**Campaign found guilty of one claim**

**Time: Robinson/Harralson get community service**

Tim Robinson and Caroline Harralson will still serve as Student Government's next president and vice president, but they'll have to do 25 hours of community service each in order to do so.

The SGA Election Board of Claims found the campaign guilty of not reporting the developmental and upkeep costs of their campaign web site. The claim, filed by the Election Board of Supervision, was deemed to have not affected

the integrity of the election, which is necessary to take away their victory. So the Board of Claims punished them with 25 hours of community service each.

Robinson said he does not know if he will appeal the decision. "The decisions were fair," he said. "But I still don't think we want to set a precedent where students cannot volunteer time in an election."

According to the expenditure report, the web site, www.uksga.com, cost \$15.82 for the web address and for the web

space. Johnson argued that the developmental and upkeep costs should have also been reported, which Johnson said would have cost more than \$300. Eric Mills, a first-year law student, said he and Robinson developed the site for free. The time spent working on the web site should not be counted as a commercial service, argued Joe Miller, a law student who defended Robinson at the trial. SGA election rules require the

cost of all commercial services be reported — at full price if bought or reported at 75 percent of fair market value if donated. Fair market value is the lowest regular price of the service or item.

The board voted against two other claims, one filed by Robinson's presidential opponent Alyshia Ochse and another filed by the Election Board of Supervision.

Ochse alleged that senators who were part of the Robinson coalition, a group of senators who were dedicated to the same ideals as the president-elect, posted their campaign posters on top of hers. The board voted 4-1 against the

claim because it was filed against Robinson and Harralson and not the senators whose signs were hung on top of Ochse's.

The Election Board of Supervision's claim, which failed 3-2, alleged that the campaign underreported the price of a ream of paper by 80 cents.

The board voted 5-0 against a claim filed by the Election Board of Supervision charging Sen. elect Mary Catherine Correll with violating an election rule by hanging unstamped election posters. The Election Board of Supervision must stamp all campaign posters to ensure no more than 200 posters are used.

**First look: Fans excited about new team**

The Lexington Legends christened Applebee's Stadium last night amidst a sea of awe and adulation on the city's north side.

Though many of the yard's features remain incomplete, the capacity crowd was treated to a bevy of big league features — among them a Stadium Club that trumps anything at Cincinnati's Cinergy Field and an immaculate playing surface that would not look out of place in Chicago's Wrigley Field.

Fans from the box seats to the bullpen lawns were united in their praise — what may be the most regal Class-A ballpark.

"It's great. They've probably got the best field in Minor League Baseball," said Keith Jackson, a LOC student.

"Where else can you go and be three feet from the playing field like this?" said UK agriculture professor Greg Ibenhath from his spot on the grassy berm near the left-field bullpen. "This is pretty good."

Carol Phippen of Lexington, at the game with husband Scott and two of their children, Jared and Tori, was impressed with the stadium and its tyke-oriented features — among them a playground and carousel.

"I've been impressed with everything," Phippen said. "The kids' area is really nice

because we have little children. This is going to be great for Lexington."

She added that the remainder of her progeny is anxious to take advantage of the family's season tickets.

"We've got two (kids) here and we've got two older ones who would love to come, too. We'll probably take turns bringing them we've got tickets to all the games."

The Pippens were but one of the many family affairs in the stands. Guy Zeigler of Frankfort, seated along the third base line with his daughter Whitney, expressed a love for the game that is shared by both generations.

"I grew up playing baseball, and I really enjoy it," Zeigler said. "My daughter plays fast-pitch softball now, so we're fans."

The ballpark's doors couldn't open fast enough for many fans, including Ginny Traci, a Lexington resident who arrived early for an extended peek.

"I've been here since three o'clock waiting to get in," Traci said. "I've been excited since the day they announced it."

Traci believes that professional baseball will become a mainstay in hoops-crazy Lexington.

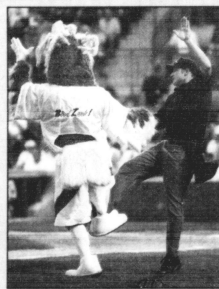
"I think it's here to stay. This is a baseball town — you just don't give it enough credit."

**Herald-Leader editor hired as media adviser**

A Lexington Herald-Leader regional editor and former reporter has been hired as media adviser for the Kentucky Kernel and the Kentuckian yearbook.

Chris Poore, who will begin July 1, replaces Michael Agin, who left the job last summer.

Poore said he was elated to be offered the job. "The Kernel and The Kentuckian have great traditions. I'm always amazed at how many talented Kernel and Kentuckian grads I run into in the professional world," he said. "I look forward to helping students continue that tradition ... and improving on it."

Poore has been the regional editor and intern coordinator at the Herald-Leader since November 1998. He began his journalism career as a reporter for the Herald-Leader after graduating from Western Kentucky University. After six years as a Herald-Leader reporter, he left Lexington to be the Sunday and special projects editor at the Columbus Ledger-Enquirer in Columbus, Ga.

Kernel and Kentuckian staff members said they are excited to have someone of Poore's caliber as adviser.

"I'm excited about the experience that Chris can bring to the newsroom," said Julie Nelson, Kernel managing editor.

This semester, Poore is teaching Journalism 301, a news reporting course, at UK. He said he would like to teach again someday, but first he wants to focus on student media.

"I have a lot to learn from staff members and students. I hope to spend a lot of time listening in the beginning," he said. "And then, as I learn the ropes, I hope to lead students and staff members in conversations about how we can make the Kernel and the Kentuckian the best student publications in the country."

**Fulfilling needs and dreams**

**Does an artist live inside Lee Todd? Faculty says they are hopeful of the president-elect's support**

In July, UK will have a new president who has seen "Les Misérables" more than 10 times, as well as a president who returns to his alma mater for a second time with a strong engineering background.

But the people in the College of Fine Arts are wondering: Is there an artist living inside of Lee T. Todd?

"Like many engineers, I was pretty much 'heads down' on my career while I was in college and in my early years of my profession," Todd said. "But I have gained a strong appreciation for the arts from my family."

Even though there has been some criticism toward Todd's selection, key members of the College of Fine Arts are confident that the new president will be good for the arts at UK.

"One of the most brilliant moves that UK has ever made in the time that I have been in here is hiring Lee T. Todd," said W. Harry Clark, director of the UK School of Music.

Clark, who came to UK in 1988, feels comfortable with the new president. Clark said the people in the music department hope Todd will bring solutions to their problems.

One of the biggest issues in the School of Music is a lack of facilities. "We are literally on six different buildings on campus," Clark said. "Our students don't have enough classrooms or practice rooms."

The music department is dreaming about a new music building, but before that, there are other needs to be fulfilled. Clark said there is an immediate need for more faculty, teaching assistants, staff and operating funds.

**Senate Council votes to create School of Interior Design at UK**

There was not a seat in the house at the UK Senate Council meeting Monday night. Interior design students packed the W.T. Young Library Auditorium waiting to hear if a School of Interior Design would be created at UK.

"This could be a big day for the department," said Bobbie Alloo, interior design junior.

The School of Interior Design was approved with no opposition. UK is researching the best location for the school right now; they do not have a location in mind as of yet.

Alloo said she is excited about becoming part of the first class to attend the new college next year.

Scott Kellie, the chair for the committee on retroactive withdrawals, also had some important information for students who have received or will receive incomplete grades.

Kellie's committee looks into cases where students have been given incomplete grades because of personal injury, family problems, illness, money issues or disabilities.

"We have been getting a lot of students with depression," Kellie said. Students who failed to meet the criteria for their courses and received incomplete grades may request that

## China's military pushes for investigation

BEIJING — American diplomats pressed for daily access Sunday to a detained U.S. air crew, while China's top military newspaper said Beijing had the right to "thoroughly investigate" the crew members. China told U.S. diplomats they would be allowed to meet the American crew later Monday, although no details were provided on when. The meeting would be the fourth since the crew was detained after making an emergency landing on Hainan Island after an April 1 collision with a Chinese fighter jet. The Liberation Army Daily also demanded an end to spy flights near China's coast. The paper's comments added to evidence that China's influential military is pushing for a hard line against Washington and might be obstructing a settlement. The newspaper is published by the military, and its contents are approved by senior commanders.

## Bush sends budget to Congress

WASHINGTON — After six weeks of debate over his budget blueprint, President Bush is sending Congress the details of his \$1.96 trillion spending plan, an event certain to trigger more fighting over the administration's economic program. The details were being released Monday in a 4-inch-thick set of documents providing the administration's line-by-line spending proposals for the 2002 budget year that starts Oct. 1. Until now, Bush has been able to keep the spotlight on his proposed spending increases in such areas as education and medical research, which were included in a 207-page budget outline he released Feb. 28. But that document disclosed little about just where the administration intends to reduce government programs to cap the increase in spending at 4 percent next year and make room for the president's proposed \$1.6 trillion, 10-year tax cut.

## Toledo wins Peru presidential first round

LIMA, Peru — Alejandro Toledo finished first in Peru's presidential election, but the U.S.-trained economist and self-styled "Indian with a cause" failed to gain a majority needed to avoid a runoff, according to preliminary results. He will likely face former President Alan Garcia, a left-leaning populist, in a second round in late May or early June. Toledo, 55, who boycotted last year's fraudulent contest against disgraced former President Alberto Fujimori, is still a favorite to win in a runoff vote. But the showing by Garcia in Sunday's election was seen as a stunning political comeback for the cleaning firebrand who ended his five-year term in 1990 amid rampant corruption, 7,650 percent inflation and surging guerrilla violence.

## Israel bombs Gaza Strip

JERUSALEM — A Palestinian was killed overnight during an exchange of fire near the West Bank city of Ramallah that came as the Israeli army bombarded Palestinian targets in the northern Gaza Strip. The Israeli strike, which came in retaliation for a Palestinian mortar shell attack, plunged a town into darkness and injured four people moderately, including a 10-year-old boy. On the outskirts of Ramallah, the body of Palestinian Tayseer el-Monday was found with three bullet wounds early Monday.

## Group of Three promises to defend poor

CARACAS, Venezuela — Mexico, Colombia and Venezuela will create a \$100 million social fund to protect the poor as Latin America dismantles its trade barriers, presidents of the three nations announced. "It's an extraordinary idea (designed) to inject much more social content into the process of integration," Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez said Sunday. "What do we do with the poor? Keep excluding them from all (trade) agreements? No. There can be no integration accord that excludes them because it won't work." Chavez and his Mexican and Colombian counterparts, Vicente Fox and Andres Pastrana, announced the fund after a week-end summit aimed at reviving a 6-year trade block dubbed the Group of Three.

## Northwest, union reach agreement

MINNEAPOLIS — Northwest Airlines and its mechanics reached a tentative agreement early Monday, ending a 4 1/2-year stalemate just days before a board of professional arbitrators was to recommend settlement terms. Steve MacFarlane, president of Local 33 of the Aircraft Mechanics Fraternal Association, said union members would be briefed during the next two weeks in anticipation of a ratification vote on the deal. He would not provide details of the agreement reached during marathon negotiations this week-end before the National Mediation Board. Richard Anderson, chief executive of Northwest Airlines, also confirmed the tentative deal but would not provide details.

facilities.

"The biggest problem is practice rooms," he said. "We only have 10 to 15 practice rooms that are available just for general practicing. So at any given time, there's a line of students trying to get in."

And the condition of the rooms does not help either, he said.

"Rooms are just falling apart," Turay said. "There is water damage on the walls and some of the rooms are just disgusting to work in."

Turay said he feels like the poor condition of the facilities reflects negatively on UK. "It is almost embarrassing when people come to audition and we have to say, 'OK, you can practice in here. Just don't look at anything.'"

Michael Braun, director of the UK Arts Administration Program, shares Clark's and Turay's views about the building where both the music and theatre departments are located.

"Theatres we are working in were built in the 1950s," Braun said. "Standards have changed but we are still dealing with 50-year-old technology."

They are also short on faculty and operating money, he said. But Braun feels confident about Todd.

"I am very optimistic about the new president," he said.

Jane S. Peters, an associate professor who has been in the art department for 26 years, described Todd as a "wild card." She is curious about what Todd will bring to UK's poor artistic life on campus that she finds to be a vital element of any great university.

"Some engineers have great interest in arts and some do not," she said. "And I don't know anything about Todd."

She said people in the arts department feel like they are lacking many things, including facilities, faculty and equipment.

"I feel that we are very marginalized," she said. "We can't use our smart classrooms, because we don't have equipment for that. At the time we get equipment, they are already broken."

Todd said he will attend many of the events at the College of Fine Arts and he plans to meet with the dean of fine arts, Robert Shay, to "learn what their absolute needs as well as their dreams are."

He also said he plans to tour all the facilities to better understand the situation.

Members of the College of Fine Arts said they are ready to improve the quality of arts at UK and hope Todd's response is positive.

"The biggest message I would give to Todd would be to come over to fine arts and spend some time with us," Braun said.

semester. This is called the all-or-nothing rule, Kellie said.

# Resident says ordinance will not prohibit partying

**Misconception: Proposed plan will fine students, not arrest them**

A Transylvania Park resident, who has played a key role in promoting an ordinance that will help monitor the behavior of college students in her neighborhood, says many students have the wrong idea about her efforts.

The College Area Party Plan, which Lisa Johnson has promoted since last fall, is a program designed to alleviate problems Johnson sees in her neighborhood.

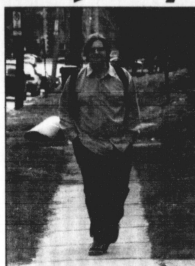
Johnson, along with Lexington Police Chief Larry Walsh, presented the ordinance to the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council last week. The council decided to send the ordinance on to the Services Committee for further review.

A popular misconception among students in her neighborhood, Johnson said, is that they think the ordinance bans partying and allows police officers to arrest them.

"Students do not get arrested," Johnson said. "Instead they get fined. Depending upon the violation, students can be fined no less than \$50 and no more than \$500, Johnson said. The fine amount increases depending on how many times police have dealt with the same student/resident."

Johnson said the ordinance does not prohibit students from partying. "Nobody wants to stop them from partying," she said.

Rather, the program is designed to encourage students to party responsibly. It will also be a way to help police officers that patrol the area. Johnson

said police officers often spend too much time breaking up parties on the weekends when their services are needed elsewhere.

"They are here to protect us and serve us, and it is sad when we have to abuse them because they are here for all of us," she said.

Johnson, who has lived on Transylvania Park for six years, is also a member of the Campus Community Coalition, a coalition that was formed last fall to help deal with problems that arise between UK students and residents. She first learned of the CAPP program from a conference on substance abuse among college students that she attended last November in Pittsburgh.

She hopes the program will help build a positive relationship between students and residents.

"We are not trying to nail students," she said. "I just want them to help me with our neighborhood."

Through civic journalism, maybe the UK community will hear your voice too.

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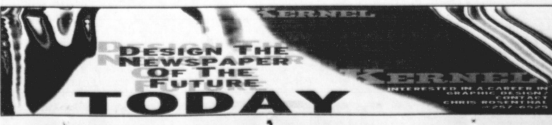

# Latest DiFranco album a case of split personality

Getting personal: Artist bares heart and soul on 'Reveling/Reckoning' double disc

I am completely absorbed in every way by Ani DiFranco's new release, *Reveling/Reckoning*. It has been too long since an artist has sprung deeply into waters of reckless uncertainty without fear. DiFranco is known best for her honest, voice-of-reason lyrics and risky guitar licks. This album includes all these components and much more.

With a double album of 29 new songs, DiFranco left herself plenty of room to explore. The first CD, *Reveling*, invites the audience to travel through the trials of DiFranco's heart. The lyrics are personal and delicate but the music is spirited.

Out of the two CDs, *Reveling* is an acquired taste. *Reckoning*'s songs have no rules and at times follow no rhythm at all. Instead, DiFranco explodes on the scene with a mastery of truth and conviction. She tells it like it felt in the moment it happened.

The highlight of disc one is "Garden of Simple." It's a tribute to the difficulty of holding on to something real in a world that feeds off of what DiFranco calls a "quick fix prescription."

A few other songs that are wonderfully written are "Marrow" and "Heartbreak Even."

The second CD, *Reckoning*, is a total turn around. From the trials of DiFranco's heart, the audience now finds itself face down in the "reckoning" of our everyday battles as people.

The music and lyrics fit each other's mood on this CD. It is the kind of music you can put on and listen to for hours not realizing where the time went. DiFranco has included some trumpet, saxophone and clarinet on *Reckoning*, giving it a soft sound but depressing overtone.

In "The School Night," one of the most beautiful songs I have ever heard, DiFranco writes like a grief-stricken poet with trademark lines such as, "You are a miracle but that is not all/You are a stiff drink and I am on call/You are a party and I am a school night/And I'm looking for my door key but you are my porch light." Another great song from this disc is "Your Next Bold Move."

Opinions of DiFranco's music never ride the fence. You either like it or you don't. *Reveling/Reckoning* holds true to form. For those of you who are fans, treat yourselves to three hours of unpredictable, diverse art.

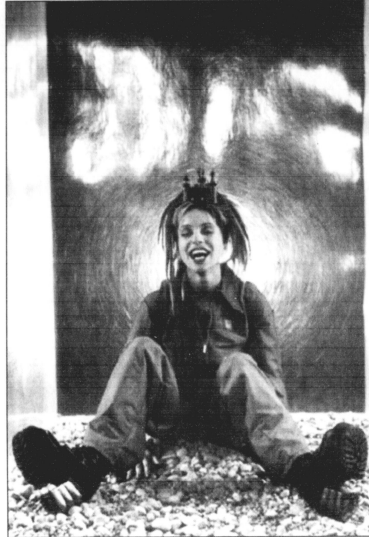

# 'Pollock' an actor's labor of love

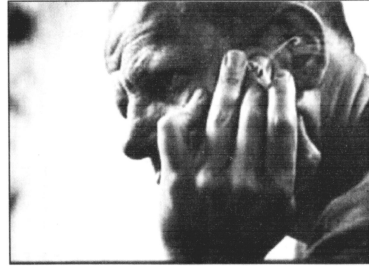

An increased amount of passion seems to be put into a film when an actor decides to try his or her hand at directing. Mel Gibson brought an epic battle of freedom to the screen with *Braveheart*, which won him an Oscar for Best Director. Clint Eastwood's vision in *Unforgiven* led to an Academy Award for Best Picture. Now in *Pollock*, the accomplished Ed Harris fulfills his desire to tell the story of the famous but struggling abstract painter Jackson Pollock.

The film is based on the bi-

ography, "Jackson Pollock: An American Saga," which Harris read several years ago. Obviously, the film became personal to him and that is definitely reflected as he takes on double duty as actor and director.

Mel Gibson's physical likeness to Pollock is only surpassed by his amazing and heart-breaking Oscar-nominated performance. The actor's blank stares and raw emotion bring the sad, tragic painter to life for the world to see. Harris proves once again that he is one of the most talented actors in Hollywood.

The audience experiences Pollock's rise to fame and his spiraling down into hell with

his bout with alcoholism. At times, the film feels like a remake of the wonderful *Leaving Las Vegas*, but the presence of Marcia Gay Harden is far superior to Elizabeth Shue's acting in the Mike Figgis drama.

While many may have been surprised by Harden's recent Best Supporting Actress win at the Oscars, all doubts of the validity of her victory will be erased by viewing her stunning portrayal of Lee Krasner. Krasner is an artist who marries Pollock and sticks by him throughout all of the pain and sadness he gives her. Harden's charm is what makes you like her character, and her strength and com-

mitment is what makes you understand and feel for her.

*Pollock* can be depressing at times because Pollock was a very miserable man. Unfortunately, the failure to really explain why the painter became so distraught that he decided to turn to booze is a downside of the film. An explanation or a history of his family life, which is represented only briefly throughout, may have given a better understanding of Pollock's misery.

Regardless of any small problems with the film, *Pollock* succeeds triumphantly behind the remarkable performances of Harris and Harden. Together they bring the story to life, making Harris's promising directorial debut an astounding film filled with emotion and passion.

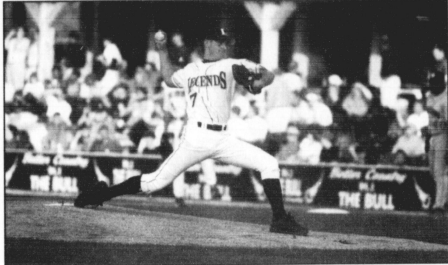

"Nice ice cold Pepsi!" As the field crews performed last-minute preparations on and around the field for the first home game — a 15-1 win — for the new Lexington Legends, 15-year-old Matt Page was hawking those words.

"It's my free ticket to the game," Page said, selling sodas for a fundraiser for his high school band. "I'm excited to be part of this team's history."

Fans who waited in line to enter the ballpark got to permanently place their names in Legends history. An oversized baseball sat in front of the ballpark gates where the fans signed their names.

"This is awesome," said Carrie Marshall of Lexington. "I love the minor leagues — I've gone to tons of games," she said.

By the time the first ball was thrown, the field bore a resemblance to a "field of dreams" — after construction

workers and Legends front office staff scurried over the weekend, adding the final necessities for the fans last night.

The ceremonial first pitch was composed of several pitches thrown by notable people including congressman Ernie Fletcher, R-Ky. Club president Alan Stein and his family got to throw the last pitch.

Official attendance for the historical home opener was 8,067.

The Legends gained an early lead with three runs in the first inning, and stayed strong throughout the game, only letting the Hagerstown Suns score in the ninth inning.

Outfielder Jesse Joyce gave the Legends their first home run in Applebee's Stadium with a two-run shot in the third.

"It was an amazing feeling," Joyce said, who has Kentucky roots.

Joyce commented on the team's powerful lineup.

"The lineup is very thick. One through nine can hit," he

said. The Suns were down by eight after Joyce's homer, with no runs. The Suns' coaching staff called for an early pitching change. Left-handed pitcher John Thomas allowed the Legends to score eight runs on seven hits before he was relieved by RHP Elgin Graham.

By the fifth inning, the Legends had launched their fourth homer, leading 11-0.

In the bottom of the seventh, catcher John Buck drove in another run with a single, giving the Legends a 14-0 advantage.

The historical game ended with a run by the Suns, making the final score 15-1. The Legends will play the Suns through Thursday in a four-game series.

First baseman Brian Schmidt, who had two runs and one hit, spoke favorably of the new ballpark.

"It's definitely a hitter's park," he said. He should know — Schmidt had two runs and a hit last night.

## Organ donation: Keep on giving

*Donating the future. Sign the card to save a life*

Someone you love has been involved in a serious accident. The doctors tell you your loved one has no measurable brain activity. They won't recover. They are going to die.

But your loved one could help save the lives of countless others through organ donation, the doctor tells you. There is just one problem — you have to make the decision.

It is a decision many hope they are never faced with, but it is also a decision that people in need of transplants wish would be answered with a "yes."

Organ and Tissue Donor Awareness Week, which starts Easter Sunday, could be a time for you to make the decision for yourself. It is a simple process. All you have to do is sign a donor card.

And these signatures are needed. The Lexington Herald-Leader reported in Sunday's paper that nationally, only about 39 percent of families who are approached about donating a loved one's organs give permission. In Kentucky, the rate is 48 percent.

There are numerous reasons why people won't consent to donate their loved one's organs. One may be for religious convictions, as some religions do not condone organ donations.

Another reason may be because family members are distraught and unable to think rationally because of the traumatic situation in which they find themselves. Their loved one is already in a great deal of distress and agreeing to donate their organs may be too much to handle emotionally.

It is also rare when people die in circumstances that allow them to be donors, the Herald-Leader reported. In order to qualify, a person must be declared brain dead but their organs must still be functioning. These functioning organs can be used to give a 6-year-old child living in another state a chance at a productive, happy life. They can be used to allow a parent to live long enough to see his or her children graduate from high school. They can be used to save people's lives.

Don't put your family members in the position to make the decision for you. If organ donation sounds like something you might be interested in, then make the decision for yourself.

Say "yes" and give someone else a chance to live a healthier, happier life.

## Theory in the works

## Actions in China justified by American blunders

It seems as though each day military intelligence becomes more and more of a misnomer.

Apparently, the United States decided to fly spy planes over China, easily the least American-friendly power in the world, hoping that maybe no one would notice.

Unfortunately, when you crash into a military plane over Chinese airspace, and when you make an emergency landing in China, the veil of secrecy is pretty much shot.

For the Chinese, who have always been suspicious of the outside world, this attack on their isolationism is very grave. Yet, in the face of an international scandal, they merely asked the United States for a formal apology. None was forthcoming.

Instead, the United States expressed outrage at, well, no one really knows what. I guess the

military command believes that we can fly our planes wherever we please and, should we crash land on foreign soil, the soldiers should be sent home at that government's expense.

Of course, the United States is correct in stating that we would not react the same way in China's shoes. If we caught a Chinese spy plane over U.S. soil, we wouldn't take any hostages or scramble any fighters; we would shoot the plane out of the sky and kill all of the crew.

China is absolutely right to take a hard-line on U.S. espionage over its airspace. China is among the most powerful nations in the world, and its military rivals ours in strength. They are one of the few countries that can stand up to the United States and put our leaders back in their places.

I urge the Chinese to continue their insistence on an American apology for flying, rather carelessly I might add, over their airspace and endangering one of their servicemen.

The American diplomats in China have reported that the U.S. personnel are being treated well pending their release and return. It is notable that despite their outrage at the incident, the Chinese have the honor to be hospitable to the unwelcome soldiers.

If the United States had even close to that measure of honor, we would apologize quickly and have the hostages released.

Bush blames this problem on former President Bill Clinton, who worked with the Chinese as though they were our equals and consequently improved our relations with them.

When the United States accidentally bombed their embassy in Belgrade under his stead, the matter was quickly resolved by an apology and reparations.

Bush should follow in the steps of his far more qualified predecessor. A fast apology to the Chinese and the family of their airman, coupled with some assurance that this incident will not be repeated would go a long way to

healing our relations with China. If, however, Bush stands firm and resorts to military action to free the hostages, we may become embroiled in a terrible war.

While this is not likely, it is frightening, and having a president who's so careless with foreign powers is appalling.

One almost wishes for Bush's daddy.
