Since 1921 the University of Ken-tucky has employed the use of clas-sification tests given to freshmen in order to determine the intelli-gence and rank of the students. Re-sults of these tests enable the col-lege to group the students homo-geneously for better educational

green to group in estucerias inomopurposes propared by the psychology department, were composed
only of intelligence ratings for the
first six years. In 1926, English
classification tests were added, and,
since 1927, mathematics examinations have also been included.

The results of the tests have
proved interesting. Surveys have
shown that there has been a tendency toward a good correlation between intelligence and success in
college. The tests have also shown
that, as a rule, students achieving
a high mark in one of the tests
will duplicate their good work on
the others.
