Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, April 3, 1990.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 1:00 p.m. Lexington time on Tuesday, April 3, 1990 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the Lexington Campus.

#### A. Meeting Opened and Roll Called

Mr. Foster Ockerman, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 1 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Professor Mary Sue Coleman.

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. Foster Ockerman, (Chairman), Mr. Ted B. Bates, Professor Raymond F. Betts, Governor Albert B. Chandler, Professor Mary Sue Coleman, Mr. Tracy Farmer, Mrs. Edythe Jones Hayes, Mr. Sean Lohman, Dr. Robert P. Meriwether, Professor Judith Rhoads, Mr. James L. Rose, Judge Robert F. Stephens, Mr. Jerome A. Stricker, Mr. William B. Sturgill, and Judge Julia K. Tackett. Absent from the meeting were Mr. William E. Burnett, Jr., Senator Walter D. Huddleston, Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson, and Judge Henry R. Wilhoit, Jr. The University administration was represented by Interim President Charles T. Wethington, Jr.; Chancellors Peter P. Bosomworth and Robert E. Hemenway; Acting Chancellor Ben W. Carr, Jr.; Vice Presidents Edward A. Carter, Wimberly C. Royster and Eugene R. Williams; and Mr. John C. Darsie, General Counsel.

Members of the news media were also in attendance. Mrs. Hayes reported a quorum present, and Mr. Ockerman declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 1:02 p.m.

# B. Governor Wallace Wilkinson and General Assembly Recognized

Mr. Sturgill gave praise to Governor Wallace Wilkinson and the General Assembly for enacting the education reform package and its funding mechanism. In his opinion, it has laid the groundwork that will be beneficial in educating the young people of the state for the high technology of the Twenty-first Century. While the education reform package is designed primarily for elementary and secondary education, higher education fared well, and more importantly the University of Kentucky fared well. He stated that the Board needs to display its appreciation for the statesmanship and leadership that Governor Wilkinson and the General Assembly displayed in forging the document implementing the financing for Governor Wilkinson's educational reform package. He made a motion that a resolution commending Governor Wilkinson and the General Assembly be prepared and sent to them at an early date to show the University's appreciation of their efforts. The motion, seconded by Mrs. Hayes, carried unanimously.

#### C. Minutes Approved

Mr. Ockerman stated that the Minutes of the March 6, 1990 Board of Trustees meeting had been distributed and asked for questions, comments or corrections. The Minutes of the March 6, 1990 meeting were approved as written.

#### D. Resolution in Memoriam

Judge Stephens read the following Resolution on the death of Nicholas J. Pisacano, M.D.:

WHEREAS, Nicholas J. Pisacano, M.D., a member of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, died suddenly March 11, 1990, and

WHEREAS, he was held in esteem nationally as a physician and a leader in the field of family medicine and as the Executive Director of the American Board of Family Practice, and

WHEREAS, he was a faculty member at the University of Kentucky highly respected by the thousands of students who over many years would "stand in line" to get into his class in biology and who remember him as a man of great depth and wit, besides being a wonderful and inspiring teacher, and

WHEREAS, he received awards from the University and his students in recognition of his teaching, including the 1967 Distinguished Teaching Award, and

WHEREAS, he served in administrative roles at the University in the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Medicine, and the Department of Allied Health Education and Research, and

WHEREAS, he also served the University well as a member of the Board of Trustees since 1987, as a member of the University Athletics Association Board of Directors, as Chairman of the University Hospital Board, and as a UK Fellow, and

WHEREAS, the members of this Board knew him as a person devoted to helping his friends and fellowman, and his absolute and unswerving devotion to the cause of what is right and fair,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of this University mourns the passing of this colleague and friend, offers to Virginia Leigh, his wife, and family its deepest sympathy for this great loss, and orders that this resolution be made a part of the Minutes of the meeting.

On motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the Resolution was adopted.

# E. President's Report to the Trustees (PR 1)

Interim President Wethington called attention to the following items in PR 1:

April 11 - Dedication of the Bruce Poundstone Agriculture Regulatory Services Building

April 20 - Dedication of the Center for Robotics and Manufacturing Systems

April 22 - Reception for recently promoted/tenured faculty and recipients of awards on Honors Day

April 24 - University of Kentucky Honors Day

May 6 - University of Kentucky Commencement

In concluding his report, Interim President Wethington called attention to the University Hospital having received verification as a Level I Trauma Center. He noted that other items were available in the report for the Board's perusal.

#### F. Singletary and Matthews Fellowships Awarded

Dr. Daniel R. Reedy, Singletary/Matthews Advisory Committee Chair, provided background information and explained the nominations/application process for the W. L. Matthews and Otis A. Singletary Fellowships. He reported that the recipients of the fellowships rank at the top of their graduating class and have also been very much involved in the activities of the University outside the classroom. He noted that the recipients will continue their studies at the University of Kentucky in the College of Medicine, College of Law and in the Graduate School. He recognized the following recipients and briefly stated facts about each of them:

Mr. Steven Ray Armstrong - W. L. Matthews Fellowship Mr. Mark Stanley Baker - Otis A. Singletary Fellowship Ms. Zheng Liu - Otis A. Singletary Fellowship

Mr. Stephen W. McNatton - Otis A. Singletary Fellowship

Mr. Ockerman extended congratulations to the recipients for their outstanding achievements, following which they were given a round of applause.

Interim President Wethington expressed his congratulations to them for the significant honor they had achieved and wished them well as they continue their studies at the University of Kentucky.

# G. Report on Budget

Interim President Wethington stated that he was completely in agreement with Mr. Sturgill's recommendation that a Resolution be adopted for Governor Wallace Wilkinson and the General Assembly. He indicated his pleasure in the Board's action to go on record in support of Governor Wilkinson's and the General Assembly's actions.

He gave a brief review of the proposed biennial budget. He stated that in the University System (all of the University except the Community College System) the proposed budget includes an increase of about \$55 million or a 27% increase over the two-year period. He noted that the proposed budget provides the following:

\$41.1 million for program increases

This amount will be enough to provide for a number of priorities included in the biennial request approved by the Board in the fall — the statutory and contractual obligations for staff benefits and operating funds for new buildings; 5% salary increase per year for faculty and staff; inflationary increases on operating expenses; and some significant progress in catch up dollars for faculty and staff.

#### \$7.7 million for new debt service

This amount is for the Civil Engineering Building; Cooling Plant Repairs and Replacement; Chemistry Physics Building Renovation; Life/Safety Projects; Animal Diagnostic Facility; Medical Research Space Expansion; and land acquisition for agricultural research.

Funding for the Kentucky Cancer Registry
The amount next year is \$330,000 and will be reduced to
\$190,000 the following year. This funding is to provide a
cancer patient data management system to be administered by the
University of Kentucky Markey Cancer Center.

\$2.9 million for a Rural Health Care Initiative
This amount gives emphasis to the University of Kentucky in
delivering Medical Center and related programs to East Kentucky.

\$620,000 for a groundwater instruction and research program
The amount for this program will be managed by the College of
Agriculture.

\$1.9 million for catch-up salary increases for agriculture
This amount is designated for salary catch-up for the county
extension agents to help them be competitive with benchmark
salaries.

\$548,000 for a Commonwealth Scholars Program
This program is designed to help the University of Kentucky recruit qualified, academically talented high school students in Kentucky.

In the Community College System, the budget includes an increase of \$24.7 million over the biennium. This amounts to an increase of almost 50%. The budget includes the following:

# \$19.3 million for program

This amount is enough to provide for a number of the priorities included in the biennial request approved by the Board in the fall — the statutory and contractual obligations for staff benefits and operating funds for new buildings; 5% salary increase each year for faculty and staff; inflationary increases on operating expenses; significant progress in faculty and staff salary catch-up; current expense improvement; faculty and support staff position catch-up and some funding to deal with needs across the system (weekend and evening programs, nursing and allied health programs, expansion of the general education programs). This will particularly give the community colleges the opportunity to employ faculty to help catch up with some of the increases in enrollment experienced the last few years.

# \$5 million of new debt service

This amount will be for new community college buildings on the Madisonville, Henderson, Owensboro, Maysville, Southeast, Lexington and Jefferson Southwest Campus.

# \$150,000 for the Commonwealth Scholars program

# \$250,000 for courses in Carrollton

Interim President Wethington stated that he is extremely pleased with the action by the Governor and the General Assembly. This will bring higher education to about 88% of formula funding from approximately 80% at the present. He stated that if the funds do stay and if the budget does get approved, significant progress can be made within the University during the next two years, particularly as the University addresses some of the serious problems in providing competitive salaries for faculty and staff. He informed the Board that a more complete presentation would be made at the May meeting.

Mr. Ockerman expressed appreciation to each member of the Board for the support they had given to the legislative process and the favorable results that the University had attained. He stated that Dr. Wethington is in a large measure responsible for many of the good things that have happened to the University and higher education during this legislative session. The time that he spent in Frankfort had been very productive, and the Board thanks him.

# H. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

With Interim President Wethington so recommending, Judge Tackett made a motion to approve the routine personnel actions in PR 2. The motion, seconded by Mr. Rose, carried. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

# I. Honorary Degree Recipients (PR 3A)

Interim President Wethington indicated his pleasure in recommending that approval be granted to awarding the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters to Blyden Jackson, the Doctor of Science to Warren H. Proudfoot and Loman Trover and the Doctor of Laws to Albert G. Clay, Thomas Marshall Hahn, and John W. Oswald. Mr. Stricker so moved. His motion was seconded by Professor Rhoads and passed. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

# J. Associate Degree Program in the Community College System - Hopkinsville Community College (PR 4A)

On motion made by Professor Rhoads, seconded by Mrs. Hayes and carried, the Board authorized for submission to the Council on Higher Education a new degree program, Associate Degree in Applied Science, Industrial Electrical Technology for the Hopkinsville Community College. (See PR 4A at the end of the Minutes.)

# K. Appointment to University Hospital of the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, Inc. - Board of Directors (PR 6A)

Interim President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointment of Mr. Jerome A. Stricker as a member of the Board of Directors of the University Hospital of the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, Inc. for a term to expire on June 30, 1990. Mr. Stricker will replace Dr. Nicholas J. Pisacano. Mr. Sturgill so moved. The motion, seconded by Dr. Meriwether, passed. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

# L. University Research Professorships (PR 8A)

Interim President Wethington indicated his pleasure in recommending approval of four University Research Professorships for 1990-91. He reported that the professorships will be awarded to Professor Billie R. DeWalt, Department of Anthropology; Professor John Lewis, Department of Mathematics; Professor Keith MacAdam, Department of Physics and Astronomy; and Professor Charles J. Waechter, Department of Biochemistry. Professor Betts moved that PR 8A be approved. His motion was seconded by Judge Stephens and carried. (See PR 8A at the end of the Minutes.)

Interim President Wethington announced that Professor John Lewis and Professor Keith MacAdam were in attendance. He provided background information about each of them, and they were given a round of applause.

# M. Acceptance of Interim Financial Report for the University of Kentucky for the Eight Months Ended February 28, 1990 (FCR 1)

Mr. Ockerman, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Committee recommended that the Board accept the University of Kentucky consolidated financial report for the eight months ended February 28, 1990 and entertained a motion for approval. Mr. Farmer so moved. The motion, seconded by Mr. Stricker, passed. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

# N. Capital Construction Report (FCR 2)

With the Finance Committee so recommending, Mr. Ockerman entertained a motion to approve the Capital Construction Report for the six months ending December 31, 1989. Professor Rhoads so moved. Mr. Rose seconded the motion and it carried. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

#### 0. Report of Leases (FCR 3)

Mr. Ockerman reviewed the lease agreements listed in FCR 3 and recommended its approval. On motion made by Mrs. Hayes, seconded by Mr. Sturgill and passed, the lease agreements were approved. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

# P. Confirmation of 1990-91 Tuition Schedule (FCR 4)

On motion made by Mr. Lohman, seconded by Mr. Stricker and carried, the Board confirmed changes in the tuition schedule as adopted by the Council on Higher Education, and established corresponding part-time and summer school charges under the guidelines of the Council on Higher Education. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

# Q. Adoption of 1990-91 Mandatory Registration Fee Schedule (FCR 5)

With the Finance Committee so recommending, Professor Coleman moved that the Board approve the Mandatory Registration fee Schedule for 1990-91. The motion, seconded by Dr. Meriwether, passed. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

Mr. Lohman expressed appreciation to Dr. Wethington from the Student Government Association for his effort in approaching the students about the fee and getting their support.

# R. <u>Authorization to Explore Coal Reserves (FCR 6)</u>

Mr. Ockerman stated that the Finance Committee recommended approval of FCR 6. He reminded the Board of its action at the March 6 meeting authorizing the University to file a petition declaring approximately 4,000 acres of Robinson Forest unsuitable for mining. Subsequent to that action, there have been conversations between representatives of Arch properties, the Sierra Club and other environmental agencies and the University to explore the possibility of an exchange of properties in portions of Robinson Forest that are not within the main tract. In order to determine whether or not this is feasible and to determine the quality and quantity of coal which might be located in some of these satellite tracts of the Robinson

Forest, it is necessary to explore the coal reserves. He explained that this would be done, if approved by the Board, at the initial cost of Arch Mineral Corporation. The Finance Committee is, therefore, recommending approval of this action to determine if the problem presented to the Board at its March 6 meeting can be resolved possibly by the exchange of properties. Mr. Rose so moved. Mr. Sturgill stated that he highly supported the recommendation. In his opinion, it is a move in the proper direction for the University. He seconded Mr. Rose's motion for approval and it passed. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

# S. Report on Presidential Search Committee

Mr. Ockerman reported that through April 2, 1990 there had been 38 nominations and nine applications received for the position of president and responses are coming in steadily. A calendar is being circulated to enable him to select a date that would provide 100% Committee attendance. The meeting will be scheduled in late May or early June.

# T. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the Board, the Chairman adjourned the meeting at 1:31 p.m.

#### BLYDEN JACKSON

Dr. Blyden Jackson is described by one of his nominators as a major scholar of Afro-American literature, a pioneer in the field, and a foremost authority as evidenced by his in-depth study of the Afro-American literary tradition in his <u>History of Afro-American Literature</u>: The Long Beginning, 1746-1895, published in 1989.

Born in Paducah, Kentucky, in 1910, Blyden Jackson grew up in Louisville and took his bachelor's degree from Wilberforce University. While a graduate student at Columbia University, he lived down the hall from poet Langston Hughes at the YMCA in Harlem and he witnessed in person the final phase of the Harlem Renaissance. When the Depression interrupted his studies, he returned to Louisville where he was a teacher of English at Madison Junior High until 1945 when he joined the English Department at Fisk University in Nashville. In the meantime, he had received the M.A. in English from the University of Michigan in 1938 and subsequently the Ph.D. in 1952. His doctoral dissertation dealt with the topic of irony in black fiction. Two years after receiving the Ph.D., Jackson went to Southern University in Louisiana where he was chair of the English Department. Ten years later he was named Dean of Southern's Graduate School, remaining in that position until 1969, when he was invited to become Professor of English at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. His appointment was the first of a black full professor at one of the South's most prestigious universities. In 1973 he was also named Associate Dean and Special Assistant to the Dean of the UNC Graduate School. Until his retirement from Chapel Hill in 1981, Jackson pursued with vigor his role as an English Professor. He published Black Poetry in America: Two Essays in Historical Interpretation (LSU Press 1974), the Waiting Years: Essays on American Negro Literature (LSU Press 1976), and his monumental History of Afro-American Literature (LSU Press 1989). Jackson has also served as in 1985), and he was an Editorial Board Member of the <u>Southern</u> <u>Literary Journal</u>. senior editor for LSU's <u>History of Southern Literature</u> (published

By recognizing Blyden Jackson with an honorary degree, the University of Kentucky honors distinguished native son and a vanguard scholar of Afro-American literature. Because of his noteworthy accomplishments as teacher and scholar, Dr. Blyden Jackson is recommended for the degree Doctor of Letters.

#### WARREN H. PROUDFOOT

Warren H. Proudfoot, born in the tiny impoverished coal mining town of Belington, West Virginia, personifies the strength and perseverance of Appalachia. Not willing to accept subsistence farming and coal mining which were the mainstays of a depressed rural World War II economy, he joined the U. S. Navy, trained and served as a Hospital Corpsman during the War. Accepting a scholarship to obtain a college education following his tour of duty, he attended Harvard where, after three years, he was accepted to the Harvard Medical School.

Following his surgical residency training with U. S. Public Health Service Hospitals, Dr. Proudfoot served a stint as Chief of Surgery with the U. S. Indian Hospital in Fort Defiance, Arizona, returning to Appalachia to become Chief of Surgery at Miners Memorial Hospital in Pikeville, Kentucky in 1958. Attracted to a burgeoning effort to establish a hospital in then remote Morehead, Kentucky, Dr. Proudfoot joined two physicians in the community who comprised the medical staff at the opening of a 41 bed hospital in 1963. While serving as Chief of Surgery at St. Claire Medical Center from 1963 until 1977, Dr. Proudfoot was very instrumental in solidifying an affiliation with the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center and the College of Medicine at the University of Kentucky.

In the early 1960's, surgical residents and medical students from the University of Kentucky went to St. Claire to participate in and receive portions of their training with Dr. Proudfoot. He was appointed to an Associate Clinical Professorship in Surgery in 1967 and became a full professor in 1989. Dr. Proudfoot has contributed to the clinical training of countless medical students and residents, as well as nursing and allied health professions students.

Not limiting his interest to educating young health professionals, Dr. Proudfoot also became chairman of the Rowan County School Board in 1973. Through this involvement, he advocated the growth of a local primary and secondary education system which has been essential to the success in attracting nearly fifty practitioners to the St. Claire Medical Center. In recognition of his ability to effect positive changes in local school systems, Dr. Proudfoot was elected President of the Kentucky School Board Association in 1987. A fellow of the American College of Surgeons since 1961, he remains an active general surgeon on the Medical Staff of St. Claire Medical Center. He has served on the Board of Directors of the Ephraim McDowell Cancer Network since 1975, and was an active participant in the development of the St. Claire Cancer Treatment Center in Morehead in July, 1989.

Dr. Warren Proudfoot is a dedicated surgeon, educator, and community leader whose tireless efforts over the years on behalf of his native Appalachia have touched the lives of thousands of people. For these reasons he is recommended for the degree Doctor of Science.

#### LOMAN TROVER

While many people think only of men wearing 'coonskin' caps as pioneers, there have been others who have blazed different kinds of trails which have opened new horizons for others. One such Kentucky pioneer is Loman Trover.

A graduate of what was then Transylvania College, Loman Trover made the decision to become a physician. Upon his graduation, he began his medical training at the University of Louisville Medical School where he was Alpha Omega Alpha. He was only the second person ever to receive the Kentucky Rural Health Scholarship, which ultimately led him to what was then a medically under-served part of the state, Madisonville, Kentucky. It was there he began a group practice, having believed from an early time, that this method of practice management created an environment for high quality comprehensive accessible rural health care.

He subsequently became the moving force behind and cofounder of what is now called the Trover Clinic, a 110 physician multi-specialty group practice with delivery sites in Madisonville, Hopkinsville, Earlington, Dawson Springs, Providence, Princeton, Morganfield, Trenton and Guthrie, Kentucky. He became the pioneer who took a region of the state which was vastly under-served, and turned it into one where virtually everyone has easy access to medical care.

Dr. Trover, along with a cadre of many other civic leaders, worked hard for many years to help establish the Madisonville Community College. In addition to his continued work with the Community College, where he now serves on the Foundation Board, Dr. Trover also was instrumental in the Vocational Region II Health Occupations School, which at the time of its inception was the only health vocation school in Kentucky.

For most of their history, Madisonville and surrounding communities were completely reliant on the coal industry for their economy. Dr. Trover, while serving as chairman of the Madisonville Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee, led the effort to obtain the first major industry other than coal in Hopkins county. Dr. Trover's vision of a better way of life for Madisonville included the diversification of its economy. Because of this, he was a recipient of the Madisonville Chamber of Commerce's Distinguished Service Award. He has also been the recipient of the Kentucky Academy of Family Physicians Award for outstanding contributions to medicine in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Dr. Trover remains active in the community and in medical leadership activities. He is a leader by nature. He is a person who has added immeasurable quality to the lives of many people in Western Kentucky. He is a country doctor, who sees a healthy way of life as something which happens both inside and out of the body. Because of these qualities he is recommended for the degree Doctor of Science.

#### ALBERT G. CLAY

Although Albert G. Clay is not an alumnus of the University of Kentucky, he has served it as loyally as any graduate. This native of Mount Sterling has been Chairman and Vice Chairman of thet board of Trustees and was a member of the Executive Committee of the University for twenty consecutive years. Additionally, he is a member of the University of Kentucky Development Council, a Fellow of the University, and a charter member of the UK College of Agriculture Scovell Society.

Following the completion of his B. A. degree at Duke University in 1938, Albert Clay attended Harvard Business School and served subsequently as a Lieutenant in the U. S. Navy. Today, he is President of Clay Tobacco Company in Mt. Sterling and is involved in many aspects of the agricultural enterprise in Kentucky. For twenty-five years he has served as Chairman and President of the Board of the Burley Auction Warehouse Association, a trade organization representing the eight-state burley tobacco belt. His directorships have included, the Kentucky Independent College Foundation; Citizens Fidelity Bank and Trust of Louisville; and Chairman of Spindletop Research, 1969-70. At present he is Director of the Thoroughbred Breeders of Kentucky; the Kentucky Thoroughbred Association; and the University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation.

Mr. Clay is Secretary and a member of the Executive Committee of the American Horse Council in Washington, D.C., which he helped form in 1969. In addition to serving as a member of the Executive Committee of Boy Scouts of America, Albert Clay helped form Leadership Kentucky in 1984 and is Vice Chairman of that organization. His broad range of activities in the field of agriculture won him the 1968 Agricultural Service Award of the University of Kentucky Chapter of the International Society of Gamma Sigma Delta honor society. He is Chairman of the UK Equine Research Foundation through which he has provided leadership and support for recruitment of three endowed chairs, a named research professorship, and significant endowments for research project support. He has also been instrumental in the establishment of the Equine Research Hall of Fame.

He has been the Farm Press and Radio Association's "Man of the Year in Agriculture" and the Kentucky Farm Bureau's 1969 "Distinguished Service Award" recipient. His honors include an outstanding service award from the University of Kentucky for a non-alumnus; the Mt. Sterling Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Citizen Award; and the Brotherhood Award of the Kentucky Conference of Christians and Jews.

Because of his dedication to the field of agriculture and his long and distinguished service to the University of Kentucky in virtually every aspect of its activities over twenty years, Albert Clay is recommended as the recipient of a Doctor of Laws degree.

#### THOMAS MARSHALL HAHN

Marshall Hahn is not a stranger to the University of Kentucky campus. His father was a professor here and Marshall completed his Bachelor's Degree in Physics at UK when he was nineteen. By age twenty-two he had received the Ph.D. in Physics from the prestigious Massachusetts Institute of Technology, whereupon he returned to the University of Kentucky as a faculty member in Physics. He departed for Virginia Tech in 1954 where he headed that institution's Physics department for the next five years, subsequently becoming the Dean of Arts and Sciences at Kansas State University, and then returning to Virginia Tech as President from 1962 until 1975 when he joined the Georgia-Pacific Corporation. His leadership is regarded by many observers as having been the catalyst for VPI's becoming a major state university.

When Marshall Hahn joined Georgia-Pacific as executive vice president of its Chemicals Division, the Corporation was an enterprise with \$3 billion in sales and 34,200 employees. Today it is one of the world's largest forest-product companies, with close to \$6.7 billion in worldwide net sales in 1984, reflecting Hahn's first full year as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer.

In Atlanta, where the company has been based since 1982, Marshall Hahn devoted time to activities which complement his corporate obligations—those of an involved citizen in the community. He gives of his time to groups such as the Atlanta Arts Alliance, the Salvation Army, Atlanta Area Service for the Blind, and the Atlanta Area Council of the Boy Scouts.

In the higher education arena, Hahn continues his ties as a member of the Board of Trustees of Emory University in Atlanta; he is a fellow of the University of Kentucky; and he serves as vice chairman of Virginia Tech's Campaign for Excellence Committee.

By virtue of his accomplishments in academia and the business world, Marshall Hahn is highly qualified to speak to the issues which bridge the two. In a recent interview, he is quoted as observing that "It's hard to beat quality... It's important that fields of study teach disciplined thinking and clarity of thinking. The ability to express oneself clearly in both written and oral forms adds to discipline and logic in thinking. These characteristics help in working with people."

Because of his contributions to the academic and corporate worlds and his achievements as a teacher, administrator, and chief executive officer, the University of Kentucky recommends him for the degree Doctor of Laws.

#### JOHN W. OSWALD

When John Oswald met with the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees on May 5, 1963, he was the person selected to guide the University into an era of growth and development as a comprehensive research institution, a period of great change and much advancement. During his tenure as President from 1963-1968, the University implemented a new academic plan along with a new academic calendar; the Community College System made impressive strides; a modern retirement and health insurance program was begun; the University's physical plant was enhanced by an ambitious building program; and the University celebrated its centennial. As President, Dr. Oswald witnessed the growth of Ph.D. programs from twenty-one to thirty-one and saw graduate enrollment increase from 1,400 to 2,200 as well as the addition of approximately 200 new faculty members; and the Research Foundation was revitalized. At the same time, the University's budget doubled. Most importantly, perhaps, John Oswald was a stanch defender of academic freedom and he worked to continue a tradition of intellectual freedom on the campus.

A native of Minnesota, John Oswald did his undergraduate work at DePauw University where he was an outstanding athlete. A Phi Beta Kappa scholar, he received his doctorate in plant pathology from the University of California, Davis. During World War II he served as a PT boat captain in the Mediterranean. He returned to the UC-Davis campus in 1946 as Assistant Professor of Plant Pathology where his research centered around the fundamentals of the serology of plant viruses and virus diseases. In 1954 he was named chairman of the Department of Plant Pathology at UC-Berkeley, and was selected as Vice President for Administration of the statewide system for the University of California in 1962.

After his return to the University of California as Executive Vice President of the nine-campus system, Oswald was named Penn State University's thirteenth president in 1970 where he served until his retirement in July 1983. While at Penn State, Oswald provided leadership on the campus, in the Commonwealth, and nationally. From 1974 to 1976 he served successively as vice president and president of the Association of American Universities, consisting of the leading graduate-research universities in the nation. He also headed the federal relations committee of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, and he chaired the American Council on Education in 1972-73.

For his distinction as a scholar, his leadership as an administrator, and for his national distinction as a educator, John Oswald is recommended as the recipient of the degree Doctor of Laws.

#### CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION REPORT

BACKGROUND: Under House Bill 622 enacted in the 1982 session of the Kentucky General Assembly, the University is authorized to enter into architectural, engineering, and related consultant contracts for the purpose of accomplishing capital construction at the University of Kentucky

The report shows that during the six months ending December 31, 1989, the University has:

- 1. Awarded fifteen (15) architect and engineer contracts.
- Made sixteen (16) amendments to architect and engineer contracts.
- 3. Made ten (10) final payments for ten (10) architect and engineer contracts.
- Awarded or requisitioned for the award of thirty-four (34) construction contracts.
- Made one hundred four (104) change orders to construction contracts.
- 6. Made fifty-two (52) final payments for fifty-two (52) construction contracts.

#### AUTHORIZATION TO EXPLORE COAL RESERVES

RECOMMENDATION: that the Administration be authorized to execute the appropriate documents to permit the University's consultant, Gaddy Engineering Company and ARCH Mineral Corporation to assess the coal reserves in the outlying tracts of the Robinson Forest, which are not the subject of the petition to declare lands unsuitable for surface coal mining filed with the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet on February 26, 1990.

BACKGROUND: Following this Board's decision at its March 6 meeting to authorize the filing of a "Lands Unsuitable" petition covering the Clemmons Fork watershed, representatives of the University and ARCH Mineral Corporation have met on several occasions to discuss the possibility that the ARCH properties in that watershed could be exchanged for other University properties in areas where mining could be carried out without damage to University research efforts.

In the course of those discussions, and in discussions with Gaddy Engineering it has become apparent that additional data, including data only obtainable through core drilling, is needed to permit an adequate evaluation of the respective properties.

This action would permit explorations, including core drilling, to be conducted in non-sensitive areas owned by the University. It would not commit the University to an exchange of properties without reference back to the Trustees.
