

July 12, 1913. Mrs. Mary Ware Dennett, New York City. My dear Mrs. Dennett: I am writing to you to ask the National Board to define my position in the State of Louisiana. In a communication from the National Press Superintendent, Miss Byrns, asking if I could make use of press material in the interest of the National constitutional amendment, she made a note that a similar copy had been sent to Mrs. Mechan. Now, the organized suffragists of the State are on record as opposed to this National amendment. The new Woman Suffrage Party, according to statements in its correspondence, have organized solely to secure the submission of a State amendment to be submitted to the voters. Now, if they take up this constitutional amendment, it is going to force us to make a public report upon our position and the reasons why. I do think that until this organization has something more to it than the skeleton upon which it stands, that the National Association might stand by the State Association and allow it the right to define its own policies. If the National is going to interfere with the State work, then it is no wonder that National disruption in the shape of bankruptcy is threatening. Again I ask, as the recognized State President, to give me some idea of the status of this other organization and what my rights and duties are to the National and what the rights and duties are. This national amendment situation shows the cross-purposes at which we are working. Do not think for a mement that I fear this other organization. If it can do better work than we have done; if a hand ful of women can come into a State and dictate in their ignorance of conditions our policies let them do it; but what I want to know is, where our National responsibility begins and ends. In the old days of the National a State had an absolute State right policy, and I do think that your Press Superintendent has certainly taken an unfortunate step in recognizing equally with the National's State organization an organization whose membership consists in pinning on buttons on people and then calling them members. No dues, nothing else but notoriety for a few women. I would appreciate very much an immediate answer to this letter, for upon your reply I shall base my future relation with the National, after due consultation with the Board. Will you also kindly tell me if the National Minutes have been published. If so, I have not received a copy. Very truly yours,


