Resolution presented to the Democratic
Resolution Committee for incorporation
in the party platform.

Resolved:

That we re-affirm the
woman suffrage plank of the National
platform of 1916; and that we pledge
our party to support in the next General
Assembly the submission to the people of
an amendment to the State constitution
granting suffrage to women on the
same terms as to men, and when the
amendment is submitted to support
it at the polls as the party principle.
