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GLSO PROPOSES ACTION PLAN FOR BLUEGRASS LESBIGAY COMMUNITY

Participants in a forum on the challenges facing lesbigay people in the Bluegrass region called for serious planning and action to change social attitudes and improve community activities. Many strengths, weaknesses, and needs of the lesbigay community were articulated at the forum sponsored by the Lexington Gay and Lesbian Organization on May 6.

A second forum planned for June 3, will focus on needs, set priorities and plan practical ways for meeting them. The forum will be between 7:30 and 9:00 p.m. at the New Morning Coffeehouse.

This forum will be oriented toward practical action. Several "action groups" will be formed at the meeting. Each of these groups will take the responsibility for developing the means of meeting a specific need in the community.

The plans will be made in response to the assets, liabilities, and needs identified at last month's forum. These are listed below.

PRIDE FROM THE CLOSET

The annual lesbigay pride events around the country commemorate the June 28-29, 1969, riots at the Stonewall Inn, a New York gay bar, where lesbigay employees and patrons fought back against a routine police raid. The ensuing riots gave birth to a politicized gay community "bent" on getting its rights. The year following the riots, 1970, saw the first commemorative parades and marches in four cities: New York, Los Angeles, Chicago and San Francisco.

The "gay pride" sparked at Stonewall had positive political effects. It is estimated that three months after the Stonewall Rebellion there were 50 gay groups in the U.S. By the mid-1970s, gay men and lesbians had formed more than 1,000 organizations. And by 1980, about 4,000 autonomous groups had sprung into existence. That's an 8,000 percent increase

in ten years.

What many gay folk don't know is that the revolutionaries at Stonewall didn't represent the shiny, clean, politically correct queers often seen today, but some of the segments of our community with the lowest social status. The Stonewallers were drag queens, rough diesel dykes, and poor, working class homos out for a beer and possibly more. Not exactly the Pilgrims, but instead, people tired of harassment and legal

abuse.
Perhaps as prophecy to the role the feminist movement and lesbian political activism were to play in the gay liberation movement, the first punch directed against the

police was by a woman.

Although now demolished, the stonewall Inn is seen as the birthplace of the modern gay movement. So get out to the Louisville march and celebrate how far we've come because one lesbian got fed up and the drag queens joined in. Salute to them.

Continued from page Our community also must deal with a number of liabilities. Some of the external liabilities faced by the community are:

External Liabilities

Kentucky's sodomy laws make some private, sexual acts between adults of the

same gender criminal activities.

There are no laws to protect lesbigays from discrimination in employment, housing, or the provision of services.

There is active, vocal opposition to lesbigay people. The right-wing of the community, fueled by some fundamentalist Christians, aggressively opposes lesbigay people.

There is no support for the lesbigay community from the mainstream media or

political organizations.

Internal Liabilities

Therefore a social and a litical analysis of the community, especially in the areas of

working for social and political reform.

Attempts to raise money have been limited to small, one at a time events. No attempt has been made to develop a comprehensive, far-reaching fund raising program.

While there are communication mechanisms in the community, there is a lack of unity and cooperation. More needs to be done to do away with cliquishness and

to remove the class gender, and racial barriers that divide us.

Efforts at political action by the lesbigay community have been limited and short-lived.

An element of fear permeates the lesbigay community that keeps most people either in the closet or jumping in and out of the closet.

The lesbigay community lacks visibility and too few prominent lesbigays are

willing to serve as spokespersons for us.

We don't have a Bluegrass gay pride parade, a Metropolitan Community Church, or a community center.

Discussion of these strengths and weaknesses helped those who participated in the forum to articulate a number of needs that the community should address.

Bluegrass Lesbigay Needs

Development of a lesbian community action plan that provides an effective organizing structure, fund-raising mechanism, and communication arm.

Creating a more open community that allows lesbigays easier access to

services and activities.

More outreach to, education of, and coalition building with the larger

community. ♦ Bridge building between the African American and white lesbigay people at

an organized community level. A gay and lesbian community center that would provide office space, meeting

areas, and community visibility.

Specific activities needed:

a. political action committee to lobby state and local government and to endorse political candidates b. Queer Nation or ACT-UP groups

c. Gay Pride March

d. better organized and publicized sports activities
e. P-FLAG chapter (Parents and Friends of Gays and Lesbians)
f. Gay and lesbian parents organization
g. Gay and lesbian youth group
h. Lesbigay chamber of commerce

i. more support for and from lesbigay owned businesses.

METHODIST CHURCH OFFICIALS STANDBY TEACHINGS ON GAYS

After 20 years of debate, the
General Conference of the United Methodist Church decided to maintain its position that "Homosexual persons are no less than heterosexual, individually sacred." A local minister who was a delegate to the Conference said that the policy-making body attempted to seek a balance body between Christian understanding of the scriptures, and compassion for all people.

While homosexual persons are of infinite worth, and as worthy of ministry as anyone else, he said, the church cannot condone a way of life which is incompatible with Christian teaching.

Opinions influencing this decision ranged from a belief that homosexuality is a disease, to the belief that homosexuality does not violate any moral truth.

The result of the debate was a ruling that does not exclude homosexuals from a church congregation but does prohibit the ordination of any professed homosexual.

When asked about this position, the delegate said, "this was not a ruling specifically aimed against homosexuals. The church simply feels it would be inappropriate to ordain a minister who was involved in any activity which fell outside of church doctrine."

The church did issue statement in support of civil rights for homosexuals as well as legal rights for same-sex couples. Many gay and lesbian Methodists attending the continued on page 12



SAFER SEX: A LESBIAN CONCERN

I would like to conclude my
editorship of Esmerelda's Parlour with a final article on safer sex practices for lesbians and focus on the use of dental dams and their alternatives. To that end I, am once again going to quote Risa Denenberg's article "A Decade of Denial: Lesbians and HIV" (On Our Backs July/August, 1991). I realize that this article is somewhat out of date, but progress in this area hasn't exactly been by leaps and bounds. So, I give

you what she has to say, and you may do with it what you will.

"The focus of the lesbian safer sex campaign is a 6 x 6 inch square of latex most women can't even obtain, designed to be used in dental offices. The focus on the dental dam assumes that oral sex is the definitive characteristic of lesbian sex. Well, lesbian sex is much more than [cunnilingus]. Lesbians usedildos have analyses practice. dildos, have anal sex, practice rimming, fisting, sucking, and biting. Lesbians sleep with men. Lesbians sell sex. Until we can frankly discuss how we really have sex, the dental dam will continue to be an ineffectual symbol.

"One aspect of safer sex involves reducing the risk of exchanging body fluids during sexual activities. Dental dams have yet to be proven risk-eliminators for oral sex, but the barrier idea is on the right track. There is no reason to prefer dental dams,

which are hard to obtain and much too small, to freezer Saran wrap. Latex gloves are easier to obtain, and so are finger cots. Both can be purchased at drug stores. I don't decrease sensation for either partner and are

play with.

"Some girls make their own panties by removing the crotch of some sexy underthings and sewing in latex. In some fabric stores you can buy rubber by the yard, perfect for queen-size dams. Condoms have entered lesbian bedrooms in a whole new way. Cut the condom open for a larger, thinner dam thinner dam . . . You can also cut the fingers off a glove then cut it open for a dam."

And how does all of this apply to us? I don't know. I don't know

how risky or adventurous your sexual practices are. For all I know, you may have quit reading this as soon as I mentioned On Our Backs. I hope not, because I believe the key to protecting ourselves and our community is

education.

We have to be willing to think about these things, and to talk about them. So what if you're in a monogamous relationship. You have friends who aren't, and they need to know and talk about these things. I guess the main thing I'm looking for here is a willingness to learn. From there to learn. From there, it's up to each one of us to use our best judgement based on what we've learned. Have you ever thought of having an HIV test just to put your mind at ease? Think about it.

The Kentucky Lambda Coalition, a network of student groups from college campuses across the state, is the first state-wide coalition of lesbigay groups in Kentucky

Kentucky Lambda Coalition's

purpose is to:

• promote social and support services for already existing and newly forming lesbigay student organizations,

♦ provide a communication link between the student groups and other groups in the state,

assist groups in educating the

public about lesbigay issues,

◆ raise political consciousness
in the lesbigay students in

Kentucky.

The coalition's impact extends far beyond the boundaries of these campuses. The coalition will help strengthen and lend cohesiveness to the movement for lesbigay rights throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This will be achieved by pooling resources, strengthening ties between Kentucky queer groups and national queer groups, and promoting communication between the coalition and various newspapers across Kentucky through press releases and articles.

Another goal of the coalition is to coordinate public responses to government, institutional, and community-based decisions which are relevant to the queer

community.

The coalition is only a few months old, and hopefully will expand to include more than the

UK QUEER WOMEN FORM GROUP

Women in LAMBDA, the UK lesbigay student group have formed a women's caucus. The caucus, called Womynweave, provides support for women in UK LAMBDA and other lesbian and bisexual women on campus.



and public accomodations.






