






Benefit Show -Comedy and Music


KY Gay Camp

Tthe Second Annual KY Gay Camp will be held on Aug 25-27 at Sloydia, a private 14 acre retreat on the Little South Fork of the Cumberland River in south Wayne County, Ky. Activities may include a hike to the top of Eartheart mountain, workout sessions, swimming in the river, entertainment ranging from singers and musicians, to drag and fantasy shows, group campfires, and lots more. Some of the activities can be enhanced by the fact that selected areas of the Sloydia property are clothing optional. A donation of \$5 per person per day is requested to cover expenses

Camping at Sloydia is true, out-in-thewoods, primitive camping, so come prepared for a unique experience! Attendees will need to bring their own supplies of food, drinking water, camping and cooking gear, a limited amount of well water will be available. There are a few camping spaces with electricity.

The facilities include shady level sites for tents and a limited number of small trailers or R.Vs sites, outhouses, ans an old fashioned swimming hole at the river. We can also accomodate boats on the river. There is also a stage for performances with lighting and electricity, a fully equipped weightlifting gym, and access to a rustic wood-burning hot tub on the adjacent property. Call for full details before you come, as there is no cell phone service available anywhere on or near the property.

Sloydia is approximately 20 miles south of Monticello, in south central Kentucky, just 5 miles north of the Tennessee state line and 10 miles from Pickett State Park in Tennessee. Name All the Animals

Written by Alison Smith Reviewed by mary crone

Alison Smith's first book, Name All The Animals, a memoir published in 2003, has received much deserved attention. It was nominated for a Lambda Literary Award, named one of the ten most notable lesbian books of the year by The Publishing Triangle, and was a finalist for a Discover Award from Barnes & Noble. It was also nominated for best book of the year by England's Diva magazine.

In some respects a traditional coming of age/coming out memoir, this book stands out because it is also a beautifully written story of a young girl's grief and struggle to survive emotionally after the death of her beloved brother.

As children, Alison and her brother Roy were so close that their mother called them by one name, Alroy. But while still in is teens, Roy dies in a car accident. The family becomes immersed in grief and over the next few years Alison's parents are unable to see that their daughter's grief tis life threatening. She questions the Catholic faith that sustains her parents, develops anorexia, and, finally a stroke of luck, falls in love with a female classmate. She heals, and claims her life for herself.

Smith's writing is powerful and unsentimental. Her story leaves the reader with respect for her survival and a deeper understanding of how human beings can recover from deep despair. I highly recommend this book.

Kentucky Fairness Alliance Develops Strategic Plan

Kentucky Fairness Alliance (KFA) held its annual strategic planning meeting June 3rd and 4th. Lisa Weiner-Mahfuz of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force served as a consultant to moderate the two day affair. With Weiner-Mahfuz's guidance, the executive director, the staff, and the board developed a six-month plan that will direct KFA's immediate goals.

Throughout the legislative season, KFA worked on promoting positive GLBTQ legislation and lobbying against defamatory legislation. Now that the legislative season has ended, KFA will re-direct its focus: For the next six months, KFA will create initiatives to educate the voter as to the upcoming November elections.

Phase one of the strategic plan includes the advent of several Action Saturdays. Volunteers will walk door-to-door during certain Saturdays. One Action Saturday will take place July 29th in Danville and another will happen August 19th in Lexington. The volunteers will not endorse any candidates but instead will talk with as many potential voters as possible in order to discuss GLBTQ issues to identify those voters who would vote pro-fairness.

In phase two, volunteers will call those voters positively identified as pro-LTQBG approximately one week before the elections. The volunteers will educate respondents on the views of the various candidates and encourage them to get out Additionally, KFAers and vote. have discussed the possibility of collaborating with other social justice organizations in an effort to increase profairness voter turn out. KFA will strive to do everything possible to insure a high voter turn out and educate voters as to the viewpoints of the candidates running for office. To the end, KFA needs a lot of volunteers who are willing to walk the districts, to talk to voters, and to make phone calls. Only through large numbers

The Kiss

I was born at 8:14 am on a Friday morning in 1950 just in time for the weekend. I always felt sure I would've made medical history by being the first newborn to be able to raise her head and cruise the nursery for pink booties and hats. But I guess no one ever saw me do it because I'm sure I'd be famous. But hey, I had other characteristics to cultivate that could bring me fame. I just "let go" of the nursery thing.

From the beginning I knew I was a lesbian. I used to hate that word until I found out what it meant. The first "gay women" were on an island named Lesbos, thus the name of lesbian. I surely wanted to be known as a woman from that island. But I'm getting a head of myself.

When I was a little lesbian I fell for all the little neighborhood girls. I just hated playing girl games. The doll thing was just too much, I mean how many times can you undress, dress, feed and rock Tiny Tears. I saw absolutely no future in it. But

playing "war" or cops and robbers, or football, now there was some games.

Those games required a lot of paraphernalia. Snub nose .38 shoulder holster, war toys- military issue, and of course a football and pads. Wow! I loved to cinch up those pads and pants. I also loved uniforms and planned to go into the service when I was old enough.

My attraction to little girls and masculine toys continued for many years. I always had crushes on the females but depending at what stage of life I was in, changed what I needed to do to impress them. It seems dancing always made them smile at me and if I swivelled my hips a little that was even better.

In junior high I had a crush on Geraldine. She was kinda weird. Always had older boy friends and class rings with angora on them. Geraldine was cramping my style. But I did find out it was cool to give your girlfriend something special.

After junior high school I had to move in with my aunt because my mother died. (That is an extremely condensed version) continued on page 14

It's one thing to be patriotic. It's quite another to be "gay-triotic" -- loyal to the country you consider home as well as to the community you consider fabulous. With the recent Supreme Court decision that struck down sodomy laws in states that used them mostly to persecute us, many LGBTs finally feel we have the opportunity to openly celebrate life, liberty and, at last, the pursuit of happiness (among other things). A giant American flag flew over the Castro. Gay veterans became the heroes of many Pride celebrations. Recent GLBT immigrants feel safer. Even queer revelers around the world seemed to share in our shackle-shedding. The feeling, for a lot of us, was exhilaration.

We're not exactly out of the woods yet. There are struggles still to come. Pundits predict gay marriage will be next, but watch out for those "lewd conduct" bills being put before many state legislatures or the current Administration's recent endorsement of faith-based workplace discrimination. And who among us in the past few weeks hasn't ever-so-briefly entertained thoughts of high-tailing it to Ontario to hitch our star to an eligible, well-saddled Mountie or a high-sticking puck monkey. Gay Marriage

In early June, efforts to ban gay marriage by amending the Constitution failed badly in Senate. Not only did they not have enough votes, but they also lost two senators that had previously voted for the amendment. Was this simply an attempt by Bush to remind the religious right that the Republican Party deserves their support? Maybe so.

But the religious right is not finished with this issue. They are considering appealing to state legislatures to call a Constitutional Convention under an obscure provision of Article 5 of the Constitution that would allow amendments to the Constitution to be passed without congressional approval.

Meeting at the offices of the Family Research Council, the top leaders of the anti-marriage movement — including Catholic, Protestant and Mormon leaders — discussed the possibility of an unprecedented Constitutional Convention. Two-thirds (34) of the state legislatures would have to call for such a convention.

But even if enough state legislatures agreed, it is not at all certain that a convention would reflect the right wing's agenda; liberals could also suggest amendments. Right-wing pundit Bob Novak believes that banning gay marriage through a constitutional convention would be difficult but not impossible.

If a convention was actually called and a marriage amendment was passed, , GLBT organizers estimate that 28 states would easily ratify it. Another eight states might do so after a protracted political fight (which could affect an election cycle). That still leaves conservatives needing two more states to reach the threshold of 38 which is the required three-fourts needed to add an amendment to the US Constitution.

Although it does not seem likely that an amendment would actually be approved in this way, the right wing may proceed in order to have this issue bring votes out in future elections.

Reframing the Gay Marriage Issue

How can we help people understand that the Republican attention to gay marriage is mainly a political game? Here are some questions that might make the point and encourage a chuckle.

Is gay marriage making gas more expensive?

Is gay marriage the reason why 45 million

Is gay marriage the reason why 45 million Americans don't have health insurance?

Is gay marriage driving up the deficit?

Did gay marriage falsify intelligence reports to mislead the country into the Iraq War?

Did gay marriage cause corporation to move jobs overseas?

Did gay marriage breach the levees in New Orleans or cause delays in the recovery of Katrina damaged areas?

Is gay marriage one of the freedoms that the terrorists hate? And if so, is it possible that we are focusing on the wrong issue?

In addition, it is always possible to point out that "marriage" has not been the same over the history of our country, much less over the centuries. It was not until the 1960's that the remaining 17 states were forced to give up laws that said black and white couples could not marry.

A decade later, feminists worked for years in various states to make it possible for women to charge their husbands with rape. A few Ky legislators treated this as a joke when it first came to their attention.
