The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 9:00 a. m., CST, Friday, May 16, 1958, with the following members present: Governor A. B. A. Called Meeting.

I am submitting herewith the Financial Report of the University covering fund transactions for the ten-months period ended April 30, 1958, consisting of a balance sheet and relating financial statements.

The general fund income received is \$11,832,742.65, which is \$25,238.79 in excess of the budget estimate for 1957-58.

Current fund expenditures and encumbrances outstanding for the period totaled \$9,769,086.95 or 82.1% of the departmental appropriations of \$11,902,292.62.

were ratified and approved.

E. Sale of Surplus Property.

President Dickey reported a list of discarded and obsolete items of furniture located in the men's and women's residence halls, some old phonographs, parts of two old pianos, and other items having the appearance of junk, located in the Fine Arts Building.

He further reported one small power unit, gasoline engine driven, located in the College of Engineering, surplus to the needs of that College, and recommended that these items be authorized sold or disposed of.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President.

F. Accident to Car.

President Dickey reported a car accident on the Experiment Station Farm. He stated that the car of Mr. James Thorndale, of the Agronomy department, was damaged by a tractor and hay baler driven by James Bryant, a mechanic in the Agricultural Engineering department. The Thorndale car was parked, and Mr. Bryant did not allow enough room between the vehicles. The cost of repairing the car amounted to \$80.00.

President Dickey stated that the University was exceedingly annoyed by such an accident but, because of the recommendation of Dr. H. Bruce Price, Acting Dean and Director of the Experiment Station, he was recommending that the cost of the repairs be paid from the Experiment Station funds, with the explicit understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability in paying the account.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the account covering

repairs to Mr. James Thorndale's car was ordered paid, with the explicit understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability in paying the account.

G. Report of Injuries.

President Dickey reported an injury to Hubert Kidwell, an employee of the Division of Maintenance and Operations. Mr. Kidwell was moving a typewriter desk to the paint room, when the typewriter carriage snapped back and caught his finger. He reported to the University Health Service where an x-ray was taken. The University Health Service submits an invoice for \$1.50.

President Dickey reported an injury to Carl Swinford, an employee of the Division of Maintenance and Operations. Mr. Swinford was involved in the building of a cattle mineral feeder, running a board through the 6" jointer, when his hand slipped. The finger next to the little finger of his left hand had the end cut off. Apparently, the bone was not cut, but about one-half inch was cut from the nail. Mr. Swinford reported to the University Health Service and was referred to Doctor Sprague for treatment. Doctor Sprague submits a bill for \$10.00.

President Dickey reported an injury to Charles E. Baierlein, an employee of the Division of Maintenance and Operations. Mr. Baierlein was checking a new exhaust fan, when his hand was pulled into the end of the blade. The tip of the blade cut the back of his small finger, partially severing the tendon. He was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital for emergency treatment. The Hospital rendered necessary services and submits an invoice for \$13.00.

President Dickey recommended that these accounts be paid, with the understanding that the University did not admit negligence or liability.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in and the invoices authorized paid, with the understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability in the cases of Hubert Kidwell, Carl Swinford or Charles E. Baierlein.

H. Death Termination of Pay.

President Dickey read the following communication and proposed Resolution:

Whereas KRS 164.225 empowers the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to fix the compensation payable to University employees out of the State Treasury or otherwise, and

Whereas the responsible administrative officials of the University are required under existing law to certify that the duty and services compensated for have been rendered by the employee, and

Whereas University employees should be fully compensated for the duty and services rendered prior to death although they die during a monthly pay period,

Now Therefore Be It Resolved:

That final compensation in the case of death of University employees shall be computed and certified according to the following formula:

Where applicable the employee's annual salary shall be composed of two increments: 5/6 for the 9 months' school term, September 1 to May 30 (usually paid in 10 equal installments) and 1/6 for the summer session of 8 weeks (usually paid in 2 equal installments). When death occurs his final compensation shall be sufficient to pay for whatever fraction of the school term has been completed and whatever fraction of the summer session has been completed.

And be it further resolved that the Vice-President, Business Administration, is authorized to establish such regulations and payroll practices as are necessary to give this formula effect.

President Dickey explained the purpose of the Resolution.

Members of the Board being thoroughly sympathetic, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Resolution was authorized adopted, effective immediately.

I. ICA Contract Approved.

President Dickey submitted contract between the Experiment Station of the University and the International Cooperation Administration, the contract known as PIO/P 91-81-001-1-70640, Pakistani V-Aid Team.

President Dickey stated that the contract referred to about 20 foreign nationals receiving training on the campus of the University, and maybe at other institutions, for a period of $12\frac{1}{2}$ weeks originally and later changed to a period of approximately 19 weeks. The total would amount to about \$13,165.00, which sum is to go to pay the cost of the University administering the program.

The President recommended that the original contract and the extension amendment be authorized and approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract as originally submitted and the amendment were authorized approved and accepted.

J. Contract with United States Forest Service Approved.

President Dickey submitted Supplement No. 5 to Basic Contract between the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station of the University of Kentucky and the United States Forest Service. He explained that the supplement would grant an additional \$1,000.00 for the cost of cooperative project between the two units. He recommended its approval.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Supplement No. 5 to Basic Memorandum of Understanding, dated October 21, 1953, between the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station and U.S. Forest Service was authorized approved.

K. Loan Agreement with Housing and Home Finance Agency Approved.

President Dickey stated that the Executive Committee, at its meeting on March 14, had approved Loan Agreement with the Housing and Home Finance Agency on Project No. Ky. 15-CH-26(D), University of Kentucky, Lexington, Kentucky, Contract No. H-302-152, but that the Housing and Home Finance Agency desired that same be approved by the full Board. He requested that the following be approved and authorized made of record:

Mr. Peterson submitted a Loan Agreement on Project No. Ky. 15-CH-26(D), University of Kentucky, Lexington, Ky., Contract No. H-302-152, whereby the United States of America Housing and Home Finance Agency agrees to loan on the above reference project the sum of \$1,800,000 at a maximum interest rate of 2-7/8% per annum. The loan provides that the bonds shall be offered for sale to the public, upon which invitation the Federal Government will bid par for the entire issue at an average interest rate of 2-7/8% per annum. Mr. Peterson stated that the provisions of the negotiated loan are similar to those heretofore approved and that he and counsel agree upon the provisions contained therein, and recommended that same be approved and authorized executed on behalf of the University of Kentucky.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the action of the Executive Committee on March 14 was ratified and approved, and the Loan Agreement above referred to was authorized and approved.

L. Purchase of Forty-Four Acres in Owen County.

President Dickey recommended the purchase of a strip of forty-four acres which joins the field on the west side of the Eden Shale Farm in Owen County. He stated that the Owen County Citizens Committee had agreed to supply \$1,000 to the purchase price, and the University would pay the balance of \$2,800. President Dickey read the following communication:

April 15, 1958

President Frank G. Dickey
University of Kentucky

Dear President Dickey:

I attach hereto a plat showing the boundary line of the Eden Shale Farm in Owen County. A strip of 44 acres which joins the field on the west is shown in the green shaded area. As 44 acres the owner wants \$3,800 for the property. The Owen County Citizens Committee is willing to apply \$1,000 towards the purchase price with the understanding that the University pay the balance of \$2,800. While I do not believe this land is particularly needed for the demonstration purposes of the Eden Shale Farm, it certainly does fill out the boundary line of the field, and it seems wise to cooperate with the local committee in acquiring this 44 acres. I am, therefore, recommending that we purchase the 44 acres with the understanding that the local committee will cause the deed, abstract, and survey to be furnished and pay any amount necessary over and above \$2,800. I further recommend that this amount be paid from the University fund and carried as an obligation against the Experiment Station budget, which may be paid on or before July 1, 1960 at an interest rate of 5%.

President Dickey recommended that the land be purchased under the conditions outlined. On motion duly made, seconded and carried, same was authorized as recommended.

M. Contract with Union Carbide Corporation, Bakelite Division, Approved.

President Dickey submitted Agreement for an additional twelve-months period, April 1, 1958, to March 31, 1959, on the contract dated April 1, 1955. He stated that the contract would provide for continuation of the study of the use of plastic films as substitutes for glass in greenhouses and hot-beds. He recommended that same be approved, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was extended to March 31, 1959.

N. Contract with Union Carbide Corporation, Bakelite Division, Approved.

President Dickey submitted extension of Agreement dated February 1, 1955, and recommended that it be extended from February 1, 1958, to January 31, 1959. He stated that the contract would provide for the continuing study of the use of films produced from polyethylene for the control of weeds and the forcing and irrigation of vegetables.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was authorized extended and approved.

O. Contract with Rough River Reservoir Area in Kentucky Approved.

President Dickey read the following letter:

April 21, 1958

President Frank G. Dickey
University of Kentucky

Dear President Dickey:

The University, upon Board authority, executed a contract with the United States Department of the Interior for work on the Rough River Reservoir Area in Kentucky. The work on the existing contract was satisfactory to the Department of the Interior and they are submitting hereto attached a Memorandum Agreement, which in reality is an extension of the existing contract. It provides for certain work to be done under the supervision of the Department of Anthropology, and that the Department of the Interior will provide the sum of \$800 to assist in carrying out the provisions of the Agreement. I recommend that the contract be authorized executed on behalf of the University.

He stated that the work had been progressing under the direction of Doctor Schwartz, of the Department of Anthropology. He recommended that the Agreement be extended under the conditions of the contract.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the extension was authorized and approved.

P. Purchase of Property at 232 East Maxwell Street and 267 South Arden Boulevard, Los Angeles, California.

President Dickey explained that the University desired to acquire property at 232 East Maxwell Street, Lexington. This property is owned by Mr. Jesse M. Laughlin, Los Angeles, California. The property in California, of similar value, is also available for acquisition. It has been agreed by all parties concerned, including the County Attorney, State Attorney, the Department of Finance and the University that the property in California could be purchased and deeded to Jesse M. Laughlin. In turn, the property in Lexington at 232 East Maxwell Street would be likewise deeded to the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky. This arrangement will enable the University to acquire the property at 232 East Maxwell Street at a reasonable and fair value.

Members of the Board being familiar with the problem, having previously had the case before it, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the transaction was authorized consummated, and all papers to be signed on behalf of the University were authorized executed to the end that both transfers be perfected.

Q. Approval of Investments.

President Dickey submitted the following Resolution:

RESOLVED, That the action of the Farmers Bank and Capital Trust Company as Trustee, and as directed by Dr. Frank D. Peterson, in the purchasing of certain direct obligations of the U. S. Government for investment of funds in the hands of the Trustee for the following accounts, is hereby ratified and approved:

R. Authorization of Investments.

President Dickey read the following communication:

Dear President Dickey:

The bond resolutions of various bond issues which we have sold to the Housing and Home Finance Agency provide that the Trustee shall invest such funds as may be available upon the authorization of the University. The Trustee feels that a Resolution of the Board of Trustees authorizing such investments should be had for his files. I attach hereto Resolution, which, if passed by the Board, would give to the Trustee such authority, and at the same time would not make it necessary to bring back to the Board each time that funds are available for investment. It provides that they should do it upon written authority from me, a copy of the letter filed with you. If you agree with this procedure, I wish it to be submitted to the Board of Trustees.

President Dickey recommended the Resolution be approved and adopted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was concurred in, and the Resolution was approved as follows:

RESOLUTION

RESOLVED, That the Farmers Bank and Capital Trust Company as Trustee for various bond issues of the University of Kentucky be and it is hereby authorized and directed to invest sums of money in its hands as Trustee for various issues, in securities approved and provided for in the Indentures entered into between the University of Kentucky and the Bank as Trustee covering issuance and sale of bonds to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, as follows:

The said Farmers Bank and Capital Trust Company as Trustee shall be authorized to make such investments in such amounts against funds held for such bond issues as may be designated in writing by Frank D. Peterson, Vice President, Business Administration, University of Kentucky. A copy of such directions to the Farmers Bank and Capital Trust Company as Trustee to invest funds for various issues shall be filed with the President of the University.

S. Alpha Tau Omega Small Dormitory (Fraternity House) Approved.

President Dickey stated the University had talked with representatives of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity and decided on a site for the fraternity building which would be known as a small dormitory. The representatives of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity have purchased the land to be used as a site. The land is now owned by the University. The Alpha Tau Omega fraternity will enter into contract for construction of building and lease of same. President Dickey recommended that the building be authorized constructed, that a lease be authorized, and that the architect who was engaged to design the building and write specifications be ratified and approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the site purchased by the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity was accepted and approved, the construction of a small dormitory (fraternity building) was authorized and approved, the Business Office was directed to make the necessary requests of the State Property and Building Commission, and employment of Meriwether, Marye and Associates was ratified and approved. It was further authorized that the building would cost not to exceed \$150,000, from proceeds of a bond issue. The University officials were authorized to enter into contract for lease of the property when it is available for occupancy.

T. Bond Resolution, Small Dormitory, 342 Clifton Avenue.

President Dickey reported that the University desired to construct a small dormitory to house not exceeding 48 men students, and that the State Property and Building Commission had approved the construction of small dormitory facilities. He recommended that the Board authorize a bond issue in the amount of \$150,000, and invest in the Executive Committee full authority to do all things necessary to approve plans and specifications, to publicize invitations to bid, and to authorize bonds to be issued, sold and delivered in an amount sufficient to construct the building.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in, a small dormitory at 342 Clifton Avenue was authorized constructed, and the Executive Committee was given full authority to do any and all things necessary to approve the plans and specifications, to authorize publication of invitation for bids, and to authorize bonds to be issued, sold and delivered in amount not to exceed \$150,000.00

Thereupon, a motion was made by Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci and seconded by Wood Hannah, Sr., that a resolution entitled

"A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE, SALE AND DELIVERY OF DORMITORY REVENUE BONDS (342 CLIFTON AVENUE) TO PAY THE COST (NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED) OF CONSTRUCTING DORMITORY FACILITIES AT 342 CLIFTON AVENUE, LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY,"

a true copy of which is attached to the minutes of this meeting, be adopted. Upon a vote being taken upon such motion, the result was as follows: Aye: Governor A. B. Chandler, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Ben Butler, Dr. Paul Hall, Wood Hannah, Sr., R. P. Hobson, Robert R. Martin and J. Stephen Watkins. Nay: None.

Whereupon, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees declared the said motion duly carried and said resolution duly adopted.

Thereupon, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci introduced and caused to be read in full the following proposed resolution:

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY DELEGATING TO ITS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FULL POWER AND AUTHORITY TO TAKE ALL ADDITIONAL NECESSARY OR DESIRABLE STEPS IN CONNECTION WITH THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF "DORMITORY REVENUE BONDS (342 CLIFTON AVENUE)" OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY.

WHEREAS, further action may be necessary in connection with the issuance, sale and delivery of Dormitory Revenue Bonds (342 Clifton Avenue) of the University of Kentucky, and it is deemed advisable and for the best interests of the University of Kentucky that the Executive Committee be given full power to take all action in connection with the sale of such bonds or otherwise which may be necessary or desirable in connection with the foregoing,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky hereby delegates to the Executive Committee of such Board of Trustees the full right, power and authority to take any and all action or actions which may be necessary or desirable in connection with completing the entire transaction pertaining to the financing of the construction of dormitory facilities at 342 Clifton Avenue and the appurtenances thereto and, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, to take any and all action which may be necessary in connection with the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of \$150,000 of University of Kentucky Dormitory Revenue Bonds (342 Clifton Avenue) and to amend, extend or change any resolution, resolutions or action previously taken by the Board of Trustees with reference to such transaction.

Section 2. That such Executive Committee is hereby authorized and directed to take any and all action which may be necessary or desirable to carry out the intent of the foregoing.

Section 3. That if and when any action is taken by such Executive Committee in connection with such Project, all parties shall have the right to rely upon such action as being equivalent to the action as if same had been taken by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, and such Executive Committee shall have the right to authorize and complete such financing and such Project upon behalf of such Board of Trustees without any further consideration or approval by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, it being the intent of this resolution to give such Executive Committee

as full and complete power with reference to such Project as if the Board of Trustees were acting upon its own behalf; that, however, the adoption of this resolution shall not prevent the Board of Trustees from taking any action in connection with such Project which it desires to take at any meeting held by the Board of Trustees, but the holding of such a meeting by the Board of Trustees and the taking of further action by such Board shall not revoke or limit to any extent the powers granted hereunder to such Executive Committee, and such Executive Committee shall continue to have all powers granted to it hereunder until and unless all of such powers are hereafter specifically revoked by the Board of Trustees. That after any or all of such bonds are sold and delivered the Board of Trustees shall not have any further power to revoke any action taken by the Executive Committee in connection with the authorization, issuance and sale of such bonds.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE, SALE AND DELIVERY OF DORMITORY REVENUE BONDS (342 CLIFTON AVENUE) TO PAY THE COST (NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED) OF CONSTRUCTING DORMITORY FACILITIES AT 342 CLIFTON AVENUE, LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY.

WHEREAS, the University of Kentucky and its students are not now being provided with adequate buildings for educational purposes, and, in order to provide same it is necessary that the University construct dormitory facilities at 342 Clifton Avenue, in Lexington, Kentucky, and hereinafter described; and

WHEREAS, said facilities can be constructed at a cost to the Board of Trustees (in addition to funds otherwise provided) not to exceed \$150,000; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Chapter 58 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, as a governmental agency, is authorized to issue Revenue Bonds, as hereinafter provided, for the purpose of constructing said facilities, appurtenances thereto and equipment, and authorization of the said project and financing has been given by the State Property and Buildings Commission and by the Department of Finance, as required by law;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It is hereby determined that in order to provide the University of Kentucky with additional and needed accommodations for educational purposes it is necessary and desirable that there be constructed dormitory facilities on the property at 342 Clifton Avenue, in Lexington, Kentucky (hereinafter described), at a cost to the University (in addition to funds otherwise provided) not to exceed \$150,000. The said facilities, appurtenances and equipment are collectively sometimes hereinafter referred to as the Project and are hereby declared to be a "public Project" within the meaning and application of Chapter 58 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

Section 2. In order to provide for the payment of the costs and expenses of the Project (not otherwise provided) there shall be and there are hereby ordered to be issued by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, in its corporate capacity and by and through its corporate name, and as a State educational institution and agency, bonds which shall be designated "University of Kentucky Dormitory Revenue Bonds (342 Clifton Avenue), in the aggregate principal amount of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$150,000) Dollars, dated June 1, 1958, consisting of One Hundred and Fifty (150) bonds of the denomination of One Thousand (\$1000) Dollars each, to be numbered from One (1) to One Hundred and Fifty (150), both numbers inclusive, bearing interest to be evidenced by coupons attached to each bond and maturing on December 1 and June 1 of each year to the respective maturity dates of principal at a rate or rates to be determined at the time of the receipt and consideration of bids, as hereinafter provided, none of which may exceed 6% per annum. Said bonds shall mature serially and in numerical order on June 1, \$2000 in each of the years 1960 through 1966, \$3000 in each of the years 1967 through 1978, \$4000 in each of the years 1979 through 1985, \$5000 in each of the years 1986 through 1992, \$6000 in each of the years 1993 through 1997 and \$7000 in 1998, provided, however, that any of said bonds numbered 9 to 150, inclusive, shall be redeemable prior to maturity as a whole or from time to time in part, in the inverse order of their maturity (less than all of a single maturity to be selected by lot), on June 1, 1963, or on any interest payment date thereafter, provided a

notice specifying the bonds to be redeemed shall have been on file at the place of payment of the principal and interest at least thirty (30) days prior thereto and provided also that such notice shall have been published at least once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date, in a newspaper having general circulation throughout Kentucky. In the event of redemption prior to stated maturities in accordance with these provisions, the holders of each bond so redeemed shall be entitled to receive on the specified redemption date the face amount of the bond, together with interest to the redemption date at the applicable coupon rate and together with additional interest in the sum of Thirty (\$30) Dollars if the redemption date is on or prior to December 1, 1967, Twenty-five (\$25) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1968, but on or prior to December 1, 1972, Twenty (\$20) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1973, but on or prior to December 1, 1977, Fifteen (\$15) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1978, but on or prior to December 1, 1982, Ten (\$10) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1983, but on or prior to December 1, 1987, and Five (\$5.00) Dollars if the redemption date is thereafter. All bonds called for redemption as herein provided, funds for the payment of which are duly deposited at the place of payment of principal and interest at or prior to the specified redemption date, shall cease to bear interest from and after such specified redemption date.

Said bonds shall be signed for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky by the Chairman of said Board of Trustees, attested by its Secretary and sealed with its corporate seal, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed with the facsimile signatures of said Chairman and said Secretary, and said bonds, together with interest thereon, shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal office of Farmers Bank and Capital Trust Company, in the City of Frankfort, Kentucky, but only out of the "Dormitory Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (342 Clifton Avenue)," hereinafter created, and shall be a valid claim of the holders thereof only against said Fund and the gross income and revenues of the Project pledged to such Fund. If any officer whose signature, or a facsimile of whose signature appears on said bonds or coupons shall cease to be such officer prior to the delivery of such bonds, such signature or facsimile signature shall, nevertheless, be valid for all purposes, the same as if such officer had continued to hold such office until such delivery.

Section 3. The aforesaid bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the following form, to-wit:

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, in its corporate capacity and by and through its corporate name and as a State educational institution and agency, for value received, hereby promises to pay to the bearer or, if this bond be registered, to the registered holder hereof, as hereinafter provided, the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars on the first day of June, 19____, with interest thereon from the date hereof until paid at the rate of _____ (____%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on each December 1 and June 1, except as the provisions hereinafter set forth with respect to prior redemption may be and become applicable hereto, such interest as may accrue on and prior to the maturity date of this bond to be paid only upon presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as they severally mature, both principal and interest being payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal office of Farmers Bank and Capital Trust Company, in the City of Frankfort, Kentucky.

The right is hereby reserved to call and redeem bonds numbered Nine (9) to One Hundred and Fifty (150), inclusive, of the series of which this bond is a part prior to stated maturities, in whole or from time to time in part, in the inverse order of their maturity (less than all of a single maturity to be selected by lot) on any interest payment date on or after June 1, 1963, provided a notice specifying the bonds to be redeemed shall have been on file at the place of payment of the principal and interest at least thirty (30) days prior thereto and provided also that such notice shall have been published at least once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date, in a newspaper having general circulation throughout Kentucky. Upon the specified redemption date the holder of each bond so redeemed shall be entitled to receive the face amount of the bond, together with interest to the redemption date at the coupon rate and together with additional interest in the sum of Thirty (\$30) Dollars if the redemption date is on or prior to December 1, 1967, Twenty-five (\$25) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1968, but on or prior to December 1, 1972, Twenty (\$20) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1973, but on or prior to December 1, 1977, Fifteen (\$15) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1978, but on or prior to December 1, 1982, Ten (\$10) Dollars if the redemption date is on or after June 1, 1983, but on or prior to December 1, 1987, and Five (\$5) Dollars if the redemption date is thereafter. All bonds called for redemption as herein provided, funds for the payment of which are duly deposited at the place of payment of principal and interest at or prior to the specified redemption date, shall cease to bear interest from and after such specified redemption date.

This bond is issued to finance the cost of constructing a dormitory building and appurtenances for educational purposes in connection with the University of Kentucky, under and in full compliance with the Constitution and statutes of Kentucky, including, among others, sections 58.010 to 58.140, inclusive, of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

This bond is payable only from a fixed amount of the gross income and revenues to be derived from the operation of said dormitory building and appurtenances, which will be set aside as a special fund and pledged for that purpose and identified as the "Dormitory Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (342 Clifton Avenue)" and this bond does not constitute an indebtedness of the University of Kentucky or of its Board of Trustees or

of the Commonwealth of Kentucky within the meaning of any constitutional provisions or limitations.

This bond is fully negotiable but may be registered as to principal only on the books of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, such registration to be evidenced by notation thereof on the reverse hereof by said Secretary, after which no transfer of this bond shall be valid unless made on said books at the written request of the registered owner or his authorized representative and similarly noted on the reverse hereof. But this bond may be discharged from registration by being transferred to bearer, and thereafter transferability by delivery shall be restored. Registration of this bond as aforesaid shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons appurtenant hereto, which shall continue to be transferable by delivery merely and shall remain payable to bearer.

IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED, RECITED AND DECLARED that all acts, conditions and things required to exist, happen and be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond do exist, have happened and have been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law, and the amount of this bond, together with all other obligations of said University of Kentucky and of its Board of Trustees, does not exceed any limit prescribed by the Constitution or statutes of Kentucky; that said dormitory building and appurtenances will be continuously operated by said University of Kentucky and that a sufficient portion of the gross income and revenues therefrom has been pledged to and will be set aside into a special account for the payment of the principal of and interest on this bond and the series of which it is a part as the same will respectively become due.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky has caused this bond to be signed by its Chairman and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, attested by its Secretary, and the coupons hereto attached to be executed with the facsimile signatures of the said Chairman and said Secretary, who, by the signing of this bond, do adopt said facsimile signatures, and each of them, to be their respective authorized and official signatures, all as of the first day of June, 1958.

That each of said bonds shall be fully negotiable, provided that upon presentation at the office of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky of any of said bonds same may be registered as to principal in the name of the holder thereof on the books of such Secretary kept for that purpose, such registration to be noted on the back of the bonds so registered, and thereafter the principal of the bonds so registered shall be payable only to the registered holder thereof, his legal representatives or assigns. Bonds so registered may be transferred to another registered holder or to bearer, upon presentation to such Secretary with a legal assignment duly acknowledged or proved. Registration of any of such bonds as to principal shall not affect the transferability of the coupons thereto attached, and such coupons shall continue to be transferable by delivery.

Section 4. The Project shall be operated as a revenue-producing undertaking on a fiscal year basis, commencing on June 1 of each year and ending on May 31 of the ensuing year, and on that basis the gross income and revenues of said Project shall be set aside into a separate and special fund designated the "Dormitory Revenue Fund (342 Clifton Avenue)" (hereinafter designated the "Revenue Fund"), and such gross income and revenues shall be sufficient (and shall be revised from time to time, if necessary) to maintain at the specified levels the various special funds hereinafter created.

There shall be and there is hereby created a fund to be known as the "Dormitory Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (342 Clifton

Avenue)," (hereinafter called the "Bond Fund"), into which there shall be set aside from the monies held in the Revenue Fund such amounts as will be sufficient to pay the interest on and principal of the bonds hereby authorized as may be outstanding from time to time. The amount to be set aside into said Fund during each fiscal year so long as any of said bonds remain outstanding shall be not less than as set forth in the following schedule:

Provided, however, that the minimum annual amounts to be set aside into said Bond Fund, as set forth in the foregoing schedule, are based upon an arbitrary assumption that when said bonds are publicly sold on a competitive basis a single interest coupon rate of three (3%) per cent will be established and made applicable thereto, and the minimum amount to be so set aside in each year is sufficient to provide for the payment of the interest coupons maturing on December 1 in such fiscal year and the bonds and coupons maturing on June 1 immediately following the end of such fiscal year. If less than all of the bonds are sold and outstanding or if the interest coupon rates established and made applicable as herein provided are otherwise than three (3%) per cent for all of the bonds, the minimum annual amounts to be so set aside in said Bond Fund shall automatically be adjusted to such sums as shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes set forth in this paragraph, without further action by the Board of Trustees or of its Executive Committee. Amounts to be paid into the Bond Fund for interest on the bonds during the construction of the Project may be paid from the proceeds of the bonds.

The amount by which the payments into the Bond Fund in any fiscal year exceed the aggregate amount of interest on and principal of said bonds then currently becoming due shall be held in said Bond Fund as a reserve for contingencies and used solely as herein provided; provided, however, that no further payments need be made into said Bond Fund whenever and so long as such amount of the bonds shall have been retired that the amount then held on the Bond Fund is equal to the entire amount of the principal and interest that is to be paid on all of such bonds then remaining outstanding.

All monies held in the Bond Fund shall be deposited in a bank which is a member of the Federal Reserve System and of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The payments hereinabove provided to be made into said Bond Fund from the Revenue Fund shall be made in equal monthly installments on the first day of each month, except when the first day of any such month shall be on a Sunday or a legal holiday, in which event such payment shall be made on the next succeeding secular day. In the event that the monies held in the Revenue Fund in any month shall be insufficient to make the aforesaid payments in full, any such deficiency shall be added to the amounts required to be paid into such Bond Fund in the following month. All the balance then and from time to time remaining in the Dormitory Revenue Fund shall be set aside into an "Operation and Maintenance Fund (342 Clifton Avenue)," hereby created, as hereinafter more fully provided. It is hereby determined that no amount is necessary to be placed in any depreciation account for depreciation.

The Bond Fund hereinabove created and described shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized to be issued and is hereby irrevocably pledged for that purpose and shall be used for no other purposes whatsoever.

All monies in such Operation and Maintenance Fund (342 Clifton Avenue) shall be used to defray the proper expenses of operating and maintaining the Project, including an amount sufficient to pay the cost of insurance; provided, however, if a surplus shall be accumulated in said Fund equal to the estimated cost of operating and maintaining the Project for the remainder of the then current fiscal year and for a like fiscal year in the future, any excess over said amount may be transferred to the Bond Fund and may be applied to the redemption of bonds outstanding pursuant to this Resolution in accordance with their terms.

Section 5. While the bonds authorized hereunder, or any of them, remain outstanding and unpaid, the rents and charges for all services rendered by the Project and fees charged to the students of the University of Kentucky shall be reasonable and just, taking into account and consideration the cost and value of said Project, the cost of maintaining and operating the same, the amounts necessary for the retirement of all bonds and the accruing interest on all bonds as may be sold and are unpaid under the provisions of this Resolution, and there shall be charged against the University of Kentucky such amounts for services rendered by the Project as shall be adequate, together with rents and fees charged to students, to meet the requirements of this and the two preceding sections hereof.

Section 6. The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders of the bonds hereby authorized to be issued, or any of them, that all duties with reference to said Project required by the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky will be faithfully and punctually performed, including the charging and collection from the University of Kentucky and its students reasonable and sufficient amounts for services rendered by said Project.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds to maintain in good condition and continuously to operate said Project so long as the principal of or interest on any of the bonds herein authorized remains outstanding and unpaid and to charge and collect reasonable and sufficient amounts as rent and for services rendered by the Project in furnishing educational facilities, to maintain the Bond Fund and the Operation and Maintenance Fund as required by the preceding sections of this Resolution, and the same are hereby pledged for that purpose.

Section 7. Any holder of said bonds or of any of the coupons may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceedings, enforce and compel performance of all duties required by law, including the charging, collecting and accounting for sufficient rents, student fees and charges, and the segregation and application of the income and revenues as provided by this Resolution.

If there be any default in the payment of the principal or of interest on any of said bonds, then, upon the filing of suit by any holder of said bonds or any of the coupons, any court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a receiver to administer said Project, with power to charge and collect a sum sufficient to provide for the payment of any bonds or obligations outstanding against said Project and for the payment of the operating expenses, and to apply the income and revenues in conformity with this Resolution and the provisions of said laws of Kentucky aforesaid.

Section 8. The bonds authorized to be issued hereunder and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the revenues of said Project, regardless of the time or times of their issuance, it being the intention that there shall be no priority among the bonds authorized to be issued under the provisions of this Resolution, regardless of the fact that they may be actually issued and delivered at different times.

Section 9. While any of the bonds herein authorized are outstanding no additional bonds payable from the revenues of the Project shall be authorized or issued unless the lien and security for the payment of such additional bonds are made junior and subordinate in all respects to the lien and security of the bonds herein authorized.

Section 10. So long as any of said bonds are outstanding, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky shall:

- (a) Maintain insurance on the Project against loss or damage by fire, lightning and windstorm in an amount equal to the full insurable value and pay the cost of such insurance from the Operation and Maintenance Fund hereinbefore described;
- (b) Keep proper books of record and accounts (separate from all other records and accounts), in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to said Project, and furnish the original purchaser of said bonds and any subsequent holder of any of the said bonds, at the written request of such holder, complete operating and income statements of the said Project in reasonable detail covering each six months' period, and same shall be available not later than thirty (30) days after the close of each six months' period; and
- (c) Grant to the holder of any of said bonds the right at all reasonable times to inspect the said Project and all records, accounts and data relating thereto.

Section 11. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to cause a notice to be published in The Courier-Journal, Louisville, Kentucky, soliciting sealed competitive bids for the purchase of the bonds authorized by this Resolution, the same to be received in the office of the Vice President (Business Administration) of the University until the time of some

meeting of the Board of Trustees or its Executive Committee, at which time such bids will be opened and acted upon. The right to reject bids shall be reserved. No bid offering less than 100% of the par or face value of the bonds shall be given favorable consideration. The Secretary having submitted to the Board a copy of a "Notice of Sale of Bonds," and said instrument having been examined, the same is hereby approved, and a notice substantially in such form may be used in soliciting bids for the purchasing of such bonds. No further authorization by the Board of Trustees or its Executive Committee shall be necessary before the Secretary may publish such notice.

Section 12. That the provisions of this Resolution shall constitute a contract between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and the holder or holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and after the issuance of any of said bonds no change or alteration of any kind in the provisions of this Resolution may be made until all of the bonds have been paid in full as to both principal and interest or funds sufficient therefor shall have been duly provided and deposited for that exclusive purpose at the place of payment thereof.

Section 13. All of the proceeds of such bonds shall be paid to the Treasurer of the University of Kentucky. There shall be paid all expenses incident to the authorization, issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized. The other part of such proceeds shall be used to pay the costs of making capital improvements on the properties herein described and the costs of such Project, including without limiting the generality of the foregoing, attorneys' fees, architects' fees, site development and interest on the bonds during the construction of the Project.

Section 14. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Resolution shall be held to be invalid or ineffective for any reason, the remainder thereof shall remain in full force and effect, it being expressly hereby found and declared that the remainder of this Resolution would have been adopted despite the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision.

Section 15. That all resolutions and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed, and that this Resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption.

Section 16. The site of the said Dormitory Building Project, authorized herein and to be financed through the issuance of the bonds authorized hereby, is described and identified as follows:

A tract of land on Clifton Avenue in Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky, composed of all of lot number 111 and part of lot 110 in Clifton Heights Subdivision (lot number 111 being known as 342 Clifton Avenue, lot 110 being known as 340 Clifton Avenue) and being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the south line of Clifton Avenue and adjacent to Sternberg's property; thence in a northwesterly direction 90 feet more or less with the curve of Clifton Avenue to a point adjacent to Phi Delta Theta; thence turning and running in a southwesterly

direction with a new line with Phi Delta Theta approximately parallel to the Church of Christ line, a distance of 240 feet more or less to a point adjacent to Phi Delta Theta and in the north line of an alley; thence turning and running in a southeasterly direction 78 feet to a pin in the north side of the alley and adjacent to Sternberg's; thence with Sternberg's line in a northeasterly direction 197 feet to the point of beginning; being the property conveyed to the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky by deed dated Dec. 3, 1954, from Charles G. Gormley of record in Deed Book 569, page 452, in the office of the Fayette County Clerk, and being part of the property conveyed to the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky by deed dated March 2, 1956, from Kentucky Epsilon of Phi Delta Theta, of record in Deed Book 596, page 185, in the office of the Fayette County Clerk.

U. Authorization for Sale of Bonds.

President Dickey recommended that the Vice President (Business Administration) be authorized to issue invitation for bids for the sale of bonds, and that he also be authorized to have completed, executed and delivered such bonds as may hereafter be authorized by the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee.

Whereupon J. Stephen Watkins moved that the recommendation be concurred in, that the Vice President (Business Administration) be authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the sale of \$150,000 bond issue, and that the Vice President (Business Administration) be authorized to have completed by the Secretary and Chairman of the Board of Trustees and delivered to the successful purchaser bonds necessary, not to exceed \$150,000 in amount. The motion was duly seconded by Member Robert Martin, and said motion having been duly considered, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky put the question, and upon the roll being called, the following voted Aye: Governor A. B. Chandler, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Ben Butler, Dr. Paul Hall, Wood Hannah, Sr., R. P. Hobson, Robert R. Martin and J. Stephen Watkins. Nay: none. Thereupon, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees declared that said motion had been duly carried and adopted.

V. Approval of Candidates for Degrees.

President Dickey submitted a list of candidates for degrees in the various Colleges for the May Commencement, 1958. He recommended that each be granted the degree to which he is entitled at the Commencement, May 26, 1958, subject to the approval of the University Faculty, at its meeting on May 21, 1958.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the candidates for degrees were approved and the degree to which each is entitled was authorized granted by the President of the University at the Commencement on May 26, 1958.

W. R. P. Hobson Appointed to the Board of Trustees of the Kentucky Research Foundation.

President Dickey advised the Board of Trustees that the term of R. P. Hobson as a member of the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Research Foundation would expire May 21. Thereupon, motion was made, duly seconded and carried, that Mr. R. P. Hobson be appointed to represent the Board of Trustees on the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Research Foundation for a new term.

X. Change-of-Work for Dr. Statie E. Erikson.

President Dickey recommended change-of-work for Dr. Statie E. Erikson, Distinguished Professor, and Home Economist in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics. Doctor Erikson will be 67 years of age September 18. She was appointed to the University on September 1, 1925. She has been continuously employed at the University for a period of 32 years and 10 months. She is entitled to a change-of-work salary of \$3,975.00. President Dickey recommended that her change-of-work assignment be: (1) Continuing work on the several research projects in which she is actively involved; (2) Occasional upper division and graduate level teaching, assignments according to her wishes; (3) Occasional supervision of research by graduate students.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Doctor Erikson was given change-of-work status, effective July 1, 1958, with a salary of \$3,975.00 and with assignment of duties as recommended by President Dickey.

Y. Change-of-Work Status for Albert Jackson Olney.

Professor Albert Jackson Olney, head of the Department of Horticulture, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, reached the age of 70 years on April 15, 1958. He was appointed to the University July 1, 1916, and has been with the University continuously for a period of 42 years. He is entitled to change-of-work salary of \$3,906.00, with the following assignment of duties: To investigate and test recent plant introductions that may be valuable additions to the horticultural plants of Kentucky. (The Division of Plant Introductions of the U.S.D.A. has accumulated and is continuing to receive large collections of plant species from foreign countries. These plants are screened for general potential values and then released to the states for determination of specific adaptability and usefulness.)

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Professor A. J. Olney was given change-of-work, effective July 1, 1958, at a salary of \$3,906.00 annually, with the duties assigned.

Z. Change-of-Work Status for Daniel J. Jones, State Geologist of the Department of Kentucky Geological Survey.

Professor Daniel J. Jones reached his 69th birthday on January 16, 1958. He has been employed continuously at the University for a period of ten years, even though prior to that time his employment was with the State. Professor Jones is entitled to a change-of-work salary of \$1,804.20. President Dickey recommended that Professor Jones' duties should consist of special geologic problems relating to occurrence of oil and gas in Kentucky.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Professor Daniel J. Jones was given change-of-work status, effective February 1, 1959, with an annual salary of \$1,804.20, and duties as recommended by the President.

A-1. Estate of William H. Stockton.

President Dickey reported communication from Woodward, Hobson and Fulton concerning the estate of William H. Stockton, in which the University has an interest.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the University accepted the provisions of the will of William H. Stockton and the attorneys were authorized to proceed accordingly.

B-1. Miss Dorothy Kavanaugh Approved for Appointment.

President Dickey submitted request from Dr. Doris M. Seward for the employment of Miss Dorothy Kavanaugh as receptionist in the office of the Dean of Women. He explained that Miss Kavanaugh was the daughter of George Kavanaugh, current Comptroller of the University, and that the employment would be temporary. He recommended that the appointment be approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the appointment of Miss Dorothy Kavanaugh to employment in the office of the Dean of Women was approved.

Dr. Joseph William Pryor, University Physician and Director of Health Service, 1887-1920; Head, Department of Anatomy and Physiology from 1890 to 1929.

Dean Louis Clifton, Associate Dean of the College of Adult and Extension Education, 1954 to 1957; Director of Department of University Extension, 1935 to 1954; and Acting Director of Extension 1932-33 and 1934-35. He was associated with the University from 1926.

Dean Columbus Rudolph Melcher, Dean of Men, 1914-33; Associate Professor, 1907; Professor, 1911; Head, Department of German, 1916.

Dean Theodore Tolman Jones, Dean of Men, 1933-1947; Acting Dean of the Graduate School, 1932; Acting Dean of Men, 1922; Professor and Head of Department of Ancient Languages, 1909. He came to the University in 1902 as instructor in the Department of Ancient Languages.

Mr. Maury Crutcher, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, 1925-1940.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board of Trustees concurred in the recommendation of the President, and authorized the buildings named as set out above.

F-1. Cooperative Agreement with Berea College.

President Dickey submitted contract for Cooperative Agreement between Berea College and the University of Kentucky for the study of economic and social conditions of the Appalachian Region. He said that the expenses would be borne by a grant from outside funds.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, on President Dickey's recommendation, the Board concurred in the above appointments, reappointments, salary adjustments, leaves of absence, resignations, promotions and other staff changes, and record was ordered made in the minutes.

K-1. Correction of Minutes of Executive Committee of January 24, 1958.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of January 24, 1958, were authorized corrected to reveal that Dr. Aubrey J. Brown, head of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Experiment Station, had accepted appointment as Director of the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland, instead of member of the Board of Governors.

L-1. Resolution on Paducah Land.

President Dickey explained that the Federal Government had several hundred acres of land in the Paducah area, which is surplus to the needs of the Atomic Commission, and that they were willing to transfer the land to the University on a gift basis.

President Dickey further stated that members of the Experiment Station staff had made certain investigations of this property and felt that it could be used for experimental purposes. He submitted the following Resolution and recommended its adoption.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, certain real property owned by the United States, consisting of PARCEL NO. 1, situate in the State of Kentucky, County of McCracken, North of the Woodville Paducah Road, being a part of the Atomic Energy Commission Reservation, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a railroad spike in the center of the Woodville Paducah Road, said beginning point being 300.21 feet east of the intersection of the Woodville Paducah Road with the main entrance road to the A.E.C. WHEREAS, the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station needs said property and can utilize the same for educational (or public health) purposes in accordance with the requirements of said Act and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station shall make application to the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare for and secure the transfer of it of the above-mentioned property for educational (or public health) use upon and subject to such exceptions, reservations, terms, covenants, agreements, conditions and restrictions as the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, or his authorized representatives, may require in connection with the disposal of said property under said Act and the rules and regulations issued pursuant thereto; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Mr. Frank D. Peterson, the Vice-President of Business Administration, be and he is (they are) hereby authorized, for and on behalf of the University of Kentucky, to do and perform any and all acts and things which may be necessary to carry out the foregoing resolution, including the preparing, making, and filing of plans, applications, reports, and other documents the execution, acceptance, delivery, and recordation of agreements, deeds, and other instruments pertaining to the transfer of said property, and the payment of any and all sums necessary on account of the purchase price thereof or on account of fees or costs incurred in connection with the transfer of said property for surveys, title searches, appraisals, recordation of instruments, or escrow costs.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President and authorized adoption of the foregoing Resolution.

M-1. Patterson Will Case.

President Dickey reported that the University received a favorable opinion in the Patterson Will case but that it would be 120 days before the case would become final, if the plaintiff did not appeal the case. He stated that the University was not inclined to do anything until the case was finally approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was approved.

N-1. Commencement Exercises Reported.

President Dickey reported that the Baccalaureate exercises would be held in the Memorial Coliseum at 3:00 p. m. , CST, Sunday, May 25, 1958, and that the 91st Annual Commencement exercises would be held

in Memorial Coliseum at 9:00 a. m. , CST, May 26, 1958. He requested as many of the members of the Board of Trustees to be present as found it convenient to do so.

O-1. Open House for Mr. J. Stephen Watkins' New Office.

President Dickey reported that Mr. J. Stephen Watkins, of J. Stephen Watkins, Consulting Engineers, had announced an open house in the new offices at 446 East High Street, to be held on May 23, 1958.

Members of the Board of Trustees were cordially invited to visit the offices at that time.

P-1. Honorary Degrees Approved.

The Board of Trustees at its meeting on April 1, 1958, approved the granting of honorary degrees to the following persons whose names were withheld from the Minutes in order that the recipients could be contacted before publicity.
