Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, August 19, 1997.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 1:00 p.m. (Lexington time) on Tuesday, August 19, 1997 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower.

A. <u>Meeting Opened</u>

Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Chairperson, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Mr. Welenken.

B. Oath of Office Administered

Governor Breathitt asked Richard Plymale, General Counsel, to administer the oath of office to the following members:

Ms. Melanie Cruz, who will serve as student trustee for the 1997-98 academic year.

Dr. W. Grady Stumbo, appointed by Governor Paul Patton to replace Robert N. Clay, for a term expiring June 30, 2003.

Ms. JoEtta Y. Wickliffe, appointed by Governor Paul Patton to replace Lois C. Weinberg, for a term expiring June 30, 2003.

Mr. Paul W. Chellgren, reappointed by Governor Paul Patton, for a term expiring June 30, 2003.

Governor Breathitt welcomed the new members and expressed pleasure in the reappointment of Mr. Chellgren. He said he looked forward to working with them.

C. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. Ted Bates, Mrs. Kay Shropshire Bell, Governor Edward T. Breathitt (Chairperson), Mr. Paul W. Chellgren, Ms. Melanie Cruz, Mr. Merwin Grayson, Mr. John "Jack" Guthrie, Mr. James F. Hardymon, Professor Loys L. Mather, Dr. Robert P. Meriwether, Mr. Billy Joe Miles, Dr. Elissa Plattner, Mr. Steven S. Reed, Professor Daniel R. Reedy, Mr. C. Frank Shoop, Dr. Grady Stumbo, Mr. Martin Welenken, Ms. JoEtta Wickliffe and Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson. The University administration was represented by President Charles T. Wethington, Jr.; Chancellors Ben W. Carr, James W. Holsinger, and Elisabeth Zinser; Vice Presidents Joseph T. Burch, Fitzgerald Bramwell, Edward A. Carter, George DeBin and Eugene Williams; Dr. Juanita Fleming,

Special Assistant for Academic Affairs; Mr. C. M. Newton, Director of Athletics, and Mr. Richard E. Plymale, General Counsel.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chairperson declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 1:05 p.m.

D. Approval of Minutes

Governor Breathitt said that the Minutes of the Board meeting on June 10, 1997 had been distributed and asked for any additions or corrections. Mr. Guthrie moved that the Minutes be approved as distributed. Mr. Chellgren seconded the motion, and it carried.

E. Resolutions

Elissa Plattner asked to read the following resolution for James C. Bowling:

Whereas, James C. Bowling exemplified the qualities of charity, benevolence and altruism, hallmark of a life of excellence.

Whereas, he demonstrated that it is not what we make of our worldly goods, but the good we can make for others.

Whereas, someday a new fact will be discovered, a new idea will take shape, an old problem will find a new answer and these acts will be born of the seeds of generosity that are the legacy of this far-sighted Kentuckian.

Therefore, the purpose of this resolution of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees is to honor the memory of the life and good works of James C. Bowling.

The 19th day of August, 1997.

Governor Breathitt said that everyone appreciated the outstanding service that James Bowling gave to the University of Kentucky, a moving spirit behind the Kentuckians in New York, and his strong efforts through the Development Council through the years. He said he would be missed, and it is very appropriate that the Board recognize him with a resolution at this time.

Dr. Plattner also noted the passing of Juliette Combs Trapp, a distinguished friend of the University of Kentucky who contributed greatly to the medical school of this state and its work.

On motion made and seconded, the resolution was adopted.

Governor Breathitt asked Professor Mather to read the following resolution for Dr. Deborah Powell:

WHEREAS, Dr. Deborah Powell was elected by the faculty of the University of Kentucky to serve on the Board of Trustees for a three-year term, beginning July 1, 1995, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Powell resigned her position on the Board to accept the position of executive dean of the University of Kansas College of Medicine, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Powell has represented the interests and concerns of the faculty in the University System in an outstanding manner during almost two years on the Board, and

WHEREAS, she has served the University of Kentucky as chair and professor of the department of pathology, as an active member of the University Senate Council and in many other professional capacities with dedication and principle, and

WHEREAS, her membership on the Board allowed the University and her fellow Board members to benefit from her experience as a full professor in the Chandler Medical Center, most especially in giving the faculty perspective on issues and items facing the Board,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky does hereby express sincere gratitude to Deborah Powell for the dedication and commitment she has given to the Board and for the support she has shown to the entire University, benefiting every sector of the institution.

This the 19th day of August, 1997

Professor Mather said that Dr. Powell was almost two years of her second term and had served a previous three year term. He asked for a modification to the resolution. Following the amendment of the resolution, Mr. Wilcoxson moved that the resolution be adopted. Dr. Meriwether seconded the motion, and it passed.

Governor Breathitt called on Ms. Cruz to read the following resolution for Alan Aja:

WHEREAS, Alan Aja has served his constituents well and faithfully over the past year as president of the Student Government Association and as student representative on the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, and

WHEREAS, on any number of issues requiring Board of Trustees action he has articulated student views and positions eloquently and factually, and

WHEREAS, he has worked diligently for the good of his constituency within the policy-making and administrative systems of the University, and

WHEREAS, he has proven himself an excellent listener as well as an eloquent speaker on matters at issue before the Board, and

WHEREAS, he has, in all matters, conducted himself with a great deal of decorum, thoughtfulness and consideration of the opinions and feelings of others,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that his fellow members of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees do formally declare their appreciation and gratitude to Alan Aja for his meritorious service and dedication to duty as a member of the UK Board of Trustees and for his exemplary service to the University of Kentucky during the 1996-1997 Academic Year.

On motion made by Mr. Grayson and seconded by Mr. Chellgren, the resolution was adopted.

F. <u>Letter from Lois Weinberg</u>

Governor Breathitt said that Lois Weinberg asked him to read a letter she had written to the Board and also include a copy of it the Board packet. He read the following letter to the Board:

Dear Friends and Colleagues of this Board:

It was not without a great deal of thought and concern that I made the recent decision not to join you today. The five years of my tenure on

the UK Board have been challenging and meaningful ones. It has been an honor and privilege to serve with Chairman Breathitt and share his dedication and commitment to quality education in Kentucky. I have gained immeasurable appreciation of the importance and complexity of the service the University provides for the citizens of Kentucky. Not only do students gain a quality education, but the outreach through the Rural Health Center, Medical Center, Agricultural Extension Service, Sanders Brown Center, to name a few, touches the lives of thousands of additional families. I have gained respect for the leadership of this institution, administrative and academic. Charles Wethington's skill in crafting policy to be implemented through the budget is remarkable. The impact of the Robinson Forest Scholars Program for talented Eastern Kentucky students will be a legacy to his commitment to using University resources to benefit those with the greatest need. His vision in creating a fiscal vehicle through which to build a library worthy of a "flagship" university was itself instructive for the next chapter in Kentucky higher education.

The concept for the next chapter was discussed as early as October 1981 when the Prichard Committee's report In Pursuit of Excellence was presented to the Council on Higher Education at Spindletop. I remember being part of that presentation and thinking we were being ambitious in our recommendations, but resolute that we had come to these conclusions for the benefit of the whole system of postsecondary education. In Mr. Prichard's forwarding letter he said, "we trust...these recommendations will send out a signal to the higher education community for unity of action in the face of unprecedented challenge." Those sentiments hold true as we face the process of implementing House Bill 1. Concerns about duplicative programs for both undergraduate and graduate levels were present sixteen years ago, along with the recommendation that the University of Kentucky assume the role as the state's comprehensive research university and that appropriate state resources be provided to support this role.

The Lexington Herald's article in last week's paper cites the 15% growth of research funding during 1996-97 bringing \$125 million in contracts, grants and gifts received to the University. This demonstrates the direction we have been moving and Dr. Bramwell is to be commended for his initiative and energy in continuing to expand this role for UK. As we extend the focus of research at the University to embrace an increasingly complex world, so might we consider the replication of a Technology/Research Extension Service comparable to that of the Agricultural Extension to translate current advances into daily practice for professionals and businesses. As I see it, the opportunity for UK to continue in developing its premier role in nurturing knowledge and

promulgating it across Kentucky is the next step in the University's evolution.

Other questions involved in that evolution might be the shaping of Lexington Community College's future with the primary task of preparing undergraduates for upper division studies. Preparing and retaining the strong students we admit to UK might become LCC's mission. The time has come to address basic research questions of utmost importance in Kentucky such as the implications for schools of education of the state's illiteracy rate or how to accelerate our academic skills to qualify for higher paying jobs. We have devoted attention to study natural resources such as coal, tobacco, horses and wood. This may be our opportunity to coordinate and further our knowledge of the most important natural resource we have - the human potential found in our young people's mind.

The conversation began in the spring by this Board requesting increased involvement in formulating policies relevant to the direction of the University bodes well for the important transition confronting us. I am optimistic that the talent and wisdom sitting at this table can provide the momentum necessary to move forward.

I look forward to a continuing dialogue with the members of this Board and between the Council on Postsecondary Education and this University.

See you at the Governor's Conference on Postsecondary Education Trusteeship in Louisville, September 21-22.

Governor Breathitt said that each member had a copy of the letter and everyone looked forward to working with Lois as she takes her seat on the Council on Postsecondary Education which is a very important role for her to continue her efforts for higher education. He recommended that the members of the Board attend the Conference on Postsecondary Education Trusteeship in Louisville on September 21-22. He then asked President Wethington for his report.

President Wethington thanked Governor Breathitt and added his welcome to the new members of the Board. He said he was delighted at the appointment and election of the new members to the Board. He also expressed pleasure in the reappointment of Mr. Paul Chellgren to serve a second term on the Board.

G. President's Report to the Board of Trustees (PR 1)

President Wethington called attention to the following items in PR 1:

- 1. Faculty and staff attracted \$125,607,107 in research contracts, grants and gifts from outside the University during the 1996-97 fiscal year, a 15 percent increase over last year's extramural funding total.
- 2. The University set two fund-raising records last fiscal year: 1) gifts to the University in 1996-97 totaled \$41.4 million, 6 percent more than the previous year, and 2) \$44,424 donors contributed, 2.4 percent more than the previous year.
- 3. The grand opening of the UK Children's Hospital will be held Saturday, August 23, with a formal dedication and ribbon cutting at 10 a.m.
- 4. New officers of the UK National Alumni Association named at the association's summer workshop in Louisville are Marianne Smith of Owensboro, president; Robert F. Pickard of Brentwood, Tennessee, president-elect; and Daniel L. Sparks of Houston, Texas, treasurer.
- 5. Henderson Community College has completed the most successful fund-raising campaign in the history of Henderson County with a total of \$3,768,867 in contributions.
- 6. The Good Samaritan Foundation, Inc. recently awarded grants for 1997-98. Those grants are primarily health related grants that Good Samaritan is making to the University of Kentucky.
- 7. The Center for Rural Health has compiled a three-volume set of comprehensive health-related information which has been published by the Good Samaritan Foundation.
- 8. UK Hospital's Aeromedical Service celebrates its 10th anniversary August 28. Each year, the service transports more than 900 patients to UK Hospital.

President Wethington asked the members to read the other items in the report at their leisure.

H. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointments, actions and/or other staff changes which require Board action; and that the report relative to appointments and/or changes already approved by the administration be accepted. Mr. Shoop moved approval. The motion, seconded by Mr. Chellgren, carried. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Appointment of Board of Directors - University of Kentucky Research Foundation (PR 3A)

President Wethington said that PR 3A is an appointment to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation (UKRF). The recommendation is that approval be given to the appointment of Mr. George Woolwine as a public member of the Board of Directors for a term ending June 30, 2000. In accordance with the Bylaws, the Board of Directors of UKRF are appointed by the Board of Trustees after being recommended by the UKRF Board. He recommended PR 3A for approval. On motion made by Mr. Chellgren and seconded by Mr. Guthrie, PR 3A was approved. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Candidates for Degrees - Community College System (PR 4A)

President Wethington said that PR 4A is an action item dealing with candidates for degrees in the Community College System that will be awarded at the completion of the summer term. The recommendation is that the degree specified on the list attached to PR 4A be awarded to the persons named upon certification that the requirements for those degrees have been satisfactorily completed. He said he was pleased to recommend approval of PR 4A. Professor Mather moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mrs. Bell, passed. (See PR 4A at the end of the Minutes.)

K. <u>Inclusion of Paducah Junior College in the Community College</u> System Pursuant to HB 1 (PR 4B)

President Wethington said that PR 4B recommends that the Board of Trustees concur with the Board of Trustees of Paducah Junior College (PJC) that PJC continue to be included in the Community College System (CCS) as Paducah Community College, pursuant to Section 114 of House Bill 1 enacted by the 1997 Extraordinary Session of the Kentucky General Assembly. Paducah Junior College is an entity which was in existence prior to the establishment of the UK Community College System. There has been an agreement reached with Paducah Junior College going back to June 2, 1967 which gave the University of Kentucky the authority to manage and operate

PJC. The legislation envisioned both the PJC and the UK Board of Trustees concurring that such an arrangement ought to continue and that such management of PJC ought to be delegated to the new Kentucky Community and Technical College System Board. The PJC Board has already taken action. He said he was pleased to recommend approval of PR 4B. Mr. Shoop moved approval. The motion, seconded by Mr. Welenken, carried. (See PR 4B at the end of the Minutes.)

L. <u>Candidates for Degrees - University System (PR 5A)</u>

President Wethington said that PR 5A recommends that the president be authorized to confer upon each individual whose name appears on the list presented the degree to which he or she is entitled upon certification by the registrar and approval by the University Senate that the individual has satisfactorily completed all requirements for the degree for which application has been made. These are degrees for students who are completing their requirements at the end of the summer session. He said he was pleased to recommend approval of PR 5A.

Professor Reedy noted that this list represents the highest figure of doctoral productivity in the history of the University and moved approval of PR 5A. Mr. Grayson seconded the motion, and it carried. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Appointments to University of Kentucky Humanities Foundation (PR 5B)

President Wethington said that PR 5B recommends that approval be given to the appointment of William T. Young, Jr. and Donna S. Hall as members of the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Humanities Foundation for a four-year term beginning with the October 1997 meeting. The Articles of Incorporation of the Humanities Foundation require that the Board of Trustees consider individuals for appointment to the Kentucky Humanities Foundation Board after being recommended by the Humanities Foundation. He recommended approval of PR 5B. Mr. Chellgren moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Shoop, passed. (See PR 5B at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Appointment of Dean of the College of Dentistry (PR 6A)

President Wethington asked Chancellor Holsinger to comment on the appointment of the Dean of the College of Dentistry, Dr. Leon A. Assael.

Chancellor Holsinger said it was a pleasure to bring the report to the Board. In December 1996 the current dean, David Nash, requested that he

have the opportunity to return to the faculty at the close of the fall 1997 convocation of the College of Dentistry on August 20th. As a result of that request, a search committee was developed and chaired by Dean Tom Robinson of the College of Allied Health Professions.

Chancellor Holsinger said that the search committee and the interviewers across the Medical Center strongly endorsed the appointment of Dr. Leon A. Assael as the new Dean of the College of Dentistry replacing Dean David Nash. Dr. Assael will assume the post as the sixth Dean of the College. He comes to the University of Kentucky from the University of Connecticut School of Dental Medicine where he currently serves as the Head of the Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery and as a faculty member in the Department of Surgery in the School of Medicine. He is a 1971 graduate of Columbia University and received a doctorate of Dental Medicine in 1975 from Harvard University School of Dental Medicine. He did his oral and maxillofacial surgical residency at Vanderbilt University and after that entered upon his career as an academic dentist.

President Wethington said it was his pleasure to support the recommendation of Chancellor Holsinger and recommend to the Board that Dr. Leon A. Assael be appointed Dean of the College of Dentistry effective August 20, 1997. On motion made by Dr. Stumbo and seconded by Dr. Meriwether, PR 6A was approved. Governor Breathitt said that the appointment of the Dean of the College of Dentistry is approved unanimously and with great gratitude for his arrival. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

President Wethington asked Dr. Assael to stand and be recognized, following which he received a round of applause. Governor Breathitt encouraged the Board to get acquainted with Dr. Assael personally after the meeting.

O. Report of Leases (FCR 1)

Mr. Hardymon, Chairperson of the Finance Committee, said that the Finance Committee met and reviewed nine items to present to the Board for action. FCR 1 is the Report of Leases of value less than \$30,000 per year. The administration has already processed the leases and this is a report to the Board. He noted there were seven new very small leases mainly involving the Rural Health program but Hopkinsville Community College as well. He said the leases are extremely competitive and moved approval of FCR 1. Mr. Chellgren seconded his motion, and it passed. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Approval of Lease (FCR 2)

Mr. Hardymon said FCR 2 is the approval of a lease with a value of \$30,000 or more per year. This particular lease involves office/classroom space for Somerset Community College, and the annual rate is \$35,000. He moved approval of FCR 2. His motion, seconded by Mr. Shoop, carried. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Capital Construction Report (FCR 3)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the quarterly Capital Construction Report for the three months ending June 30, 1997 be accepted. He said that this report represents the tracking of capital construction projects and consultant projects that are in some form of completion. The Finance Committee reviewed and approved the report. Mr. Guthrie seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

R. <u>1997-98 Budget Revisions (FCR 4)</u>

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 4 is a quarterly report on revisions for the budget. This report normally shows the stream of income and the Finance Committee discusses the expenditures made in conjunction with the income. He noted that FCR 4 is different and asked President Wethington to comment on it.

President Wethington said he would like to comment on the \$1.4 million which is an increase in the state appropriation that came to the University very late in the 1996-97 fiscal year. He reminded the Board that the administration was to come back to Board and ask for a recommendation concerning the expenditure of \$1.4 million for 97-98. It has been determined that the best use of these monies for 97-98 would be the support of graduate and research initiatives which get underway during 97-98 and signal that the administration and the Board are very serious about the work this University is doing to become a better research university moving toward top 20 status among public universities.

He said FCR 4 proposes that the \$1.4 million be expended during 1997-98 in support of research and graduate initiatives. Specifically, those initiatives are designed to recruit and retain the best and brightest graduate students and, second, that these initiatives are those which will assist the faculty to improve their research competitiveness in seeking external contracts and grant support. Thirdly, that these monies be used for initiatives to enhance the research environment, such as expansion and renovation of our laboratories, assisting faculty teams as they work together to put together

proposals for research contracts and grants, and bringing distinguished scholars to campus.

He said that in those three areas in particular, the graduate student area, the assistance to research faculty members, and the improving and bettering of the research environment, the administration will dedicate the \$1.4 million in 1997-98 and let everyone know and understand that the first discretionary money that has come to this institution will be dedicated to the research and graduate mission which, in his opinion, is very important to the University of Kentucky. He asked Professor Reedy to comment on the research task force which he is chairing. He said Professor Reedy, as a member of the Board, will be a person who can keep the Board well informed about the research initiatives at the University.

Professor Reedy reported that the task force began its work organizationally this past April and May. The task force has looked at the context of the legislative action of May 30 and the legislation that was passed at that time redefining institutional mission and directions and particularly the goal of achieving major comprehensive research institution status. The process now has begun at the grass roots. The task force has had considerable input already from faculty moving up through the department level. There have been several task force meetings, and the task force intends, by the end of the fall semester, to have in President Wethington's hands a set of priorities that will relate to research and graduate education. Those priorities will identify the areas of strength of which we know we have many and look for the areas that we know also have to be improved, but always keeping the focus on our mission as a comprehensive university and on our role in supporting the directions and needs of the Commonwealth. He said that this is a culturalization process, getting the involvement of a lot of faculty in the university. It is particularly important to note as a faculty member that this is coming from the ground up and not a top down kind of process. This is, in his opinion, a very important effort developmentally within the University for us to identify the strategic areas that the institution feels it can definitely move into national or international competitive status and that will also serve the needs and directions of the Commonwealth in the future.

President Wethington thanked Professor Reedy. He said he wanted the Board members to know of at least a couple of actions that are already underway. One is the effort chaired by Dan Reedy which will identify those research priorities and initiatives which will help this university move forward more rapidly toward a better national status. And two, that this \$1.4 million will be used in support of the graduate and research program.

Mr. Hardymon thanked President Wethington and Professor Reedy and continued with his report on FCR 4.

Mr. Hardymon called attention to two other items in the budget revision: \$912,000 and \$500,000. The \$500,000 is part of a \$600,000 allotment. \$100,000 was in the original budget. It is in support of the extended campus engineering program in Paducah as part of the regional higher education center. This is to run the facility and begin delivery of the program. The second part is in the same area but involves a one-time situation. It is part of an appropriation bill enacted during the May 1997 special session of the legislature. It is \$912,000 to equip the center with telecommunications and computer equipment to support the teaching of the engineering classes there. On motion made by Mr. Hardymon, seconded by Mr. Welenken and carried, FCR 4 was approved. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

S. The Frederick Van Lennep Chair in Equine Veterinary Science (FCR 5)

Mr. Hardymon provided an overview of FCR 5, 6 and 7. He said that these three items involve the reclassifying from professorships to endowed chairs. The University's policy is that when the professorship gets to a million dollar amount they may be reclassified to an endowed chair. He noted that FCR 5, 6, and 7 are in the equine area: the Frederick Van Lennep chair, the John S. and Elizabeth Knight chair which was started in January 24, 1989 with an endowed grant of \$850,000, and the Keeneland Association chair which started with \$200,000 in July of 1990. He moved approval of FCR 5, 6, and 7. Mr. Shoop seconded the motion for FCR 5, and it passed. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

T. The John S. and Elizabeth Knight Chair in Equine Veterinary Science (FCR 6)

On motion made by Mr. Hardymon and seconded by Mr. Chellgren, FCR 6 was approved. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

U. The Keeneland Association Chair in Equine Veterinary Science (FCR 7)

On motion made by Mr. Hardymon and seconded by Mr. Grayson, FCR 7 was approved. (See FCR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

V. <u>A Resolution Authorizing the University's Investment of Additional Funds in Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. (FCR 8)</u>

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 8 is a resolution authorizing the university's investment of additional funds in Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. This is a management services organization composed of a network of physicians and providers. Health Associates of Kentucky started December 12, 1995 with \$8 million that was hospital income put into this fund. The goal is to add 200 physicians in this program by the year 2000, and the Finance Committee was informed at its meeting that this organization is probably ahead of schedule with over 45 physicians currently. He moved approval of the movement of \$8 million to the for-profit corporation to assist with the plan to add additional physicians and medical practice provider sites. Dr. Meriwether seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

W. A Resolution Authorizing the University's Participation in the Formation of a Medicaid Managed Health Care System (FCR 9)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 9 is a resolution authorizing the University's participation in the formation of a Medicaid Managed Health Care System. He explained that in 1995 Kentucky obtained waiver approval to convert its Medicaid program to a prepaid managed care plan. There are eight regions around the state, and the University of Kentucky was asked to participate in Region 5 and possibly others.

He said that FCR 9 is asking the Board's authorization to invest funds of the University Hospital in the amount of \$9 million to provide a managed care network system. He called attention to the last paragraph of FCR 9. Medicaid utilization at the University Hospital for the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1996 was 33.1% of inpatient days and Medicaid net reimbursement accounted for approximately 22% of total cash revenues for the same period. He said it is important that the University stay very competitive and active in this area. Hopefully, because of the University's size and because the University is ahead in this program, it can also provide this assistance to other regions. He moved approval of FCR 9. Dr. Meriwether seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 9 at the end of the Minutes.)

X. Mr. Guthrie's Comments

Mr. Guthrie made a motion that the resolution in memory of James C. Bowling be properly prepared and forwarded to his wife, Anne Bowling, who is also a Kentuckian, and it was so ordered.

Y. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the Board, the Chairperson adjourned the meeting at 1:58 p.m.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. Extramural Research Funding Sets Record at \$125 Million

Faculty and staff attracted \$125,607,107 in research contracts, grants and gifts from outside the University during the 1996-97 fiscal year, a 10 percent increase over last year's extramural funding total. This is the fourth year in a row that the University has topped \$100 million in research funding. The composition of research awards reflects UK's dual mission as a land-grant and research university. More than 70 percent of the \$121.9 million awarded through the UK Research Foundation was earmarked for basic and applied research. The remainder was for public service, instruction and training. An additional \$3.6 million was received in the form of gifts by the UK Development Office. The largest award was to Frank Derbyshire of the Center for Applied Energy Research. He received \$2,153,000 from the U.S. Department of Energy to study the liquefaction process of coal.

2. UK Sets All-time Record in Fund Raising

The University set two fund-raising records last fiscal year: 1) gifts to the University in 1996-97 totaled \$41.4 million, 6 percent more than the previous year, and 2) 44,424 donors contributed, 2.4 percent more than the previous year. Corporations and foundations gave \$19 million, and donors included 24,762 alumni. The Chandler Medical Center received \$12.4 million, the Lexington Campus \$11.3 million and the Community College System \$5.9 million. A gift of more than \$1.1 million from an alumna went to the Thomas Hunt Morgan School of Biological Sciences and was the first contribution to the new Fund for Academic Excellence.

3. First E.O. Robinson Scholars Named

In June, 162 eighth graders from 29 Eastern Kentucky counties were named the first E.O. Robinson Scholars. They will receive full tuition, room and board, books and fee payments at UK in Lexington and/or a UK community college if they maintain an acceptable grade-point average in high school and successfully complete their high school studies. The scholarship funds are from the earnings on coal mining and logging operations permitted on a portion of Robinson Forest.

4. Children's Hospital to be Dedicated August 23

The grand opening of the UK Children's Hospital will be held Saturday, August 23, with a formal dedication and ribbon cutting at 10 a.m., followed by special tours, a health fair, family entertainment, children's crafts and science experiments. The public is invited to attend.

5. Hopkinsville CC Unveils Unique Agriculture Technician Program

Hopkinsville Community College is now offering the only program in Kentucky that will prepare students for technical jobs on farms and in agriculture-related businesses. Five new agriculture courses have been created specifically for the new program -- a joint effort between the community college and Kentucky Tech. The program was developed in response to agriculture officials' concerns that it is becoming more difficult to find qualified workers for today's agriculture machinery and chemicals.

6. UK Researchers to Study Effect of Welfare Reform

Researchers from the College of Human Environmental Sciences, the College of Social Work, the Martin School of Public Policy and Administration and the Survey Research Center will evaluate the effect of Lexington's welfare reform plan on families and children. Face-to-face interviews with 400 Fayette County residents affected by the new welfare laws will be conducted for the study. Claudia Peck-Heath, associate dean of Human Environmental Sciences, is the lead researcher for the project.

7. New National Alumni Association Officers Named

New officers of the UK National Alumni Association named at the association's summer workshop in Louisville are Marianne Smith of Owensboro, president; Robert F. Pickard of Brentwood, Tennessee, president-elect; and Daniel L. Sparks of Houston, Texas, treasurer.

8. Henderson Community College Tops \$3.5 Million Fund-Raising Goal

Henderson Community College has completed the most successful fundraising campaign in the history of Henderson County with a total of \$3,768,867 in contributions. That total represents 492 donors contributing from \$1 to \$300,000 to the Community College System's Partners in Progress Campaign. To date the 14 community colleges have raised more than \$37 million.

9. Jazz Legend Becomes Artist-in-Residence

Legendary jazz musician Richard Davis will make six visits to Lexington over the next year as part of a project coordinated by the Singletary Center for the Arts and the Office of African American Student Affairs. His concerts will include a celebration of the 20th anniversary of the UK Spotlight Jazz Series as well as performances with the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra and at the KET studios. With each visit, Davis will conduct a workshop on improvisation for area musicians. His residency is the first in the Lexington Jazz Artist Residency and is supported by a \$105,000 grant from the Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest Fund.

10. Tobacco Institute Initiates Biotechnology Research

The Tobacco and Health Research Institute will begin research into the possible use of biotechnology strategies to combat blue mold disease. This work will emphasize collaboration with other laboratories worldwide who have developed, or are developing, strategies to resist the fungal diseases of crop plants. The institute hopes a survey of strategies already under development will provide clues to an effective method of limiting blue mold damage.

11. Interactive TV Training Center Opens at SECC Bell County Campus

The Comprehensive Classroom Training Center and Interactive Television Classroom opened August 1 on the Bell County campus of Southeast Community College. The new ITV classroom will provide students with the opportunity to fully participate in classes and programs that originate at distant locations. It also will increase the variety of programs offered on the Bell County campus. The new Comprehensive Computer Training Center provides software packages for business and industry, personal growth and development and the development of entrepreneurial skills. The center is a joint project of Southeast Community College and Southeast Regional Technology Center/Kentucky Tech.

12. <u>UK Engineers Updating 50-Year-Old Equipment</u>

With financial assistance from the National Science Foundation under its Academic Research Infrastructure program, the Department of Civil Engineering is updating 50-year-old test equipment. Digital retrofitting of the 300,000-pound test equipment will permit it to be used in modern studies of solid waste utilization or "waste resource engineering."

13. Pharmacy Professor Honored by University in Greece

George A. Digenis of the College of Pharmacy received an honorary Ph.D. June 18 from the University of Athens in Greece. During their opening remarks, both the rector and orator representing the University of Athens mentioned UK's consistent ranking as one of the top three pharmacy programs in the United States. The Greek press made similar remarks in its coverage.

14. Community College Students Guaranteed Transfer of 60 Hours

Beginning this fall community college students are guaranteed that 60 hours of college credit will transfer toward a bachelor's degree at any public university in Kentucky. The Baccalaureate Program Transfer Frameworks recently approved by the Council on Higher Education (now the Council on Postsecondary Education) provides community college students with a guide to each major offered in the state. Students working with academic advisers can pre-plan their college work to save both time and money.

15. <u>Clinical Studies Center Receives \$3.4 Million from NIH</u>

The College of Medicine General Clinical Studies Center (GCSC) has received a \$3.4 million renewal grant from the National Institutes of Health. The grant will award approximately \$900,000 per year to the center until 2001. Although UK's 14-bed facility is the smallest GCSC in the nation, this clinical research resource annually initiates more than 50 new research protocols and is known for the diversity of its research.

16. Kentucky and Indiana Sign Tuition Reciprocity Agreement

Three UK community colleges are among institutions in Kentucky and Indiana that have signed a tuition reciprocity agreement that allows residents of designated counties in both states to attend designated institutions in the other state while paying in-state tuition rates. The Kentucky schools involved are Henderson, Jefferson and Owensboro community colleges, Northern Kentucky University and the University of Louisville. The Indiana schools are the University of Southern Indiana and the Ivy Tech State College campuses in Evansville, Madison/Lawrenceburg and Sellersburg.

17. Food Services Wins National Award

UK Food Services won the Grand Prize at the 24th Lloyd E. Horton Dining Award Competition recently in Buffalo, New York. Food Services also won first place in the specialty restaurant category for Intermezzo Coffee Shop, located on the Patterson Office Tower mezzanine. The National Association of College and University Food Services sponsors the competition.

18. Good Samaritan Foundation Awards Grants, Honors Good Samaritan

The Good Samaritan Foundation, Inc. recently awarded grants for 1997-98. They include: \$119,600 to the College of Nursing for a three-year pilot program in the Red Bird River area; \$87,100 to the College of Nursing for a two-year pilot project in downtown Lexington; \$43,000 to the College of Nursing at the Center for Rural Health; \$56,100 to the College of Nursing for Greater Downtown Lexington; \$73,600 to the College of Medicine Department of Family Practice for a rural medical residency; and \$7,000 to family practice for a summer externship. Marcia K. Stanhope, College of Nursing, also was named a Good Samaritan, a designation for companies and individuals who donate \$10,000 or more to the foundation.

19. Research Shows Promise for Potential New Treatment for Diabetes

The first potential new treatment for Type I diabetes since insulin has shown promise in improving blood sugar control in a study under way by a UK researcher. Kathryn Thrailkill, chief of pediatric endocrinology, presented the findings at a recent American Diabetes Association meeting. She is developing an insulin-like growth factor as an adjunct to insulin therapy for those whose diabetes is not adequately controlled by insulin alone.

20. German Courses Offered on the Internet

The UK Department of German will offer German 101, 102, 201 and 202 on the Internet this fall. The courses match courses taught on the Lexington Campus and will be marketed to the community colleges, correspondence students and areas outside Kentucky.

21. Rural Health Training Receives Continued Funding

The Rural Health Interdisciplinary Training Project has received three years of continued funding totaling \$567,390 from the Health Resources and Services Administration. Linda C. Kuder, associate director for the Sanders-Brown Center on Aging, is co-primary investigator on the project.

22. Allied Health Receives Physician Assistant Training Grant

The College of Allied Health Professions is the recipient of a three-year physician assistant training grant for \$210,000 through the Bureau of Health Professions, Health Resources and Services Administration. The grant will be used to develop an HIV/AIDS training program for physician assistant students. The project's principal investigators are Herb Ridings and Pat Jennings.

23. Center for Rural Health Compiles New Statewide Publication

The Center for Rural Health has compiled a three-volume set of comprehensive health-related information published by the Good Samaritan Foundation. The publication is designed to provide basic health statistics to policy makers in such areas as the percentage of uninsured and mortality rates from various diseases, county-by-county data and data on the health status of the elderly. This is the second year the foundation has provided funding for the project.

24. Agriculture Recruitment Publications Win Awards

A series of undergraduate recruitment brochures for the College of Agriculture recently won a national Award of Excellence from APEX '97. The 14-piece series was edited and designed by Deborah Witham and Linda Millercox in agricultural communications.

25. Islamic Civilization Endowed Book Fund Established

An Islamic resident of Central Kentucky has contributed \$7,500 to the UK Libraries to establish an endowed book fund in honor of the late Hajja Razia Sharif Sheikh, a native of Lahore, Pakistan. The anonymous gift will be used to purchase research materials for the study of Islamic civilization.

26. UK Hospital's Aeromedical Service Celebrates 10th Anniversary

UK Hospital's Aeromedical Service celebrates its 10th anniversary August 28. Each year, the service transports more than 900 patients to UK Hospital, which has the only Level I Trauma Center in central and eastern Kentucky.

27. Primary Care Enhancement Grant Extended

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Practice Sights Grant, focusing on primary care enhancement, will be extended for a fourth year. Wayne Myers, Center for Rural Health, is the principal investigator and William Pfeiffle, College of Allied Health Professions, is the co-principal investigator. Funding from the RWJ Foundation over the four-year period is \$800,000.

28. WUKY Raises \$83,000 in Popular Fund Raiser

The UK public radio station, WUKY-FM, raised \$83,000 in its recent Blues, Brews and Barbecue project. More than 2,000 attended the popular fund raiser, including football coach Hal Mumme, who helped judge the "Some like it hot" food contest.

29. Workshop Develops Simulations for Farmer Safety

A workshop at the Department of Biosystems and Agricultural Engineering has resulted in five simulations to be used with farmers and those who provide health and safety services to farmers. The simulations concern prevention of farm tractor overturn injuries, run-over injuries and other tractor injuries, based on actual injury and fatality cases. The workshop was sponsored by the Southeast Center for Agricultural Health and Injury Prevention, the Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center, the Department of Biosystems and Agricultural Engineering, Research and Graduate Studies' Behavioral Research Aspects of Safety and Health and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention.

30. Student Awards and Honors

<u>David Butler</u>, geology, <u>Molly Shabel</u>, engineering, and <u>Phillip Sisk</u>, engineering, have received scholarships for 1997-98 from the Kentucky Water Resources Research Institute, which received \$117,000 for scholarships from the state Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. Two current recipients from engineering, <u>Brian Howell</u> and <u>Heather Willis</u>, also will be supported for an additional year.

Jennifer Dickey, <u>Kathy Redding</u> and <u>Heather Vidourek</u>, agricultural communications undergraduates, won five national awards for their entries in the 1997 Agricultural Communicators of Tomorrow contest.

Mike Dobbs, medicine, has been elected president of the Kentucky Medical Association-Medical Student Section for UK for 1997-98. Also elected were fourth year students Mike Stoltzfus, vice president, Barry Lee, secretary, and David Hiestand, treasurer.

UK engineering students won second place in a national competition of female engineering students to design improved manufacturing systems.

Malinda Ellington was the team leader. This is the fifth consecutive year that the UK chapter of the Society of Women Engineers has won first- or second-place awards in the competition.

Jo Ann Fuller, Hopkinsville Community College, placed ninth nationally in Accounting 1 at the National Leadership Conference for Phi Beta Lambda, held July 5-8 in Anaheim, Calif.

Alicia Holland and Ginnie Word, Hopkinsville Community College, received the Hopkinsville Community College freshman speech team scholarships.

<u>David Morales</u>, Hopkinsville Community College, participated in the 17th National Veterans Wheelchair Games in San Diego, competing in nine-ball billiards, bowling, archery and air gun.

Sharon Ricks, medicine, has been selected as a 1997 Academic Medicine Fellow. Ricks is among 35 medical students selected nationally and the the only Kentucky student to be selected by the program, sponsored by Bristol-Myers Squibb Company. INCLUSION OF PADUCAH JUNIOR COLLEGE IN THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM PURSUANT TO HB 1

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees concur with the Board of Trustees of Paducah Junior College that Paducah Junior College continue to be included in the Community College System as Paducah Community College, pursuant to Section 114 of House Bill 1 enacted by the 1997 Extraordinary Session of the Kentucky General Assembly.

Background: The Kentucky Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997 (HB 1) amended laws relating to the University of Kentucky Community College System (UKCCS). Section 114 of the Act requires that the boards of trustees of UK and Paducah Junior College (PJC) concur that PJC remain included in the UKCCS as Paducah Community College (PCC). The Act also provides that following the concurrence of the two boards, an agreement shall be executed memorializing the parameters of the community college relationship. The Act further provides that any agreement executed pursuant to Section 114 regarding the community college operation shall be subject to the "management of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS)", under the provision of the Act which requires that the Board delegate management responsibilities of the UKCCS to the KCTCS Board of Regents. The PJC Board of Trustees enacted its concurring Resolution at its July 17, 1997 meeting. The two boards' existing agreement, entered into under the prior law, was executed June 2, 1967. Legal counsel for both institutions are reviewing the existing agreement to determine if it needs modification to reflect the revised law and operations of PCC during the last 30 years. This action does not affect other relationships that UK has directly with Paducah and PJC, e.g., the Crisp Center, the UK College of Engineering and other extended campus programs and initiatives.





3. Comments - The University's 1997-98 Operating Budget was approved by the University Board of Trustees on June 10, 1997. That budget was developed based on the state support as originally appropriated to the University for 1997-98 with the understanding that revisions to the state support as a result of the Special Session would be brought back to the Board as a budget revision at the next Board meeting. Included in the General Fund appropriation to the University of Kentucky adopted by the General Assembly in the Special Session was additional state support in fiscal year 1997-98 of \$1,480,000 to provide an operating budget increase. In order to move forward on the goal for the University of Kentucky to become ranked nationally in the top twenty (20) public universities, these funds will be utilized during 1997-98 for graduate student support, new research initiatives, and the renovation of research space and facilities.

3. Comments (continued)

At their July 21, 1997, meeting, the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) approved the allotment of \$600,000 to the University of Kentucky (\$100,000 of which is continued funding provided in 1996-97 for program delivery through the Regional Higher Education Center in Paducah and was contained in the 1997-98 University of Kentucky Operating Budget approved by the Board of Trustees in June 1997). The additional \$500,000 is to begin delivery of extended campus engineering programs in Paducah. This allotment is based on and consistent with the provisions of the framework for a regional higher education center in Paducah as approved by the Council on Higher Education on November 13, 1995 and HB4, the Appropriations Bill enacted during the May 1997 Special Session of the General Assembly.

In HB4, the Appropriations Bill enacted during the May 1997 Special Session, \$912,000 was included in the General Fund appropriation to the Kentucky Community and Technical College System in support of the University of Kentucky College of Engineering extended campus programs at the Regional Center in Paducah established by the framework as approved by the Council on Higher Education on November 13, 1995. The use of those funds is limited to the following technology/telecommunications items including items of "equipment" and "systems" as defined in KRS 45.750 in support of those University of Kentucky College of Engineering extended campus programs: (1) voice and data lines; (2) Private Branch Exchange (PBX) switch system; (3) science and engineering building communications wiring; (4) computers and routers for the engineering programs; and (5) Interactive Television (ITV) equipment for one classroom. The University has been advised by the Governor's Office for Policy and Management that these funds have been approved for allotment to the University of Kentucky and are now available for expenditure.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE UNIVERSITY'S INVESTMENT OF ADDITIONAL FUNDS IN HEALTH ASSOCIATES OF KENTUCKY, INC.

<u>Recommendation:</u> that the Board authorize the expenditures of funds from University Hospital earnings in the amount of \$8.5 million to provide additional capital for Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc., to facilitate its corporate restructuring and expand its operations.

Background: At its meeting of December 12, 1995 the Board of Trustees authorized an initial investment of \$8 million to form a for-profit corporation that will have the power to acquire physician and other medical practice/provider sites and to provide management services to medical practice/provider sites to broaden the Medical Center's network of physicians who will be available for teaching, research, and service. That corporation, known as Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. has engaged in acquisition, partnering and management of physician practices, including acquisition of Corbin Pediatrics, and Urgent Treatment Centers of Kentucky, Inc.; partnering with physicians in Lexington, Versailles, and Frankfort; and management of Kentucky Clinic Frankfort and Kentucky Clinic North.

In order to maximize tax benefits and to insulate Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. from potential liability flowing from physician practice management, it is advisable for Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. to form a subsidiary corporation to which the practice management assets of Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. will be transferred in exchange for shares of the new corporation. The subsidiary corporation will continue to expand its physician practice management.

After the restructuring of Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc., insulating its physician practice management functions, it will then be able to partner with other for-profit entities. In addition, Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. will form a not-for-profit corporation which will be able to partner with not-for-profit entities by contributing capital to not-for-profit partnerships or corporations.

By restructuring Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. into two operating functions, with one engaged in partnering with for-profit corporations and the other partnering with not-for-profit entities, this will expand the opportunities for University physicians and ancillary support staff to provide care to the population of the Commonwealth where educational opportunities will be afforded. Both the provision of care to the population of the Commonwealth and the educational opportunities afforded will continue to fulfill the mission of the University of Kentucky Medical Center. In accordance with the December 12, 1995 Board of Trustees action Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. activities are reported annually to the Board.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE UNIVERSITY'S PARTICIPATION IN THE FORMATION OF A MEDICAID MANAGED HEALTH CARE SYSTEM

<u>Recommendations</u>: that the Board of Trustees take the following actions to facilitate the University's participation in the formation of a managed health care system for Medicaid recipients.

- 1. That the Board endorse the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center's participation with other local and regional health care providers in the formation and development of a delivery system and its related organizations, as described in the Background below, for Medicaid managed care.
- 2. That the Board authorize the investment of funds of the University Hospital in the amount of \$9 million to be used along with funds from other qualified hospitals, physicians, and health care providers to provide capitalization for the Medicaid managed health care delivery system throughout its development. The investment of these funds will be made through the CHA Service Company, Inc. and/or CHA HMO, Inc.
- 3. That the Board authorize the President of the University to execute all necessary documents and contracts to facilitate participation of the University in this managed health care delivery system.

Background: The Commonwealth of Kentucky received approval of a Section 1115 Waiver from the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) in 1995 to convert its Medicaid program to a prepaid, for profit managed care plan. The Waiver called for the state to be divided into eight regions with broad-based provider partnerships to be responsible for program implementation. Each health care partnership is to have responsibility for providing essentially all services to the majority of Medicaid beneficiaries in its region. The federal Waiver includes provisions that require the state's two teaching hospitals to furnish leadership in developing provider partnerships in each region. The University of Kentucky

has provided this leadership to many areas of the state and most specifically region 5 which is made up of Fayette and 20 other central Kentucky counties.

The region 5 health care partnership will provide medical services to 74,000 Medicaid recipients in the central Kentucky area under a managed care approach. This provider-driven plan is unique to Kentucky and will allow providers to be responsible for managing the health care needs of the Medicaid population. Except for the exclusion of the nursing home population and some other similar groups, participation by Medicaid beneficiaries will be mandatory.

To this extent the University of Kentucky Medical Center, along with other providers in the region, formed a planning committee to do the initial planning activities for the partnership. The region 5 planning committee has been meeting since March 1996, and has overseen the development of the organizational design and the reimbursement models. The planning committee has formally organized into a corporation and that corporation will join CHA HMO, Inc. to contract with the state as the Medicaid Partnership for region 5. CHA HMO, Inc. and its parent corporation CHA Service Company, Inc. are working with providers in region 5 to raise the needed capital to start the system. If the system functions as anticipated, the investments will be repaid at the end of the contract with the State. The University currently holds a majority interest in the CHA Service Company, Inc.

Contract negotiations with the state are ongoing, for a late fall implementation. If the state cannot enter into a financially sound agreement with a health care partnership that will provide greater access, higher quality of health care and a reduction of the overall rate of growth in medical costs, it will proceed with a competitive bid process for the Medicaid Managed Care Program. A competitive bid process could reduce total provider payments greater than the partnership approach by redirecting dollars to marketing activities and other administrative overhead requirements.

The University Hospital has significant dependence on the Medicaid population both in terms of support of its teaching mission and overall utilization. Medicaid utilization for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1996 was 33.1% of inpatient days and Medicaid net reimbursement accounted for approximately 22.0% of total cash resources for the same period.
