has been been supported by the community. Students majoring in the new sustainable agriculture program will have the opportunity to participate in an experiential learning project that promotes a system of farming known as community-supported agriculture) is a partnership that consumers and farmers enter into with each other," said Ben Abell, a community-supported agriculture manager at UK. "Basically a customer pays a farmer a membership fee to be entitled to a seasons' worth of produce, a share of that farm."

Students in the major will apprentice on UK-owned farms, worting in the gardens to grow food but also to learn about the economic aspects of farming, said Mark Williams, professor of horticulture.

and director of the sustainable agriculture program.
"Farming is not just something you learn about in class," said Jessica Ballard, a student who is participating in the new major.
As part of the project, UK students, faculty and staff can pay between \$400 and \$550 to receive fresh produce for 26 weeks during Kentucky's growing season.
Community-supported agriculture is a new way of thinking about farming, Abell said.
"If a farm has an excellent season, where everything is bountiful, you get an excellent share," Abell said. "If the farm goes through some tought times in that season — there's a drought, there's a flood, there's a bad pest infestation — all these things affect the farmer's harvest, and that trickles down to (the consumers)."
The shares vary from month to month depending on what is in season, Williams said, but UK consumers will get tomatoes, com, counters will get tomatoes, combeans, potatoes, hot peppers, garlic, 25 cents.

"It's learning and being a part of a system that doesn't put the farmer at a disadvantage." Williams said. "It's about creating a community around the farm. This way, you're not taking out loans each year, and the shareholders get crops grown for taste and for quality, not for shipping."

The community program will be about more than just how to farm—it will look into the relationship of the consumer to the farmer, which other agriculture programs don't do, "Basically, the idea is that customers share in the hardships along with the farmer, that the farmer isn't left high and dry if he has a bad year," Abell said. "It means he has a community of support that surrounds him."

MEXICO CITY — Fueled by the rising popularity of soft drinks and fast-risod resturants. Mexico has become the second fattest nation in the world. Mexican health officials say it could supass the U.S. as the most obese courry within 10 years if trends continue.

More than 71 percent of Mexican momen and 66 percent of Mexican men are overweight, according to the latest national surveys.

With diabetes now Mexico's leading cause of death, activists and leaders hope to renew efforts to crack down on junk food and other fatty-food consumption and encourage critizens to exercise more. But it will be a tough batter, as industry groups are expected to put up a fight.

No one knows better the country's affection for fattening foods than Lidia Garcia Garduno, who's run a fruit stand in central Mexico City for the past 10 years.

The Kernel editorial board sat down with SG presidential candidate Tyler Montell to talk about his candidacy and platform. The interview is available in full below. See tomorrow's Kernel for the editorial board's take on the presidential race.

A The reason that I'm running for SG president is that I've been involved in this organization own for two years. I think the SG president wears two hats, along with the vice president. But the other role for the president is the student body president. I've seen Jonah and Nick do that very well, working with communities and state leaders too. Q. What skills or qualities are you going to bring to the presidency?

A. First and foremost is communication. One thing I value the most at UK is the relationships I've made with different communities and groups. Lop bring that shill its and groups. Lop bring that shill its. made with different communities and groups. I can bring that ability to communicate to SG. The internal experience in SG is invaluable too. Not everyone can run for SG president — one has to be familiar with the channels of how to get things done in the organization.

In your other leadership positions on campus, what's the most significant thing you've done for the student body?

student body?

A -Helping campus organizations. For instance, a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha had the vision to spread Pink Goes Global on campus and asked SG for help. It was great to help plan the event and carry it out. Just being able to work with so may different organizations that wouldn't be able to fund their programs without SG was one of the things I am most proud of. It's not that SG is changing everyone's life, it's more that SG is helping different organizations to make a difference in the lives of students.

Q.If you're elected as SG president, what will be your first priority in office?

A. The first priority is represent-ing students, whether it's rep A ing students, whether it's representing students in neighborhood associations on off-campus housing, on Board of Insates, on the university Staff Senate and (to) state lawmakers, or even represent ing students inside SG— inside the SG Senate and during student sinds 6S— inside the SG Senate and during staff meetings. Our main focus for next year is to take the need of the student body and tache 1 face and a voice to it, whether it's talking to President (tee) flood, administrators or outside of the university.

Q. What, if anything, would how Sc operates?

A. There is something very tangines we can work with right now. This year, we ran out of money in the Senate to fund campus organizations through their Apriprints and Revenue (committee). I've seen the value of the funding and how much these organizations need the funds. Funding student organizations is another important role of SG, and Grant and I have talked about putting substantially more morey into the available funding so organizations can work toward the organizations can work toward the changes they want to see. And we are proposing a Senate accountability act that would ensure that students know what their senators are

committed to doing. We want to show students what we are doing and that we are doing things for them, and that they are in fact in

The student member on the Board of Trustees often seems like more of a symbol than someone with actual influence. How do you plan to increase the student the board?

the board?

A Everyone I have talked to doesn't seem to believe that the student representative is just a symbol. It's more about building relationships with individual board members, not just being ready for the meetings and saying a few things during the meetings.

Q: What will be your primary
priorities on the board?
A Issues come up that are unforeseen, being that it is only
March. But the board has the final
say over tuition. We have to keep
the tuition at a manageable rate,
not because it sounds good in an
interview, but this is the future of
our state, and I think the board realizes how important it is for students to get affordable education in
the state. And that's our priority.

•What will you do to increase diversity, both within SG and on campus as a whole?

whole?

A I feel like students have heard so much about the diversity problem at UK. Diversity is not a problem — the problem is that we have too little of it at the university. UK has taken some proactive steps to address that, such as hiring Dr. (Aludy' 3.L.). Jackson, to create a to address that, such as hiring Dr. (Judy) "J.J." Jackson, to create a campus that is welcoming to all students. It's really a two-step thing: One is to bring in more diver-sity to campus; but further, we can illuminate and appreciate the diver-sity we already have. We want to reward innovative programs for the purpose of educating students of diversity. We want to help the organizations to fund these events and to promote them.

Even though your presidency won't be during a budget session, how do you plan to advocate for UK students with the General

students with the General Assembly?

A Nick started this year by schoduling meetings with each legislator, and I went to some of these meeting. We really set a good four-felion to give UK students faces and voices among the legislators, but I think we can do a lot more next year. We can get students swith their local legislators and show that, as constituents, these students interests are relevant. This will show state senants; and representatives that students should be a priority, not just because of their votes, but because they are the future of the commonwealth.


Q:You mentioned earlier that the Appropriations and Revenue committee ran out of funds for student organizations midway through this semester. What changes would you push for in the funding process?

funding process?

A. We are already doing things to reform the way we fund organizations. These measures will limit the amount of money an organization can receive from SS, but from firsthand experience, I can say that it's difficult for senators to see these groups that need funding when there is none left available. So more than that, we want to put more money there for students to be eligible to receive.

Q. How do you think being the only candidate on the ballot will affect students' perceptions of your presidency?

A. I hope that people see that Grant and I have a real plan. But the real benefit to students of having only one ticket running is that we've been really proactive in the transition. We have a month to work on what we would do as president and vice president in stead of focusing on the race. We want to call our plan 'Campus 365' — where we want to be a year from now, where we want to leave

this campus when Grant and I are finished. I hope students see that while there are not that many choices at the top of the ballot, the choice they do have is a good one and a legitimate one.

Q.What does the lack of other candidates say about SG's efforts to get more students involved?

A. Nick and his staff have gone or great lengths to make sure that students know how to get involved and how to run for office. Grant and I do have 14 senators running on our ticket, if you will, but there are 11 senators who aren't with us; they are running in dependently, if you will. And I think that shows that the process has opened up for students who really want to get involved. I don't hink it's a closed-door policy all; I think it's a sopen now as ever.

Q. Turnout has been low in past SG elections, even highly competitive ones. This year, with only one candidate running for president, why should students come out and
