Generous gift given

Donation goes to scholarships

Students majoring in Business and Economics can figure this one out — a million dollars in scholarship money will soon be

directed to them. UK announced Tuesday a one million dollar donation from

million dollar donation from Charles Haywood, a former dean and professor of finance, and his wife, Judith Haywood. The donation will establish the Charles F. Haywood and Judith Milburn Haywood Schol-arship Program, which will ben-efit Kentucky residents major-

ing in Business and Economics at UK's Carol Martin Gatton Col-

lege of Business and Economics.

A portion of the scholarship money will also benefit business students in UK's Community College System who transfer to the Business and Economics

Department.

The gift comes in the form of a bequest funded from a program established by the Pittston Company for its board of directors,

on which Haywood serves.

The company insures each director for \$1.1 million with \$100,000 directed to the Pittston Foundation upon the director's

The remaining \$1 million is paid to educational and/or charitable institutions of the director's choice in 10 annual installments.

The Haywoods are not new-

comers to the art of giving: Charles Haywood was a key adviser in creating the Community College program under Governor Combs and has been an adviser to every governor since 1959.

"Charles has a history of giving not only to our college but to the University of Kentucky," Dean Richard Furst said at Tues-

Dean Richard Furst said at lues-day's new conference. "This is a wonderful celebration, and I am happy to be a part of it." Judith Haywood established a fund in 1989 in her husband's honor, to which he and some of his former students have contributed

"I think the University of Kentucky is doing more than any other educational institution in Kentucky to provide education

STATE Harrelson touts hemp writing contest

SIMPSONVILLE, Ky.— Marijuana papers are a no no. Hemp papers? That's a different story. Actor and environmentalist Woody Harrelson has launched a statewide essay contest on the sub-

ject.

He wants children to write about hemp, its history and the products that can come from it.

Harrelson is offering \$500 for first place, \$300 for second place and \$150 for third in each of three age groups: fourth through sixth grade, seventh through ninth and 10th through 12th.

The actor created quite a stir last month when he visited a fifth-grade class at Simpsonville Elementary on behalf of industrial hemp.

He's also scheduled for trial in Lee County in October for planting four hemp seeds — a stunt

October for planting four hemp seeds — a stunt meant to challenge the law that makes no distinction between industrial hemp and its psychoactive

tion between industrial nemp and its psychoacuve cousin, marijuana.

Some public officials have criticized Harrelson and the teacher who invited him to the school for confusing kids about drugs.

But Harrelson is a staunch advocate of growing industrial hemp as an alternative to cutting down old-growth forests to produce paper.





It didn't start out very promising, as Kenny Lofton singled off John Smoltz to open the game. But Lofton turned out to be the only American Leaguer who got more than one hit, going 2-for-3. In the second, Smoltz surren-

dered a leadoff double to Mo Vaughn, the only extra base hit by the AL.

"The first two innings, I did-n't like the way I started by giv-ing up a single and a double, but after that, it was great," said

"My last session on the side, I was throwing more stiff-wrist-ed," he said. "I'm a loose-type pitcher and my fastball tends to get a little hop on it, and I cor-rected it."

Smoltz was the only NL

Simoltz was the only NL pitcher to go more than an inning. After he was replaced by Kevin Brown in the third, man-ager Bobby Cox brought in a new arm every inning, trotting out two in the ninth.

Once the shutout had gathered some steam, the NL pitchers said each worked hard to make sure they would not be the one to surrender the first run.

"By the time I got in there, it was 6-0 and I definitely didn't want them to score," said Todd Worrell, who pitched the eighth. "It was kind of catching and we were all cheering for each other." to the type of pitching we have in the NL."

Second, I support President Clinton's
"America's Hope Scholarship" tax cut - a
guarantee of two years of tuition at a
community college for any student who

earns a B average. This new proposal provides all students with a \$1500 refundable tax credit for full-time tuition in their first two years. The credit could also be used as a down payment or tuition at more expensive four-year schools.

But we all know that our education doesn't begin at 18. Elementary

doesn't begin at 18. Elementary and high school education must be improved, too, if young people are to be suitably prepared for future

study or training.

530 billion in 2002. The federal government's obliga-tion to higher education does not end with the receipt of financial aid though. The Balanced Budget Act mandates that the U.S. Department of Education provide students with guaranteed loans the same kind of flexible repayment choices avalibable to those with direct loans. Our plan allows students to deduct up to \$500 from their taxes yearly for interest paid

on college loans. Getting our fiscal house in order. Encouraging savings and continued fund ing of student loan programs form but two legs of the higher education stool. The third leg is perhaps the most impor-tant. We must balance our federal bud-

While the arguments between the political parties in Washington might seem at times to be an annoying distraction, they are over important, fundamen--and differences of opinion.

I believe our children's future are being mortgaged if we do not immediately control this behemoth we call the federal government. Fifteen percent of every dollar the federal government spends goes just to servicing the national debt. This cannot go on.

This cannot go on.

We must demonstrate the courage our constituents expect of us and tackle this problem head-on. A balanced federal budget will create hundreds of new jobs, spur investement an economic growth, and lower interest ratews by nearly two percent. Lower interest rates will be especially important to those of you who hold student loans.

The tasks before us are not easy. But, just like the degree you will someday hold, it's worth it.

It's about time.

Finally, after years of infla-tion, the federal government has acknowledged the need for the minimum wage to be increased.

In a recent 74-24 vote, the Senate approved a two-step increase from \$4.25 an hour to \$4.75, and to \$5.15 a year later. About 10 million Americans

increase, which will be the first hourly increase in five years.

Economists say that the \$4.25 an hour wage lags far behind the average hourly earnings, which currently stands at \$11.72.

With the new wage increase, those who are solely dependent upon minimum wage for their livelihood will be given the chance to earn what they should have been making for the past

'Odelay' attests Beck's talent

Q. What would you get if you took a talented, young musician of the 90s and stuck him in a

cian of the 90s and stuck him in a state-of-the-art recording studio with unlimited samples? The only catch: the year is 1977.

A. Beck's latest release, 'Odelay,' if you were lucky.

On his newest CD, the artist who gave us 1994's 'Mellow Gold' and the hit single "Loser" pulls from his knowledge of 20th century music to effortlessly mix and match funk, folk, iazz. rap. and match funk, folk, jazz, rap, punk and country into a seamless blend.

The sound of 'Odelay' evokes a warm70s feel with its laid back bass and funky organs. Images of vinyl come to mind, with the periodic snap-crackle-pop noises

periodic snap-crackle-pop noises on the disc.
"Devil's Haircut," the first track on the CD, offers proof of Beck's 70s sensibilities, with a sample from the song "Out of Sight," by the original funkmaster himself, James Brown.

To be sure, Beck is not stuck in the 70s, or any other era for

in the 70s, or any other era for that matter. Sonic Youth-style guitar coexists with classic country steel guitar hooks, a la Hank Williams. His rap-style vocals, found on almost every song, were surely spawned from the 80s, when the Beastie Boys ruled the world.

the world.

The rap sounds on the album may be due in part to production by the Dust Brothers, who produced hits with Tone-Loc. Beck may be the only white artist, with the exception of the Beastie Rose, who can rap without Boys, who can rap without sounding pretentious or artificial

Beck's stream of conscious-less vocal lines flow effortlessly; do not worry much about meaning. An overzealous listener could strain him or her self trying to decipher lyrics that were only intended to sound cool.

On an album abounding with samples, Beck makes no secret of his influences. In addition to the 70s funk, Beck includes a sample from "It's All Over Now, Baby Blue," by Bob Dylan. Beneath the record scratches, horn secthe record scratches, horn sec-tions, organ lines and occasional video game bleeps lies a tradi-tional singer/songwriter, whose

only real requirements for mak-

only real requirements for making music are an acoustic guitar and a few chords.

By borrowing elements from numerous styles of American music and piecing them together like a patchwork quilt, then putting his own signature on the product, Beck has created an impressive album that sounds familiar, yet fresh. Perhaps this recording will be as successful as Beck's first major label release.

Until then, maybe we should

Until then, maybe we should do as Beck instructs:

"Take off your coat/ Put a song in your throat/ Let the deadbeats pound all around."

Their early deadlines require

"Now is the time to prepare for these scholarships," said Study Abroad Adviser Suzanne

Kifer.
"Most students don't realize that the deadlines fall so early in

the school year."
Rhodes, Marshall and Fulbright awards support study abroad and research opportunities to graduate students

However undergraduates are encouraged to attend scholarship information sessions to inform them of preferred applicant qualities.
"I think it is good for under-

graduates to begin focusing their studies towards these scholar-ships," Kifer said.

The lucky winner of the Rhodes scholarship, the Rhodes Scholar, may spend a year to two years at Oxford earning a second degree.

"(The judges) are looking for people who have leadership potentiality," Kifer said. About 32 Rhodes Scholars are

named each year with applicants chosen from eight state districts.

Marshall scholarships are academically oriented, requiring an undergraduate GPA of 3.75.

Awarded to 40 students annually, the Marshall allows recipients to study in any British uni-

The best odds, however, rest with the Fulbright Scholarship, which annually awards nearly 900 fellowships for foreign research.
