I must apologise for having left your letter so long unanswered, but I am not in my office regularly in summer.

I have read your letter with much interest and am very glad to think that your niece is to be a member of our Freshman Class next year. I hope that she is as good a suffragist as her aunt, whom I know by reputation, as does everyone who is interested in the "cause".

I have looked up the application of your niece and of her friend Miss Runyon and find that in order of date their applications for rooms come almost at the end of the Freshman Class list. I wish it were possible for me to do something, but the choice of rooms is one of the most difficult subjects in the whole management of the college, and we have found by experience that the only way to arrange it is to allow entering students to choose in strict order of application. Our Secretary's Office is now sending out the lists of vacant rooms in the various halls of residence to the members of the Freshman Class, and each entering student chooses in the order of her application. It is impossible for us to say now whether there will be any rooms vacant in Pembroke Hall when your niece's turn comes, but if not, will you not tell her from me that our other halls are really just as comfortable and pleasant. After the first year, students have an opportunity to draw for rooms in other halls, so that there would in all probability be a very good chance of getting into Pembroke in her sophomore year.



I beg your pardon for the delay in replying to your letter of the lst, as I have been replacing the receipts in their proper order in the file and note the corrections to be made. in odd moments, as I lay other work aside.

The first one referred to, the erasure of 10.00 is an error and has been replaced.

The second one, that of the absence of an order for 31.30, for Dr. Francis
Woods, is accounted for in this way. On page 40 of the Journal a credit for this
31.30 is entered with the explanation that it was paid by the National, temporarily

Efuly 24, 1908y The fifth mistake, the error of 1.00 in the President's office expense will be corrected by a memorandum on the margin of the page referring to Journal page in the present one where it will be entered and paid to her with present office expenses, if this will be satisfactory. The sixth error, the one in the small journal was in the postage account, and has been altered. THE LAURA BRUCEMLEGACY: We are not running the Bruce Legacy as a separate fund, for all the money derived from this account is turned into the general treasury and used in common with any other money received by it. It is entered as a separate account however on the Ledger, hincorder to trace it readily at any time. I have transferred the 120.00 from the Miscellaneous to the Laura Bruce Bequest as you sug-With the exception of the 1.00 error in the President's office expense, the financial statement for the year was correct as these were posted in the Ledger, and the Bruce receipts all come under the head of Miscellaneous in this record for 1907. This was pretty careless and I shall try to avoid so many, at least, this year. If there is anything about these corrections to which you wish to take exception kindly advise me what it is and how you prefer to have it done. "There seems to be a misunderstanding with regard to our new position. Under the present Laws of Oregon, which taxes even the clothes we wear, the petition, if it carries, cannot debar any woman from voting who desires to do so.

The petition is so worded as to catch that class of men who have always objected to what they deem straight Suffrage; but not to Tax Suffrage; and it certainly has done so, as evidenced by our wonderful success in getting signatures to our petition. In less than a month we have obtained almost ten thousand signatures. I have counted these so I know. In thirty-two hours I obtained seven hundred twenty and only found nine men who objected to our position!

INITIATIVE PETITION

To the HONORABLE F. W. BENSON, Secretary of State for the State of Oregon:

We, the undersigned, citizens and legal voters of the State of Oregon, respectfully demand that the following proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular general election, to be held on the 8th day of November, A.D., 1910 and each for himself says: I have personally signed this petition; I am a legal voter of the State of Oregon; my residence and post office address are correctly written after my name.

TAXPAYERS' SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT.

Section 2 of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended to read as follows: Section 2. In all elections not otherwise provided for by this Constitution, every citizen of the United States, of the age of twentyene years and upwards, who shall have resided in the State during the
six months immediately preceding such election, and every person of foreign birth of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in this State during the six menths immediately preceding such election and shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States one year preceding such election, conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law; it is expressly provided hereby that no citizen who is a taxpeyer shall be denied to vote on account of sex.



KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION J.G. CRABBE, STATE SUPERINTENDENT FRANKFORT October 28, 1908. Miss Laura Clay, Lexington, Ky., Dear Miss Clay:-I have your favor of October 26 and in reply I beg to say that widows with children are not permitted to vote for the election of trustees or on matter of school taxes. The fortieth convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association marks the sixtieth year since the historic convention in Seneca Falls, N. Y., which first formulated women's resigtance to arbitrary limitations of their rights and privileges under law and in government. So effectually has that resistance operated that in four of our States full suffrage has been won; and laws relating to women have been improved in every State.

This spirit spread to foreign lands; and already sev-

eral of them are advanced far beyond our country in the political rights of women. Since we met last in convention women in Norway have won full suffrage; women in Denmark have been granted municipal suffrage; and in Great Britain, where they have long possessed municipal suffrage, women have been made eligible as Mayors and County and Borough Councillors. The heroic struggle for Parliamentary suffrage by the women of Great Aritain is attracting the attention of the world. The immense crowds recently assembled in a demonstration for "Votes for Women" formed the largest public meeting which has

ever been held for any cause.

In our own country during the past year 175,000 women of Michigan appealed for suffrage to its constitutional convention; in Oregon, wemen secured the submission of a constitutional amendment for suffrage to a Referendum vote; and efforts for minor suffrage rights were made in other states. Though no victories were won, the advocates for equal suffrage have never felt more hopeful. Our watchers know that public sentiment is closer in sympathy than ever before. Five hundred associations of men, organized for other purposes, and numbering millions of votors, have officially declared for woman suffrage; only one, - the organized liquor traffic, - has made a record of unremitting hostility to it. The domination of the saloon in politics has wrested many victories from our grasp. wevertheless, men who believe with us have won our cause for us in four States, and have given large favorable minorities wherever our question has been submitted to the electors, all indicating that our allies, men who possess votes, hold the balance of power in every State. We look forward confidently to the day when their power will be exercised to give the right of the ballot to women on equal terms with themselves.

We cordially invite all men and women who faith in the principles of the American government to meet with us, in convention assembled, for the advancement of our people along the lines of

liberty and justice.
