



House Bill 86 would allow motorists to be pulled over and cited for not wearing a seat belt. Under current law, a motorist can only be cited for a seatbelt violation if he or se is initially pulled over for another violation of state law.

While it's a shame that too many people don't wear seat belts, it's hard to imagine anyone not knowing the risks of his or her actions. However tempting it may be to punish individuals who endanger themselves, lawmakers should realize it's a citizen's call — not the

government's — to make.




