

In Kentucky, a 16-year-old can be put on death row. Since March 1998, lethal injection is the method of death. Two men have been exceuted in Kentucky since the state made new laws concerning the death penalty in the mid-1970s. Currently, Kentucky has 39 men on death row.

"I feel like it is 39 too many. Kentucky is not as violent a state as others are. "Our goal is to get an abolition bill in January when the General Assembly meets," Gallagher said.

With categories like automobiles, antiques, jewelry, sports, toys, and computers, the site stays true to its mission.

ebay has strict rules on what you can and cannot sell, just like

Colombia bombing kills eight

BOGOTA, Colombia — Raising the specter of a bloody era when drug lords sowed terror to avoid extradition to the United States, a car bomb ripped through a Bogota commercial district yesterday, killing at least eight people and injuring 45. The attack came a day after the Supreme Court approved the second handover in a week of a major alleged drug trafficker to the United States - and Colombians feared it was a blunt warning to the government not to go ahead with more than three dozen planned extraditions. U.S. Officials have pressured authorities here to extradite drug kingpins for trial in U.S. courtrooms, where they face much stiffer sentences than in Colombia.

Gore criticizes Bradley's plan

DES MOINES, Iowa — Vice President Al Gore ripped into rival Bill Bradley's "foxhole conversion" on raising the retirement age today and said Bradley's health plan "is contrary to the values of the Democratic Party." Gore departed from his Veteran's Day theme to launch yet another assault on Bradley's health care and Social Security proposals, issues that Gore aides think works well for their side. In the latest exchange, Bradley had said he was opposed to raising the Social Security retirement age from 65 to 70, a position Gore said Bradley had favored as recently as a week ago.

Soldier walks for monument

WASHINGTON — In a scene ripe with symbolism, Army Sgt. Maj. Ronald Bedford yesterdaycompleted a 1,500-mile journey to push for a World War II monument as one of that war's veterans walked alongside, carrying the nation's flag. Bedford, whose father is a World War II veteran, began his trek in Mobile, Ala, on Sept. 2. he 54th anniversary of the official surrender of the Japanese to end World War II, and ended it 71 days later as the nation paused to honor all veterans. Bedford said he hopes it will bring attention and funds for the planned World War II memorial.

WASHINGTON — Criticized for investigations of alleged Chinese nuclear espionage and political contributions, the FBI set up two new divisions yesterday to devote more attention to catching and thwarting terrorists and spies. One

Sensors you can eat

Remote query sensors: Smart, small and developed at UK

UK researchers have developed new query sensors that can be used to assist people suffer-ing from ulcers, monitor food packaging and possibly offer diabetics an alternative treat-

possibly offer diabetics an aiternative treatment.

"The sensors are small, and they are smart," said Jim Boling. Vice Chancellor for Research and Graduate Studies.

Recently, Craig Grimes, an electrical engineering professor in the ASTeCC facility, received the National Science Foundation Facul-

ty Early Career Development Award for his

ty Early Career Development Award for his work with the remote query sensors.

One application of his project is the monitoring of gastric pH and pressure in the form of ticers.

"What we are working on is just small sensors put inside a pill that you swallow. As it goes through your digestive tract, it monitors pH and pressure," Grimes said.

Grimes has also found a way to externally monitor the environmental conditions of food packaging. An example would be when you buy a jug of milk at the grocery store. Thou do you can look at the expiration date, but need you can look at the expiration date, but all could have been exposed to high temperatures.

It could have been exposed to high temperatures."

He said that conveyor belts would be equipped with carbon dioxide sensors that will pick up on any form of contamination before it hit the supermarket shelves.

Another work in-progress for Grimes is his application of the sensors in diabetic patients to test glucose levels.

"Ideally, what we would like to do is insert the sensor under the skin of diabetic patients, Rather than repeatedly removing blood, what they can do is just wave their hand in front of a pick-up coil." Grimes said.

If the patients are in need of insulin, they can skip the blood work and proceed with their shot. The sensors are disposable, and replace the inconveniences and expenses of prior alternatives.

Puzzled aviation experts said the Boeing 767 could have experienced a rapid decompression, forcing the pilot to make an emergency maneuver to get the plane to an altitude where passengers could breathe. Other scenarios being considered by investigators include terrorism, saborations in the New York-to-Cairo flight. A sudden decompression could also have occurred from an explosion of the New York-to-Cairo flight.

"Keith is very poised and mature for a freshman," coach Smith said. "Although he's gotta get that spin move out of his repertoire."


The UK coach was referring to one of Bogans' favorite moves from high school — which could be referred to in college as rather "dipsie-doodle."



Money well spent

Research Challenge Trust Fund improves education, Kentuckians' lives

The Kentucky General Assembly will soon convene, and Gov. Paul Patton, freshly re-elected, already has his eyes on some big programs. The wishlist includes sever-al education items, of which our favorite happens to be more money for universi-

Patton and the General Assembly should reintroduce the Research Challenge Trust Fund. After all, the Kentucky government has mandated UK become a Top 20 public research institution by 2020, so there should be state interest in providing UK with the funds to do so.

Problem is, a preliminary budget scenario done by Patton's people has anticipated revenue falling \$131 million short of normal expenses. Things are going to be tight, the governor says.

Republicans and Democrats disagree on just box tight.

on just how tight. Hopefully they can put aside their differences and settle on a Gen-eral Fund that will provide the education-al institutions of our state with money.

For better or worse, education has been forced to become a competitive play-er in the marketplace. Money measures success on the American scene, so if UK wants to go Top 20, the quickest path will surely be lubed by cash.

Education, after all, is the bedrock of society. Education allows people to make more informed choices. Informed choices help avoid mistakes, like unexpected pregnancies and drug abuse. Informed choices lead to the eradication of social ills, like violence, environmental abuse and preju-

The amount of money a person makes The amount of money a person makes often coincides with the amount of education that person has had. Someone with a degree from a Top 20 public research institution will likely earn a higher salary than a counterpart with a degree from a less prestigious institution. That person will also make more money than someone with no college degree at all.

The more graduates from a Top 20 institution Kentucky has, the higher income per capita the state will have. Income per capita coincides with tax revenue. Assuming that a percentage of UK graduates will remain in Kentucky if they have a degree from a Top 20 institution, the General Fund's woes could be alleviated.

So, investing money from this year's tight budget could fatten future budgets.

Money for Kentucky's universities would help UK become a Top 20 institu-tion, would improve the standard of living for Kentuckians and would benefit the General Fund in the long run.

Gov. Patton, members of the General Assembly, please do what is best for Ken-tucky and reintroduce the Research Challenge Trust Fund.
