⊆CONSTITUTION**∋**

-OF THE-

KENTUCKY WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION.

Adopted October 27, 1881.

PREAMBLE: The undersigned friends of Woman Suffrage, believing that a truly representative State organization is needed for the orderly and efficient prosecution of the Woman Suffrage movement in Kentucky, which shall embody the deliberate action of the local organization, and shall carry with it their united weight, do hereby form the Kentucky Woman Suffrage Association.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Association shall be known as the Kentucky Woman Suffrage Association.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

Its object shall be to concentrate the efforts of all the advocates of Woman Suffrage in Kentucky.

SECTION I. To form auxiliary District, or County Associations in every Congressional District, or County, (where none such now exist), and to cooperate with those already existing, which shall declare themselves auxiliary, the authority of the auxiliary Societies being reorganized in their respective localities, and their plans promoted by every means in our power.

SECT. 2. To hold an annual meeting of delegates for the transaction of business and the election of officers for the ensuing year: also, one or more State Conventions for the advocacy of Woman Suffrage.

SECT. 3. To secure tracts, documents, and other printed matter for the supply of District and local

societies, and individuals at actual cost.

SECT. 4. To prepare and circulate petitions to the State Legislature, or to Constitutional Conventions, in behalf of the legal and political equality of women: to employ lecturers and agents; and to take any measure the Executive Committee may think fit, to forward the objects of the Association.

ARTICLE III.—ORGANIZATION.

SECT. 1. The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice President, Chairman of the Executive Committee, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer, all of whom shall be ex officio members of the Executive Committee.

SECT. 2. Every President of an auxiliary District or County Society shall be ex officio, a Vice Presi-

dent of this Association.

SECT. 3. Every Chairman of the Executive Committee of an auxiliary District, or County Society shall be *ex officio* a member of the Executive Committee of this Association.

SECT. 4. In cases where no auxiliary District or County Association exists, a suitable person may be selected by the annual meeting or by the Executive Committee, as Vice President or member of the Executive Committee from said District or County, to serve until the organization of said District or County Association,

SECT. 5. The Executive Committee may fill all vacancies that may occur prior to the next annual

meeting.

SECT. 6. All officers shall be elected annually at an annual meeting of delegates on the basis of the Congressional representation of the respective Districts, except as above provided.

SECT. 7. No distinction on account of sex shall ever be made in the membership or in the selection

of officers of this Society.

SECT. 8. No money shall be paid by the Treasurer except under such restrictions as the Executive Committee may provide.

SECT. 9. Five members of the Executive Commit-

tee shall constitute a quorum.

SECT. 10. The Chairman shall convene a meeting of the Executive Committee whenever requested to do so by three members of that Committee.

ARTICLE IV.

The Association shall have a branch office in every District or County, in connection with the office of the auxiliary Society therein, and shall have a central office at such place as the Executive Committee may determine.

ARTICLE V.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a vote of three-fifths of the delegates present therein.

ADDITIONAL CLAUSES.

Any person may become a member of the Kentucky Woman Suffrage Association by signing the Constitution and paying the sum of \$1.00 annually, or a life member by paying the sum of \$10, which shall entitle such person to attend the business meetings of delegates and participate in their deliberations.

Honorary members may be appointed by the an-

nual meeting, or by the Executive Committee, in consideration of services rendered.

Members of local societies shall become members of this Association on such terms as the Executive Committee shall determine.






