Rediscovering Contributed BY MARY CRONE

ROMANTIC FRIENDSHIPS

Perhaps you have never heard this term, but during the Nineteenth Century and the first quarter of the Twentieth Century, romantic friendships were a common and accepted form of "intense friendships" between young women. Known as "smashing" in the expanding New England women's colleges of the same era, young women were expected and even encouraged to have crushes on older women or teachers. A young woman was said to develop a "crush," "spoon," "pash" (for passion), or "rave" on an older, admired woman.

Public affirmation of these crushes were allowed, but feelings were expected to be acted out in symbolic acts of homage to the older woman, such as making her bed, leaving some candy in her room, or writing her poems. Actual physical closeness or daily conversations were not expected, thus maintaining distance. The "ravee" was expected to offer affection and moral guidance to her "raves." "Desires" that might arise were thought to be adolescent

Dec 1994 - Bias-related killings homosexuals are often gratuitously violent and many go unsolved, according to a report by 23 anti-violence groups. The report listed 151 murders in 29 states and the District of Columbia from January 1992 until early this month. Almost 60 percent involved four or

and to have only an "immature" sexual nature. (But they did call them "passions!") Of course, even adult women were not believed to be sexual in the same sense as men were at this time in history. The feelings of love and desire stirred up in these relationships were socially acceptable as long as they were controlled and directed into self-denial, spiritual sacrifice, and social service.

I first read of romantic friendships years ago and was able to ask my mother, who attended high school and college in the 1920's, if with was familiar phenomenon. Certainly, she said, she had carried books for an older girl regularly in high school and worn a token of affection in her hair. In college, she was the captain of a Crew Team (still a big women's sport at a few schools) and several younger women had crushes on her. She did not see these as particularly intense relationships, but remember they were for some of her classmates.

Can we guess which young women might have been most intensely involved? My father's favorite older sister, Mary Cabell (who I was named for), attended Mt. Holyoke College in 1913, and was refused readmittance in 1916 after taking a year off to travel with her family. no one at Mt. Holyoke was able to give an adequate explanation for their refusal of her re-entry. I suspect that her attempt at a romantic friendship became more sexually charged and less self-sacrificing than was socially acceptable. My Aunt Mary went on to become a doctor

and lived with Gertrude, her lifelong "companion" in the mountains of North Carolina.

The support of romantic friendships as healthy learning experiences for young women began to decline in the late 1920's, perhaps not coincidentally as scientists began to write about women's sexuality. In this period, there were articles written by female college administrators and professors who spent their lives living with women companions, warning their students to avoid intense friendships with each other. Perhaps with an increased awareness of female sexuality, they were afraid of being discovered, or perhaps they accepted society's negative opinion of their relationships. Romantic friendships continued particularly at women's colleges into the 1940's and 50's, but were written about as less intense, nurturing friendships rather than as crushes or as passions.

Domestic Partnership Benefits Offered At Some Corporations

"Nationwide, about 140 major public and private employers extend medical benefits to gay and lesbian domestic partners, including Apple Computer Inc., Eastman Kodak, Levi Strauss & Co., Microsoft Corp., Sony Corp., Harley Davidson, Marriott Corp., Sheraton Corp., HBO, USAir and Xerox."

The GLSO is currently unaware of any company based in Kentucky that offers similar domestic partnership benefits. Recently, the owner of a local company - to which one of our staff belongs - went to Humana Corporation and asked whether they would cover the domestic partner of their employees. Humana said that, in some other states, they cover domestic partners, when that state's law contains language about health benefits for common-law partners. That is, since Kentucky has no stipulation regarding protection for commonlaw spouses, Humana will not cover domestic partners of homosexuals, either.

GLAAD DIRECTOR'S
STATEMENT ON VA
SUPREME COURT DECISION
AGAINST LESBIAN MOTHERS

April 21, 1995 - by Director Ellen Carton - The Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) deplores the decision of the Supreme Court of Virginia to allow the state to remove a child from its mother's care because she is a lesbian. This decision sends a chilling message not just to lesbian mothers, but to all mothers who lead lives that narrow-minded individuals do not accept or understand. The freedom to support and nurture one is own family is one that every human being should enjoy. Lesbians and gay men have long known that we cannot count on our nation is courts to protect us against acts of discrimination or violence. In Virginia, we cannot even count on them to upheld the most basic level of human decency.

ONTARIO COURT OK'S ADOPTION RIGHTS FOR SAME-SEX COUPLES

Earlier this week (May 8), a judge of the Ontario Court ruled that 4 lesbian couples, who had applied for adoption of their partner's children, could do so. The judge went further to rule that Ontario's law disallowing same-sex adoption rights was in violation of the federal Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

LESBIAN ACTIVISTS TO ADVANCE RESOLUTION AT WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON AGING

Two lesbian delegates at the May 2-5 White House Conference on Aging advanced a resolution detailing issues of special concern to older lesbian and gay Americans. Del Martin and Phyllis Lyon will

submit the resolution in response to the final conference agenda, published in the Federal Register on February 2, 1995, which excluded lesbian and gay concerns from explicit consideration. The original conference agenda, published in the Federal Register on October 12, 1994, included gay men and lesbians in a list of special constituencies to be addressed during the conference.

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The Martin and Lyon resolution would ensure gay and lesbian visibility and sensitivity in future conference events and make several policy recommendations. The White House Conference on Aging is tasked with shaping guidelines for national policy on aging and the elderly. It is the fourth such conference since 1961.

Conference delegates Del Martin, 74, and Phyllis Lyon, 70, in 1955 co-founded the first lesbian rights organization, Daughters of Bilitis. Martin and Lyon have been partners for 42 years and have dedicated their adult lives to lesbian and gay activism. The pioneer activists have also co-authored several books including, Lesbian/Woman.

GLAAD SEEKS LOVEBIRDS

The Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation hopes to educate the public about the need for gay marriage by having same-sex couples "who are in marital-type relationships" talk to the press. To volunteer anywhere in the U.S., phone (212) 807-1700.▼

GMHC LAUNCHES
CAMPAIGN DIRECTED AT HIV
Gay Men NEW YORK (Reuter) Gay Men's Health Crisis, the
nation's oldest AIDS service organization, Thursday announced its first
campaign targeting gay, HIV-

negative men to try to get them to use condoms. "Staying negative it's not automatic" is the slogan of the campaign that will feature posters, displays in gay publications and cards distributed in New York City bars, clubs and gyms frequented by gay men. GMHC hopes the program will be picked up by other groups around the country.

Richard Elovich, director of GMHC's substance use counseling and education department, said the aim of the campaign was to encourage HIV-negative gay men to talk about when they have unsafe sex and why, rather than focusing on an ideal of using a condom during every sexual encounter.

GMHC also released a report calling for closer studies of the spread of AIDS and what programs work to convince men to use

more gunshots or stab wounds, the repeated use of blunt objects or more than one killing method.

Dec 1994 - A 21-year-old Filipino homosexual who was depressed about people taunting him over his homosexuality, used a razor to cut off his penis in his family home in Manila.

Nov 1994 - Emmett Stagg, Irish minister of state in the Environment Department, is arrested for asking a suspected male prostitute to get into his car in Dublin's Phoenix Park.

Oct 1994 - The new Bishop of Durham spoke of his "penitence" for an act of gross indecency in a public lavatory 26 years before; "I am not, and never have been homosexual," he said.

Oct 1994 - The naked body of Technion Prof. Yeshayahu Demner,

46, a homosexual who was an AIDS carrier, was found at his home in Haifa's Kiryat Eliezer district. He had been stabbed to death. Demner had reportedly invited men to his home and paid them to have sex on condition they did not use condoms, even though he was aware he was an AIDS carrier. Israeli Police advised anyone who had been in contact with the Technion lecturer to undergo an AIDS test.

May 1994 - Michael Brown is cleared of accusations of a homosexual affair only after he resigned as a British Government whip.

May 1994 - Openly gay, Carsten Hofer, is arrested for the December 1993 murder of Suzanne Olds, wife of the closeted powerful Chicago trademark attorney, Dean Olds, at their \$850,000 Wilmette, IL home. Carsten, had been a traveling companion of Dean. Dean, who was 40 years Carsten's senior, had bankrolled \$350,000 for the younger man's failed limo business. The attorney had made headlines in 1990 when he won a \$42.6-million judgment for a tiny beverage company. In September of 1993 he was removed from his partnership at one of the biggest Chicago law firms of Willian Brinks Olds Hofer Gilson & Lione.

Feb 1994 - Mr Stephen Milligan, a Conservative British MP, was found dead wearing women's underclothing.

1993 - "Gay Slayer" Colin Ireland was sentenced to life imprisonment after he admitted strangling five homosexual men in murders that horrified London's gay

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condoms. According to the report, the rate of infection among gay men is on the rise again, up to 2.6 percent in 1993 from 1.4 percent in 1990, after an initial rate of over 10 percent in the early 1980s.

The report said that young gay men in 1994 engaged in far less risky behavior than their counterparts a decade ago, but noted that "due to the extraordinarily high prevalence of HIV infection among gay men, even moderate levels of risk behavior may be sufficient to sustain the epidemic in the gay community into the next generation."

PROTESTERS STORM
ANTI-GAY
PSYCHIATRIST'S LECTURE

London, 29 Apr 95 - Lesbian and gay protesters today invaded a prestigious London school of psychotherapy, disrupting a speech by controversial U.S psychiatrist Charles Socarides. The protestors stormed the podium at Regents Park

College, covering Socarides with luminous pink sticky foam and blowing whistles and fog horns.

Demonstrators chanted, "We're not sick we don't need healing" and accused Socarides of leading a political war against lesbian and gay rights. They surrounded Socarides with placards reading "Cure Homophobic Psychotherapists" and "Mind-F**cker".

While 20 demonstrators chanted and blew foghorns, Socarides, covered in pink foam, was led away by security guards. Demonstrators occupied the room for about 10 minutes before being removed from the building by police officers. Some 40 officers were present but no arrests were made.

New York Psychoanalyst Charles Socarides is the leading exponent of attempts to "cure" homosexual patients by effecting a change to heterosexuality. He was the top medical expert presenting arguments against allowing gays in the U.S. military.

VICTORY IN KANSAS

May 4, 1995...In a three-two vote Tuesday, May 2, the City Commission of Lawrence, Kansas voted to add the words "sexual orientation" to the city's existing Human Relations Ordinance.

The decision is being hailed as making Lawrence the only city in the state of Kansas to extend protection against discrimination to people based on their sexual orientation.

According to the personnel policies for the 104th Congress. Out of Kentucky's 2 senators and 6 representatives, only Louisville's Mike Ward includes Sexual Orientation in his non-discrimation policy.▼

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

community. Ireland, who was fascinated by outdoor survival training, said he hated gays but police believed he murdered not out of a sexual motive but because he wanted to be famous.

1992 - Commander Michael Trestrail, who joined the Royalty Protection Branch in 1966 and became Queen Elizabeth's bodyguard in 1973, is forced to resign after relation with a male prostitute is made public.

March 1992 Conservative British MP Alan Amos, aged 39, is forced from office after he was arrested and released without charge after being questioned about an alleged homosexual act on Hampstead Heath.

1991 - Gay and Lesbian Americans (GLA) founder, Michael Petralis, threw drink at Rep. Steven Gunderson (R-Wis.) at Alexandria gay bar.

1991 - Dept. of Defense Spokesman, Pete Williams outed.

July 1991 - Police uncover alleged sexual and physical assaults in North Wales children's homes that had been going on for over a decade. The former deputy head of Bryn Estyn children's home in Wrexham, Peter Howarth, who retired in 1984 shortly before the home was closed and former Bryn Estyn housemaster at a children's home in Gwynedd, Nefyn Dodd, become the subject of a police investigations that they subjected children to sadistic and humiliating treatment. Cartrefle Children's Home's head, Stephen Norris, is jailed for three years for sexually abusing young boys in his care over a seven-year period. Norris had been a housemaster in charge of the young boys' wing at Bryn Estyn, and two of his former colleagues there had also been convicted of sex offences against children in care. Fred Rutter, a former policeman, is jailed for 12 years for rape and buggery of young girls at a hostel for the young homeless. Another former Clwyd social worker, gay rights activist David Gillison, was given three years' imprisonment in 1987 for having sexual relations with a 16year-old boy in his care.

1990 - Robert Indiana, an artist known for his block-letter representations of the word love was arrested on a charge of hiring a male prostitute in Rockland, Maine.

1990 - James William Dayton, 44, a computer scientist at the Naval Avionics Center in Indianapolis, ran a male prostitution ring known as "Muscles USA" and "Muscles Midwest" that offered young bodybuilders for hire through a computer network that drew clients from 39 states. Authorities say Dayton was believed to have matched at least 100 prostitutes and 300 patrons through a sophisticated electronic network whose clients included banking officials, a Roman Catholic priest and a policeman. Dayton died in March of a heart attack during a homosexual tryst at a motel in Ohio before he could be tried. Marion County Prosecutor Stephen Goldsmith.

1990 - Author Wendy Leigh publishes biography of Arnold Schwarzenegger which alleges that he used large quantities of steroids and that he engaged in homosexual activities with wealthy gay men. March 1992, SPY magazine publishes a nude photo of Arnold and further allegations of homosexual activity. The magazine later announces it will close due to financial pressure.


