Telephone service answers questions of human sexuality problems, concerns

YESline tries to answer questions like these. This nonrofit community agency, telephone operated, provides
formation for those with questions related to human

profit community agency, telephone operated, provides information for those with questions related to human extuality.

Carol Richardson, coordinator of the agency which is now in its fourth year of operation, said the idea for YESline developed when several other agencies such as Planned Parenthood, the Rape Crisis Center and the Florence Crittendon home for single, pregnant women began getting calls which were directly related to sexuality.

The name VESline was chosen to "make a positive statement about sexuality as well as to let callers know that, yes, we have accurate information," Richardson said.

Yesline is staffed by approximately 27 volunteers, including nurses, doctors, businessmen and students who are often in sociology and psychology. It has no central office where volunteers take calls. Instead, a telephone diverter system is used, which relays calls into the homes and offices of its workers.

All workers go through a training workshop which is a two-part session. The first part is devoted to basic information and teaching facts, the second teaches them to be "good listeners" and not give advice but rather suggest alternatives. What's right for one person is not necessarily right for another. Richardson said.

YeSline offers a non-threatening situation. Richardson described it as "annonymous, non-judgmental, accurate and available." Volunteers use the "trained ear" listening approach. "We help people find where they are and offer alternatives."

Allison Hile, a new volunteer for YESline who underwent training about two months ago, said the agency is a "very needed thing." Most of the questions she receives from callers she said. concern pregnancy and birth control. "Many callers just want to know that they are normal," she

said. "They call for honest answers and are getting honest

The majority of calls, Richardson said, are for basic information, such as facts about VD or questions related to pregnancy or brith control, Questions about husband-wife and boyfriend-girlfriend relationships are also common. College students call most officen, which Richardson said may be due to advertising. YESline runs a daily ad in the Kernel. Its only other advertising is free public service spots on radio and television.

Men make up 43 percent of incoming calls and women 57 persent. Teens and adult callers are also almost evenly split, this figure is based on approximations made by the YESline truns evenly split, this figure is based on approximations made by the YESline Count of the Callers are not asked about their age or sex. The only question asked by the service is where the caller found out about YESline.

About five percent of YESline's calls are random calls, usually concerning legal questions, which are referred to other agencies.

Richardson, who is married and a mother of two children, is a full-time student majoring in sex education and counseling. She has worked with Planned Parenthood, Birth Planning Council and Teen Age Parent Program (TAPP—which is no longer in operation).

Sadat and Begin don't possess qualities for Nobel Peace honors



"OH GOOD, MR SADAT AND MR BEGIN MUST BE DAKE TALKING...LET'S AWARD THE PEACE PRIZE..."

Each has visited the other's homeland, bathed his counterpart in platitudes (or insults, depending on which way the wind is blowing), and journeyed to diplomacy camps where watchful counselors tried to cajole them into

compromises.

But despite all the talks, visits and headlines, there is still no Middle East peace treaty that would however temporarily—end more than 30 years of hostility between Israel and

than 30 years of hostility between Israel and Egypt.

And for this, Anwar Sadat and Menachem Begin have been honored with a coveted award for statesmanship.

The two national leaders join a highly selective group; including Gen. George C. Marshall (architect of the Marshall Plan), former United Nations Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold and Martin Luther King, Jr.

But in recent years the award has gone backward. The most glaring example is the 1973 award to Henry Kissinger and Le Duc

Tho for the lasting peace they established in Vietnam. (Tho thought the award so ridiculous that he refused to accept it.)

Why the award has lost some of its prestige is hard to pinpoint, but apparently the quality of world leaders has made it difficult for Nobel Peace Prize Selection Committee of the Nowegian Parliament and the Nobel Institute to find a suitable candidate.

Last year, in a commendable move, the committee ignored all the political leaders and honored Betty Williams and Mairead Corrigan, two women who have been working to silence hostilities in Northern Ireland.

The Nobel Peace Prize does serve more of a purpose than being the Academy Award of the diplomatic world. It symbolizes scarifice for a cause and the dedication to the goal of world peace. But from all their hoopla, Sadat and Begin have yet to show these qualities in their extended peace talks.

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

Now that every college football team in the nation has completed seven games, some 50 schools are beginning to wonder what their chances are for a bowl game bid. Southeastern Conference

Overall, the current SEC outlook for postseason play looks promising, especially in comparison with last year, when just four conference teams plad winning records. This year the SEC boasts three teams ranked in the AP and UPI top 15. In November 77 there were only two conference teams in the top twenty and one of them — UK — was ineligible for post-season play.

Last year, LSU was 5-3 et at his point in the season and the Tigers went to the Sun Bowl. There are seven SEC.teams that have some chance at postseason play. Alabama, Georgia and LSU are the frontrunners with their national rankings. Mississippi State and Auburn have outside shots, while Florida and Kentucky would have to be considered longhosts. Tennesee, Ole Miss and Vanderbilt will have to wait until next year.

Score a lot of points. Bowl scouts literally drool over high scoring offenses usually produce the most exciting games.

Play somebody important. The fact that a team is 11-0 means nothing if those wins come against such worthy opponents as Hollow Creek Institute or San Toga State.

If playing somebody important, avoid getting stomped. No bowl would be interested in a team that brags about its tough schedule if that team fails to score.
Pull off an upset during the season. Beating one of the "Biggies" usually brings national attention to a school. And where there's national attention there's usually a bowl representative nearby.

Have strong fan support. If a team's fans are not concerned enough to see their team, surely a bowl won't be. After all, bowl officials enjoy bragging about (and reaping the profits of) sellout crowds and fan enthusiam.

respective conference. While it is common knowledge that bowl scouts are impressed with top-twenty teams, it is also true that scouts realize some conferences are stronger than others. As a result, some unranked teams get invited, provided they're in the upper-level of their conferences.

Maintain a winning record. This would appear to be so obvious it need not be mentioned. But the fact is that a surprisingly large number of teams feel assured of bowl invitations one week only to

lose important gaines the next.
Bowl scouts seem to frown on
this type activity.
With the flig 10 and Pac-10
conferences now granting their
runnerup teams permission to
accept bowl bids, it's getting
difficult for more than two or
three teams from each
conference to receive howle
bids. However, several new
bowls have been formed to
meet the demand. The new
bowls are not as precigious as
their foreruners, but they will
seem very important for the
teams that receive their
invitations. And by following

This tale is preposterous from beginning to end The action opens circa A.D. 873 and ends with the hero giving directions to Christopher Columbus in 1491, and author Munn's unflagging powers of invention are well-utilized throughout.

Six centuries is almost long enough to learn how to pronounce the hero's Welsh name: Gwalchmail. This galout hails from the Empire of Artlan, and his girlfirend, Corenice, is from mythical Atlantis. Their romance is complicated by his habit of falling askeps for a few hundred years, and by her problem of finding attractive bodies to inhabit (her own having been decomposed several centuries ago.)

The action takes in the Vikings, the Normans, the Crusades, Marco Polo's China,

What's-his-name and Corenice.

The author has done his research. Having read several books on history, he refuses to let facts stand in the way of his plot. Consistency is not one of his vices.

Munn writes with skill and considerable dash. This ridiculous, furn book exhibits as rare joy in its hops, skips, and jump through time. Every so often, leapfrogging over all bounds of probability, it springs a sudden blessing on the unwary reader.
