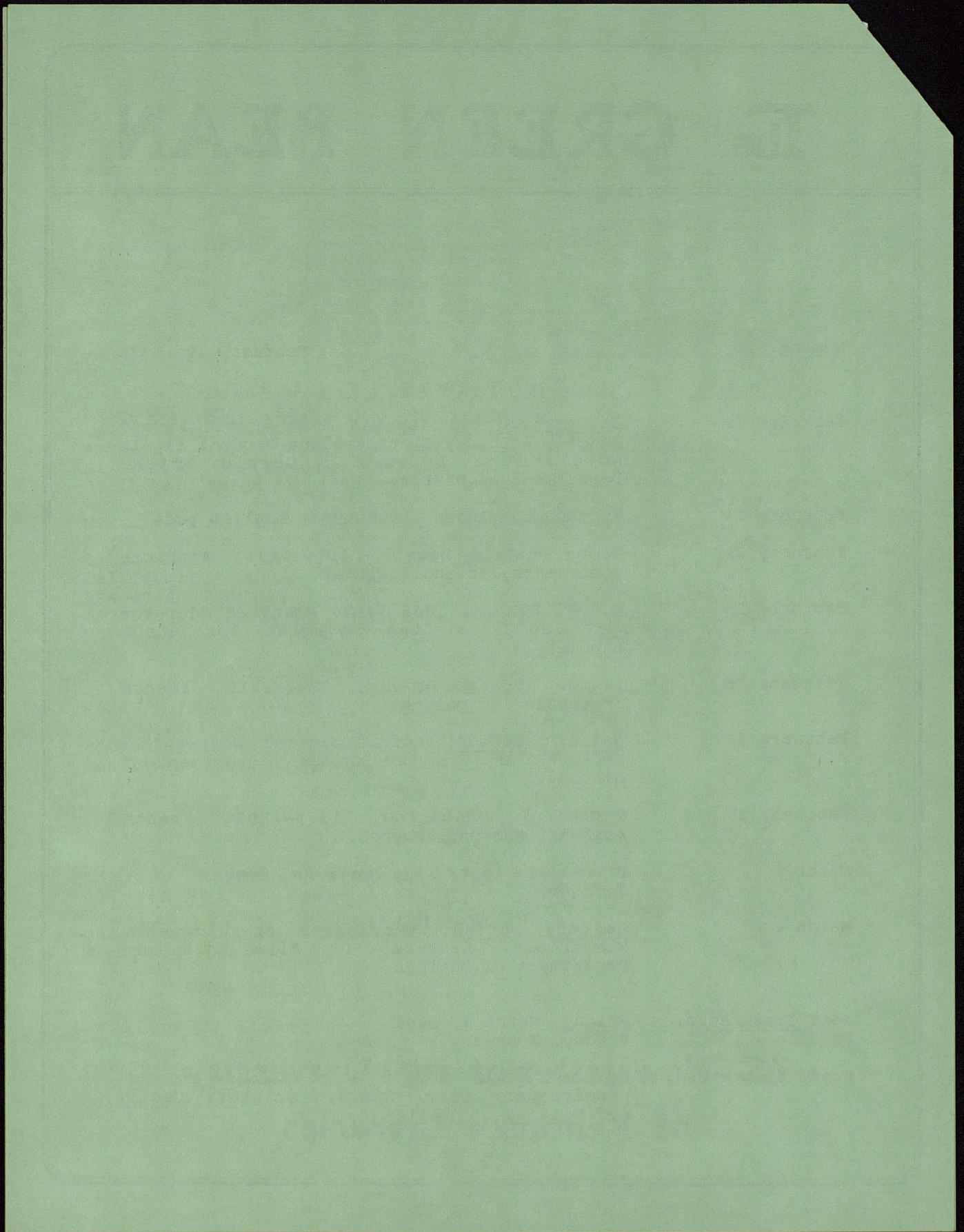

1989-90 NEH FELLOWSHIPS

May 1, 1988 is the deadline for applications for 1989-90 National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships. The fellowships are available for faculty and staff members of colleges and universities as well as for independent scholars in the humanities.

The programs are designed to support not only those who have made significant contributions to the humanities, but also those who are at the beginning of their careers.

The fellowships are for 6 to 12 months with a maximum stipend of \$27,500.

RESEARCH GRANTS FROM CLR

The Council on Library Resources currently has two grant programs of interest to librarians, research grants and cooperative research grants.

The research grants program is meant to encourage exploration of the issues and questions raised by a changing information structure, with special attention to the needs of faculty and students and the services and responsibilities of academic and research libraries.

Individuals interested in such a grant should send an informal letter to CLR, 1785 Massachusetts Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036, describing the purpose of methods proposed for projected work, along with a summary of academic and professional credentials and a careful estimate of costs and funding requirements.

In addition to these grants, under the Cooperative Research Program, CLR makes a limited number of grants each year to support research projects proposed jointly by librarians and members of faculties in library science, or, when appropriate, other pertinent disciplines. The purpose is threefold: to stimulate productive communication between teaching faculty and librarians; to encourage librarians to develop more fully their research

skills; and to increase the quantity and improve the quality of research and analytical studies related to library operations.

Grants are given for carefully developed proposals that exhibit an imaginative approach to solving problems or analyzing subjects of current interest in libraries.
