THE PROGRAM PROVIDES THE OPPORTUNITY FOR OUTSTANDING LIBRARIANS TO: DEVELOP SKILLS IN IDENTIFYING AND DIAGNOSING LIBRARY PROBLEMS, STUDY THEORY AND CONCEPTS OF LIBRARY TRAINING AND CONSULTATION, GAIN EXPERIENCE IN THE CONSULTATION PROCESS, GAIN AN OPERATIONAL UNDERSTANDING OF OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES SELF-STUDY PROCEDURES AND THEIR APPLICATIONS, AND INCREASE SKILLS IN FACILITATING GROUPS ENGAGED IN PROBLEM SOLVING.

THE PRIMARY COMPONENTS OF THE TRAINING PROCESS ARE (1) AN INTENSIVE TWO-WEEK INSTITUTE ON CONSULTATION SKILLS THAT ACQUAINTS CANDIDATES WITH THE WIDE ARRAY OF TECHNIQUES, STRATEGIES, AND RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO THEM WITHIN THE PROGRAM, AND (2) A YEAR-LONG PRACTICUM WHERE CANDIDATES WORK WITH OMS STAFF MEMBERS IN THE CONDUCT OF LIBRARY STUDIES.

ALL TRAINING IS CONDUCTED ON A COMPLIMENTARY BASIS, AND CONSULTANTS WILL BE REIMBURSED FOR TRAVEL AND MAINTENANCE COSTS DURING THE 6-12 MONTH TRAINING PERIOD.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE FINAL REPORT 1979-1980.

THE STAFF DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE HAD A VERY EVENTFUL YEAR. WE SPONSORED FIVE PROGRAMS, COVERING A WIDE VARIETY OF SUBJECTS. GERMAN FOR LIBRARIANS WAS TAUGHT FOR THE FIRST TIME AND WAS WELL RECEIVED. ON THE EVALUATION FORMS FOR THAT CLASS, INTEREST WAS EXPRESSED IN THE LANGUAGE COURSES. WE SPONSORED THREE WORKSHOPS DESIGNED TO HELP THE INDIVIDUAL. THE FIRST OF THESE WAS ON THE NOMINAL GROUP PROCESS. THIS PROGRAM SHOWED HOW TO WORK EFFECTIVELY ON A COMMITTEE. THE SECOND WAS CONCERNED WITH SELF-DEVELOPMENT, THAT IS, HOW YOU PERCEIVE YOURSELF. THE THIRD WORKSHOP WAS THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL WORKSHOP WHICH WE SPONSORED FOR THE SECOND TIME. ALBERTA CRAMER, WHO IS WITH

THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION, PRESENTED AN EXCELLENT PROGRAM, WITH DEMONSTRATIONS AND A CHANCE FOR ALL TO TRY THEIR HAND AT ARTIFICIAL RESPIRATION. THE MOST SUCCESSFUL PROGRAM WE SPONSORED WAS HARRY SNYDER'S TALK ON THE COUNCIL ON HIGHER EDUCATION. THIS PROGRAM WAS WELL ATTENDED AND WE RECEIVED MANY COMMENTS CONCERNING IT.

IN ADDITION TO THIS, WE ASSISTED DR. JOHN CLUBBE, UK PROFESSOR OF ENGLISH, AND PAUL WILLIS IN BRINGING AN ENGLISH BIBLIOGRAPHER, ROBIN MYERS, TO THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY CAMPUS. WE ALSO HAVE TWO ON-GOING CONCERNS. THE FIRST, AN OUTGROWTH OF THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL WORKSHOP, IS A FREE BLOOD PRESSURE CHECK WHICH, IF PEOPLE ARE INTERESTED, WILL BE GIVEN ON A QUARTERLY BASIS. THE SECOND IS THE MASTER CALENDAR OF LIBRARY EVENTS WHICH IS BEING KEPT IN THE REFERENCE DEPARTMENT. THIS CALENDAR, WHICH SHOULD BE CONSULTED WHEN PLANNING PROGRAMS AND EVENTS, LISTS LIBRARY RELATED EVENTS WHICH INVOLVE THE UK LIBRARY STAFF, I.E., CONFERENCES, ACTS MEETINGS, STAFF DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS, ETC. IN ORDER TO MAKE THIS CALENDAR WORK, WE NEED YOUR COOPERATION, SO PLEASE KEEP THIS IN MIND AND SEND ME YOUR VARIOUS ANNOUNCEMENTS.

THE COMMITTEE WOULD LIKE TO PASS ON TO NEXT YEAR'S COMMITTEE SOME IDEAS WE HAD DISCUSSED: INVITE REBECCA BINGHAM, DELEGATE TO THE WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE; INVESTIGATE GRANT POSSIBILITIES WITH RUTH BROWN FOR STAFF DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS, FOR EXAMPLE, A WRITING COURSE FOR LIBRARIANS; TOUR OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY'S AUTOMATED CIRCULATION SYSTEM; CONTINUE THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL WORKSHOP; CONTINUE THE LANGUAGES FOR LIBRARIANS; AND CONTINUE THE UPKEEP OF THE MASTER CALENDAR OF LIBRARY EVENTS. WE ARE GRATEFUL THAT THE REFERENCE DEPARTMENT HAS AGREED TO KEEP THE CALENDAR. HOWEVER, THE COMMITTEE STILL THINKS THE DIRECTOR'S OFFICE IS A MORE LOGICAL LOCATION FOR SUCH A CALENDAR AND WOULD LIKE TO SEE IT MOVED THERE. THE IMPORTANCE OF SUCH A CALENDAR, HOWEVER, OVERRIDES ANY LOCATION PROBLEMS.

THE STAFF DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE MEMBERS HAVE WORKED TOGETHER EFFECTIVELY WHICH IS THE MAIN REASON FOR SUCH A PROFITABLE YEAR. I WOULD LIKE TO TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO THANK THEM FOR THEIR TIME AND IDEAS.

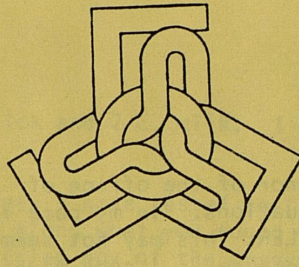

COOK'S CORNER

When one accepts the honor of the office of an organization, one gets into some strange situations. In my case it has been testing the recipes of the KENTUCKY SAMPLER. This may not seem so strange to most of you but it is for me because 1. I cook maybe twice a week 2. I am married to the worlds pickiest eater who has to be strongarmed into trying new foods (who, me? DP). Nevertheless I have been systematically trying recipes from the KENTUCKY SAMPLER and I have come up with the following rating system.

**** Both of us liked it and it will be made again

*** One of us liked it and it will be made again (depending on which one of us liked it)

** Neither of us liked it but we ate it

* Neither of us liked it but one of us (it wasn't me) would not eat it

00 The dog wouldn't eat it

Listed below are the recipes I have tried thus far with my comments.

WATERGATE SALAD *** (page 8 of the KENTUCKY SAMPLER)

I needed something simple, fast, and good to take to the tasting party. This salad fit the bill in all respects. I loved it but Dave did not know what a pistachio was so he wouldn't look at it. (A what? dp)

MEAT AND CHEESE LOAF **** (page 28 of the KENTUCKY SAMPLER)

I modified this recipe slightly by leaving out the green pepper and celery salt (one of us in the family will not eat anything with these ingredients in it). I used Velveeta Cheese and cut the recipe in half for one loaf instead of two. I used a microwave oven and microwaved the loaf on 50% power for 36 minutes. The result was a delicious meat loaf but the cheese was melted a bit more than I liked it. Next time I think I will try cheddar.

ANGEL BISCUITS **** (page 58 of the KENTUCKY SAMPLER)

This recipe is great because the dough keeps in the refrigerator for 2 weeks. I think I may have mismeasured the Buttermilk because the dough seemed to be a bit sloppy. However I compensated by adding additional flour before I rolled out the biscuits each time. The result was fresh biscuits with each meal with a flavor that was out of this world.

CROCKPOT STEW *** (page S20 of the KENTUCKY SAMPLER II)

This recipe only gets a 3 star rating because Dave had a cold when I sprung it on him. I enjoyed it but he could not taste it so I guess I'll fix it again when he can taste.

SQUASH QUICHE *** (page S27 of the KENTUCKY SAMPLER II)

Since I am the only one in the family who eats squash this gets 3 stars. I added some mushrooms and used cheddar and mozzarella cheese (Dave called it a garbage quiche because I cleaned out the refrigerator). Remember that there is an error in the ingredients.

There is 1/2 c. Bisquick and 2 c. milk. I found this very good for a fast breakfast.

These are the recipes I have tested so far. I would appreciate it if any of you would pass along what you found when you've tried some of the recipes. I haven't tried any of the desserts because both of us are too fat. (WHO???) Maybe some of you would share your opinions on the desserts.
