Stylish 'staches

Archive exhibit displays historical facial hair

Handlebar, pencil-thin, closed loop, facespinner, waterfall, or Fu Manchu.

However it's grown, a mustache can make a statement. Tom Selleck's mustache is infamous, and the odds are, most students' fathers grew them in the '70s. Still, no era was better for mustaches than the 19th century, or at least that is what the blog, "Mustaches of the Nineteenth Century," aims to prove.

Created by UK photo archivist Jason Flahardy, the blog features pictures of Chester A. Arthur, Friedrich Nietzsche and other men of the 19th century whose top lip is covered by a well-sculpted mustache. The site, mustachesofthenineteenthcentury.blogspot.com, started as an office joke after Flahardy and coworkers noticed the facial hair fad in photos they were archiving.

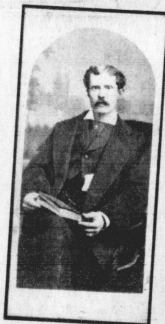
"We had joked about it for years," Flahardy said. "We would find particularly nice mustaches and photocopy them. It was a running joke that we had that everybody in the 19th century had a mustache."

Last year, Flahardy and fellow archivist Deirdre Scaggs were asked to create displays for The Hub in the W. T. Young Library during October, which is Archives Month.

"I jokingly suggested that we do mustaches of the 19th century," Flahardy said.

To his surprise, the idea was approved. However, when Flahardy realized the amount of mustaches he had collected, he decided to create a blog in addition to the displays. He posted his first mustache in July 2007, and "Mustaches of the Nineteenth Century" grew from there.

Since its creation, the mustache blog has had

New college partnership announced by Todd

UK is teaming up with Bluegrass Community and Technical College to introduce a new cooperative student transfer opportunity program.

During a news conference Wednesday morning on the BCTC Cooper campus, UK President Lee Todd and BCTC President Augusta Julian signed agreements to put the Blue Plus Program into action.

The program is designed to allow BCTC students to take up to 12 credit hours of UK course work at the BCTC tuition rate. Its goal is to enable students to take classes that will count towards their degree after they transfer to a four-year institution.

"You don't want to just take a bunch of hours if it doesn't count toward your degree," Todd said.

Students are allowed to take more than 12 hours of UK course work. However, additional hours will be billed at the UK tuition rate instead of the BCTC rate.

According to the schools' Web sites, UK's current tuition rate for a Kentucky resident is \$307 per credit

Green fee group plans out new membership

Student Government allocated \$1,250 to three different organizations during Wednesday's Appropriations and Revenue Committee meeting.

Athletic organizations received \$400, while the rest went to academic and campus events. They also approved \$2,650 for Senate special projects that will be presented and voted on by the full Senate at the meeting next week.

The Green Fee Committee had their second meeting, during which they discussed the organization and formation of the committee that would handle the money from student fees designated to go toward sustainability.

The committee discussed the idea of having members on the committee from not only SG and Green-Thumb, but also possibly from Reslife, the Sustainability Advisory Board and at-large members. These members, totaling 13, would have voting privileges, but anyone else interested in the issue can voice their opinions to the committee.

At the committee's next meeting in two weeks, they will discuss plans for the group's constitution and the application for the new committee's executive members.

The Internal Affairs Committee also met and prepared an act that appoints two new members, Eric Smith and Terran Cross, to the SG Supreme Court. It will be voted on at the next full Senate meeting.

Obama effigy found hanging from noose in tree near Rose St.

A likeness of Barack Obama was found hanging from a noose in a campus tree Wednesday.

UK Police received a report at 7:45 a.m. that the Democratic presidential candidate's likeness was hanging from a tree between Parking Structure #2 and the Mining and Mineral Resources Building near the W. T. Young Library walkway. At 8:25 a.m., members of UK's physical plant division cut the effigy down using a crane, said UK spokeswoman Kathy Johnson.

No suspects have been identified yet, but UK Police are working with federal authorities on the case, Johnson said. Secret Service was called as part of standard protocol, she said.

The figure wore khaki pants and a blue sports coat, said hospitality management junior A.J. Mertz, who saw the effigy when it was hanging. The figure also wore a mask to resemble a black man, Mertz said. Johnson confirmed it was a Barack Obama mask.

Mertz said he saw the life-size figure dangling from a tree and thought it was a person. Startled, Mertz did not want to walk closer, but as he moved toward the tree he saw it was not a real person.

Mertz said he did not want to even take a picture of the effigy because he "didn't want anyone to see it that didn't have to."

"I was disgusted and hurt someone would deface the university and put something up of this magnitude," he said.

If someone were to be arrested in connection with the hanging figure, he or she would be charged with harassment with a hate bias, a misdemeanor charge, Johnson said. Whether or not federal charges would be pressed is in the hands of federal authorities, she said.

UK Police declined to comment on the case, referring all calls to UK Public

Relations.

If the person committing the crime were a student, whether they would be punished would depend on the circumstances, said Tony Blanton, associate dean of students. Because almost no circumstances of the Obama effigy are known, Blanton said he could not comment specifically on the case.

As a rule, for the university to impose any punishment from a warning to expulsion, UK has to prove the student was provoking or threatening another student. If the effigy was making a political statement, it would be covered because of First Amendment rights, he said.

"We don't have the right not to be harassed, not to be intimidated," Blanton said. "We have the right not to be harassed, not to be intimidated."

Campus leaders denounce racial incident at UK

With hand-made signs in the back of Memorial Hall supporting the fight for diversity, the stage was set for a forum Wednesday night to discuss the effigy of Democratic presidential candidate Sen. Barack Obama found hanging from a noose in a tree on campus earlier in the day.

"Change needed to happen on campus," said La Toya B. Smith, a counseling psychology graduate student. "We are going to be active in the situation. We are no longer going to sit idly by." UK President Lee Todd began the forum by expressing his disappointment with the effigy. Todd called the act an embarrassment to the university and the Lexington community. However, he said despite this "disgusting episode," the school will continue striving to create an environment for diversity.

"We cannot let episodes like this tear down the progress we have made," Todd said.

Mayor Jim Newberry was also present to show his distaste for the symbol. Newberry said he was sickened by the cowardly act, which is unacceptable in any community.

A 'Thriller' on Main Street

Kids run around in circles, chasing each other. Their laughter and yells of joy ring in the studio and bounce off the mirror covering one whole wall. Groups of people stand in circles and talk. One woman, in dancewear, is running through choreography by herself before the official rehearsal begins.

Her dance moves are instantly recognizable as the famous dance sequence in Michael Jackson's "Thriller."

It has been 24 years since Jackson decided to turn his "Thriller" music video into a 13-minute short film about zombies dancing in his signature style. Since then, the video has taken on a life of its own.

Even today, people from every generation and background are finding the dance moves fun, as evident by the "zombies" rehearsing for the 7th annual Thriller Parade in downtown Lexington, which is sponsored by Mecca Live Studio and Gallery and starts at 8:30 p.m. on Halloween.

The zombies, as the dancers are called, who perform the sequence with a Jackson impersonator, are actually volunteers from the community who sign up and attend rehearsals held at Mecca Live.

"Fifty people did it the first year," said Mel Smyth, the choreographer for the event. "It seems to grow every year. One hundred people participated last year, and this year we have 80 many new people."

A lot of zombies come back every year to participate, and through word of mouth, more are added every year, which accounts for the growth since the first year, said Teresa Tomb, the owner of Mecca Live and organizer of the Thriller Parade.

During rehearsals the zombies form a diverse community. Ages of zombies range from kindergarten-age to 50s and 60s, Tomb said.

"There are a lot of different people here; there are different classes and cultures," said Teresa Wiese, who is participating in the parade for the first time with her two children, Sarah and Molly.

"It's something the whole family can get involved with," she said.

Lynda Matussek, a UK employee who manages the sound and lighting of events at the Student Center and teaches a UK 101 class, has participated for the past four years in the Thriller Parade and noticed it getting more diverse every year.

"There is a wide range of people here. There are always some kids, but there are more this year," Matussek said. "There are more older people and men too."

Mecca Live has made it a priority to let people know they can easily participate in the event, Smyth said.

"This is for the community from the community," she said to the zombies during a staging rehearsal.

"We want everybody who wants to participate to be able to, regardless of skill. While the dance I teach is close to the dance in the video, those are professional dancers. It's important to make it

Of Montreal bends genres, reality with new album

"Of Montreal's new effort, "Skeletal Lamping," released on Oct. 21, is a crazed psych-rock adventure with many genre-bending points along the way. Hailing from Athens, Ga., the band is fronted by the eccentric vocalist and songwriter Kevin Barnes. The songwriting style of Barnes can best be described as the essence of a schizophrenic kid, with a touch of ADD, who happens to have a very large record collection.

His style changes from track to track, sometimes

even having many genre shifts within the same song. This makes the record very enjoyable when listening through it continuously and gives the listener a feeling of being in a disco club on Mars.

Past Of Montreal albums have been full of songs that resemble character studies, but with "Skeletal Lamping," Barnes seems to be focusing his interest inward. The new songs focus on his life and the life of his alter ego, George Fruit. In an interview last year, Barnes described

his alter ego.

"The character's name is George Fruit, and he's in his late 40s, a black man who has been through multiple sex changes," Barnes said. "He's been a man and a woman, and then back to a man. He's been to prison a couple of times."

When listening to the album it is easy to realize which songs were written from Fruit's perspective. The song "Wicked Wisdom" is a perfect example of this. It starts off with a very danceable beat and

a falsetto vocal before switching to a funky bass line that would make Beck envious. Then Barnes spews out the lines, "I'm just a black she-male/ and I don't know what you people are all about."

"Skeletal Lamping" is overflowing with weird sexual overtones, but the record can basically be summed up as a very creative pop album that is full of love songs. Personally, I really enjoy Of Montreal's new album and their older works as well, but for the average music listener

the band could be a bit much to swallow. Their exploration of multiple styles and genres can easily turn people off who don't necessarily enjoy a great amount of experimentation within music, but for those with an open mind, I would definitely recommend "Skeletal Lamping."

easier for anybody to learn the dance," Smyth said.

Mecca Live also doesn't charge for zombies to participate, so the ones who can't afford it won't be denied. They instead ask for donations for the dance space and expenses that Mecca Live pays for, like sound equipment and safety patrol.

Smyth and Tomb, along with other members of Mecca Live, created the Thriller Parade in 2002 while throwing around crazy ideas for the members of the community to get involved in, Tomb said.

"We encourage insane ideas," Tomb said. "Thriller took on a momentum of its own due to our enthusiasm about the event."

To find people who wanted to participate in the first year, Mecca Live put out ads in local papers. It was the ad that found the Thriller Parade star, Jackson.

Micah Isaacs, who said he's a huge Jackson fan, received a call from his mom about the ad asking for zombies to participate in the event during its first year. Isaacs attended the first rehearsal with the intention of being a zombie.

"When I found out there wasn't a Michael yet, I asked if I could do it," Isaacs said. "After that, they invited me to come back the next year."

Isaacs has been Jackson in the Thriller Parade every year since its creation in 2002, except in 2007 when he moved to Canada. That year, three guys played the role of Jackson during different points in the parade.

This year Isaacs has come back to Lexington for a month

to reprise his role as Jackson and visit family and friends.

"I was pretty sad when I missed it last year. I'm not sure if I'll be able to come back next time, so this might be my last year," Isaacs said.

Since channeling Jackson for the Thriller Parade, Isaacs has become a full-time Jackson impersonator, performing at weddings and special events.

"I didn't even know the dance when I started, and now I'm a Michael impersonator," Isaacs said. "This started the whole thing."

This year Isaacs will perform at the Dame on Main Street with Members Only, an '80s tribute band, at 9:30 p.m. after the Thriller Parade. He will sing three Michael Jackson songs from the "Thriller" album: "Billie Jean," "Beat It" and "Thriller."

The Thriller Parade will start at the Kentucky Theater on Main Street, where Isaacs will act out the beginning sequence of the video, with a volunteer who plays his girlfriend in the film. A truck will follow Isaacs, blasting the song down the street.

Isaacs will travel down North Limestone Street, and zombies will emerge around him and begin to perform the dance sequence from the video. Smyth said the parade will go down North Limestone to Barr Street, and there will be three more performances of the dance.

The parade will end at the Courthouse Lawn, where they will do the final performance, along with a showcase including a performance by Isaacs of "Billie Jean" and crowning of a Zombie King and Queen.

256,000 hits, according to Flahardy's stat counter. Almost 600 blogs have referenced or linked to it. Even now, the blog averages about 300 hits per day, and regular followers post comments. The photo displays in The Hub will remain up through October.

More than just pictures of men sporting mustaches, the blog educates on the history of mustaches and terminology. One fact on the site is that British military men were required to have a mustache until 1916 when Parliament revoked the order.

All original material posted on the blog comes from

UK's archives and the photographs are donations, mostly from private families and state bequests, Flahardy said.

"We pretty much have the largest collection of Kentucky Civil War photographs," he said. "Most of what we do is serve photographs to the public that are specifically about the history of Lexington and Kentucky."

Unfortunately, Flahardy said the blog has slowed a bit because he is running out of mustaches. He said the 20th century had some great mustaches. He named President Taft, Lemmy from the band Motorhead and Vincent Price as the top three 20th century mustaches.

"We'll have to start a project to go hunt down more mustaches," he said.

Student representatives from UK attended the event as well. Travis Darden, president of the Black Student Union, said it was the BSU's responsibility to go out and make sure justice and equality are served.

"It is unrealistic to believe ignorance, racism and bigotry do not exist on this campus," Darden said.

Student Government President Tyler Montell agreed that racism was present on this campus, but it is also present in today's society. Montell asked students to come together, because today, Montell said, everyone was a victim.

"Today we are forced to take a step back," Montell said. "Today our community has been degraded by intolerance."

Joe Gallenstein, president of the College Democrats, and Jacob Sims, president of the College Republicans, each spoke, agreeing in their stances against Wednesday's racial act.

"This despicable act not only leaves a scar on our university, the students and faculty within it, but it also leaves a scar on the Commonwealth of Kentucky as a whole," Sims said.

Sims said whoever created the effigy was "cowardly," and the College Republicans do not want that individual's support at the polls on Election Day.

As the forum came to an end, some students were confused, thinking it was going to be an open forum where students were free to speak. "I misunderstood the info," said Matthew McClendon, a landscape architecture freshman. "I thought we were going to be able to express our opinion."

Todd said he faxed a letter of apology to Obama and his family. Police are continuing to investigate the effigy.

Communications and psychology sophomore Khai Johannes said he was not surprised by the effigy. Some people aren't open to change, he said, a problem that will only grow closer to the election. An Obama win would make it worse, he said.

"It's funny in my opinion because the same person who did that is probably a guy sitting in the football stands cheering for black football players," he said. "But when someone tries to take a leadership role, watch out."

UK is not the first place to have a symbol against Obama or other contenders in the 2008 presidential race.

A similar incident occurred two weeks ago when a man, Mike Lunsford, hung an Obama effigy in his yard in Fairfield, Ohio, about 100 miles north of Lexington.

A life-size representation of Sarah Palin hanging from the front of a West Hollywood man's house has caused controversy as well. The man, Chad Michael Morrisette, had defended the statue's presence, citing First Amendment rights.

At George Fox University, a small Christian college near Portland, Ore., an Obama effigy was cut down on Sept. 23.

Two Arkansas men were arrested this week in connection with a plot to kill Obama as well as shoot or decapitate 88 black people. Daniel Cowart, 20, of Bella, Tenn., and Paul Schlesselman 18, of Helena-West Helena, Ark., planned on killing 88 because each word of "Heil Hitler" be-

hour. At BCTC it is \$121 per credit hour for a resident.

"We still expect a lot of students from around the state to come directly into UK, but some students feel that they are not ready," Todd said. "It is our goal to help you achieve your goals."

Todd and Julian said they hope the new plan will create more opportunities and make it easier for students to earn a bachelor's degree. The goal is to increase the number of transfer students from 4,000 per year up to more than 11,000 per year.

"Students who complete their associate's degree are more likely to go on and complete a bachelor's degree," Julian said.

States with top-20 research schools have a 28 percent population with bachelor's degrees, Todd said. The population in Kentucky with bachelor's degrees is 20 percent.

"We need more Kentuckians competing to complete four year programs," Todd said. "We want this to be a model that is one we can continue to invest in."

gins with H, the eighth letter in the alphabet, police said.

The effigy's message is especially strong in southern states such as Kentucky because of lynching's tie to the region's past, said UK political science professor Christopher Rice. The practice was used not just to kill people but also to scare black people who witnessed the suffering.

The noise, a symbol of lynching, and Obama being black come together to create a message with a clear meaning, Rice said.

"Would you see (2004 Democratic nominee) John Kerry in effigy? No, you would not," he said. "Senator Obama is African-American, and it provokes this racially-charged thinking. Don't vote for so-and-so because he is black."

How effective such a strategy is depends on whom the effigy's creators were trying to access, Rice said.

"To me that's unclear," he said. "The University of Kentucky isn't going to be an environment that's going to be sympathetic to that."

Human nutrition freshman Lauren Brinkman had not heard about the effigy, but said the representation was "just too much." Brinkman, who said she likes neither Obama nor Republican opponent John McCain, said what wins people is a good argument, not an ugly symbol.

"No one's going to take you seriously if you do something like that," she said.

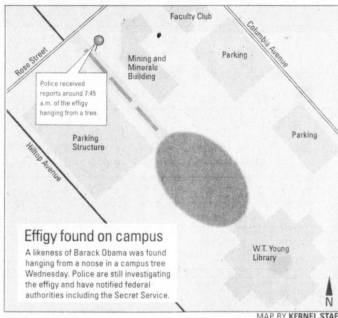

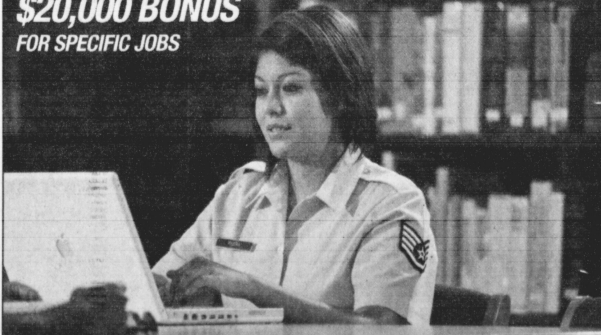

The final game for four seniors

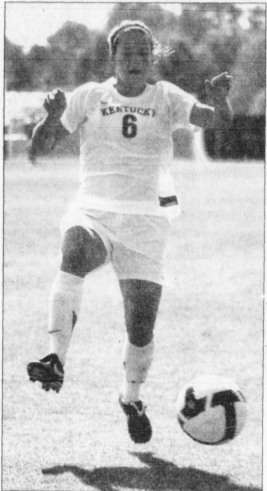

The UK women's soccer team has already been eliminated from qualifying for the Southeastern Conference Tournament. But the Cats do have something to play for in their last game of regular season play: pride.

Friday's game against Vanderbilt is not just an end to the season for the four seniors defender/midfielder Kristin Kover, defender Tara Herold, defender Kate Hughes and midfielder Nicola Holdsworth - it's an end to their collegiate soccer careers.

Hughes said her most memorable soccer moment was being a part of that championship team, a sentiment echoed by all of the girls.

Herold said her most memorable moment would be a win on Friday night, sending the seniors off properly, which many can't say at the end of their careers. "If we can get a win and leave on a high note, that would be great," Herold said. "This group of girls has worked hard together and we will do whatever it takes to win on Friday."

UK head coach Warren Lipka would like to send his seniors off with a win because of how much they have meant to the Cats the past four years.

"This senior group has done a lot for this program," Lipka said. "They won the SEC Tournament just two years ago as sophomores and they've played hard all season. They deserve to win on their night."

UK bounces back against rival

When Indiana and UK meet during an athletic battle, most people expect to see the tradition-rich basketball schools on the hardwood. However, that's not the only case when the border states meet in an athletic event.

The two men's soccer programs also battled each other to a 1-1 tie Wednesday night in Bloomington, Ind.

"A lot of players from the state of Kentucky go north and become Hoosiers," senior midfielder Chad Hagerly said before Wednesday night's game. "Playing Indiana is a way to get back at them. Since we play them every year, emotions build between the players."

The series has traditionally belonged to Indiana are 20-1-2 against the Cats. UK's only win came in the 1995 season when Indiana was ranked No. 2 in the nation, but close games have cost the Cats in the past few years.

"This rivalry is a weird deal. When we started playing annually, we kept

getting destroyed," UK head coach Ian Collins said. "It kept being a one-sided affair until 1999. Once we proved we could play with the best of them, we have started looking forward to these types of games. We just haven't gotten the bounces in the past, but I think this team is ready to step up and perform well."

After giving up a goal only six seconds into the game against the No. 14 Hoosiers, UK was able to bounce back, netting the tying goal in the 22nd minute.

Junior Marco dos Santos was able to capitalize on an open goal after Hagerly found his way behind the defense and set-up dos Santos.

"Indiana is absolutely the top of collegiate soccer," Collins said. "They always have great, physical teams that wear you down."

The Cats scored their first goal against the Hoosiers, who are ranked No. 1 in the RPI, since a loss in overtime in 2003. Collins thought UK was able to play well in a place where they average 2,000 fans per game and are al-

ways ready to back their team.

"Playing in Bloomington is always tough," Collins said. "But, it will be a good challenge to see how far we have progressed as a team. If we can win in the most difficult place to play in the country, it will say much about this team's character."

The Cats were able to get a goal on a defense that was riding a three game winning streak. However, Hagerly said the way the Cats were playing he was not scared of the Hoosiers' defense.

"Kevin Alston, a defender they have, is really good," Hagerly said. "But, if we keep playing the way we have been lately and finish chances, it doesn't matter who is playing defense against us."

The tie against the Hoosiers could be vital in securing an at-large bid in the NCAA Tournament for the Cats. Collins believes it is now important to use this as a stepping stone when the Cats take on conference foe Southern Methodist University.

"If you couldn't get up for this game, you got a problem," Hagerly said.

UK faculty, staff must receive safety training

A Kernel report on Wednesday that said most UK faculty and staff are not trained for emergency situations leaves this editorial board feeling even more unsafe in an already uncertain time when it comes to campus safety.

Given the recent school shootings and campus scares, there is no reason why UK's faculty and staff should not be trained to handle emergency situations.

According to the Kernel article on Wednesday, Human Resources is the only UK department that has been trained to handle situations of an active shooting or workplace violence. UK does not currently have a requirement in place for faculty or staff to be formally trained for those situations. UK Police said in Wednesday's article they offer emergency training by request, but chances are very few employees take advantage of the opportunity.

"I would be shocked if a fellow faculty member told me they took a training program because I haven't heard of any," said history professor Daniel Smith in Wednesday's Kernel. "I think I'm literally out of the loop."

Message to UK: let's get him and the rest of this university into the loop. Install a mandatory training session for all UK employees immediately. It is not unreasonable to implement some type of system that would give every employee the proper training they need to handle an emergency situation.

We are not talking about a two-day event on every specific emergency detail. All we are calling for is a simple one- to two-hour session that would outline the basic emergency procedures a professor would have to follow in the unlikely event of an emergency. That could be a simple slide presentation with UK Police Maj. Joe Monroe or an informal seminar with local policemen; anything that gets the message across of how to handle a panic-filled situation.

Whatever the university decides to do, it will certainly be better than the lack of plan UK has now. Ultimately the professors of each course, whether it is a lecture hall of 300 students or a classroom of 15 people, are responsible for the safety and well being of everybody in that designated time frame. Somebody in the room needs to have an idea of how to handle an emergency situation and the university should make sure that its employees are one of those people.

UK Police are working to complete the training program for all UK employees and students by the end of this semester, Monroe said in Wednesday's article. We commend him for his efforts. But the university should do its part to see that this gets done now instead of later because there is no later when it comes to student safety.

And when the university hires its new employees, they should make training sessions part of the standard faculty orientation. In the process of filing out paperwork, getting acclimated to the university and other procedural hiring processes, there is no reason UK cannot set some additional time aside to prepare its employees for emergency situations.

It is scary to think what would happen tomorrow if the unthinkable really did happen given the lack of preparation of UK, and it is irresponsible on the university's behalf not to already have a training program in place. Act now and do something immediately before it really is too late.

Boy, am I ashamed to be a Wildcat today. Lexington has felt its share of shame in the past — one merely has to think about where you're at while sitting on the patio at Cheapside Bar and Grille. But we were always able to rationalize that those actions occurred in the past, that we had reached a point where racism simply wasn't an issue. Or at least that's what some of us like to tell ourselves.

Racism was a problem for a different generation. Mind you, we're telling ourselves this while racist jokes are being made around us, while people are rushing in to assure Americans that Barack Obama isn't a Muslim, as if you couldn't be Muslim and a "true" American, all at the same time, and while most groups on campus are still divided by race. I thought we had moved past "separate, but equal." You'd be hard-pressed to

prove that in many UK organizations though. This is not to say that efforts haven't been made to change this, just that we're far from reaching our goals on this issue. The Nick Phelps (former SG president) e-mail scandal from January of this year is proof enough that we still have work to do.

The hanging of an Obama effigy on campus Wednesday morning was deplorable, cowardly and disgusting. Yet, hardly unexpected. It merely proves what many of us have always suspected, that the racial undertones on campus are just barely hidden beneath polite speech. As much as it sickens me, I am aware that this kind of behavior is protected by our right to free speech.

But this isn't the same as the effigy hung of Sarah Palin earlier this week in West Hollywood. Both are disgusting, and beyond the bounds of the kind

of political discourse that can actually produce something productive. But that action didn't occur in the South, didn't involve an African-American candidate, and didn't evoke images of lynchings that occurred in this very place. This makes the two completely different in how they are perceived.

UK President Lee Todd said in his e-mail to the university that he would like to "personally assure (the Obama family) that this is not who we are as a university or as a state." Unfortunately, I disagree with him. This is exactly who we are. And until we acknowledge it as such, and work to change the underlying racism present here, all the diversity-increasing actions in the world won't make a difference.

The effigy of Sen. Barack Obama that was found on UK's campus is an outrage for all people of any shred of human decency. The fact that this was found on our campus speaks to larger implications about our state and our university.

I congratulate him for providing effective leadership on this issue.

Todd's insistence that our university rise above such hatred is admirable. However, I call upon more concrete action from the UK administration to educate its students about diversity, to minimize such attitudes underlying the event that took place. What happened is regrettable, but the real problem is that so many people, both students at our university, and members of the population of our

state at large, simply look at blacks as inferior, and any black aspiring to political office as uppity, or worthy of demotion.

If UK is serious about preventing the attitudes that cause such events, and in seriously fostering diversity on our campus, I will offer my own personal proposal. Mandate a class that focuses on racial diversity and education. Most people are simply ignorant of black culture. SG and students working together will influence change

As a first year senator, I am greatly disturbed by the widely negative attitude that is associated with Student Government on campus. I would like to take this space to explain some of the powers of SG as mandated by the SG Constitution, a copy of which can be obtained at the SG office. A summary of each office's duty can also be obtained on SG's Web site, (<http://uksga.org/>).

The purpose of SG is discussed in Section 1 of the Constitution: "To increase student influence management or consulting fees; to provide necessary student services; to protect and expand student substantive and procedural rights; and to better represent the student body in relations with the faculty, administration, Board of Trustees, and the Commonwealth of Kentucky." The duties of senators are listed in Article 1, Section 1. In my experience, I have found

the following to be the most important functions of senators: The ability to appropriate funds, approve nominated executive officials, approve the SG budget and to enact SG policy.

The Senate is given, by the administration, a portion of student fees you pay every year to attend the university. The senators then divvy up the fees they have been allocated as they see fit. So far this school year, SG has appropriated \$27,000 to various student groups and activities.

The Senate cannot appropriate funds for every student activity. According to the Student Funding Act of 2006, SG cannot fund, "1) food and beverages; 2) non-university printing services; 3) subscriptions; 4) taxes; 5) management or consulting fees; 6) organizational membership dues; 7) personal gifts, donations or contributions; 8) financial aid or scholarships and 9) expenses incurred prior to SG approval." In addition, if an organization is not a registered student organization, they may not receive any SG funding. Becoming a registered student organization is a relatively simple process and the instructions can be

found on (<http://www.uky.edu/GetInvolved/StudentOrgs/>).

The powers and duties of the president of SG are outlined in Article II, Section 2. These duties include the ability to possess full executive authority to represent the student body in dealings with persons of other universities and the university faculty and administration; to administer the executive branch, as well as appoint all personnel required to run the executive branch; to prepare an executive budget to be approved by the Senate; and to enforce and administer all Senate legislation enacted into law, as well as allocating money specified in the budget approved by the Senate.

The president also sits on the Board of Trustees as the representative of the student body. This is a privilege not afforded to SG presidents at many private universities. The Board of Trustees at UK, as described on their Web site, "is the final authority in all matters affecting the institution and exercises jurisdiction over the institution's financial, educational, and other policies and its relation with state and federal governments." Every resolution that the student Senate

passes is, in effect, a non-binding act because it does not have a final say on the issue. Instead, it just mandates how the SG president will vote. The Board of Trustees has 20 members and the SG president is one vote.

SG is a body of limited power, but we can maximize our influence of campus if we work together. I strongly urge instead of pointing out what SG is not doing for you, submit concrete proposals for what you would like to see SG accomplish. If they take action or inaction on an issue, then specifically mention what your problems are with the issue so the body can attempt to remedy them.

On a campus as large as UK, it is inevitable that every senator will not know all of his or her constituents. However, if you offer constructive criticism, hopefully we can work for the better of the student body, the university and the Commonwealth in the future. Believe in blue!

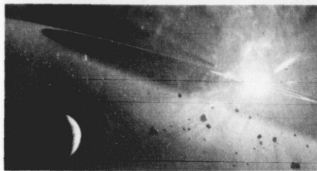

Evidence found of solar system around nearby star

WASHINGTON — For the first time, astronomers think that they've found evidence of an alien solar system around a star close enough to Earth to be visible to the naked eye.

They say that at least one and probably three or more planets are orbiting the star Epsilon Eridani, 10.5 light-years — about 63 trillion miles — from Earth. Only eight stars are closer.

The host star, slightly smaller and cooler than our sun, is in the constellation Eridanus — the name of a mythological river — near Orion in the northern sky.

"This system probably looks a lot like ours did when life first took root on Earth."

"This really is a system like our solar system was when it was five times younger than it is now," said one of the discoverers, Massimo Marengo, an astronomer at the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics in Cambridge, Mass. "It's like a time machine for our solar system."

"This system probably looks a lot like ours did when life first took root on Earth," said Dana Backman, of the SETI Institute in Mountain View, Calif., the lead author of a report to be published Jan. 10 in *The Astrophysical Journal*.

SETI chose Epsilon Eridani as one of the first targets in its long — but so far vain — search for signs of extraterrestrial intelligence in 1960.

The suspected planets are too far away to be detected directly, so their presence has to be inferred by indirect measurements. Their star is so near, however, that some astronomers think that they may be able to see its planets with better telescopes within the next decade.

One of the planets, a gas giant 1 1/2 times heavier than Jupiter, was discovered in 2000 by Barbara McArthur, an astronomer at the University of Texas in Austin. She measured the slight wobble in the star's position as the planet swung around it. Farther observations by the Hubble

Space Telescope in 2006 confirmed its existence, McArthur said at the time.

Now Backman's team has deduced the presence of at least two more planets, after space- and ground-based telescopes separately revealed two belts of rocky asteroids and an outer icy ring circling Epsilon Eridani.

The inner asteroid belt is about 280 million miles from its host star, the same distance as our own ring of asteroids orbiting between Mars and Jupiter. The second belt is about the same distance as Uranus is in our system.

Finally, a wide, third ring of icy objects extends billions of miles beyond Epsilon Eridani, resembling the so-called Kuiper Belt of mini-planets outside Pluto.

In 2002, Aïce Quillen, an astronomer at the University of Rochester in New York state,

reported that unusual clumps of material in the outer ring probably indicated the presence of a Saturn-size planet in a Pluto-like orbit. Her finding hasn't been confirmed, but in an e-mail, Quillen said, "I still think there is a planet out there of this size."

According to Marengo, the gaps between these belts were created when clouds of dust and rocks consolidated into planets, as happened in the early days of our solar system. He likened the process to the formation of Saturn's famous rings, which are separated by spaces cleared out by little moons.

"The easiest way to explain the gaps is to say there are planets there," Marengo said. "It's the same way as the rings of Saturn are kept stable by the moons of Saturn."

"I think these rings are probably telling us about how systems clear out after planets have formed," Quillen said. "It's pretty exciting to catch such a nearby system in this critical stage."

Marengo raised the possibility that more Earthlike planets might exist in the space between Epsilon Eridani and the inner dust ring.

"The inside belt is cleared, like in our solar system," he said. "There could be terrestrial planets inside, but we can't detect them yet."

Unknown receivers ready to make name for themselves

Gene McCaskill removed a white, No. 13 jersey as he ran off the field during one of UK's practices this week inside the Nutter Indoor Complex as the Cats prepared for Mississippi State.

There's just one problem — McCaskill wears No. 85.

But many UK fans wouldn't know the difference between McCaskill and the real No. 13 on this year's football team, Eric Adeyemi, except by their numbers. So when they switch one can imagine the confusion.

"They called us the smallest guys on the team, so we switch jerseys to get in on the fun," McCaskill said.

The jersey switch aptly describes UK's on-going situation at wide receiver, where UK's top two receivers, senior Dicky Lyons Jr. and sophomore running back Derrick Locke, are out for the season.

Veteran wide receivers Anthony Mosley, Kyrus Lanxter and DeMoreo Ford have not accomplished much on the field this season and what had been UK's biggest threat at

wide receiver, freshman Randall Cobb, is now starting at quarterback.

That type of fluid situation had led UK head coach Rich Brooks to consistently play, and start, freshman wide receivers Aaron Boyd, Adeyemi and McCaskill. Boyd started opposite of Cobb against Florida. McCaskill will get his first start this Saturday against Mississippi State.

"I always have said I had a chance to play," McCaskill said. "I worked hard this summer. I've always played against bigger guys anyway."

After two years of upperclassmen leadership at both the quarterback and wide receiver positions, the Cats have now transitioned to a completely fresh look — freshman Cobb at quarterback, with McCaskill and cornerback-turned-receiver E.J. Adams.

So far, UK's receivers have struggled in Southeastern Conference play, contributing to the offensive woes that have plagued the Cats. But with only four conference games left,

Adeyemi said that inexperience is no longer a free pass.

"It's not really an excuse," Adeyemi said. "We've got to come out and make some plays. (We've) got to adjust."

Both McCaskill and Adeyemi have made small strides this season, coming up with first down receptions when UK has needed them. But without a full knowledge of the system, talent has only taken the freshmen so far.

"I try to make it happen every chance I get," Adeyemi said. "No one is perfect. Just got to make it happen."

Making it happen could be a little bit more difficult in Starkville, Miss., as the Bulldogs have the second-best pass defense in the SEC. A little jersey switch could go a long way in helping UK's offense off the ground.

"It's to get everyone on the team confused," Adeyemi said. "It lightens up the mood."

In addition to a physical defense, Brooks said that Mississippi State had become a more physical offense as well. Sophomore quarterback Wesley Carroll provides the Bulldogs with the same multi-threat ability that Cobb provides for UK.

"They are a very physical football team," Brooks said. "Their QB can hurt you with his feet as much as his hands."

With senior safety Marcus McClinton still slowed by injuries, as well as a variety of other UK defensive players, Brooks said Mississippi State's ever-changing offense could be a different look for the Cats.

"They've changed their offense a little bit," Brooks said. "They get in the gun, read with the quarterback. It's changed, increasing every week. They put a few more wrinkles in every week."

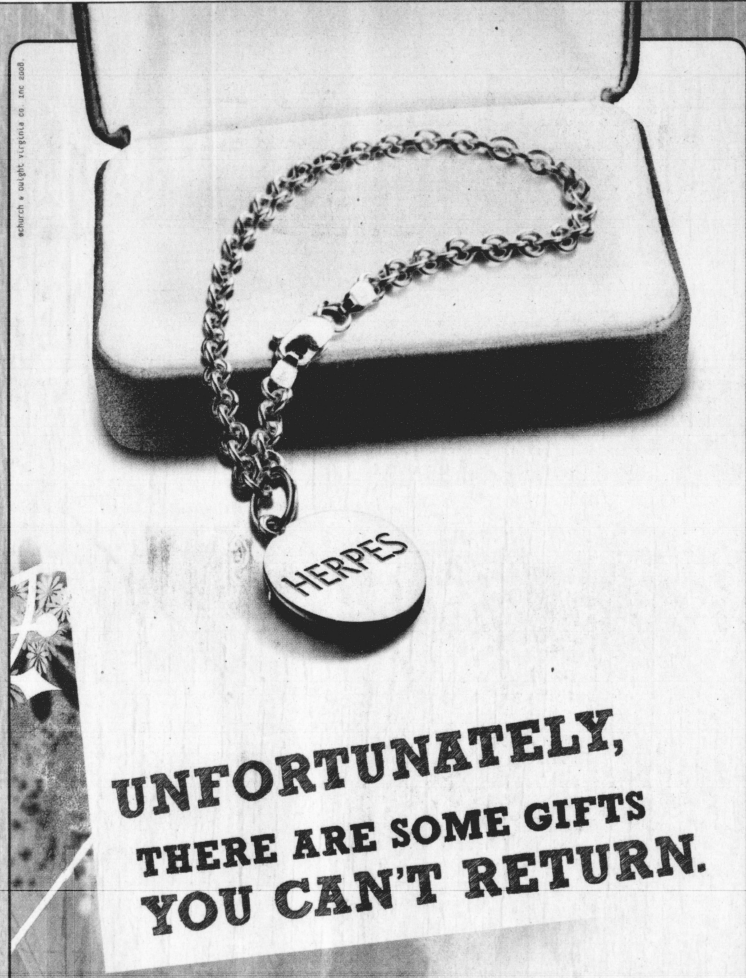
With UK facing a different Bulldog team than in the past and recovering from their worst loss in 12 years, the Cats are at a crucial point in their season. But that doesn't bother UK's young receivers, who seemingly have one mantra.

"We just have to work hard and compete," Adeyemi said.
