Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, May 25, 1960.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office on the campus of the University at 10:15 a.m., EST, Wednesday, May 25, 1960, with the following members present: Governor Bert T. Combs, Chairman; R. P. Hobson, R. W. Bushart, H. B. Murray, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Harper Gatton, Dr. Paul B. Hall, Clifford E. Smith, Floyd H. Wright, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, J. Stephen Watkins, Robert Hillenmeyer, Aubrey J. Brown and Thomas D. Clark. Absent: William F. Foster, Emerson Beauchamp and Wendell P. Butler. Also present were President Frank G. Dickey, George R. Kavanaugh, Acting Secretary of the Board; and Oliver Clay Maupin, Director of Accounting and Budgetary Control.

A. Temporary Chairman and Acting Secretary.

President Dickey explained that Governor Combs, Chairman of the Board, and Mr. Hobson, Vice Chairman, were expected but had not arrived, and suggested that Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci serve as Acting Chairman pro tem. Dr. Angelucci assumed the chair.

In the absence of Mr. Frank D. Peterson, Secretary of the Board, Mr. George R. Kavanaugh was asked to serve as Acting Secretary.

B. Devotional and Prayer.

Doctor Angelucci called the meeting to order. He then introduced the Rev. E. Ray Jones, pastor of the Gardenside Christian Church, Lexington, present by invitation, who presented a brief, inspiring devotional, concluding with prayer.

C. Oath of Office Taken by New Members.

Dr. Angelucci introduced the four new members of the Board, R.W. Bushart, H.B. Murray, Aubrey J. Brown and Thomas D. Clark. After cordial expressions of welcome by the Acting Chairman and President Dickey, the new members took the oath of office, administered by Mrs. Esther D. McChesney, Notary Public.

(Governor Combs, Chairman, arrived at 10:30 a.m. He expressed his regrets in being delayed by business at the Capitol. Dr. Angelucci, after explaining the status of the Agenda to that time, relinquished the chair to Governor Combs, who presided thereafter.)

(Mr. Hobson, Vice Chairman, arrived about ten minutes later.)

D. Approval of Minutes.

Upon motion by Mr. Watkins, seconded by Mr. Gatton, and carried, the minutes of the Board of Trustees of April 5, 1960, were approved, subject to this correction by Mr. J. S. Watkins, as follows:

The action reported in Section X, page 44, relative to the Budget being submitted ten days in advance of the Board meeting, was likewise to apply to all Financial Reports.

E. Financial Report.

The Financial Report for the fiscal period July 1, 1959 through April 30, 1960, copies of which had previously been sent to the members, was presented by Mr. Clay Maupin, Director of Accounting and Budgetary Control, who offered to make any explanations requested by members of the Board.

Upon motion by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Watkins, the Financial Report was ordered accepted and incorporated in the minutes of this meeting.

I am submitting herewith the Financial Report of the University of Kentucky for the ten months period ended April 30, 1960. This report contains a balance sheet and related financial statements which present a complete financial picture of the period for all funds of the University.

The Current General Fund budgetary operations for the period reflect income realized for educational and general purposes in the amount of \$14,062,114.89 or 98.2% of the budget estimate of \$14,324,221.10. The expenditures, including encumbrances outstanding, amount to \$11,586,601.96. This represents 81.1% of the total Current General Fund Appropriations of \$14,294,177.96.

Upon motion duly made by Dr. Angelucci, seconded by Mr. Gatton, and carried, the members confirmed and approved the purchases and commitments as recorded above.

G. Agreement with Hercules Powder Company.

President Dickey presented an Agreement with the Hercules Powder Company for a grant of \$500.00 to the Department of Entomology and Botany for the period January 1 to December 31, 1960, to aid in experimental work in the effectiveness of taxaphene sprays and granules for control of corn and sorghum insects.

On motion of Mr. Hillenmeyer, seconded by Mr. Watkins, and carried, the Agreement was approved and ordered executed.

H. Contract with U. S. Department of Agriculture Approved.

President Dickey presented a proposed contract between the United States Department of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station of the University of Kentucky, whereby the former would furnish a grant in the amount of \$19,150, for a study of the cost and efficiency of loose-leaf burley tobacco auctions in Kentucky.

Upon motion by Mr. Watkins, seconded by Dr. Angelucci, and carried, the list of candidates was approved, and President Dickey was authorized to confer upon each, at the May Commencement, the degree to which he is entitled.

J. Resolution on Death of Professor E. F. Farquhar.

President Dickey read the following Resolution:

Resolutions on the Death of Edward Franklin Farquhar

Professor of English

Edward Franklin Farquhar was born in Ashley, Pennsylvania, in 1883; he died in Wilmington, Delaware, on March 23, 1960. He received his A.B. and M.A. degrees from Lafayette College in Pennsylvania and later attended Columbia University. In 1909 he came to the University of Kentucky from Purdue University as assistant professor of English and remained a member of the staff until 1953, when he was assigned to non-teaching duties on a change of work status.

Professor Farquhar's interests were many. He was, for example, the author of several articles which appeared in drama and theatre magazines; was the founder and first director of what is now known as the Guignol Theatre; was founder and editor of Letters, one-time literary magazine of the Department of English; and for five summers was a lecturer with the Radcliffe Chautauqua when that organization was in its heyday.

It was as a classroom teacher, however, that Professor Farquhar won an immortality among the many students who took his classes. As a result of his long service -- some forty-four years -- he was one of the few who could claim to have taught three generations of the same family. The children of his early students came to the University with instructions to be sure that they took work with Professor Farquhar -- and once they came under his spell, they continued in his classes until they graduated. When he walked into his classroom -- be the subject Shakespeare or the Bible -students were astonished to observe that frequently he carried no textbook with him. Anything which he considered supremely great in literature he took the pains to memorize. Question him about a great scene in Shakespeare and he would recite the whole passage with a dramatic flair that would make a professional actor envious, and his students listened spellbound. In his classrooms he had all the attributes of an effective teacher. He was full of energy, full of his subject, and full of interest in his students.

Professor Farquhar was not only a great teacher in the classroom, but he was also an institution on the campus. He was frequently the subject of conversations at social gatherings. When a group of students was asked once what they discussed during a long social evening, one of them quickly replied, "Farquhar". His character took on legendary proportions among both students and faculty. Classroom personality episodes were regularly transferred from their origins to him. Any colorful remark, in the course of time, was quickly attributed to Professor Farquhar. Much of this was due to his dynamic energy and drive. He was quoted by many because he seldom phrased

even the humblest platitude in a commonplace manner. Professor Farquhar will live long in the memory of a multitude of students who had the privilege of studying with him. They will remember him as a man with a clean optimistic philosophy of life who spent his whole life and energy so that others might lead more fruitful lives.

Therefore, be it resolved that these resolutions be approved by this Board as an expression of its high regard for him; and be it further resolved that they be spread upon the mimutes of this Board and that a copy of them be sent to his family.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Resolution was ordered spread upon the minutes and a copy sent to members of the family.

K. Two Assignment Contracts.

1. President Dickey presented for approval of the Board two Assignment Contracts. One was to the University of Kentucky by Dr. E. M. Emmert, of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, in regard to Dr. Emmert's invention relative to hormone spray in liquid and powder form, according to specifications filed in the U. S. Patent Office on March 25, 1958, as serial No. 723660. The President explained that there had been a previous assignment made to the University, but that the present one was more inclusive, now applying, to powder as well as liquid form. This Assignment document, executed by Dr. Emmert on April 25, 1960, reads as follows:

ASSIGNMENT

WHEREAS, I, EMERY M. EMMART, a citizen of the United States and a resident of Lexington, in the County of Fayette and State of Kentucky, have made application for Letters Patent of the United States and have described the nature of my invention in the specification of said application, which was signed by me under oath on the 24th day of March, 1958, and filed in the United States Patent Office on the 25th day of March, 1958, as Serial No. 723,660;

AND WHEREAS, the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, having a place of business at Lexington, Kentucky, is desirous of acquiring the entire right, title and interest in and to the aforesaid application and the invention thereof, and in, to and under any and all Letters Patent which may be granted on or as a result thereof in any and all countries:

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) to me in hand paid by said the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-VERSITY OF KENTUCKY, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, I, the said EMERY M. EMMERT, have sold, assigned, transferred and set over, and by these presents do hereby sell, assign, transfer and set over, to said the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, the entire right, title and interest in and to said invention and said application and any and all continuations, divisions and renewals of and substitutes for said application, and in, to and under any and all Letters Patent which may be granted on or as a result thereof in

the United States and any and all other countries, and any reissue and reissues and extensions or extensions of said Letters Patent, the same to be held and enjoyed by said THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, its successors, assigns and legal representatives, to the full end of the term or terms for which said Letters Patent respectively may be granted, reissued or extended as fully and entirely as the same would have been held and enjoyed by me had this assignment, sale and transfer not been made;

AND I hereby covenant that I have the full right to convey the entire interest herein assigned, and that I have not executed and will not execute any agreement in conflict herewith, and I further covenant and agree that I will, at any times, upon request, execute and deliver all such papers as may be necessary or desirable to perfect the title to said invention, said application and said Letters Patent in said the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-VERSITY OF KENTUCKY, its successors, assigns or legal representatives, will communicate to them all facts known to me respecting said invention, said application and said Letters Patent, will testify in any legal proceedings, sign all lawful papers, execute all disclaimers and divisional, continuing, reissue and foreign applications and make all rightful oaths, and generally will do everything possible to aid said the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-VERSITY OF KENTUCKY, its successors, assigns and legal representatives to obtain and enforce for its or their own benefit proper patent protection for said invention in any and all countries, all at the expense, however of said the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, its successors, assigns or legal representatives;

AND I hereby authorize and request the Commissioner of Patents of the United States and any official of any country or countries foreign to the United States whose duty it is to issue patents on applications as aforesaid, to issue to said the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, as assignee of the entire right, title and interest, any and all Letters Patent for said invention, including any and all Letters Patent of the United States which may be issued or granted on or as a result of the application hereinbefore identified, in accordance with the terms of this instrument.

2. The other Assignment document conveyed the same patent rights from the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to the Kentucky Research Foundation, this document worded as follows:

M. Free Transcripts for Air Force Officers.

President Dickey presented the following communication from Colonel R. W. Boughton, head of the Department of Aerospace Science:

30 March 1960

MEMO TO: Dr. Frank D. Peterson
Vice-President Business Administration
University of Kentucky

We have just been advised that Headquarters USAF desires that the Institute of Technology Transcript Repository include the academic transcripts of every newly commissioned Air Force officer. This specifically pertains to each Air Force ROTC graduate.

I have been directed to immediately obtain an official, legible copy of the transcript of each of our graduates since I January 1959 and forward them as soon as possible. For future graduates we are to forward the transcripts as soon as the final data is posted and complete transcripts can be obtained.

The graduates since 1 January of last year are listed on the attached roster and total 44. We anticipate that future annual requirements will approximate 50. It is requested that a policy be established that transcripts required for this purpose be supplied without charge and without nullifying the provision that the student may obtain one copy at no charge.

Your concurrence on this request and the forwarding of the roster to the Registrar for early action would be greatly appreciated.

1 Atch Roster of Graduates

President Dickey stated that he concurred in the recommendation of Colonel Boughton, and explained that his recommendation for free transcripts was limited to student graduates of the Air Force R.O.T.C. curriculum.

Upon motion made by Mr. Watkins, seconded by Dr. Angelucci and carried, the Board approved the recommendation of the President.

N. Leaves Granted to Dean A. D. Kirwan and Dean Doris M. Seward.

President Dickey recommended that Dean A. D. Kirwan, of the Graduate School, be granted a leave of absence from September 1, 1960, through June 30, 1961. The first semester will be a sabbatical leave with half pay, and the second semester, during which time Dean Kirwan will be on the campus for part-time duties will be at half-pay. He explained that Dean Kirwan had received a Guggenheim Fellowship for this period of time to do research. The President further explained that, during the absence of Dean Kirwan, it would be necessary to appoint an acting dean of the Graduate School for the ten months' period, and that he would later make a recommendation for that appointment.

Upon motion by Mr. Gatton, seconded by Mr. Watkins, the recommendation of the President was approved.

President Dickey also presented the request of Dr. Doris M. Seward, Dean of Women, for a leave without pay for the month of June, 1960, to teach in the summer session at Indiana University. He recommended approval of this request.

Upon motion made by Mr. Gatton, seconded by Mr. Watkins, and carried, the recommendation of the President was approved.

O. Office of Director of School Relations Established and Director of School Relations Appointed.

President Dickey recommended establishment of the position of Director of School Relations, with Dr. Elbert W. Ockerman as Director, who would be

responsible to the President and would have duties and responsibilities now contemplated as follows:

- 1. Endeavor to build good will for the University through visits to schools and communities of Kentucky by working with superintendents, principals, senior teachers, librarians, UK alumni, local officials, county agents, civic leaders.
- 2. Discuss UK individually with superior high school seniors and their parents.
- 3. Show University of Kentucky motion pictures and slides before high school, alumni, and other groups; discuss campus life; answer questions about UK.
- 4. Distribute UK informational material to schools, libraries, county agents offices, etc.
- 5. Represent the University at college days sponsored by Kentucky schools.
- 6. Be available at State Fair booth to chat with prospective students and their families.
- 7. Assist at KEA, other school meetings.
- 8. Cooperate in planning monthly advertisements for Kentucky School Journal.
- 9. Serve on staff of Report from UK to Kentucky Schools and proposed Report to Parents.
- 10. Help in planning and coordinating special student days on campus.
- 11. Assist in directing the work of the Committee of 240.
- 12. Set up and direct the operation of a UK Speakers Bureau to serve the schools and communities of Kentucky.
- 13. Assist the University Editor in planning University bulletins and other publications which are used in the University-school relations program. These would include such publications as the campus viewbook, housing brochure, question-and-answer pamphlet, scholarships and awards booklet, general information bulletin, and other informational material designed particularly for prospective students.
- 14. Serve as a consultant to University officials in matters relating to University-school relations: promotional material, programs, meetings, school visitation, campus tours, radio and television programs aimed at young people, UK news and feature items designed especially for high school publications, motion pictures and slides showing campus life, scholarships and awards, part-time work, student loans, speakers for high school events, summer session plans, etc.
- 15. Represent the University as time permits at conferences held throughout the state.

Upon motion by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Watkins, and carried, the office of Director of School Relations was ordered established, with Dr. Elbert W. Ockerman appointed as Director, at a salary of \$9,000 a year.

P. Consultative Services Authorized.

1. President Dickey submitted recommendation from Mr. E. B. Farris, Chief Engineer, that Mr. Seth Taylor, at the request of the Commissioner of Finance, make a survey of the various state buildings in Frankfort and set up, on the basis of a time and motion study, a janitorial program. He stated that the time to be required was indefinite and would be paid for at the rate of \$4.00 per hour. He stated that he concurred in the recommendation.

Upon motion of Mr. Watkins, seconded by Mr. Gatton, and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in.

- 2. President Dickey presented a communication from Mr. George R. Kavanaugh, Associate Business Manager, recommending that Mr. Harvey Sherer be allowed to do consultant work for the Board of Higher Education of the Presbyterian Church of the U.S., in regard to the problems of Lees Junior College at Jackson, Ky. The work would be done on vacation time of Mr. Sherer. The President stated that he concurred in the recommendation, and upon motion of Mr. Hillenmeyer, seconded by Dr. Angelucci, and carried, the Board approved.
- 3. President Dickey read a letter from Dean M. M. White, of the College of Arts and Sciences, recommending that V. P. Kenney be given permission to accept an appointment as consultant to the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies. He stated that this would not interfere with Mr. Kenney's work at the University, and recommended that he be permitted to accept the appointment.

Upon motion of Mr. Watkins, seconded by Dr. Angelucci, and carried, Mr. Kenney was authorized to accept the consultant work at the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies.

Q. Nomenclature of Fees

President Dickey explained that appropriate action by the Board of Trustees was necessary to standardize the nomenclature relating to student fees in order that the bond issues contemplated for the construction of educational buildings would use the same terminology and thus avoid any misunderstanding of the purchasers of such bonds as to the particular student fee pledged for the payment of interest and bond amortization. The Council on Public Higher Education (of Kentucky) adopted a similar action at its meeting on May 9, 1960. Mr. Cornelius W. Grafton, of the firm of Grafton & Fleischer, Attorneys at Law, Louisville, Ky., has recommended the following Resolution to accomplish this purpose for the University of Kentucky:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, at a meeting held on May 9, 1960, the Council on Public Higher Education in Kentucky, acting in accordance with KRS 164.020, adopted a Resolution having reference to the University of Kentucky, Eastern Kentucky State College, Western Kentucky State College, Murray State College, Morehead State College, and Kentucky State College, and determining for each institution the fees to be charged to the students thereof, the same being in a single continuing schedule as to the University, and in two schedules, as to each of the five State Colleges, one of which schedules is applicable currently and until August 31, 1961, and the other to be effective from and after September 1, 1961; so that it is in order for this Board, acting under authority of KRS 164.160, to establish fees in conformity thereto;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-VERSITY OF KENTUCKY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. In accordance with policy established by the Council on Public Higher Education in Kentucky and in order to conform to a pattern of nomenclature of fees derived from various sources and for various purposes which will be uniform for all of the State Institutions of higher education, so that confusion may be avoided in the issuance and public offering and sale, from time to time, of revenue bonds of the various respective institutions, it is hereby determined that the fee which is charged to each student at the beginning of each academic year, semester, or summer session, as an incident to registration and admission (heretofore generally referred to in the proceedings of this Board, in the records of the University, and in the University catalogues as the "incidental fee") is hereby designated and shall hereafter be referred to as the "registration fee" or the "student registration fee"; but in effecting this change of designation, there is no purpose or intention of disturbing in any way any previous pledges or commitments which are applicable to the same, or to any part thereof, and if it shall be deemed necessary or desirable in order to avoid confusion in connection therewith, the new designation may be accompanied parenthetically by the former designation.

Section 2. In order to conform in similar fashion to nomenclature policy established by the Council on Public Higher Education in Kentucky, all miscellaneous fees collected from students separate and apart from the registration fee (such as, for examples only, fees for hospitalization or health insurance, athletic activities, student activities, subscription to campus newspaper, etc.) shall hereafter be designated collectively as "special fees" for the purpose of distinguishing the same clearly and unmistakably from the registration fee.

Section 3. In accordance with the fee schedule established by the Council on Public Higher Education in Kentucky for the University of Kentucky in the aforesaid Resolution adopted on May 9, 1960, and acting under authority of KRS 164.160, the following registration and special fees for resident and non-resident students and for regular academic years, academic semesters, and summer sessions, are hereby established.

Section 4. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and shall supersede all previous actions and proceedings of this Board of Trustees in connection with the matters herein referred to; but this Resolution is adopted in full recognition of all previous contractual obligations and commitments of this Board and of the University, and nothing in this Resolution shall be construed or applied in any manner inconsistent with the same.

After full discussion, Mr. Smith moved that the Resolution be adopted, with the expressed understanding that "special fees" are not to be included now or at any later date as a part of the "registration fee". The motion was seconded by Mr. Watkins and was passed unanimously by the Board.

R. Resolution on Bond Agreement -- Two Small Dormitories.

President Dickey presented Resolution on the \$300,000 bond agreement, relative to two small dormitories, now in process of being approved through channels of the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency. The Resolution follows:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the University has heretofore filed with HHFA an application for a loan in the sum of \$300,000 for financing construction of two small men's dormitories (said application being identified by HHFA as its project KY-15-CH-39 (D))

WHEREAS, the officers of the University are informally advised that said loan is in the advanced stages of consideration and that the tendering by HHFA of its usual "loan agreement" may be anticipated within a short time, but the same is not actually available for signing at this time on behalf of the University, and

WHEREAS, bids for the construction of said dormitory buildings were opened on May 20, 1960, and are advantageous and lower than previous estimates but the same are good for only 30 days and it is important that the said HHFA "loan agreement" be signed as soon as same is received so that construction contract may be executed during such 30 day period, and

WHEREAS, this Board has obtained other loans from HHFA in the past and is familiar with the nature of such instruments and the character of security provisions which are required

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky does hereby resolve that the President of the University, the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of this Board, and the Secretary or Assistant Secretary of this Board be and they are hereby authorized, in their discretion, to sign the anticipated HHFA loan agreement for project KY-15-CH-39 (D) in the sum of \$300,000 when the same is received from HHFA and is found, in their judgment, to be acceptable and as conforming in general terms to the general character of such loan agreements heretofore executed on behalf of the University.

On motion duly made by Mr. Smith and seconded by Mr. Watkins, the Resolution was passed unanimously.

S. Budget for Bureau of Business Research Approved.

President Dickey presented the 1960-61 budget for the Bureau of Business Research, Restricted Account 3234, and stated that, because of projects under consideration, this budget was not sufficiently complete to present as a part of the University Budget at the previous Board meeting. He stated that this departmental budget totaled \$69,996, and recommended that it be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Gatton, seconded by Mr. Wright, and carried, the 1960-61 budget for the Bureau of Business Research was approved as recommended by the President.

T. Off-Campus Center at Somerset, Ky.

President Dickey gave a brief summary of a preliminary report submitted by Dr. A. D. Albright, his letter of April 11, 1960, with attached statistical data, relative to the study of the Somerset area as to the feasibility of a University Center. Other members of the committee appointed by President Dickey for this study were Messrs. Scherago, Shaver, Peterson and Farris. The President stated that, from the study made to this date, the facts and figures compiled indicated that a University center at Somerset would not be feasible according to the criteria previously accepted for such determination.

Governor Combs stated that he would soon appoint a Commission on Public Education to make a thorough study of all phases of public education. He asked President Dickey to share the report of the University Committee when completed with the Commission on Public Education.

Upon motion made, seconded and carried, the preliminary report of the committee on the Somerset study was ordered filed.

President Dickey then commented on the erroneous impression apparently created by certain newspaper accounts about extension classes being considered for Madisonville. He pointed out that this contemplated project at Madisonville was not to be in any sense an off-campus University Center, as some may have been led to believe from certain newspaper reports, but that it related to the possibility of extension courses being offered if the need warranted. He also stated that the study and appraisal of the need for extension classes at Madisonville were planned as matters with Western State College and Murray State College; that the University and the State Colleges did not wish to duplicate or compete in extension course offerings.

U. Spindletop Industrial Research Center.

President Dickey reported that for the past several months consideration has been given to the establishment of an industrial research park and a research institute on part of Spindletop Farm. It was indicated that the research park would be composed of research laboratories owned and operated by private industries with the land on which the buildings would be constructed

to be purchased from the Kentucky Research Foundation through a Research Park Advisory Board. The research institute, which would be constructed from state funds and operated through state appropriations and contract income, would be under the jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees of the University and would become an integral part of the University program.

The proposed project was outlined in some detail and, after thorough discussion, Mr. Smith made a motion that the Board of Trustees go on record as approving the general plan for the industrial research institute and that it be located as near the campus as practicable and, further, that the Chairman of the Board of Trustees consider calling another meeting of the Board, perhaps in June, to deal more specifically with the whole subject of an industrial research center and with particular attention being given to the proper correlation with the agricultural research center of the University.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Wright and adopted unanimously by the Board of Trustees.

V. Revision of Governing Regulations of the University Approved.

President Dickey presented the proposed revision of the "Governing Regulations of the University of October, 1959" as prepared by a committee of which Vice President Leo M. Chamberlain served as chairman, with Mr. R. P. Hobson and Dr. John Kuiper. He asked that the revision be approved, with the understanding that the sections relating to "change-of-work" and "retirement" of staff and faculty would continue to be studied by appointed committee or committees, and that any resulting recommendations for modification of present provisions of the Governing Regulations on these points would be presented to the Board for consideration and appropriate action.

With this understanding, it was moved by Mr. Watkins, seconded by Mr. Gatton, and carried, that the Governing Regulations be approved as recommended by the President.

W. Men's Dormitory No. 6 Named.

President Dickey stated that the new men's dormitory which is scheduled to be occupied in September has not as yet been named. He presented the proposal that this major building be named in honor of James B. and Margaret V. Haggin, friends and benefactors of the University.

Upon recommendation of President Dickey, motion was made by Mr. Hillenmeyer, seconded by Mr. Gatton, and carried that the new dormitory for men, No. 6, be named "Haggin Hall".

X. Budget Adjustments.

President Dickey presented five recommendations on 1960-61 budget adjustments, all to be transfers from Unappropriated Surplus, as follows:

- 1. To Department of Zoology, Account 120-3, for fish cases, amount \$1,000.
- 2. To College of Pharmacy, Account 1330-1, for summer research, amount \$1,000.
- 3. To the Graduate School, Account 1360-1, to provide salary for Acting Dean of the Graduate School for the period from September 1, 1960, through June 30, 1961, amount \$1,300.
- 4. To the Honors Program, Account 180-1, to provide advisers and Colloquium Director, amount \$4,000.
- 5. To College of Education, Account 900-1, to increase salary to conform to standard for distinguished professors, amount \$700.

Upon motion made by Mr. Watkins, seconded by Mr. Gatton and carried, the budget adjustments as listed in the total amount of \$8,000 were approved.

Y. Gifts.

From: Mr. Anton E. Mickelsen, National Council of Churches of Christ, North Plainfield, N. J. --\$60.00.

President Dickey reported that Mr. Anton E. Mickelsen, Budget Analyst for the National Council of Churches of Christ, North Plainfield, N.J., had given to the University checks amounting to \$60.00, to be used as a scholarship for a participant of the College Business Management Institute. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

From: Yeager, Ford & Warren, Certified Public Accountants, Louisville, Ky. -- \$100,00.

President Dickey presented check for \$100.00 from Yeager, Ford and Warren, Louisville, Ky., to cover an award to a senior student in accounting. He stated that this is one item in this firm's regular program of gifts to the University, and recommended that it be accepted.

From: Kentucky Artificial Breeding Association, Louisville, Ky. --\$1,000.00.

President Dickey reported that he had received a check for \$1,000.00 from the Kentucky Artificial Breeding Association, to be used in support of the Experiment Station's artificial breeding research projects in Dairy. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

From: Central States Forestry Experiment Station--\$1,500.00.

President Dickey presented check in the amount of \$1,500.00 from the Central States Forestry Experiment Station for the continuation of cooperative work in conducting forest products marketing research to improve the consumption of wood in home building and furnishing. He stated that this is a continuation of a memorandum of agreement which has been in force with the Forestry Service since 1953, and recommended that the check be accepted.

From: American Cyanamid Company, Princeton, N. J. --\$1,000.00.

President Dickey reported that the American Cyanamid Company had given to the University their check for \$1,000, as payment in full of their grant to the Agricultural Experiment Station, for field evaluation of anthelmintics in cattle, sheep and horses, for the calendar year 1960. He recommended that the grant be accepted.

From: Ciba Pharmaceutical Products, Inc., Summit, N. J. --\$2,000.00.

President Dickey reported that Ciba Pharmaceutical Products, Inc., had given to the University their check in the amount of \$2,000.00 for use in support of the Experiment Station's project, Growth Stimulants for Swine. He recommended acceptance of the gift.

From: Keeneland Foundation, Lexington, Ky. --Check and U.S. Treasury Bonds Amounting to \$102,146.12.

President Dickey reported that Keeneland Foundation had given to the Kentucky Research Foundation their check for \$52, 146.12 and five United States Treasury bonds, 1967-72, each in the amount of \$10,000, the whole gift totaling \$102,146.12. He stated that this gift would be treated as a perpetual endowment and that the income therefrom would be used to support scholarships in the College of Agriculture, and recommended acceptance.

From: Louisville Nurserymen's Association, Louisville, Ky. --\$100.00.

From: Hirsch Brothers & Company, Inc., Louisville, Ky. -- \$900.00.

President Dickey reported that Hirsch Brothers & Company, Inc., had given to the University their check for \$900.00, to be used to support research in the Horticulture Department. He recommended acceptance of the gift.

From: American Steel Foundries, Chicago, Illinois -- \$500.00.

President Dickey reported that American Steel Foundries, Chicago, had given to the University their check for \$500.00, and stated that they wished this sum used by the College of Engineering for the welfare and development of young men interested in mining and metallurgical engineering, over and above the amount allotted by the University for that purpose. He recommended acceptance of the gift.

From: Dr. A. J. Whitehouse, Lexington, Ky. --\$105.00.

President Dickey stated that Dr. A. J. Whitehouse, of Lexington, Ky., had given to the College of Arts and Sciences his usual grant of \$100.00 to the outstanding pre-medical student of the year, the additional \$5.00 to be used to put the student? s name on a plaque in the Funkhouser Building. He explained that Dr. Whitehouse had given this sum for the same purpose for many years, and recommended that it be accepted.

From: Mrs. Jimmy Jones, Lexington, Ky -- One High-Fire Kiln.

President Dickey reported that Mrs. Jimmy Jones, of Lexington, Ky., had given to the University a high-fire kiln with a value of \$385.00. He stated that this kiln is new and will be of obvious value to the Department of Art, and recommended that it be accepted.

From: R.A. Cashman, Webster, Ky. -One-half the Cost of 1,300 White
Leghorn Pullets.

President Dickey informed the Board that Mr. R. A. Cashman of Cashman Leghorn Farms, Webster, Ky., has donated one-half the cost of 1,300 white leghorn pullets to be used for experimental work at the Robinson and Western Kentucky Substations. He stated that these chicks are from excellent breeding stock and the total gift to the University is approximately \$300. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

From: The Oliver Corporation, Columbus, Ohio--Oliver #77-HC Tractor Engine.

President Dickey stated that the Oliver Corporation had donated to the University an Oliver #77-HC tractor engine, with a value of approximately \$200.00. He explained that this engine would be of great value to the Department of Agricultural Engineering, and recommended that it be accepted.

From: The John Deere Plow Company,
Indianapolis, Indiana, Touch-OMatic Hydraulic Unit for Model
40 John Deere Tractor and a
4-Speed Dubuque Tractor Transmission.

President Dickey reported that the John Deere Plow Company had donated to the Department of Agricultural Engineering a Touch-O-Matic hydraulic unit for model 40 John Deere tractor, cut away for demonstration and a 4-speed Dubuque tractor transmission, with a value of approximately \$500.00. He expressed appreciation for this gift and recommended that it be accepted.

Upon motion by Mr. Wakins, seconded by Mr. Hillenmeyer, and carried, the above gifts were ordered accepted.

Z. Property at 347 Lexington Avenue Purchased.

President Dickey recommended that the house and lot at 347 Lexington Avenue be purchased from Mrs. Minnie F. Hardman, for the price of \$14,500. The lot is 41' x 116'. He explained that this property, in the vicinity of the Coliseum, is desirable for the University to own because of future plans of the University. He also suggested that the movable furniture and equipment in the house be purchased at the agreed price of \$266.

Upon motion duly made by Mr. Gatton, seconded by Mr. Hillenmeyer, and carried, the purchase of the house, lot and furniture at 347 Lexington Avenue was approved.

A-1. Extra Fee Approved for Department of Modern Foreign Languages.

President Dickey read the following letter from Dean M. M. White of the College of Arts and Sciences:

May 18, 1960

Dr. Frank G. Dickey, President University of Kentucky Administration Building

Dear President Dickey:

The Department of Modern Foreign Languages recommends that a fee of \$1.00 be charged each student taking beginning courses in the Department for the purpose of buying disks and supplies for the language laboratory. The fee will be used to purchase the disks and tapes that the students themselves use in the language laboratory. I recommend that this laboratory fee of \$1.00 for each student in beginning courses in Modern Foreign Languages be authorized.

President Dickey explained that the new Federal Employees' Health Benefits Act of 1959 is now available to all Cooperative Extension employees in the Agricultural Extension Service, as presented in the following communication from Dean Frank J. Welch, Dean and Director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and the Agricultural Experiment Station:

President Frank G. Dickey University of Kentucky

Dear President Dickey:

I believe I mentioned some time ago that a new Federal Employees? Health Benefits Act of 1959 was available for our Cooperative Extension employees. This is an unusually good health benefits program and one that will add materially to the protection and provide significant benefits to those of our Extension employees who may happen to need it.

Mr. Ruschell attended a national meeting recently and he is well informed in terms of the principles and problems involved.

I am herewith enclosing an agreement form that we will have to execute in order to become a part of this program and I should like to recommend that, if it meets with your approval and the Board's, we be authorized to proceed with the agreement in the formulation of our program so as to make it effective July 1.

If there is any detailed information you would like to have about the program, we, of course, will be glad to provide it for you.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE (Name of the College or University)
AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE AND THE FEDERAL EXTENSION SERVICE, UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FOR ADMINISTERING THE FEDERAL EMPLOYEES'
HEALTH BENEFITS ACT OF 1959 (Public Law 382, 86th Congress)

In order that Federally appointed cooperative extension employees in the State of () may be eligible for coverage under the Federal Employees' Health Benefits Act of 1959, it is agreed that it shall be the joint responsibility of the (Name of College or University) Agricultural Extension Service and the Federal Extension Service to administer the Health Benefits Program provided by the Act and the regulations relating to this subject as prescribed by the United States Civil Service Commission and the United States Department of Agriculture. In addition to the requirements for coverage, the (Name of College or University) Agricultural Extension Service and the Federal Extension Service will establish the necessary administrative and fiscal procedures, specifically:

- I. The Federal Extension Service Agrees to:
 - A. Act as the liaison between the () Extension Service on the one hand and the United States Department of Agriculture and the United States Civil Service Commission on the other in all matters relating to the installation, operation, and review of the Health Benefits Program in the () Extension Service.
 - B. Develop and prescribe such internal administrative regulations, procedures and controls consistent with the Act and regulations of the United States Department of Agriculture and United States Civil Service Commission, as are required for the proper administration of the Health Benefits Program within the State.

- C. Provide technical advice and direct assistance to the (______) State Extension Service in the interpretation and application of the provisions of the Act and regulations and in the installation of the program in the State.
- D. Review and appraise as part of its regular internal audit program the adequacy and effectiveness of the (
 State Extension Service Health Benefits Program administration and determine the degree of compliance with requirements.

II. The (Agricultural Extension Service Agrees:

- A. Health Benefits Certifying Officer. The State Extension Director will designate two members of his staff to serve as health benefits certifying officer and alternate who will be responsible for the functions prescribed in Chapter XII, Section—of the Administrative Handbook for Cooperative Extension Work which has been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Persons so designated must be under Federal appointment and meet other requirements as specified under Chapter XII, Section—.
- B. Registration. (1) Within 31 days after the effective date of this agreement each eligible employee shall file with the State Extension office a properly executed Health Benefits Registration Form, Standard Form 2809, either electing to be enrolled or not to be enrolled in a Health Benefits Plan. (2) Each employee who becomes eligible 31 days after the effective date of this agreement must register within the time periods and in accordance with the regulations prescribed in Chapter XII, Section of the Administrative Handbook for Cooperative Extension Work.
- C. Enrollment. The effective date of enrollment under B.
 (1) above is the first day of the first pay period which begins after the pay period in which the employee's health benefits registration form is received by the State Extension office and in which he has been in pay status. The effective date of other enrollments or changes shall be set in accordance with regulations prescribed in Chapter XII, Section of the Administrative Handbook for Cooperative Extension Work.
- D. Withholdings. Beginning with the effective date of enrollment and during any subsequent pay period of employment in which an eligible employee is enrolled in the Health Benefits Program, the appropriate disbursing or fiscal officer of the State or College or University will withhold from the salary of such employee, as his share of the costs of Health Benefits, the amount applicable to the plan and option of his choice as shown on the employee's Health Benefits Registration Form, Standard Form 2809.

- E. Contributions. For each pay period in which an employee is covered under the Health Benefits Program and for which withholdings have been made, the () Agricultural Extension Service will authorize the appropriate State or College or University fiscal office to and such office shall contribute from Cooperative Extension funds available to the State the amount of the employer's share of the costs, applicable to the plan of the employee's choice as shown on the schedule of such rates published in Chapter XII, Section , of the Administrative Handbook for Cooperative Extension Work.
- F. Disposition of Moneys. Payroll deductions and employer contributions will be forwarded to the United States Civil Service Commission, Bureau of Retirement and Insurance, Washington, D.C., for deposit to the credit of the Federal Employees? Health Benefits Fund by no later than 12 days following the close of the pay period covered by such withholdings and contributions. Checks shall be drawn payable to the United States Civil Service Commission and supported by the original of Standard Form 2812, approved by the Health Benefits certifying officer, a copy of which Standard Form shall be retained in the payroll office and made available for audit by representatives of the Federal Extension Service and other authorized persons.
- G. Accounting. Accumulate employee withholdings and employer contributions data on Forms prescribed by regulations. In the preparation of records and reports there will be shown the uniform classifications and enrollment code numbers as prescribed.
- H. Records. Maintain such personnel and fiscal records as may be prescribed by the Federal Employees' Health Benefits Act of 1959 and regulations and procedures promulgated for administering such Act. These records shall include those which are prescribed by regulation as well as those which may be created by the payrolling office to control and support Health Benefits Program accounting transactions.
- I. Reports. Furnish such reports on prescribed forms as may from time to time be required by the United States Civil Service Commission; by the company or companies underwriting the Health Benefits Program; or by the Federal Extension Service.
