Resolved, That the next step of mogress demands the application of these principles to women by extending to them the right of suffrage on equal terms with men; and we urge the necessary ochanges in our laws and constitutions to secure this right to be then."

THE RESOLUTION OF THE INTERNATIONAL TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION ADOPTED AT WASHINGTON, D.C. ARE AS FOLLOWS:

Recognizing that industrial evolution has driven women in ever increasing numbers into the trades and professions until they constitute a large percentage of the wage-earners of the country, we believe they should have the same right to vote as men for the better defense of their industrial position.

E19147 NAMT. The name of this Association shall be the ° - - - - - County ----- auxiliary to the State ---ØBJTCT. Its object shall be to advance the industrial, educational and legal rights of women, and to secure suffrage to them by appropriate Stare and National legislation. Mambarship. Any person may become a member by endorsing the constitution. The usual method of admission shall be to sign an enrollment card inscribed: "I believe in the right of suffrage for women, and I hereby enroll myself as a member of the ----- County ---------- Association ". No dues are obligatory, though the treasureris expected to ask at least once a year for voluntary contributions from members for the objects of the Association. Out of these funds ----- cents for State dues and IO cents for National dues for every member represented are to be paid to the State treasurer, representation in the State and National conventions being based on the dues paid. OFFICERS. The officers of the Association shall be a president, a treasurer, a corresponding secretary, a recording secretary, and one or more vice-presidents. The duties of these officersshall be those usually pertaining to their respective offices. MTTINGS. There shall be one meeting each year for the election of officers and the transaction of business. Three members shall constitute a quorum, after due notice has been given to all members, All notices shallbe (or may be) given through the newspaper press. Other meetings may be called at the discretion of the president or of any three of the officers. AMINDMINTS. This constitution may be amended by a majority of the members present at any meeting of which due notice has been given. RULTS OF ORDER. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be a book of reference for alll points not covered by this constitution.

INSTRUCTIONS.

1. Who is required to make a return.—Every domestic and foreign corporation, joint stock company or association, or insurance company with a taxable net income which is required to file a return of net income under the Act of September 8, 1916, as amended by the Act of October 3, 1917, is required to file a return of undistributed net income with the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the return of annual net income is filed.

2. Time of filing return.—The return of undistributed net income must be filed within 60 days after the expiration of six months from the close of the last taxable year (that is, the calendar year, or fiscal year if different from the calendar year).

3. Income subject to tax.—The net income of the last calendar or fiscal year remaining undistributed six months after the end of such year, which is not actually invested in the business, nor retained for employment in the reasonable requirements thereof, nor invested in obligations of the United States issued after september 1, 1917, is subject to a tax at the rate of 10 per cent.

4. Computation of tax for fiscal year, part of which falls in the calendar year 1916.—If the fiscal year which this return is made ended during the calendar year 1917, the tax will be assessed on that portion of the taxable undistributed net income returned for the fiscal year which the period between January 1, 1917, and the end of such fiscal year bears to the whole of such fiscal year.

5. Application of tax at rate of 15 per cent.—If any portion of the net income of the taxable year reported to be retained for employment in the reasonable requirements of the business shall not be so employed, a tax of 15 per cent will be collected thereon.

6. Time of paying tax.—The amount of tax assessed on the undistributed net income of the taxable year is payable to the collector of internal revenue within 10 days after the day of notice and demand of tax assessed. If the tax is not paid within that time a penalty of 5 per cent of the amount the prev
