A CLEAR ACCOUNT OF THE RAID. CARLISLE, Saturday, Och 11, 1862 From the most trustworthy sources I learn that the cavalry under command of Stuart reached Chambersburg about 6 o'clock on Friday evening. They crossed the Potomac below Hancock, some 40 miles off, proceeding by the way of Mercersburg and Campbellstown to Chambersburg.

About 800 entered the town, the residue remaining a mile outside. A portion of the latter dividedone part going toward Greencastle, taking with them their artillery; the other remaining in camp near by all night.
