Voter turnout

The lowest voter turnout in six years may have been a result of only two candidates vying for Student Government Association president.

Only 1,733 students voted in this year's presidential elections, with only 1,660 voting in the senator at large race.

Although the low number of students voting may show student apathy, this year's race was fairly quiet compared to previous years and may have failed to capture students's attention. Last year, 2,530 students voted in an election with five candidates.

The highest voter turnout in this decade was in 1994 when 3,172 students voted in the SGA elections. With the low voter turnout this year, elections ran very smoothly said Laura Luciano, election bard of supervisions chairwoman.

Luciano said last year's SGA had a problem of poll workers leaving poll sites unstrended, but there were no instances of people leaving the poll sites this year.

Current SGA President Shea Chaney also said the elections went well in his remarks to the crowd just before the results were announced.

"The election ran more smoothly than I've ever seen it," Chaney said. "And I've seen a lot of elections."

The claim states that Rohmiller made a speech in a classroom with the professor's microphone before class, Arlinghaus claims there were about 100 people in the class when Rohmiller made his speech.

Campaigning in class is prohibited by the SGA by-laws and Constitution. Rohmiller won the election by only 5 votes. The Election Board of Claims will hear the claim and decide whether to issue a penalty. Claims can be filed until 4 p.m. Tuesday.


As for Alan Aja, it is obvious that he has the experience to help guide the young Senate. He should be omeone who can work with the group, instead of ightning it each step of the way.

The sister organization of FarmHouse social fraternity has encountered opposition in its attempts to join UK's Greek system.

Since its first meeting on Jan. 15, the 20-member women's fraternity, called CERES, has been struggling to establish itself on campus.

In addition, due to alleged violations of National Panhellenic guidelines, CERES is not eligible for acceptance into UK's Greek system.

A first_meeting with Panhellenic Adviser Susan West, Dean of Students David Stockham and Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs James Kuder, proved futile for the group.

"In order to be classified as either a fraternity or a sorority, the group must be officially within the national governing body, which is the National Panhellenic Organization," West said.

"CERES is not a member of that national organization."

Although CERES members are of various majors, UK's Panhellenic Council still considers the organization to be too departmental to be admitted.

"The only similarity we share through this group is a common agriculture bond," said Stefanie Cruz, agriculture senior vice president of the group.

The only other option CERES has to be involved with UK, according to Dean West, is to be classified as a student organization.

However, in order for the group to be considered as such, CERES must change its by-laws to be gender neutral.

"We are exempt from accepting men through our international group in the same way that the Girl Scout Organization is. We are not prepared to change anything," Cruz said.

Despite all of the problems the fraternity has met while trying to establish itself on campus, the members say they don't have any intentions of giving up.

The group's officers are planning to meet with West, Stockham and Kuder again soon to discuss the possibility of other options.

"I feel that it will be easier for more people to get our point across that we are serious about being a part of UK," Baker said.

A bill that may reduce pollution and energy waste has passed the Senate and awaits the governor's approval.

If approved, the legislation would give UK the go-ahead to make economically and environmentally sound changes in its buildings' lighting. of energy use in lighting.
Lighting accounts for 20-25 percent of all electricity sold in the United States, according to the EPA. Out of this, 80-90 percent goes to lighting industries, businesses, offices and warehous-





Evolution allowed to be taught in Tennessee

NASHVILLE, Tenn.
After a debate reminiscent of
the courtroom oratory during
the infamous Scopes "Monkey
Trial," the Tennessee Senate
killed a bill yesterday that would
have teachers be fired for teaching evolution as fact.
The bill would have allowed,
but not required, school boards
to fire such teachers for "insubordination."

It was defeated in a 20-13
vote. NASHVILLE Tenn

Sen. Tommy Burks insisted his bill was a simple attempt to clear up confusion in classrooms where overzealous teachers present evolution as more than a

theory.
"Do you believe that you descended from a lower species? I don't," argued Burks, a Demo-

crat. This does not have a religious connotation to it. We're talking about truth to a child."
But other senators said the bill was unnecessary and an intrusion by the Legislature into school curriculum.

"I have not had one com-plaint out of my district, not one concerning this issue ever," said see. Don Wright, a Republican. Sen. Don Wright, a Republican. Sen. Andy Womack, one of the bill's most vocal opponents, said the input of scientists was in the textbooks, and argued that the Legislature shouldn't dictate curriculum.

Others worried how con-stituents would interpret their vote.

"I can't vote for this bill, but I don't want anybody to think I don't know God," said Lt. Gov. John Wilder, who presided over

The most famous legal battle over evolution took place in 1925 when Dayton, Tenn., biology teacher John Scopes was convicted in the so-called Montager and the so-called Mo


ogy teates from the so-called Monkey Train the conviction was later overturned on technicality. The law under which Scopes, a substitute biology teacher, was convicted was tougher than the one rejected by the state Senate. It outright prohibited any eaching of evolution that conflicted with the biblical creation story.

Disney to build a goofy township

ORLANDO, Fla. — Bob and Susan Raffell bought their new \$250,000 house strictly on faith, in a town that's not yet open.

When they arrived to sign the contract, there were no model homes to look at, just some plans and drawings and the outlines of two similar houses rising from the ground.

But Disney is doing this town, and that's enough for Bob and Susan.

for the Federal Aviation Administration at Orlando International
Airport. "It's a bold experiment,
really. There's a lot of faith
involved on our part."

Celebration is a \$2.5 billion
self-contained, real-life community being built by a company
with few, if any, peers in the


make-believe industry. It is smack in the middle of Central Florida's theme-park worfil.
Celebration — just a few miles down the road from Disney World — may ultimately have a population of 20,000 in 8,000 dwellings ranging from \$130,000 town houses to \$750,000 estate homes.
The first homeowners start moving in this summer, and Celebration will be formally unveiled to the general public during Walt Disney World's 25th anniversary festivities in October.
Disney is marketing the town as a community of diverse styles for people of varying incomes. Buyers have a choice of 15 variations on six architectural styles. Celebration will be an unin-corporated town within Osceola County, governed by a Community Development District that maintains utilities, roads, street-

lights, landscaping and other services.

The 4,900-acre community is rapidly taking shape on what was once a cow pasture near the intersection of Interstate 4 and U.S. Highway 192. The Central Florida Connector, a loop around metropolitan Orlando, puts Disney's town 15 to 20 minutes from the airport.

A public school for 1,400 students from kindergarten through twelfth grade, within easy walking distance of downtown, will not be completed in time for classes this fall.

A health-and-medical complex run by Florida Hospital is taking shape nearby. A business park Celebration Place, is separated from the village by an 18-hole golf course and a winding thoroughfare that leads into the network of streets and neighborhoods from the honky-tonk clutter of U.S. 19



Cats get chance to avenge loss

As UK's players were walking off the court following their 92-82 loss to Massachuserts in November's Great Eight, Minutemen forward Tryone Weeks looked into the future. "I remember (Weeks) saying 'We'll see you again,' 'Wildcat guard Tony Delk said. "I said, 'You're right about that."

Delk said. "I said, You're right about that."

And so it is.

Almost five months later, UMass and UK are set to square off again, this time in tomorrow's national semifinal with a trip to Monday's NCAA championship game up for grabs.

With the teams' first meeting coming so early in the season — the early-season matchup was UMass' first and UK's second game of the season — expect to see drastically different basketball teams take the Meadowlands' floor for round two.

The Cats were still ironing out the kinst and trying to gel as a unit in the earlier UMass showdown. Delk was playing the point and center Walter McCarty was hobbled by an ankle sprain.

"We're a different basketball team

sprain.

"We're a different basketball team this time around," said Anthony Epps, who has since stepped in as the No. I man at point guard. "We weren't raily together chemistry-wise then, but now

we got things the way we want them."

Massachusetts hasn't made any noticeable personnel changes, but the Minutemen have grown together by surviving without All-American center Marcus Camby for two weeks and by playing with the pressure of being ranked No. 1 for almost five months.

The Minutemen (35-1) owned the nation's top ranking before suffering their first and only loss Feb. 24 against George Washington.

As for Camby, the 6-foot-11 menace in the middle suffered a fainting spell in midseason. He has since recovered and was given the Naismith Award as college basketball's best player.

"They're one of the best teams to play in the NCAA Tournament in quite sometime," said Pitino, who is 13-0 when playing against a team his squad has lost to earlier in the same season. "It just doesn't get any better than Massachusetts."

Camby, who scored 32 points against UK (32-2) this year, anchors the UMass offense, but according to Pitino, a team can shut down Camby and still lose.

That's because the Minutemen feature one of the nation's premier guard tandems in Edgar Padilla and Carmelo Travieso.

In addition to the two guard and Camby, forwards Donta Bright, Dana Dingle and Weeks fill out the Minutemen's limited rotation.

"When I talk about UMass, I talk about the whole being greater than the aptract, Pitino said."When Camby goes out, as great as he is, the team's lead always is enhanced. They all have such a valuable role."




