

Student recovers from brain surgery, regains singing voice

For seven years, the showerhead and car radio were the only audience who go to hear Derek Stephens sing.

But it took a brain tumor and encouragement from a mentor for the psychology piuntor to finally stand alone in front of a undience and belt out gospel tumes. Stephens was 18 when he had two seizures in June 2003. A tumor was press-

Once Stephens came out of surgery without the voice he once had, he realized what he was missing.

Stephens spent the next six weeks doing radiation treatments and the rest of that summer in speech therapy.





UK Opera showcases 'Carousel'

"Carouse!" is the second of several award-winning musicals on which composer Richard Rodgers and lyricist Oscar Hammerstein II collaborated. The first, "Oklahoma!," on a Pulitzer Prize and is recognized by many critics for revolutionizing American musical theatwith its fission of music and dance into plot. deeper into character and encompasses more of humanity han "Oklahoma!" The latest in the "Elder Scrolls" series of games produced by Bethesda Softworks, "Oblivinon" is very much the developer's ultimate oppus. The world in which you partake is one rich in the texture of life; rooms are littered with bottles, glasses and clothes, the forests are full of deer, fungi and rats. And every aforementioned element is perfectly capable of being manipulated, stolen and killed.

To play "Oblivion" is to enter a new plane of existence. You know, it's that feeling you get in the back of your skull when the neurons in your brain melt into the cathode rays beaming into your eyes. It's a feeling so intense that you accept the screen as reality. Time blends into nothingness as a great and terrible abyss of fun sucks it all up while you sit on your lazy butt, immersed in a completely different world.

Everything in the game is done in first-person perspective, just like

Men's swimming ends year at NCAAs



Q: What do you think SG is currently doing well, and where could it improve?

A lot of times, we've been concerned with what's going on in Student Government, what Student Student Government, what Student Government leaders can do for each other and what they can do to change the organization, but we fend the students and to defend our friends in Student Activities Board, because by running and getting involved with Student Government, we would be in a position where we could vote against these hostile takeovers and truly begin to cultivate and reshape Student Government into what it should be: a government that is truly the students' government.

Q: Why should students care about the outcome of this election?

That's why this election is important, is that you're electing the person who will have that power and that potential.

But students are not being represented in a lot of these things that are being changed; a lot of changes are being made without a student voice, without students speaking on their own behalf, and that's what Student Government needs to do. It's great that we have a student body president that can speak and will speak for the students

The Staff Senate meets regularly, on the second Thursday of every month. The meetings are open to everyone. Each meeting features reports from the Senate's internal committees as well as from Senators serving on University-wide committees or commissions such as the President's Commission on Women, the Employee Benefits Committee, and the Ethics Committee. Staff Senators have also represented staff interests on ad-hoc committees such as the Top 20 Steering Committee, the IRIS Steering Committee, and the Retiree Health Benefits Committee.

The Staff Senate frequently invites guest speakers to inform us on University initiatives such as Operation Educate, Make the Difference, and the Work-Life Office. In addition, the Senate has also hosted presentations from local and state civic leaders and programs including Ernesto Scorsone and Habitat for Humanity. In 2003, the Staff Senate was instrumental in organizing the Gubernatorial Convocation, a discussion between the two leading candidates in the race for Governor of Kentucky.

We hope to soon have a submittable form that staff can use to send their concerns and issues directly to the attention of the Staff Senate.

What Else Does the Staff Senate Do?

The Staff Senate has eight standing committees. Each Senator serves on one of these, where much of the Senate's work takes place. Some committees, such as the Bylaws Committee and the Election Committee, are solely concerned with the business of keeping the Senate functioning. The Institutional Finances and Resource Allocation Committee, a joint committee with the University Senate, seeks to understand and optimize the use of money and resources across the University. There are two advisory committees, one of which serves as a liaison to the President, the other to the Staff Representative to the Board of Trustees. The External Affairs Committee keeps the Senate informed about civic issues, and the Public Relations/Communications Committee lets staff know about Senate events and happenings. The Staff Issues Committee works to investigate and resolve issues that are important to the staff of the University. The External Affairs Committee has been active in bringing local and state civic leaders to speak to the Senate. The Public Relations/Communications Committee recently presented a truly dedicated staff member with an engraved clock, in honor of 50 years' service to the University.

Who Should Be a Part of the Staff Senate?

You should, if you're a full-time (0.75 FTE or greater) staff member who's been employed at UK continuously since April 1, 2005.

Why?

Because you're a hard-working, conscientious staff member who is willing to listen to all sides of an issue before reaching a conclusion. Because you're dedicated not just to your job, but to making the University a better place to work. Because you want to show that you care about UK and the University community. Because you want to be a part of an organization dedicated to helping the voice of the staff be heard by the President and the Board of Trustees. Because the Staff Senate needs you.

How Can I Become A Staff Senator?

We are holding an election this spring for a record number of new Senators. You can get involved by completing the self-nomination form on the back page of this insert (also available online at: http://www.uky.edu/Staff/Senate/election) and returning it to the Staff Senate office, 202c Main Building by April 21, 2006.

Once you recieve word from the Senate office that your nomination has been verified, you may begin campaigning for office. Campaign signs must conform to University policy. See http://www.uky.edu/Staff/Senate/SignRegulations.htm for details. Electronic voting will take place from May 1 - May 12, 2006. If you do not have access to vote electronically, laptops will be available for voting at Staff Appreciation Day on May 12. Results of the election will be announced on May 19, 2006. An orientation for newly elected Senators will be held before the regular Staff Senate meeting in June 2006.
