

STAFF LOUNGE RULES

- 1. Please dispose of food properly. All food not consumed should be removed from the refrigerator before it spoils. Soup should not be washed down the sink as it blocks the plumbing.
- 2. Please be sure the refrigerator door is completely closed. Not only will food spoil but it wastes our precious energy.
- 3. Please clean up after yourself. All dishes should be washed and all food wrappers thrown in the trash.
- 4. We would prefer that food be confined to the tiled area but if you do eat in the carpeted area, please be careful and clean up after eating. It is difficult to have the furniture cleaned.

SPRING IS ONLY ONE WEEK AWAY!

A new (to us, anyway) twist on the "shell game" is the use of egg shells as seed starters. Remove the top 1/3 of egg shells and save them in the cartons. Fill with a mixture of soil and vermiculite, plant seeds and dampen the soil. Cover with plastic till germinated and thin to one seedling per shell. Let this plant grow until it has two true leaves before transplanting in the garden. Then crush the bottom of the shell and plant shell and all. The shell even adds a little calcium to fertilize your soil.


