

November 4, 1918

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The Senate met in the Physics Lecture Room, Monday November 4, at 3:45, President McVey presiding.

Minutes of the Council for September 13, 20, 27, October 4, 11 and 21, and November 1 were read and approved.

President McVey reported that he had received a telegram from the War Department, authorizing the University to admit students to the S.A.T.C. who do not have the prescribed number of high school units, but who, in the judgement of the committee, seemed competent to pursue one of the programs prescribed for the S.A.T.C..

On motion the Senate approved the recommendation of the Council which is as follows: "That students with thirteen units who desired admission to the S.A.T.C. be admitted to the University without examination."

The Senate approved the recommendation of the Council in reference to the system of grading, which is as follows:

"That all grades at the end of the term be reported by letters, according to our regular system, and that the Registrar ask at the end of each month for a special report on S.A.T.C. students on the centigrade scale."

The President announced that the constitution provided for the election annually of two members of the Senate to membership in the University Council. The members selected to represent the Senate were Dr. F. E. Tuttle and Professor E. S. Good.

The following resolution presented by Dr. Boyd for the College of Arts and Science, was approved:

"The Faculty of the College of Arts and Science met September 25 to consider the matter of granting credits for work in musical organizations. After a statement by Professor Lampert and a full discussion the following motion was made and carried: ✓

One half credit per semester will be allowed for satisfactory work done in the band, orchestra and the glee club under the following conditions:

1. Students to be entitled to this credit must pass satisfactory entrance examinations in music.
2. No student will be allowed to participate in more than two of the organizations at one time.
3. No student will be allowed to gain more than eight credits for such work during his college course.

The following courses recommended by the Dean of the College of Arts and Science were approved:

Course for pre-medical students. This course will conform closely to the program suggested by the Committee on Education and Special Training of the War Department. It consists

of 4 terms of 12 weeks each, the first term's work being as follows:

Course in Industrial Chemistry. This course will conform closely to the program suggested by the Committee on Education and Special Training of the War Department. It consists of 8 terms of 12 weeks each, the first term's work being as follows:
