of snow.


All are very well.

bust for me not writing
more often. I really think
I devote enough time to a
pencil so I use one for
eight hours every night
except Sunday.

I expect to have a nice feed
of pork chops or dinner for
Supper tonight. We have
had chicken two Sundays
in succession so will have
to live on frog for a while
I got a very intelligent
letter from Garetta the other
day there was more news
in it than the Brookville
paper. her letter was
interesting only wish I could
think of some of the things
I should write. Vernon has
started a new year again
It hardly seems reasonable
that the years pass so
quick I was figuring up.

The time that I have spent
roaming around since I was
born last & I can't realize
what I have done it was
three years the 26 of Dec
since I was home those
youngsters will be all grown
up in a few more years

How you drawn up my
plans for June yet?

Will have to close hope
you are well. We are all
getting along fine here

will last much longer.



Am in receipt
of your letter. I did not know you
well enough to understand whether
you were in earnest in speaking of
your desire to go to Brazil when you
were here - but I wrote my husband
the circumstances that evening, asking
him to see Dr Lane (^{Head} of the Am. Hospital)
and learn the particulars. Told him
you said \$5.00 a day would be satisfactory.
I asked him if conditions were
favorable for your coming to wife
just the word Yes and if not - No.

I do not mean that you were to work
for \$3.00 but that if an amount equiva-
lent to that were being paid, you would
not go.

It will take three weeks for the letter to
reach him, and I know that he will
give the matter his immediate attention.

My husband has taken passage
for us on the Munson Line boat
sailing July 8th. The passage on
this boat is \$295. one way. I would

not buy a return passage - should you go.

I will write the Minson Line tonight asking of the possibility of going as a nurse. - I can tell you nothing of this now but I do believe there would be opportunity of your coming back to this country with some patient. There always has been some one needing help. You will have to get your passport and vaccination certificate.

Just as soon as I hear, I will let you know.

Now Miss Burroughs, I do want you to go with us and I would care for you just as I would for Robert and so would my husband for he is a good, true, kind hearted man.

However, I want you to understand just a wag 'bit about things before you go. My husband went to Brazil two years ago in March. He went with a silk Co. the Taramina of Japan - and owing to a crisis and poor exchange he did not sell the required amount of silk in a year. He lost the amount of his bond which he himself had furnished. It took nearly everything we

had so Daddie has practically had
to start anew.

Together with another man he has
bought a factory - I think they will make
out well in the end.

I am going down to see just how things


