Dear Judge:-

About two weeks ago I was in Paintsville and while there had a nice visit with Jim Turner. At that time he told me that he had attended four Lincoln dinners within the week; that it was his understanding that Harry Ramey would be a candidate for judge of the Court of Appeals, if he could get the nomination without a contest, but otherwise not; that in Louisville it was the understanding that Judge Sampson would be a candidate. I have seen Harry on two different days this week, and I get the information through the gentlemen whom I mentioned to you as considering being a democratic candidate that Harry stated to him that he was going to be a candidate, with or without opposition. Our friend threw up his hands and told me he would not be a candidate after I stated to him the conditions in the Cumberland Valley.

In my judgment, you can win over either Harry or Judge Sampson, and your work there has been of such an outstanding na-

ture that you should without question be re-elected.

It occurs to me that if Harry and Judge Sampson are in a contest for the republican nomination in August, and if you have no democratic opposition, that it would probably be easier to win over both of them in the primary, when they will be dividing the vote between them, than it would be in November, to fight either of them as the republican nominee; in other words, it might be a good idea for you to file reasonably early for the democratic nomination, and then at the last minute to file for the republican nomination as well. Of course, I do not give much attention to politics, and before deciding on such a course you should consider it well and secure the advice and better judgment than mine of such friends as Dan Talbott, Bob Humphreys, Zack Justice, Herb Smith, and others.

I was in Pikeville last night and had a nice visit with Zack for about one and one half hours, during which time your

interests were discussed at length.
