

Reagan fails in Capitol Hill budget meeting

WASHINGTON — President Reagan met with House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. and congressional leaders for more than three hours yesterday but they failed to reach agreement on a compromise budget for the next fiscal year.

The president scheduled a television address to the nation on the budget problem for 8 p.m., EDT, today, the White House said in asserting that the president was not "met half way" in the negotiations discripted that was not marked to the president was not marked to the president of the presid

O'Neill did say the meeting produced an agreement on a deficit target for each of the next there years:
\$105 billion to \$110 billion for 1983;
\$78 billion in 1984, and \$35 to \$40 billion in 1985.
Baker said the president offered to "extend the effective date" of the 10 percent personal income tax cut scheduled for July 1983, perhaps by \$90 days.

Equestrian program cut due to funding problems

UK's equestrian program will be terminated May 7, according to Virgil W. Hays, chairman of the animal science department.

Detailed discussion about the closing had been going on in the department for the past nine months, he said.

"We regret that it is necessary to make cuts, but we found that the program was sampling funds from other programs because of shoeing, feed and general care of the horses, especially when we are operating on a fixed budget," he said.

Hays added the horse program is not being cut totally. "We still offer courses that lead to degrees in horse production, genet-ics and nutrition," he said.

Two riding instructors, Karen
Winn and Becky Gentry, one fulltime caretaker and several students
are employed in the 20-year-old program.

"We will not be disrupting anyone's job," Hays said. "The instructors' jobs were terminated as of
July 1 and the other worker will be
directed to some other area of the
animal science department."

do graduate work," Hays said. "We have no permanent faculty in this area. We would have had to look for ewe people as of July I anyway."

Hays said the program's 21 horses will eventually be sold.

"We plan on using some of them for genetics and nutrition studies," he said. "Also, we will be doing a digestion study in the early part of the

Sexual biases do not belong in workplace

Career women are finally making progress in the 1980s — finding fulfillment outside the home, growing in numbers in traditionally male-dominated professions and making more money for what they do.

But the road to equality is a long one. One major stumbling block to that goal can be found in this University, as it is found in the majority of institutions of higher learning in this nation.

Women are woefully few and far between in the upper echelon of university admistra-

White men hold 94 percent of the chief-ex-ecutive jobs and 80 percent of the adminis-trative affairs and academic affairs posi-tions nationwide.

tions nationwide.

A national study published by the College and University Personnel Association this February found that men continue to outnumber women and minority-group members in administrative jobs at colleges and universities by a ratio of three to one.

Numerous factors have been cited to explain why women are scarce in administrative positions. One is that women have few tive positions. One is that women have few role models to look to (although that is beginning to change), and those who do make it to the upper levels are pretty much on their own, without an "old-boy network" to depend on.

Another reason is that only 4.8 percent of UK's 62.5 percent female instructors will graduate to the rank of full professor, which is a unspoken requirement for academic administrative positions.

trends nor salary trends appeared related to the financial condition of the institution. Another factor mentioned in the study was low job turnover in a tight cacdemic labor market, but the finding was that positions with the highest rates of job openings did not appear to be held by increasingly large shares of women or minority-group mem-bers.

When asked why women administrators have not been hired in the past, Ronda Connaway, associate dean of the College of Social Work, said three reasons prevail: women have not aspired to be administrators, universities have been reluctant to hire them and not all women administrators, like

men, succeed.

Universities need to take a closer look at women as canidates for administrative positions. Women as a whole will not have the experience that men have had, but until hiring practices change, the situation will remain a vicious circle.

The qualifications required for the job should be assessed and the experience requirements should not be unreasonably demanding, Connaway said. "The whole idea is for the women to come in here (UK) and have a chance to advance and a chance to

Study of biorhythms produces some interesting facts

Many other useful hints exist, assed on scientifically conducted biorhythm research, which can help you maximize your day's performance by flowing with the ebb of your cycles. You cannot determine your biorhythms by purchasing a book that shows you when your ups and downs occur based on your birthday. That is a numbers game like astrology, and is fake. Such is the general conceins of the exprests in the field.

Biorhythms even have medical importance. Certain drugs like caffeinem, alcohol, barbiturates and benzodiazepines (valium, etc.) induce disturbed REM sleep patterms which may alter one's natural biorhythms. Chronic use of such drugs could throw the body's rhythms out of phase and result in a fatigued, weak feeling.

By withdrawing the drugs, correcting the change in birotythm, physicians can perfect some sleep problems. It is generally recognized that if the biorhythms are not properly synchronized, fatigue, sleep disorders and other pathological conditions can result. These van be

My interest in biorhythms was heightened in 1978 after I met Dr. Charles Ehret while I was a research associate at the Argonne National Laboratory just outside of Chicago. Dr. Ehret is considered by some to be one of the true pioneers

fore you leave New York City. On Monday and Wednesday, you should feast — eat big meals. On Tuesday and Thursday (the flight day) you should fast — eat light meals.

This will alter your regular 24 hour (durnal) eat/fast yote, and will help your body reschedule the month of yours of key enzymes, your body will begin to use up its stired glucose. On Thursday, you should glucose.

not eat/drink any carbohydrates (crackers, chips, potatoes, breads, sugar containing items, speghetti); you should not drink tea or caffeine containing beverages before 6 p.m. Between 6 p.m. and indight during the flight, you should drink strong tea or black coffee (no sugar) with caffeine (Mello Yello or Coke). Eat a balanced breakfast of protein and carbohydrates followed by a large, high protein lunch (fish). Your supper should be light and high in carbohydrates to induce a sleep-cycle at bedtime in Paris. You should retire early the first night in France. All of these things will set your internal clock ahead by six hours. On the return flight you need to reset your clocks back six hours—see?

WASHINGTON — The Soviet Union surged ahead of the United States in arms sales to the Third World in 1978 and 1979 and sold more than twice as many weapons as the United States did in 1980, the last year of the Carter

administration, officials of the Arms Control and Disarmamanent Agency said yesterday. At a news conference, ACDA officials challenged the accuracy of recent private studies but concluded the Soviet Union remains behind the United States in arms exports to Third

The report, which is based on an analysis of arms deliveries, did not include sales after 1980, when Ronald Reagan defeated Carter of the presidency. The Reagan administration has moved to sharply increase weapons sales to confront what it considers a growing threat of Souriet avenacionism.

NEW YORK — After a year-long slide, gaso-line prices are creeping upward in many parts of the nation. Some industry officials said they believe consumers will see substantially higher prices this summer as the oil glut disappears. Several major oil companies posted increas-est this week in the price they charge wholesale distributors, and analysts say the added cost will show up at the retail pump before the start of the summer driving season. Although demand for gasoline remains gen-erally weak, the oil companies are raising prices to distributors in reaction to a recent irrning of crude oil prices. That turnaround for crude oil is linked mainly to the success of

Britain declared yesterday that a "total" war zone 200 miles around the Falkland Islands will go into effect at 7 a m EDT tomorrow, and Argentina put its forces on "maximum alert."

The two sides also said they were studying a U.S. peace plan relayed by Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig, but Argentina said it expects "military operations" in the Falklands area in 24 to 48 hours.

Details of the plan were not known, but a government source in London said, "Clearly Mr. Haig wants to bring some sort of finality to the issue, with some sensible way of resolving it."

As prospects for peace grew dim. the British Defense Ministry announced that any ship or aircraft, including Soviet vessels, that are found within the 'total exclusion zone' will be regarded as hostile and liable to attack. The British move came amid mounting speculation that the task force now off the Faikland Islands was poised to launch an assault on the South Atlantic archipelago seized by Argentina April 2.




