The Current General Fund budgetary operations for the period reflect income realized for educational and general purposes in the amount of \$14,826,536.41 or 57.8% of the budget estimate of \$25,654,285.62. The expenditures including encumbrances outstanding amount to \$11,121,003.58. This represents 42.3% of the total Current General Fund Appropriations of \$25,693,929.07.

Members having heard the report and being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was received and ordered put to record.

D. University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bonds of 1961, Dated April 1, 1961--Supplement Approved.

The Secretary reminded the members of the Board that at the Board meeting of December 13, 1960, action was taken to authorize \$1,225,000 "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bonds of 1960" to be dated as of April 1, 1960, and that in order to secure such bonds a Trust Indenture was authorized and thereafter duly executed with Farmers Bank & Capital Trust Company, Frankfort, Kentucky, as Trustee. When construction bids were opened they substantially exceeded the estimates thereof, and subsequently the Board negotiated a "Revised Loan Agreement" with Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States (HHFA) contemplating an increase of the bond issue from \$1,225,000 to \$1,325,000, a change in the date of the bonds from April 1, 1960, to April 1, 1961, and re-designation of the bonds as "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bonds of 1961". It was necessary to amend the previously executed Trust Indenture, and at the Board's meeting on September 19, 1961, action was taken to authorize an "Amendment to Trust Indenture" which was thereafter executed with the Trustee and duly recorded. Counsel has now discovered that although the amount of the bond issue, the maturity schedule, and the redemption provisions were properly amended, nevertheless through inadvertence there was a failure to redesignate the various special funds provided for in the original Trust Indenture as well as a failure to increase the amounts to be paid into such funds, and the amounts of the reserves to be accumulated and maintained therein. There has now been tendered a "Supplemental Trust Indenture", prepared by Bond Counsel for the purpose of correcting these oversights. The text of the instrument has been reviewed and found to be in conformity with the HHFA "Revised Loan Agreement", and it was the recommendation of the Secretary that action be taken at this time to authorize the execution thereof with the Trustee.

After discussion Board Member James Sutherland introduced, caused to be read in full, and moved immediate adoption of a proposed Resolution, in which the text of the "Supplemental Trust Indenture" was incorporated in full, as follows:

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION, WITH FARMERS BANK & CAPITAL TRUST COMPANY, AS TRUSTEE, OF A "SUPPLE-MENTAL TRUST INDENTURE" RELATING TO THE BOARD'S \$1,325,000 "UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY HOUSING AND DINING HALL BONDS OF 1961."

WHEREAS, it has been made to appear that the certain "Amendment

to Trust Indenture" dated May 1, 1961, authorized by a Resolution adopted by the Board at its meeting of September 19, 1961, and relating to \$1,325,000 "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bonds of 1961" was incomplete, and failed in certain respects to conform to the terms and conditions of this Board's "Revised Loan Agreement", identified by HHFA as its "Project No. KY-15-CH-36(DS) Rev"; and

WHEREAS, for the purpose of supplying the deficiencies and conforming to the terms and provisions of said "Revised Loan Agreement" Bond Counsel has now tendered a "Supplemental Trust Indenture" with a recommendation and request that the Board authorize the execution thereof with the Trustee; and said instrument has been examined and appears to be in proper form and substance;

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The "Supplemental Trust Indenture" dated December 11, 1962, tendered by Bond Counsel for the purposes recited in the preamble of this Resolution, and intended to be executed on behalf of this Board with Farmers Bank & Capital Trust Company, Frankfort, Kentucky, as Trustee, is hereby approved in all respects and the proper officers of this Board are hereby authorized and directed to execute the same, cause it to be executed by said Trustee, and delivered in such manner as to become effective as of this date; said "Supplemental Trust Indenture" being in the following text:

SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST INDENTURE

This SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST INDENTURE, dated the 11th day of December, 1962, made by and between BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-OF KENTUCKY, a body corporate, as a public educational institution of higher learning of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (hereinafter called the "Board"), party of the first part, and FARMERS BANK & CAPITAL TRUST COMPANY, a combined bank and trust company organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, having full powers to act as corporate trustee, and having its principal office and place of business in the City of Frankfort, Franklin County, Kentucky, as Trustee (hereinafter called the "Trustee"), party of the second part:

WITNESSETH:

THAT WHEREAS, the Board, by proper proceedings on the occasion of a meeting held on December 13, 1960, in conformity with the terms and provisions of a certain "Loan Agreement," dated as of June 1, 1960, previously made by the Board with the United States of America, Housing and Home Finance Administrator (hereinafter sometimes called "HHFA") authorized the issuance of its \$1,225,000 "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bonds of 1960,"

to be dated as of April 1, 1960, consisting of 1,225 negotiable coupon Bonds of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 1,225, inclusive, maturing as to principal, serially, in various amounts on April 1 of the years 1963 to 2000, inclusive; and in order to secure the payment of said Bonds authorized the execution with the Trustee of a certain Trust Indenture, dated April 1, 1960, in form and substance as fully set forth in said proceedings, and the same was subsequently duly executed on behalf of the Board and the Trustee and was recorded in the office of the Clerk of the County Court of Fayette County, Kentucky, where it is now of record in Mortgage Book 646, beginning at page 159; and

WHEREAS, prior to the issuance and sale of any of said Bonds it was caused to appear that the aggregate cost of the Project intended to be financed thereby (to the extent not otherwise provided) would require the issuance by the Board of Bonds to the additional principal amount of \$100,000; and by proper proceedings on the occasion of its meeting held on September 19, 1961, the Board approved and entered into a "Revised Loan Agreement" with HHFA, the same being dated as of May 1, 1961, and providing for the issuance of \$1,325,000 "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bonds of 1961," dated April 1, 1961, the same to be issued in lieu of the aforesaid previously authorized Bonds; and in conformity with said "Revised Loan Agreement," identified by HHFA as its "Project No. Ky-15-CH-36(DS) Rev." the Board thereupon took proper action to authorize the \$1,325,000 "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bonds of 1961" and authorized the execution with the Trustee of a certain "Amendment to Trust Indenture," dated as of May 1, 1961, and the same was thereafter duly executed and recorded in the office of the Clerk aforesaid, where the same is now of record in Mortgage Book 646, page 207; and

WHEREAS, it was the intention of the aforesaid "Amendment to Trust Indenture," dated May 1, 1961, that the terms and provisions of the original "Trust Indenture" dated April 1, 1960, would be modified in such manner as to conform in all respects to the aforesaid HHFA "Revised Loan Agreement" and in pursuance of such intention the designation, principal amount, schedule of principal maturities, redemption provisions, and Bond forms of the original "Trust Indenture" were properly and accurately amended; but it now appears that through inadvertence there was a failure to effect comparable and proper changes in the designations of certain special funds and accounts, and in the amounts periodically to be deposited therein and in the reserves to be accumulated and maintained therein; and

WHEREAS, it is provided in Section 8.01 of the original Trust Indenture of April 1, 1960, that the Board and the Trustee may at any time enter into supplemental indentures

"(3) For any other purpose not inconsistent with the terms of this Indenture, and which shall not impair the security of the same, or for the purpose of curing any ambiguity, or of curing, correcting or supplementing any defective or inconsistent provisions contained herein or in any supplemental indenture" and the Board and the Trustee now desire, by means of this Supplemental Indenture to supply the inadvertent omissions and cure the inadvertent errors above referred to;

NOW, THEREFORE, KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, THAT THE BOARD AND THE TRUSTEE HEREBY AGREE that the aforesaid Trust Indenture dated April 1, 1960, as amended by the aforesaid "Amendment to Trust Indenture" dated May 1, 1961, is hereby supplemented and amended as follows:

- (1) In Section 1.01 of ARTICLE ONE of the Trust Indenture reference in sub-paragraph (f) to the "Housing and Dining Hall Revenue Fund Account of 1960" shall read "Housing and Dining Hall Revenue Fund Account of 1961"; the reference in sub-paragraph (g) thereof to the "Housing and Dining Hall Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account of 1960" shall read "Housing and Dining Hall Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account of 1961"; and the reference in sub-paragraph (h) to the "Housing and Dining Hall Building, Maintenance and Equipment Reserve Account of 1960" shall read "Housing and Dining Hall Building, Maintenance and Equipment Reserve Account of 1961."
- (2) The designation in Section 4.01 of ARTICLE FOUR of the Trust Indenture of April 1, 1960 of the special fund therein created, as the "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Revenue Fund Account of 1960" shall read "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Revenue Fund Account of 1961"; but the short designation of said fund for purposes of reference as the "Revenue Fund" shall continue unchanged.
- (3) The designation in Section 4.02 of ARTICLE FOUR of the original Trust Indenture of April 1, 1960 of the special fund therein created, as the "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account of 1960" is changed to read "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account of 1961"; but the short designation thereof for purposes of reference as the "Sinking Fund" shall continue unchanged.

The second literary paragraph of said Section 4.02, and the two numbered sub-paragraphs thereof are supplemented and amended and shall read as follows:

"In connection with the establishment and maintenance of the Sinking Fund, the Board covenants and agrees, as follows:

"(1) There will be deposited in the Sinking Fund all accrued interest received from the sale of the Bonds, all amounts made available from the Construction Fund, or from other sources, as interest on the Bonds during construction, and all revenues derived from the Project, from the date of completion of any portion of the Project to the date of delivery of any of the Bonds, remaining after payment of the Current Expenses of the Project.

- "(2) There will be transferred from the Revenue Fund and deposited to the credit of the Sinking Fund, on or before September 15, 1961, March 15, 1962, September 15, 1962 and March 15, 1963, respectively, such sums as will be sufficient, together with balances in said Sinking Fund, to pay interest on any outstanding Bonds to become due on October 1, 1961, April 1, 1962, October 1, 1962, and April 1, 1963, respectively, and thereafter, on September 15, 1963 and on each succeeding March 15 and September 15 of each year, the sum of \$40,000 until the funds and/or investments therein are sufficient to meet the interest on the outstanding Bonds due on the next interest payment date and one-half of the principal due within the succeeding twelve months, plus a debt service reserve in the sum of \$125,000 and, thereafter, on or before each succeeding March 15 and September 15, in like manner, such sums from said sources as may be necessary to meet the interest on the Bonds due on the next interest payment date and one-half of the principal due within the succeeding twelve months and maintain a debt service reserve in the sum of \$125,000. Funds in the Sinking Fund in excess of the maximum amounts required may be used to redeem Bonds in advance of maturity, according to the redemption provisions herein set forth."
- (4) The designation in Section 4.05 of ARTICLE FOUR of the original Trust Indenture of the separate account therein created, as the "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Building Maintenance and Equipment Reserve Account of 1960" is changed to read "University of Kentucky Housing and Dining Hall Building Maintenance and Equipment Reserve Account of 1961"; but the short designation thereof for purposes of reference as the "Maintenance Fund" is continued unchanged The amount required to be deposited into the Maintenance Fund from the Revenue Fund on or before the close of each fiscal year, after the required reserve is accumulated in the Sinking Fund and after payment of Current Expenses of the Project, is hereby increased from Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) to Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), and the balance to be accumulated in said Maintenance Fund is hereby increased from One Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$120,000.00) to One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00). However, in the event that the balance in the Sinking Fund should be reduced below One Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000.00), funds on deposit in the Maintenance Fund shall be transferred to the Sinking Fund to the extent required to eliminate the deficiency in that account.
 - (5) The Board affirms to the Trustee and to each and all of the holders

of the Bonds that prior to the sale and delivery of the Bonds it established an initial rate of not less than Two Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$280.00) per regular term for each student using or occupying the Project dormitory and a rate of not less than Three Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$320.00) per regular term for each student using the facilities or taking the services afforded by the Project Dining Hall in conformity with paragraph (g) of "Exhibit B" attached to the "Revised Loan Agreement," dated May 1, 1961.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY has caused this instrument to be signed in its name by its Chairman, or its Vice-Chairman, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by the Secretary, and FARMERS BANK & CAPITAL TRUST COMPANY, to evidence its acceptance of this Supplemental Trust Indenture, has caused this instrument to be signed in its name by its President or by one of its Vice-Presidents, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and the same to be attested by its Secretary or Cashier, or by one of its Assistant Secretaries or Assistant Cashiers, all as of the day and year first above written.

The motion and Resolution were seconded by Board Member Robert H. Hillenmeyer.

There was further discussion, and thereafter the Chairman put the question, and upon roll call, the following members voted:

"Aye": Hon. Bert Combs, Chairman; Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Vice-Chairman, Hon. Emerson Beauchamp, Mr. R. W. Bushart, Dr. Harry Denham, Mr. Sam Ezelle, Mr. William F. Foster, Mr. Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Mr. Gilbert Kingsbury, Mr. H.B. Murray, Judge James Sutherland, Mr. Floyd H. Wright.

"Nay": None.

The Chairman then declared that the motion was duly carried and that the Resolution had been adopted and was in full force and effect.

E. Henderson Center Approved for Fall-out Shelter.

Mr. Peterson presented a contract granting a fall-out shelter license for the Northwest Center at Henderson, Ky. He explained that the County Judge, R. S. Staples, had requested that a fall-out shelter license be granted for the Northwest Center building. He reported that the Director of the Center and the Executive Dean of Extended Programs concurred in the recommendation, and stated further that the designation of the fall-out shelter would not in any way interfere with the teaching program of the Center. He requested authorization to execute the license.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried: the recommendation was approved and the fall-out shelter license was authorized executed.

F. Budget Adjustments.

President Dickey reported that Evening Class Program income had exceeded the budget estimate and that, by virtue of the enlargement of the Program, the expenses necessary to operate it had increased. He suggested that the income has produced \$7,000.00 more money than had been anticipated and recommended that the budget for Extended Programs be raised by this amount.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved and the necessary budget adjustment was authorized.

G. Haggin Scholarships to Teachers of English Approved.

President Dickey recommended that \$2,500.00 be approved from Haggin restricted funds for the purpose of making awards of \$100.00 each to 25 teachers of English in the elementary and secondary schools of the State. He reported that the University had found this program to be very helpful in improving the instruction of English in the public schools of the State and that the University desired to award 25 \$100.00 Haggin Scholarships for the summer of 1963.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the sum of \$2,500.00 was appropriated from the Haggin Restricted Fund and the scholarships were authorized given.

H. Late Registration Fee Revised.

President Dickey reported a recommendation pertaining to the late registration fee at the University. The present rule covering late registration

provides for a fee of \$3.00 to be assessed for the first day, \$4.00 for the second day and \$5.00 for any day thereafter. He stated that it would seem to be a simpler program to administer if there were a flat fee of \$5.00 assessed for late registration, regardless of the degree of lateness.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, a late registration fee was authorized assessed for all students entering the University after the regular registration periods expire.

I. Department of Physiology Name Changed.

President Dickey presented a recommendation from Dean William R. Willard to change the name of the Department of Physiology to the Department of Physiology and Biophysics. He stated that it was the thought of the faculty of the College of Medicine that the change would be beneficial to the over-all program and would be more in keeping with the subject matter of the course and with the interest and competency of some of the faculty in the Department. He also stated that he felt that the change might place the department in a more favorable position to derive support for resear ch and training from various granting agencies.

Members of the Board, being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved the request to change the name of the Department of Physiology to the "Department of Physiology and Biophysics".

J. Nepotism Rule Waived.

President Dickey reported that the wife of one of the professors in the Medical Center holds the M.D. degree and it would strengthen the program if the nepotism rule could be waived. He, therefore, recommended that Frida Gerarda Surawicz, M.D., be employed as an instructor of psychiatry in the Department of Psychiatry for the period January 1 to June 30, 1963, and recommended that a term, part-time appointment be approved, with the necessary budget adjustment.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was approved and the necessary budget adjustment authorized.

K. Change-of-Work Status for Nancy J. Ratcliff.

President Dickey reported that Miss Nancy J. Ratcliff, clerk-typist in the Department of Agronomy, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, was recommended for change-of-work status, effective January 1, 1963.

He reported that Miss Ratcliff has been consecutively employed at the University for a period of 19 years and seven months and is, therefore, entitled to $39\frac{1}{2}\%$ of her salary at the age of 65, which birthday was reached June 1, 1959. He recommended that her assignment of duties under change-of-work be the typing of reports and other material as assigned by the head of the Department of Agronomy.

Members of the Board being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Nancy J. Ratcliff was given change-of-work status, effective January 1, 1963, with appropriate salary adjustment.

L. R.O.T.C. Program Made Voluntary.

President Dickey reported that the University Faculty voted to change the R.O. T.C. program at the University from a requirement to a voluntary program. He stated that, of the 68 land-grant institutions in America, about two-thirds of them have already changed the program from a requirement to voluntary (elective), and that part of the reasoning behind this change was (1) that the Department of Defense has revised and revamped its R.O. T.C. program, and (2) that the entire program is to become voluntary with a change made between freshman and sophomore and junior and senior levels in the R.O. T.C. courses. He stated that the contract with the University would be presented within the next few months, and recommended that R.O. T.C. programs at the University be changed from compulsory to elective (voluntary).

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the action of the University Faculty was approved.

M. Advance of State Funds Requested.

President Dickey reported that the University would soon let contracts for four small dormitories, more specifically to be leased to Delta Gamma sorority and to Zeta Beta Tau, Sigma Nu and Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternities. The cost of these buildings will be in the neighborhood of \$630,000. The Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency has approved the loan and the bonds may be sold at any time after March 1, 1963. He stated that it would save the sorority and fraternities interest during construction if the funds for construction could be made available by an advance by the State of Kentucky, recognizing the Housing and Home Finance Agency's authorization of the loan as a receivable. He recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the request. Mr. Robert Matthews, Commissioner of Finance, was present and stated that the request could be granted if funds were available.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved and the request authorized submitted to the Department of Finance, Frankfort, Ky.

N. Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series B and Series C.

President Dickey made the following recommendation concerning the issuance of revenue bonds to be known as Series B and Series C:

Re: University of Kentucky
Consolidated Educational

Series B and Series C

Dear President Dickey:

You will recall that the Board of Trustees at its meeting September 20, 1962 adopted a resolution creating and establishing a consolidated building project which provided for the issuance, from time to time, of consolidated educational building revenue bonds. Also adopted at this meeting was a resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds to be known as Series A in the amount of \$8,000,000 for the construction of a Chemistry-Physics Building and for a Library Addition.

Now that Series A Bonds have been issued and the proceeds used for the construction of the two projects named above, it seems an appropriate time to consider the necessary financial arrangements to proceed with the construction of other projects which are well in progress. Therefore, if you concur, I recommend that the Board of Trustees be requested to authorize proceeding with the necessary steps to draw up resolutions authorizing the issuance of Series B Bonds in the amount of \$6,500,000 and Series C Bonds in the amount of \$9,500,000.

The annual debt service cost for Series A Bonds is being paid from fees received from students. The 1962 Legislature made available to the University \$867,000 to replace the student fees which are pledged and used for paying off the bonds. The dollar figure of this state appropriation which is in excess of the amount used to amortize the Series A Bonds plus \$240,000 will be available to the University to issue Series B Bonds for the second year of the biennium. We estimate that this combined figure will be adequate to service Series B Bonds herein requested for the current biennium.

Series B Bonds would be used for the construction of facilities and equipment for the Colleges of Commerce, Education, Engineering and Law. You will notice from the tables attached showing the estimated annual debt service cost to amortize Series B Bonds and also a table

showing the estimated annual income available for this purpose from student fees that we estimate that it will take \$500,365. to amortize Series B Bonds in the amount of \$6,500,000.

Also shown on the attached tables are the estimated annual debt service cost for the issuance of Series C Bonds in the amount of \$9,500,000. If appropriations are forthcoming from the 1964 Legislature to replace the student fees which will be necessary to use for the amortizing of Series C Bonds, the proceeds from these bonds would be used for the construction of a general classroom and office building, a Mathematics and Physics Observatory, an Arts and Sciences Physical Education Complex, and for related equipment to operate these facilities. It will only be possible to issue Series C Bonds if the Legislature appropriates the necessary money to replace the student fees which would be needed to get these projects under way. Therefore, any authorization you may give would be subject to funds being made available in the ensuing biennium.

In addition to an appropriation from the 1964 Legislature to replace the student fees which would be used to amortize the Series C Bond issue, it will also be necessary that the Legislature appropriate the necessary operating funds to maintain these projects once completed. We have made a study of the cost figures for maintaining some of our more recently completed buildings on campus and estimate that it would cost approximately \$378,000 per year to maintain and operate all of the projects which are outlined to be built.

R. Dr. Cochran Makes Statement.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, on President Dickey's recommendation, the Executive Committee concurred in the above appointments, reappointments, salary adjustments, leaves of absence, resignations, promotions and other staff changes, and record was ordered made in the minutes.

T. Dr. Abby Marlatt.

Mr. Sam Ezelle asked for the status concerning the controversy revolving about Dr. Abby Marlatt. He was advised that no change existed and no report was available.

U. Report of Screening Committee.

Judge James A. Sutherland, Secretary of the Screening Committee, reported that the Committee had held a meeting and organized, that Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci was elected Chairman of the Committee, and that the Committee had agreed to give progress reports from time to time to the members of the Board of Trustees. Governor Combs stated that he thought it was everybody's desire that the Committee operate with as much information given to the public as possible, without impairing the efficient efforts of the Screening Committee to secure a fine president for the University.

V. Consultant Architect and Extended Centers Report.

Governor Combs read statement concerning (1) the selection of an architect consultant and (2) the issuance of revenue bonds for construction of off-campus centers. The statement detailed a request of the University in May, 1962, for an architect for the student housing complex at the University, and actions taken by the State Department of Finance in naming three different architectural firms to do the design and architectural work and a fourth firm to do the mechanical engineering work. The report also narrated efforts to secure a consultant to coordinate the architects and engineers to work on the project.

The report narrated that three consultants had been interviewed and told of a decision by the State Commissioner of Finance to appoint Edward D. Stone, Architect of New York, as the consulting architect. The statement also reported the difference in agreement on behalf of the University in that Edward D. Stone's request for fee was $l\frac{1}{2}\%$ of construction costs plus all expenses, and that of Meathe, Kessler and Associates was for a fee of l% of construction costs.

The statement further reported that Edward D. Stone, Architect of New York, had revised his bid to \$140,000 to furnish, for the complex, program and definitive preliminary plans and consultations with the architects, and that Meathe, Kessler and Associates, of Detroit, had revised their bid to \$100,000 for like work.

Dr. Dickey reported that the University did not object to Stone as consulting architect but felt it could get the work competently, done by Meathe, Kessler and Associates for \$100,000. However, the University was willing to accede to the wishes of Commissioner Matthews and Governor Combs, and get the architects, engineer and the consultant working on the project to move it ahead.

Mr. Peterson stated that the University had no interest in any of the consultant architects. However, three firms were interviewed and five of the seven people who sat in on the interviews thought that Meathe, Kessler and Associates could do the job and two of the seven thought that Edward D. Stone, Architect of New York, should be chosen, on the basis that Stone is

more widely known than the other firm. Mr. Peterson further stated that the University's effort is to save a large sum of money on the cost of the project.

A second matter to which the statement referred was the question of the University issuing revenue bonds for the construction of off-campus centers at Elizabethtown, Prestonsburg, Somerset, Blackey and Hopkinsville. The statement indicated that bonds could be issued for construction of the Centers without interfering with the University program. Dr. Dickey and Mr. Peterson felt that the issuance of revenue bonds for off-campus Centers would interfere with the on-campus building program and that money used from student fees to amortize bond issues for off-campus Centers would, in reality, have the effect of competing with State money requested for operating purposes at the University.

Commissioner Matthews felt that there would not be any interest due on off-campus Center revenue bonds until 1964, at which time the Legislature would pick up the cost, and that the State was willing now to put up funds to start operating the Elizabethtown Center with the University appropriating about \$60,000.00 for 1963-64 fiscal year.

Governor Combs expressed the thought that Revenue Bonds have been used for a long time in Kentucky to finance the construction of school facilities and this is not setting a precedent. Mr. Peterson advised that the University had not, prior to 1960, used revenue bonds to construct academic facilities. This method of financing had been largely used for construction of academic facilities in connection with elementary and secondary education in Kentucky since about 1912.

Governor Combs expressed the thought that, if the University would "humor" the Legislators from off-campus center districts, this might gain favor enough to get more adequate funds to carry on a larger program at the University.

W. Adjournment.

There being no further business, on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the meeting was adjourned at 12:15 p.m., EST, and the members went to the Student Union where luncheon was served.
