Hispanic heritage month a celebration for all

Diversity: UK professor says events welcome everyone on campus

This month is a special e for Sheila Rodriguez, a business management junior. And she, like many other hispanics, intend to actively celebrate their heritage this month. The reason — it's National Hispanic Heritage Month Between Sept. 15 and Oct. 15, a period of festivities promoting the immigration of Hispanics to the United States will occur.

National Hispanic Month is fairly new to UK, though it was set aside

years ago by the federal government as a month for recognizing the contributions of Hispanics and Latinos. It was not brought to UK until a few years ago when members of the Latin American Studies Program decided to involve students with the celebration, said Francie Chassen-Lopez, a history professor.

"I think that it's been really well received on campus since we've begun

doing this," Chassen-Lopez said.__

said.

The month of recognition is not limited to Hispanics, though.

"The truth is, National Hispanic Month is important to the nation as a whole," said Chris Pool of the Latin American Studies Program.

Pool said most students who come to events planned during the month are not even Hispanic.

UK is home to a "few hundred" Hispanics, and they come to Lexington because they find it to be a tolerant society. Pool said.
UK students of all cultures are recognizing the diversity in Lexington and on campus.

Community impacts Kentucky

A rapid increase: Hispanic population tripled in last decade; Ky. ranked No. 33

"Explosive" — the word Lexington Mayor Pam Miller used to describe the growth of the Hispanic population in the Bluegrass area over the last 10 years

During these 10 years, the face of Lexington changed as Hispanics settled in the region and began to impact the area as a whole.

Miller said the local government was not prepared for this

"We didn't have enough people who spoke Spanish in our schools, social services agencies, police department and health department," Miller said. 'It really put a stress on our social services.'

Data gathered by the Cardinal Valley Center, a social services institution established by the Lexington government and run by Ibarra, estimates there is more than 80,000 Hispanics living in Kentucky, a difference of more than 20,000 compared to the census. The data also suggests the number is increasing by 20 percent each year.

Barra said he believes the face of the Latino immigrant

Ibarra said he believes the face of the Latino immigrant coming to the state is changing

as fast as Kentucky is changing, due to the impact the population has on the region.

The Hispanic immigrants who come to Kentucky are mostly young single males from Mexico, who are attracted to the region because of the demand for agricultural jobs, Ibarra said. Immigrants usually move to other states when the harvest season is over. Overall, 55 percent of Hispanic immigrants are Mexicans.

Now the immigrant workers are bringing their families and becoming permanent residents in the state. Barra said this means more female immigrants are coming to the region, and the result is a growth of the number of American children born to Hispanic children under 5 in Lexington are U.S. citizens.

Hispanics are also moving from the rural areas to cities like Louisville and Lexington industries.

This is the case for one illegal immigrant, who wished to be known by only his first name. Octavio, a 19-year-old from Veracruz, Mexico, came to Lexington a year ago and returned home to bring his father and two sisters to the United States.

"I want to stay here, work and learn English for the better

"I want to stay here, work and learn English for the better of my family back home," said Octavio, who sat waiting for a job opportunity in one of the rooms at the Cardinal Valley

rooms at the Caruma.
Center.
Octavio's father, Adrian, said one reason for emigrating from Mexico is a lack of jobs for people older than 40.



Some gas stations offering refunds

Some gas stations offering refunds
FRANKFORT - Some gas stations that hiked
prices the day terrorists attacked are offering refunds, Attorney General Ben Chandler an
nounced Monday. About 15 unidentified stations
offering refunds from 467 people who reported gas price increases at about 185 stations
since Sept. 11, when hijacked jetliners crashed
into the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. It
appeared that some stations began raising prices
around 5 pm. on Sept. 11, just as people were getting off work, Chandler said, Pump prices came
down again the next day. Chandler said his staff
made spot checks of more than 130 stations on
Sept. 12. They interviewed operators of 39 stations where prices allegedly reached \$2 or more
per gallon.

Death certificate procedures hurried

LEANNY, N.Y. - Gov. George Pataki signed an executive order Monday that will allow relatives of World Trade Center attack victims to get death certificates within days instead of years. As of Monday, more than 6,400 people were missing and feared dead at the trade center. New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani said lawyers will be available at a family center later this week to help families with the paperwork necessary to obtain death certificates. The executive order is intended to help families file insurance claims, disburse estates and withdraw as much as \$15.000 from bank and money market accounts that are in victims' names.

Stocks rebound, but remain nervous

Stocks rebound, but remain nervous NEW YORK. Stocks surged Monday, carrying the Dow industrials up more than 360 points, as bargain hunters returned to help Wall Street rebound from one of its worst weeks ever. The Dow's advance was its fifth-biggest daily point gain in history. Monday's gainers were spread across nearly all market sectors, an indication that cheaper prices lured buyers to the market rather than lessening fears about how the United States will retaliate for the terror attacks and how long the economy will suffer. Even airline stocks were up. The Dow closed Monday up 368.05, or 45 percent, at 8,803.86, recovering more than a quarter of the 1,369.70 it lost last week in its biggest-ever weekly decline. The Dow was up as much as 413.51 in the last hour Monday.

Mining accident could be worst in history

BROOKWOOD, Ala. -An explosion in a coal mine killed at least three miners and left nine others missing and feared dead, a spokesman said. If the deaths are confirmed, it would be the worst mining accident in the United States since

SAN JOSE, Calif. Security experts are warning of a more pernicious and potentially more damaging kind of attack on computers - the manipulation of content on trusted Web sites. The issue became clear with the recent revelation that a hacker had rather easily entered Yahoo news pages and inserted phony quotes and wrong information on stories. The backer, 20-year-old Adrian Lamo of San Francisco, says he wanted to show Yahoo! Inc. that it needed to fix what he considers a basic mistake in its network setup. Woman shot, truce talks delayed JERUSALEM - Israel-Palestinian truce talks sought by the United States were again put off Monday after a Jewish woman was killed in a shooting attack in the West Bank. Israel also took a step toward sealing itself off from Palestinians militants, closing off a swath of West Bank land, angering Palestinians and drawing U.N. criticism. The United States wants truce talks to put a lid on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict while it concentrates on building an anti-terror coalition in response to the Sept. 11 attacks. But Israel again called off a meeting between Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat and Israeli Foreign Minister Shi mon Peres after the shooting death of the Ziyearold woman in the northern West Bank. U.S. and allies prepare for assault ISLAMABAD, Pakistan. In signs of an intensifying showdown over Afghanistan's refusal to surrender bin Laden, the Taliban drastically curtialed the activities of the remaining United Nations relief workers inside Afghanistan, and neighboring Pakistan pulled its diplomats out of the Afghan capital, Kabul, in what could be a predude to severing diplomatic ties. The Taliban, who control more than 90 percent of Afghan territory, have been battling a northern-based opposition alliance for control of strategic areas north of Kabul. Heavy exchanges of mortar and artillery fire could be heard Monday in the Panishir Valley, 45 miles north of the Afghan capital. The United States and its allies have increased contacts with those forces in preparation for a possible assault on both bin Laden's bases and his Taliban hosts. Bin Laden's latest call to arms came in a statement provided Monday to Qatar Al-Jazeera satellite channel, which the exiled Saudi multimillionaire and accused terroris masternind often uses to communicate with the mastermind often uses to communicate with the outside world

and left my wife and younger sons," he said.
For another illegal Hispanic immigrant, Rosi, 63, of
Guatemala, the situation is not that different. She came with
her son's family, running from the poverty and conflict preva-

lent in her country.

"In Guatemala we didn't have enough to eat, and the vioence was too much," she said. "We had to leave the country,
even though I will return someday."

Like Octavio and Rosi, the center estimates nearly 85 percent of Latino immigrants in the state are undocumented,
meaning they either have lapsed visas or illegally entered the
country.

Along with the growing population, the perception of Hispanic immigrants in the area varies greatly.

Pat Freibert, a former Republican member of the Kentucky House of Representatives, teaches English to immigrant workers at Lexington's Saint Paul's Church. Freibert said she believes in restricting the number of immigrants coming to the country, but at the same time, she thinks they are important to the area.

"These people need help, everybody benefits to integrate them to society," she said. "They are not going away."

Fred Nesler, a Democratic member of the Kentucky House of Representatives, recently implemented a resolution to improve the performance of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in the area.

Nesler said he doesn't blame Hispanics who come here looking for a better life but said he believes "If you go to a country, you get there according to the laws of that country ... you just don't do whatever you want."

Though some oppose immigrants in the area, the Lexington government has taken steps to implement a series of programs to respond to the needs of the Hispanic community.

One, the Lexington Police exchange program with Morelia, Mexico, allows Lexington policemen to travel to Mexico and learn not only the language but also the culture of the neighborring country.

Lexington's Chief of Police Anthany Beatty said the ex-

"We want to serve and protect everybody in Lexington."

New student administration spends \$17,000 renovating old office in the Student Center

"There is a new day dawning on SG. This budget, in a sense,

reflects that."

This statement by Senator at-Large Joe Impellizzeri couldn't be truer. Unfortunately for UK students, this new day is not

very promising.

Last week Student Government approved the budget for the current school year by a vote of 21-2. The margin of victory shows this new day includes a united Student Government. The budget itself shows that this united SG cares little about the students it is supposed to represent. Students pay a \$4.25 fee every semester, all of

posed to represent. Students pay a \$4.25 fee every semester, all of which goes toward SG's \$200,000 annual budget.

The budget includes \$17,000 for the remodeling of the SG office. It also features an increase in the allotment for the executive support staff, consisting primarily of friends of the president and sorority sisters of the vice president, from \$12,000 to \$27,700. Meanwhile, the money SG gives out in scholarships was increased by a meager \$1,500.

SG President Tim Robinson said the SG's mission is one of unity.

service and advocacy for the students. So, how does \$17,000 worth of paint and furniture achieve any of these goals?

It is true the executive support staff quadrupled in size since last year, but is this behemoth staff really necessary? Perhaps Robinson could have only doubled the size of the staff and saved a few thousand dollars of the students' money

The money SG could have saved by enduring a less than perfect office and creating a smaller, more efficient staff could have been better spent. It could have gone toward scholarships, computers or even more activities like the Gator Roast. If SG truly stands behind its budget, let students see exactly where each penny is going. Using its new publication Campus Wildcat or its Web site, SG could list remodeling purchases and the salary of each executive staff member.

Robinson and the rest of Student Government should remember

their primary goal is to help students, and this is best accomplished by using money for students, not by financing new carpet or a

SG's decision to give the con-SG's decision to give the contract to FarmHouse is questionable. It just doesn't make much sense. Both FarmHouse and Air Force ROTC put in bids of \$10,000, but the contract was awarded to the fraternity.

So, the simple decision of giving the job to the lowest bidder didn't apply here. It follows

der didn't apply here. It follows that each organization's ability and potential to run the pro-gram had to be examined and analyzed in order to make the choice

Let's see. Air Force ROTC had nine years experience in escorting students home, Farmhouse had, um, zero. Air Force ROTC cadets are required to

appointed by Robinson voted unanimously to give the contract to FarmHouse.

Robinson said he supported

Another Jordan comeback, with Washington this time

Head Wizard: Decision expected from MJ by today on whether he will play

WASHINGTON — For weeks, the question hasn't been whether Michael Jordan will return, but rather what it will be like when he does.

The official, anticlimactic "I'm back" was due via fax this week, possibly as early as Monday, Jordan all but confirmed two weeks ago that he will play for the Washington Wizards this season, and Monday's Washington Post, citing a league source with knowledge of the situation, reported that he has erased any final twinge of uncertainty about ending his three-year retirement.

But answering that question only begs a few more.

Can Jordan keep his job as the Wizards' president of basket-ball operations? The Poets story, citing its source, said he must give up that position. Even so, who will be in charge when he's on the court — Jordan or his hand-picked coach, Doug Collines? How will Jordan's teammates handle sharing the court with him? Will any of them dare not pass the ball to someone who has the influence to trade or cut them?

How much will Jordan play? He's 88 and last played an NBA

How much will Jordan play? He's 38 and last played an NBA game in June 1986. Over the last few months, he's had two cracked ribs, back spasms, knee tendinitis and hamstring problems — and that's just from pickup games against invited players.


Will his body hold up for an 82-game schedule, or will he follow he lead of the NHL's comeback kid, Mario Lemieux, and sit out selected games and handle losing? He couldn't stand it as a front office executive, having thrown tirades in front of the television while watching his woeful Wizards go 19-63 last season. Conventional wisdom says a healthy Jordan on the court just might get the Wizards to 500. He never missed the playoffs in 13 seasons as a player with the Chicago Bulls, while the Wizards haven't won a playoff game in 13 years.

Jordan has been very cagey about his comeback plans — he even asked for pledges of secrecy from the players in his pickup games — but the general outline of his return is clear.

A year or so ago, Jordan started working out because he found himself with a middle-age belly. His weight reached 242 pounds — 30 pounds above his playing weight in Chicago. His initial basket-ball workouts were a last-resort weight-loss plan after he found the treadmill boring.

As the months passed, the workouts intensified. Jordan's focus changed and, despite his denials, he began thinking he could indeed play again. He hired Collins, who coached Jordan in Chicago in the 1980s. Inspired in part by Lemieux, Jordan started holding intense pickup camps at a Chicago gaym with NBA-caliber tal-ent. The injuries slowed him down but didn't deter him.

Last spring, Jordan said: "If I had to answer today, I'm 99-9 percent surre I won't play again." At another point, he said he would have to grade himself a 9 on a scale of 1-0-10 in order to play again, the net

required by the NBA if he plays, is prepared and awaiting his signature. The Wizards' staff is ready to put him on the cover of the media guide. The NBA got overeager and briefly listed Jordan as a player on the Wizards' who site last week.
Finally, there's a question only Jordan can answer: Why?
Why come back and risk his legacy? Why not find another means to vent his extremely competitive nature?
"It's definitely the challenge," Jordan said in April. "Tm not coming back for the glory, I think I left the game with that, but the challenge is what I truly love."
On Sept. 10, Jordan was more eloquent as he spoke following a pickup game in Chicago.

The next day, the Jordan saga was displaced from the front pages by the terrorist attacks, prompting him to shelve plans for a news conference to announce his comeback. His next chance to answer the "why" question comes Oct. 1, the team's pre-camp media day.
