WASHINGTON — Money problems and "a lack of attention to detail" are hampering the District of Columbia's fire department and contributed to the death of a firefighter, the department schief said Wednesday.

The shortcomings were among more than 30 departmental problems listed in a report Fire Chief Donald Edwards released on the death of Fire Sgt. John Carter. Edwards ordered an internal investigation after the 15-year department veterand ideo (Oc. 24, 1997, in the basement of a burning grocery store, the first district firefighter to die on duty in 13 years.

Carter drowned after he fell through a floor into the basement and his colleagues kept pour-



ing in water. The report said the glass on t front of his emergency mask slipped away fro the rubber seal, and he was found with water the mask up to his eyes.

Officials need help

Officials need help

WASHINGTON — Federal officials pleaded for the public's help to find Eric Robert Rudolph as they added major charges — the 1996 bombing at the Olympics and two other Atlanta attacks — against the man who has eluded a massive search for nine months.

Attorney General Janet Reno told a Wednesday news conference the complaint charging Rudolph with the Olympic blast and the 1997 bombings of a gay bar and an abortion clinic was filed with a federal court. New evidence against him was kept sealed to protect "the safety of with ressess who have come forward," she said.

Two people died and scores were injured by the six bombs Rudolph is on the run' from earlier charges that he bombed a Birmingham, Ala. abortion clinic Jan. 29, Reno said. "We're are not going to rest until we bring him to justice."

She re-emphasized the \$1 million reward posted when Rudolph was put on the FBI's 10 most wanted list last May.

McDougal witness a no show

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — Attorneys in Su-san McDougal's embezzlement trial angrily clashed Wednesday over evidence that requires testimony from a witness who refuses to come to court.

The dispute centers on Kate Bell, who was the bookkeeper for conductor Zubin Mehta and his wife, Nancy, before Mrs. McDougal took the job. Defense and prosecution lawyers both ac-knowledge that Ms. Bell is refusing to come to the courthouse and will not return phone calls. Deputy District Attorney Jeffrey Semow said Ms. Bell is desperate not to testify — although he does not know why. "She will say or do anything to avoid having to come to court." Semow said.

Polka king Yankovic dies

TAMPA, Fla. — Frankie Yankovic, the accordion-playing Polica King from Cleveland who had folks rolling out the barrel and asking who stole the kishka for generations, died at his home Wednesday, He was 83.

Yankovic wowed dance-hall crowds throughout the Midwest for more than 60 years with his rollicking, toe-tapping performances, won the first Grammy ever awarded for polka in 1986 and more recently reached a whole new generation by teaming up with TV's Drew Carey and "Weird Al" Yankovic, who was thought to be a distant relative.

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
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
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






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Fighting poverty

said Julie Miles, executive director of the National Student
Campaign Against Hunger and
Homelessness.

problem of hunger and homelessness."

Students will be joined by top national leaders involved with the fight against hunger and homelessness. Martha Pickett, the executive director of Second Harvest, the nation's largest network of food

banks, will be one of the speakers. Homelessness and hunger are issues in Lexington as

Homelessness and hunger are issues in Lexington as well.

"I think student involvement is important educationally, not only for the students themselves, but simply because the homeless problem has become larger, (and) at the same time it has become less visible. People need to know the truth, said Walter May, communications director at the Hope Center, a Lexington agency that deals with homelessness and poverty.

deals with homelessness and poverty.

He said 1995 figures estimate that 1,000 people in Lexington are homeless. Part of this problem, he said, was the decline in the number of affordable housing, yet the increase of people living below the poverty line.

Jennifer Hecker, a field organizer for the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness, said one of the goals of the conference was to educate students about food-salvage programs, such as Kentucky Har-

vest, and try to get them to establish chapters on their campuses.

While UK does not have a chapter for the National Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness, students can be a considered to the constitution of the experiential education deavited to volunteering in various community projects, with the focus being that students should learn something from their experience.

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

The Yonders do private gigs at Lynagh's, as well as their usual Sunday night hangout, Cheapside, where they play from 8 p.m.-11 p.m.




Born Cross Eyed




Lexington stations WXZZ and WKQQ play the bands music, as well as a variety of other stations across the Ohio River Valley.

New book makes DUIs a worry of the past

It was another insane party. But now it's late and you suddenly sense it's time to go home. No problem. You stopped drinking hours ago. You're not stone cold sober, but you're probably OK to drive. Or at least you're more OK than your plastered roommate. It's 2 a.m., and you have to get home.

Cops are all over the place. What if you get pulled over? You're not drunk, but an ambitious cop could trip you up. How do you defend yourself from a police officer bent on taking you in? You are a respectable citizen who had a few beers, not amanicad drunk driver, You need advice and Judge X can help.

With more than 20 years of experience as a state judge, Judge X has seen thousands of drunk driving cases. He knows the system, and he will teach it to you. In his book, Hou to Avoid a Drunk Driving Conviction, he explains the mistakes most drivers make to get them busted.

First, he explains that his book is addressed to the reasonably prudent drunk driver.

"Similar to the prosecution of the 55-mph speeding law, cops, judges and prosecutors sometimes recognize a tolerable blood alcohol level above the statutory limit," he says. No book will help the manicloaded up on pure grain and Kool-Aid.

Judge X says just sitting in a car with the keys in the ignition could lead to a drunk-driving conviction.

"Pull the keys and hide them, then climb into the back seat and sleep it off," he writes. Having the keys shows you are in physical control of the vehicle and subject to prosecution.

Many people are convicted of drunk-driving from single car, non-injury wrecks, he says. But a run-in with a tree, guardrail or telephone phone is not necessarily reportable, he says.

Thousands of people are killed every year by drunk drivers. The pressure to prosecute all drivers showing any signs of drunkenness is intense.

This book explains how to separate yourself from those crazy drunk drivers and get home safe. But none of the information is guaranteed and should be read only for academic reasons.
