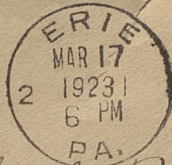
and she got them and they are Beautiful

My dear Bettie;

I have thought and thought about you and have wanted to write to you many times but about all of our family have been sick and I have been somewhat busy with school work, so of course, I did not get the letter written.

I have been so worried about you - wondering why you did not answer my letter acknowledging your lovely Christmas gifts to all of us. I finally decided that you were so busy and were sick probably.

Mother and dad are both going to Dr. Mac and I guess will have to continue for some time. He says mother has quite serious heart trouble for which there is no cure. Dad is just generally run down.

The doctor has been giving dad some kind of shots - two a week for four or five weeks and dad is feeling much better now but is still taking treatments.

Lath and Joe each had a rather bad case of flu or whatever this prevalent trouble is. Each of them was in bed for about a week. Lath does not feel very well yet but you know she feels punk a good bit of the time.

You should see our front room now! We got a new three piece mahogany set and a floor lamp and have had a chair finished in mahogany. We changed the position of everything in the room. It hardly looks like the same room. Then we bought a new rug for the living room and that gives it a different appearance too!

Leo and Evelyn have been having pecks of trouble too. Their two youngsters have been sick and the baby (who came since you have been down) is in Grant Hospital. They are going to try to bring him home - although they don't know just yet whether they can. But if they do bring him, they wondered if there were any chance of getting you to come take care of him. Would you let me know whether you could possibly come?

I know this isn't very clear but they wanted me to ask you for they knew you were a good nurse and they would have more confidence in you.

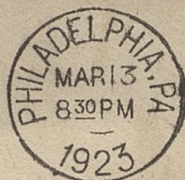

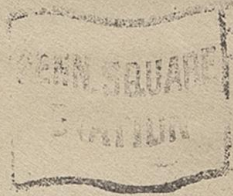

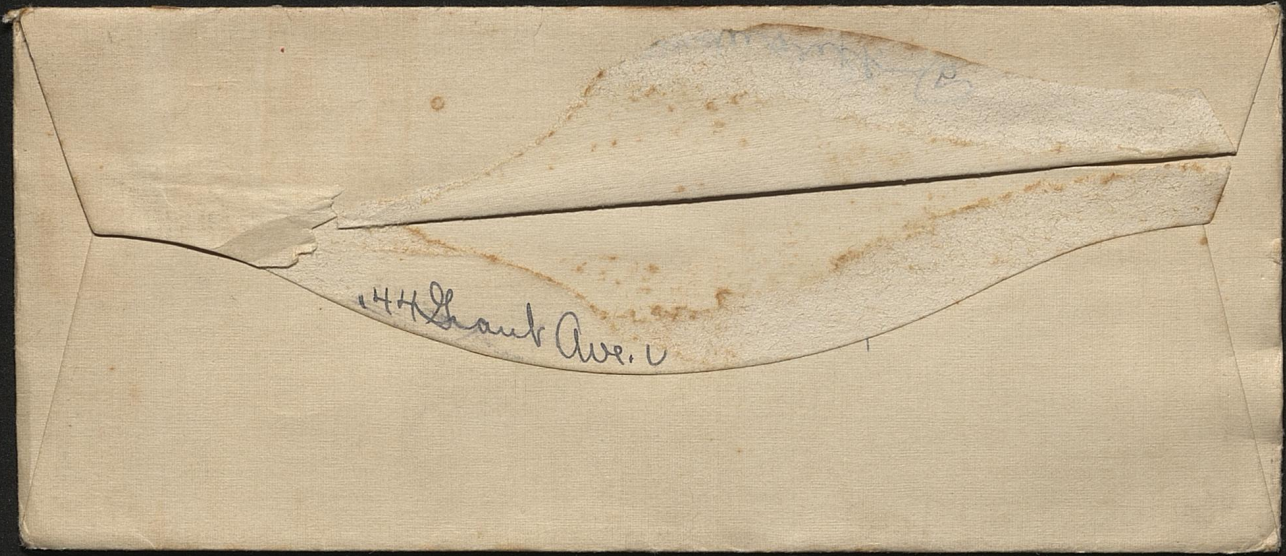

The instructor in the Clinical Pathology Lab. is leaving her job to go back to nursing which she did for some years. The hospital still has a lure for me but I do not think I want to take up nursing.

I will be satisfied if I can become a good technician. I find more to interest me every day.

Just think, in three more weeks I will move from the lab. where I am to another one. That means that one fourth of my term is finished. It doesn't seem true but it really is.

My work keeps me so late that I never get in a store and if we go to a show on Saturday

afternoon, we cannot have much time in the stores, so I haven't done as much looking (some people would call it shopping) as I would like to do. 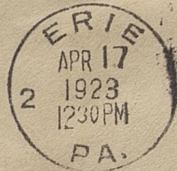
