, can be consumed by the budget appropriation for General Expenses Not Otherwise Classified, which has a free balance amounting to more than two-thirds of the budget appropriation for that purpose.

The free balances shown to the credit of the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Engineering, College of Commerce, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, College of Law, and College of Education are more than one-fourth of the budget allotment to each or these colleges, clearly indicating that the unexpended, or encumbered, balance of the budget appropriation to each college will be sufficient to maintain present operations for the remaining quarter of the current fiscal year. The free balance of the total operation of the Physical Plant, as shown on page 8, requires some analysis. The free balance for Utilities and Their Operation shows a deficit of \$6.345.16. Credits due from self-supporting auxiliary agencies, when received, will more than clear the deficit. The deficit shown for Property Insurance of \$2,497.49 is an actual deficit due to an under-estimate for the amount necessary for property insurance. This was caused by an omission of estimating insurance to be carried on leased property such as Men's Dormitories, Jewell Hall, and Service Building, which insurance is not carried with the State Fire and Tornado Insurance, but through commercial The deficit in excess of \$35,000.00 on Work in Progress concerns. will be reduced by credits received before the end of the fiscal There will be, however, a deficit in this account even at the end of the year unless it is charged as "accounts receivable." It will not be possible to complete all work in progress by the end of the fiscal year. Therefore, it will be necessary to carry end of the fiscal year. over a deficit in this item.

At the time of the approval of the budget no amount was included for Stores Account, or Materials Inventory. The deficit in this item is \$38,566.65. A part of this capital investment in materials and supplies will be dharged out against various departments and divisions prior to the end of the fiscal year. It is necessary, however, to tie up \$30,000.00 to \$40,000.00 in the Stores Account and a balance in our Revolving Fund should be built up to a point where same will permit a budget of approximately \$50,000 for Materials and Supplies Inventory.

The expenditures for Men's Residence Halls and Women's Residence Halls will not exceed budgeted estimates.

### Plant Funds

The total budgeted estimate for the Plant Funds, or for the retirement of bonds, and lease agreements aggregate \$93,507.54, not including the State appropriation for Capital Outlay amounting to \$200,000.00. The expenditures and encumbrances for bond issues and lease agreements have been made according to commitments and the free balances are adequate to meet all Plant Fund obligations due and payable prior to July 1, 1943.

### General Comment on Division of Colleges

It is safe to predict that the income will equal budget estimated and that the expenditures will be held within budget appropriations, but due to war emergencies, making it difficult to secure supplies when needed, it has become essential that we maintain a materials inventory reserve. This will cause the encumbering of funds, not budgeted. Therefore, while we will have a balanced budget, as far as receipts and the budgeted expenditures are concerned, yet may find ourselves short of cash.

### Experiment Station

The income for the Experiment Station from State and Federal sources is being received in accordance with budget estimates. The estimate of receipts from Sales and Services seems to be appreciably underestimated. The Revolving Fund balance of Experiment Station as of March 31, 1943, is \$65,000.00. The receipts of this fund are broken down into eleven different revolving funds. These funds are analyzed monthly as to sources to insure proper segregation of the funds, and also to give adequate operating data.

The expenditures for the various budgets of the Experiment Station approximate two-thirds of the year's budget estimate, while only one-fourth of the current fiscal year remains.

### Extension Division

The income to this Division is received entirely from State and Federal sources. The budget estimate will, therefore, be realized in total.

The expenditures from these funds are mostly for salaries and travel. There is no budgetary problem in connection with the funds as budgeted for this Division.

### Restricted (Trust) Funds

The group of Restricted Current Funds, on the whole, are in a satisfactory financial condition. The receipts and balances of the various restricted funds exceed expenditures to date. In the main, each fund has a free and unencumbered balance as of March 31, 1943. There are, however, a few accounts that I wish to especially call to your attention.

On page 18, there are four accounts headed "Enlisted Specialists Branch." The total receipts shown by this report approximate \$90,000.00. The receipts for February and March are not included. They aggregate slightly in excess of \$63,000.00, making a total earned receipts in excess of \$153,000.00 for the period from September, 1942, through March, 1943. The expenditures through March exceed \$124,000.00, a difference of approximately \$29,000.00, which may be treated as a reserve fund for the use of the physical property and the restoration of same, when the contract is terminated.

On page 20, under the heading "Student Union", the total receipts for the current year to date aggregate in excess of \$22,000.00. The expenditures for operating the Student Union Building for the first nine months of the current year are in excess of \$20,000.00, leaving a balance of more than \$2,000.00, on which to operate the Student Union for the months of April, May and June. There will be some additional receipts from student fees to be credited to this account. They will not be sufficient to keep the Student Union on a self-supporting basis for the balance of the current year. It will be necessary, therefore, to draw upon the accumulated balance in the Student Union Fund, which has been obligated for the installation of the air conditioning of certain parts of the Student Union Building and may eventually make it necessary for the University to make a small appropriation either to supplement the cost of administration of the Student Union, or pay a part of the cost of air conditioning certain parts of the building, if and when the job is finished.

The total received from the Haggin Trust Fund, during the current year has amounted to \$32,267.46. More than \$20,000.00 has been allotted by the Board from the Haggin Fund, during the current year, for graduate scholarships, publication of book, instruction and other projects deemed worthwhile to the betterment and advancement of the University. In addition to these allotments there is a free balance in excess of \$63,000.00. The Executive Committee, at its meeting on March 30, 1943, authorized the investment of \$50,000.00 in Government bonds.

### Agency Funds

On pages 24, 25 and 26 will be found a list of Agency Funds carried in the Accounting Division. These Agencies are self-supporting and even though some show a small overdraft, they are temporary. The Comptroller's Office acts as a bookkeeper for these Agencies and does not exercise any control over the expenditures of the funds.

#### QUARTERLY REPORT TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES

H. L. Doncvan, President

April 6, 1943

Report of Committee of Fifteen on the University's Administrative Organization

Last September (1942) the Board of Trustees authorized the president to appoint a committee to study the administrative organization of the University. A Committee of Fifteen able menend women representing every college of the University was selected to undertake this study. Under the chairmanship of Dean Thomas P. Cooper, the committee has diligently examined the practices in the best universities of the United States, and it has prepared a report in the light of its investigations that it believes will work effectively and efficiently to promote the educational interest of our University. This report I have examined with great care and I am pleased with the recommendations contained therein.

The Committee is recommending to us a charter. If it is adopted by the Board, I believe the University can live under it for the next half century. The proposed plan separates administrative functions from those known as educational policy-making functions. It provides that the membership of the faculty be composed of both the administrator and the teacher, thereby giving professors and administrators the opportunity to work together for the welfare of the institution. Special telents and abilities of teachers can be capitalized under the proposed organization. will certainly stimulate professors and cause them to have a greater interest in the University. The plan makes the faculty a representative group, but thru the provision for rotation in office eventually every professor will have an opportunity to be a member of that body. By making the faculty a representative democracy, its size has been kept small enough to enable it to transact business efficiently and without consuming too much time as a deliberative body.

The Committee became acquainted with the administrative procedures of America's best universities in the preparation of this report. It has drawn freely on the experiences of the best institutions of higher education. It has adopted some of the better features of a number of our leading universities. The proposed organization resembles to a degree the administrative organization of the University of Florida and Chio State University; however, it does not follow the exact pattern of either

of these institutions. It is a plan that fits our needs at the University of Kentucky.

Andrew D. White, the first president and one of the founders of Cornell University, says in his autobiography: "I felt that the university, to be successful, should not depend on the life and conduct of any one man; that every one of those called to govern and to manage it, whether president or professor, should feel that he had powers and responsibilities in its daily administration. \*\*\*\*\* I insisted that the faculty should not be merely a committee to register the decrees of the president, but that it should have full legislative powers to discuss and decide university affairs. Nor did I allow it to become a body merely advisory: I not only insisted that it should have full legislative powers, but that it should be steadily trained in the use of them".

President White, one of the greatest university presidents of all times, in 1868 infused this spirit into Cornell University at a time when other institutions were autocratically administered. Today, however, this is the spirit that is to be found on the campus of every American university that has attained a rank of the first order. It is a policy of this character that I think has largely prevailed at the University of Kentucky and a spirit I hope to see perpetuated so long as I am president of the institution. For this reason I am anxious to have the Board of Trustees adopt the Committee's report for I am confident it represents the type of organization under which the University will prosper.

The proposed plan does not greatly alter the administrative organization of the University that was adopted by the Board in April, 1941.

The Department of Business Management and Control under the Comptroller has not been changed in any particular. A few additional responsibilities have been added to the office of the Dean of the University. The several colleges retain the maximum amount of autonomy consistent with good university administration. Each Dean retains as much, if not more, control over his college than heretofore.

The points of difference are (a) the Faculty of the University has been enlarged so as to include professors as well as administrative officers and (b) a clear cut line of demarcation between administrative functions and policy-making functions has been drawn.

I recommend the adoption of the Report of the Committee of Fifteen and that it become effective as of September 24, 1943, the opening of the Fall Quarter.

Dear President Donovan:

On September 17, 1942, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, you named a Committee of 15 to make a study of the University's administrative organization and "report its findings to the President and Board of Trustees" for their consideration.

This committee met with you for the purpose of organization and to discuss with you the contemplated study. Since that time it has held frequent meetings, either of the Committee as a whole or its subcommittees. It has had the benefit of studies made by individual members of the Committee and of the study made by Dr. Jesse E. Adams for you.

Your report to the Board of Trustees in September suggested three approaches to the problem which you presented. Your primary interest was that not only should there be a sound administrative set up, but that certain educational functions and responsibilities recognized in all institutions should be retained by a representative University Faculty. It was with these expressions in mind and a study of the appraisal presented by you that the Committee proceeded with the work assigned to it.

Careful attention has been given to the suggestions made in the report of the President to the Board of Trustees entitled "An Appraisal of the University's Administrative Organization". The Committee surveyed and considered in detail the experiences of the educational institutions of first rank. It was concluded that with minor changes, the suggestions in the President's report would provide a sound basis of organization both from the standpoint of education and of administration. It would also provide the mechanics to meet the problem of promoting a cooperative democratic administration which the President asked for.

The report of the Committee of 15, which was unanimously adopted and signed by each member of the Committee, is

transmitted herewith. The main features of the Committee's report are:

- (a) That the President of the University is the executive officer of the institution and of all the work associated with it and <u>ex officio</u> a member of all faculties.
- (b) That the President at his discretion may appoint or have appointed such temporary or standing committees of the teaching, research or administrative staff as he may deem wise, including an advisory or administrative cabinet.
- (c) That the Faculty of the University be expanded by the addition of certain ex officio members and forty members of the rank of assistant professor or above elected by the professorial staff. This body shall exercise jurisdiction over all matters of University educational policy, but shall have no management or administrative functions.
- (d) That the University Assembly shall be continued and shall consist of all officers, staff and employees of the University.

It is believed that the organization and duties proposed will permit the University of Kentucky to function effectively. The powers, functions and responsibilities of the office of the President are preserved. There is segregated to administration the powers and duties that accrue to it. The responsibility of educational policy-making is confided to the University Faculty. As great an amount of autonomy remains with the individual College as is consistent with the most effective operation of the institution as a whole.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE UNIVERSITY'S ADMINISTRATIVE ORGANIZATION

### Introduction

The Committee's report is submitted in the form of proposed changes in the <u>Governing Regulations of the University</u> published in June, 1936, and amended by the action of the Board of Trustees of April 1, 1941. If adopted by the Board of Trustees, the regulations herein presented would supplant all previous regulations in the areas covered.

There are, however, several sections of the Governing Regulations of the University not touched upon in this report. It will be imperative, therefore, if these proposals are accepted, that a study be made of the entire regulations as published and amended with a view to insuring that there will be one complete and consistent set of governing rules for the University. If this report is approved, it is suggested that the President proceed immediately to request this or a new committee to harmonize the remaining governing regulations of the institution with the organization herein provided.

For the convenience of those who may be concerned, the proposals hereinafter made are summarized as follows:

- 1. The objective of the proposed organization is to make possible an effective formulation of basic policies and a clear definition of functions, in order that the fundamental purposes of the University of Kentucky may be best achieved. These would seem to be the most effective instruction of all students enrolled and the largest possible contribution to the state in the form of research and public service.
- Administrative or executive functions are separated as completely as possible from educational policy making.
- 3. All administrative and executive functions, including all budgetary, financial and business matters and including the authority to suspend or otherwise abrogate rules in specific cases, are definitely assigned to the President of the University and his administrative staff.
- 4. Educational policy making, on the other hand, is made the responsibility of the University Faculty. This body, which represents an expansion of the present Faculty of the University, is composed of the administrative officials of the institution and

a number of elected members of the instructional staff of the rank of assistant professor or higher. It has seemed wise to enlarge the membership of the present Faculty of the University in order that the administration and staff may be kept in closer touch with each other; in order that the fullest advantage may be taken of the wisdom and special abilities of members of the instructional staff; in order to insure the largest amount of coordination of the various colleges and divisions of the institution; and in order to promote the most cooperative and democratic administration of the University.

- 5. Under the proposed organization as great an amount of autonomy remains with the individual college as is consistent with the most effective operation of the institution as a whole.
- 6. Provision is made for a University Assembly which shall consist of all officers and employees of the institution. This body has no administrative or legislative powers. It serves as a medium of expression for all members of the staff, regardless of rank, and offers to the President an opportunity to address all employees on matters of general interest.

#### The President of the University

The President of the University is the executive officer of the institution and of all the work associated with it, and ex officio a member of all faculties. As such executive officer, he shall have full charge of the administrative activities of the University; and all deams and directors. the Comptroller, the Librarian, and all other subordinate officers and agents of the University shall be subject to his supervision and direction. He shall also serve as the official medium of communication between the Board of Trustees, on the one hand, and the University Faculty, administrative officers, individual members of the staff, student organizations, and students, on the other. responsible to the Board for administering the educational and business policies of the institution, subject only to the law and the University rules and regulations prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

The President shall call meetings of the University Faculty and of the Assembly and shall preside over them. He may also call meetings of the various college faculties. It

is the duty of the President to make recommendations relating to the general policy of the institution and to the maintenance of coordination among its several functions.

It is the function of the President to see that the rules and the regulations of the Board of Trustees and of the University Faculty are enforced. It is also his duty, directly or through the various University officers, to administer (a) all budgetary matters (other than approval of the budget by the Board of Trustees) including all business and financial activities; (b) all personnel matters, including appointments, promotions, transfers, changes of pay, retirement, and staff discipline; (c) the application of University rules relating to studies; (d) the admission and classifie cation of students; (e) registrations and class assignments; (f) curricula and courses of study; (g) research and teaching; (h) all physical facilities, including libraries, laboratories, etc.; (i) University commencements and other convocations; (j) student discipline; (k) student activities; (l) student social life; (m) University publications; (n) the University calendar and modifications in it; (o) public relations; (p) athletics and military training; and to perform all other administrative functions, whether expressly enumerated herein or not, necessary or appropriate for the effective operation of the University.

The President also shall provide for the application of the rules of the Board of Trustees and of the University Faculty to individual cases, and may authorize in extraordinary instances suspending the application to a particular case of a rule of the University Faculty, except a condition of admission and except the number of credits and quality points required for graduation. It is assumed that the authority to suspend rules in individual cases will be delegated by the President to the appropriate administrative officers and that these officials will be responsible for the strict enforcement of the spirit of the regulations in all When a rule is suspended or otherwise abrogated in cases. an individual case, the action shall be taken by the administrative official most immediately concerned. action directly involves a member of the teaching staff or another administrative officer, the approval of such person or persons shall be obtained before the suspension or abrogation of the rule is approved. In all cases a report of the special action involving the suspension or abrogation of a rule shall be made to the Registrar on the regular petition form. The Registrar shall record the action in the appropriate menner and shall be prepared at any time to submit to the University Faculty a report on all such actions showing in each case the rule suspended and the person or persons approving the action.

In the event of inconsistency between the President's administrative action and the educational policy of the University Faculty, the President shall arrange for a consideration of the matter at a meeting of the University Faculty. He shall then transmit to the Board of Trustees the viewpoint represented together with his recommendation. Action by the Board shall not, however, preclude further communication with the Board by the University Faculty, provided that the Board shall be addressed in all cases through the President.

The President, incident to the administration of the institution, may not/utilize subordinate administrative officers at his discretion (subject to general Board regulations) but may also appoint or have appointed such temporary or standing committees of the teaching, research, or administrative staff as he may deem wise, including an advisory or administrative cabinet. Standing committees shall be appointed annually.

## The Dean of the University

The following personnel shall be under the general supervision of the Dean of the University and shall report to that official; the Dean of Men, Dean of Women, Registrar, Director of Personnel, University Librarian, Director of the Department of University Extension, Secretary of the Y.M.C.A., Secretary of the Y.W.C.A., the Head of the Department of Athletics, the Director of the University Health Service, and the Director of the Department of Public Relations. He shall have general supervision of the summer quarter, administering it through the deans of the several colleges, and he shall perform such other administrative functions as the President shall delegate to him.

## The University Faculty

The University Faculty is the agency through which the educational policy of the institution is determined. It has no management or administrative functions, either in itself or through the instrumentality of its committees, administrative matters being expressly reserved to the President of the University and to such other officers as he may authorize, consistent with the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees. The membership of the Faculty shall consist of the President, who shall be ex officio chairman; the Dean of the University, who shall preside in the absence of the President; the Dean of the Graduate School; the dean of each college; the Dean of Men; the Dean of Women, the Registrar, who shall be ex officio secretary; the Comptroller; the Director of Extension; the Librarian; the President of

the Student Government Association; and of 40 elective members of the teaching and research staff of the rank of assistant professor or above distributed as follows:

After the first term, each member shall be elected for three years. At the expiration of any term, a member shall be ineligible for reelection until after one year has elapsed. The Faculty may cause this distribution to be restudied and adjusted after three years and every six years thereafter. The election of representatives to the Faculty shall be by letter ballot, and shall be conducted in each group for the representatives from that group\*\* by a committee appointed by the President, in the case of the first election, and thereafter, by a committee of the University Faculty. At the first election the length of term of each member shall be determined by lot. The individuals receiving the highest numbers of votes in each group shall be elected with the result of a tie being determined by lot. To fill a vacancy the President of the University shall appoint a member from the eligible members in the group affected to serve until the next election. Individual attendance records shall be maintained and reported in the minutes. Non-attendance shall be cause for the Faculty's dropping a member. No alternate or substitutes shall attend nor shall there be voting by proxy.

Except as such functions are expressly reserved to the Board of Trustees and the President of the University, the University Faculty has and shall exercise jurisdiction over all matters of University educational policy. It is authorized

to make regulations to promote the educational interests of the University as a whole with respect to (a) studies, including schedules of classes, numbering and classification of courses, credit for foreign languages and extension work, poor work in English, probation, repeated failures, student load, transfer between curricula of different colleges, unsatisfactory scholarship and attendance, examinations, credits, marks, and student standing; (b) admission and classification of students and requirements for graduation; (c) approval of curricula and courses; (d) the University libraries; (e) commencements and other convocations; (f) student discipline, including non-attendance; (g) student social and extracurricular activities; (h) the awarding of honors; and other matters, whether or not enumerated herein, concerning the educational program of the institution as a whole.

The Faculty may perform these functions directly or through the use of standing or special committees which it may authorize for appointment from personnel eligible for Faculty membership, but neither the Faculty nor its committees shall have authority to perform administrative, as distinguished from policy-making, functions. In case of an issue between a college faculty and the University Faculty concerning jurisdiction over a particular function, the question of jurisdiction shall be determined by the President. No degree, however, shall be conferred except on recommendation of the University Faculty.

The University Faculty may address the President, or through him the Board of Trustees, respecting any University matter.

The Faculty shall hold regular meetings on the second Monday of each month during the school year, and special meetings at the call of the President or at the call of its secretary on written request of ten members.

#### The Assembly

The University Assembly shall consist of all officers and employees of the institution, including the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension staffs. It shall meet on call of the President or on written request of ten members. The Assembly may express its view on any matter affecting the University and may make recommendations to the University Faculty, the President, or through him to the Board of Trustees.

Nothing herein shall affect, in any particular, the

resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on the first day of April, 1941, relating to the creation and functions of the Department of Business Management and Control of the University.\*\*\*

#### Board Action

The recommendation of President Donovan that the report of the Committee of Fifteen (15), herein above set out, be approved was considered by the Board of Trustees. It was moved, seconded, and carried to amend the report as follows:

On page 6, paragraph 4, line 40, strike out the word "state" after the word "the" and before the word "law".

In paragraph 2, page 9, line 10, after the word "conducted"

and before the word "by" by inserting the following words "in each group for the representatives from that group".

On page 10, by inserting after the fifth paragraph the following paragraph and words: "Nothing herein shall affect, in any particular, the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on the first day of April, 1941, relating to the creation and functions of the Department of Business Management and Control of the University".

President Donovan stated that it was not the intent of the Committee to change, or alter, the Department of Business Management and Control as created by the Board of Trustees on April 1, 1941. Thereupon the following resolution offered and being duly seconded was unanimously adopted:

Be it resolved that the report of the Committee of Fifteen, of which Dean Thomas P. Cooper is Chairman, which is copied herein, be and it is hereby amended by striking out the word "state" on page 6 and inserting the words "in each group for the representatives from that group" on page 9, and inserting the paragraph on page 10, "nothing herein shall affect the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on the first day of April, 1941, relating to the creation and functions of the Department of Business Management and Control of the University", said amendments being inserted, as designated above, and, as so amended, the report is hereby approved and adopted.
