The Executive Committee of the State Equal Franchise League of Maryland has instructed me to write to you concerning the number of delegates the League is entitled to send to the N. A. W. S. A. Convention.

According to the copy of the N.A.W.S.A. Constitution which you enclosed in your letter of Feb. 1, 1912, the persons entitled to vote at the Annual Convention are: "the presidents of auxiliary organ izations, and the Executive Committee members of the State Associations, and one delegate for every one hundred paid-up members, and for every fraction of one hundred." (Article 111. Section 4.)

What is meant by "presidents of auxiliary organizations"? In Section 1 of this same article the term "auxiliary" is used twice. First in reference to associations auxiliary to the National Association. Second in reference to the Societies auxiliary to the State Associations. My dear Miss Clay:-

Just a word in answer to one point among the remarks added to your vote of September 20th. as member of the Executive Committee, and that is about the rent.

We are not paying \$5,000 rent and we never have, except for a very brief period which came at the expiration of Mrs. Belmont's lease and before our new one was made. We are paying \$3,000 rent and toward that receive \$200 from the College League by sub-letting, and we charge off \$1200 of if to the literature department, which is self-maintaining, that is if the value of the unsold stock and the amount of uncollected bills is counted in with the assets.

Counting the entire time that the National Association has had headquarters in New York, the average rent paid per month has been less than that paid by a number of branch headquarters over the country. This is a fact that ought to be known and considered in discussing the affairs of the National. In the long run I think it has proved a real misfortune to the National Association that Mrs. Belmont originally took these headquarters and leased them in her name and sub-let to the National Association and to the New York State Association, for it has seemed to be firmly fixed in the minds of a great many people ever since that the National Association was paying the \$5,000 rent. I hope you will take pains to correct this impression so far as you possibly can.

We are trying to make an arrangement for you here on Sunday evening October 6th. I am selfish enough to want to hear that Sunday evening service myself.

We have sent press notices to every place in the 1st district that you will be with them in October, and Mrs. Knapp, my new assistant secretary, starts out Monday morning and will go to each place to pave the way for your coming. We are especially anxious for the first district it has so many large cities and is so thickly populated. I think I will cut out Lawrence on the 15th and let you go to Kansas City that day so that you may get started home one day earlier. Lawrence will have had Mrs. Colby and Anna Shaw, and should be satisfied with that.
