

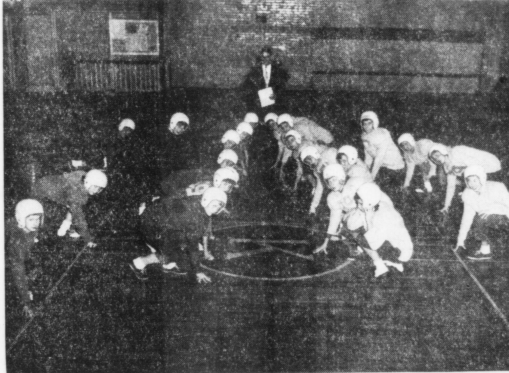

Campus and state celebrities will participate in the mock football game to be played at 7 o'clock tonight at Memorial Coliseum. The giant pep rally will be the "kick-off" for a weekend of Homecoming activities.

Decorations judging, the crowning of the Homecoming king and queen, and a brunch, open house, and dance for alumni will round out the other activities surrounding the Tennessee game.

"Happy" Chandler will be water boy for the Tennessee and Kentucky teams, composed of two girls from each of the campus sports organizations. Dean Sarah B. Holmes and University President, Herman Donovan, have agreed to be line markers again this year. J. B. Faulkner, sports commentator, will narrate the second picnic luncheon.

Ralph Pasolone, Ray Correll, Herby Hunt, and Tommie Karlow and Tommy Adkins will be five of the 10 cheerleaders leading the yells for the Kentucky Wildcats. At halftime the Marching 160 and card section composed of faculty members will perform. They are requested to be at the Coliseum at 6:30 p.m.

Homecoming decorations will be judged from 10-12 a.m. Saturday. Neal Asher, Homecoming chairman, has announced. Judges chosen by the University of Tennessee pep organization, will come from Knoxville to judge the decorations. They will be persons, with no Greek affiliation, Asher said. This will eliminate complaints of unfairness, he said.

UK Seeking TV Channel

Efforts to secure an educational television channel for UK appear not to be blocked entirely, even though a recent request has been turned down by the Federal Communications Commission. Dr. Leo Chamberlain, vice president of the University, said this week.

At the present time three TV channels have been set aside for the Lexington area but are not designated either as commercial or educational. The FCC reports only one request for a commercial license in this area—that of the American Broadcasting Corporation, owners of radio station WLAP. Two channels, therefore, remain for future expansion.

In denying UK's recent application for an educational channel grant, the FCC ruled that not enough evidence was submitted to back up the request. Usually financial backing of the project, detailed present and future plans for TV construction and operation are included in the evidence requirement.

Officials of the University Radio Arts Department are prepared to supply any local commercial TV station with spot news and pictorial feature coverage. An Airsonic single-system sound recording film camera, purchased last summer, will be used for filming UK news developments and productions. Radio Arts representatives say.

Students enrolled in cinematography, a basic course in TV principles, will provide a skeleton crew for handling news assignments.

Youth Exchanges Return Saturday

Three Kentuckians who have been in Europe on the International Farm Youth Exchange for the past six months returned to Lexington Saturday.

They are Lois Taylor, junior in Home Economics, who went to Ireland; Elaine Cowley, '53, who is in Germany; and Nancy Guilford, '52, who was in France.

The IFYE's will be honored with a tea in the Home Economics Building from 1:30 to 4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 29. Also honored at the tea will be Daniel Pizore, from Columbia, South America who is in Kentucky on the International Farm Youth Exchange Plan. Daniel arrived in Kentucky in October and will return to South America Jan. 19.

The returned IFYE's will be guest speakers at the Phi Delta Theta alumni meeting Monday. For the next few months they will give talks over the state concerning the country they visited.

She has also studied at Havana High School of Dance, Martha Graham School of Contemporary Dance, and New Dance Group Studio.

Mr. Kivimäki is a member of the UK music faculty and directs the University Mixed Chorus. He holds degrees from Ohio State University and has studied in New York.

The University String Quartet is composed of Dr. Kenneth Wright, 1st violin; Mr. Joseph Pival, 2nd violin; Mr. Marvin Rubin, viola; and Mr. Gordon Kinney, cello.

Mr. Pival is a high school string teacher in Lexington and is one of the members of the quartet are members of the UK music faculty. Accompanists for the program are Mrs. Viola Kivimäki and Barbara Weesner. Mrs. Kivimäki has appeared as her husband's accompanist for the majority of his recitals. SGA Studies Proposal Increasing Membership

An amendment to have class officers elected to serve as Student Government Association representatives was suggested at an SGA meeting Monday night.

The proposed amendment, made by Ann Marie O'Rourke, Constitutional, would give SGA the power to set up the dates and methods necessary to elect four representatives from the freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior classes. The text of Miss O'Rourke's proposal is:

"The assembly of the Student Government Association shall have the power of prescribing the time and method of holding elections in the four classes and shall have the power to designate by amending Article 3, section B of the constitution, or by a by-law that any one of the elected officers should be ex-officio members of the assembly."

Reasons Set Forth - "The reasons for suggesting and advocating this change are: 1. There would be a better representation of the student body in SGA. This amendment would add approximately 16 members to SGA, which is supposed to represent the whole student body through a little more than 20 people. With this amendment, there would not only be wider student sentiment expressed, but there would also be the feelings of the individual classes supported as well as those of the various colleges.

"This amendment, which has been previously suggested by the Alumni Association, would definitely be a benefit to the University in keeping in contact with the alumni and organizing class reunions. A survey of southern schools last year (Continued on Page 3)

Better Representation Possible If SGA Accepts Class Officers

An SGA committee has recently come up with what we consider a worthwhile proposal in regard to Assembly membership. In an effort to increase the number of student representatives in the organization, the committee has set forth a plan to include officers of the four classes as members of the Student Government Association.

Discussion of the proposed amendment to the SGA constitution has been postponed until the Assembly meets on Monday. In the meantime, present members would be wise in giving the suggestion a great deal of consideration. It's not an easy step to take. It involves forethought, as well as careful organization. Unless the matter is worked out in detail and clarified for the students, there will be such disinterest from the student body that the whole idea will be just so much wasted effort.

The basis of the proposal is sound . . . to allow more representation in an organization that is supposed to put the students' interest uppermost. However, a similar attempt in the 30's to include class officers in SGA did not meet with much success. At that time so much dirty politicking and ballot-box stuffing was evident that the Administration was compelled to appoint the officers. Such interference should not be necessary if the selecting of class officers is conducted as in regular SGA elections.

In accepting class officers as members of SGA, the Assembly must designate how many and which offices would be included in the organization. Whether it is advisable to incorporate all four officers or only the president and vice president from each class should be decided upon before presenting the recommendation to the student body. In addition, the details of election must be ironed out to avoid any confusion connected with the voting.

An underlying purpose in advocating the passage of such an amendment is directed at inter-class rivalry. If it is possible, through election of officers and more organization within the classes, to gain friendly class competition, it would certainly be a step in the right direction. With such a nucleus from which to work, student interest and spirit could expand immeasurably. At present only senior class officers are elected and their activities deal solely with commencement.

A third point, brought out in the proposal, concerns the alumni. Having class officers would be an advantage in organizing class reunions and keeping in contact with UK alumni. The University Alumni Association had suggested such a plan in the past but failed to get any action.

The only significant change such an amendment would bring about in the structure of SGA would be in its membership regulations. However, the increased membership would result in better representation for the Independents. With officers being elected by the individual classes, composed largely of non-Greeks, a larger number of Independents would be elected to office.

In passing such an amendment, hasty decisions must be avoided. Consequently, we suggest that SGA should accept the recommendation, wait until next year to put it into effect. By rushing to pass the proposal in time for the December elections this year, adequate consideration of the plan is not possible.

The ballet partner of dancer Jeannette did an ungracious prat-fall during a big number, Gordon "Shorty" MacRae was left shifting his feet on stage when Sullivan blew a cue, and the "Toast curtain, per usual, swept props and players off stage with reckless abandon. Ronald Combs has been named as an alternate member of the Law College's Moot Court Competition team which is representing UK in the regional at St. Louis Nov. 13-20.

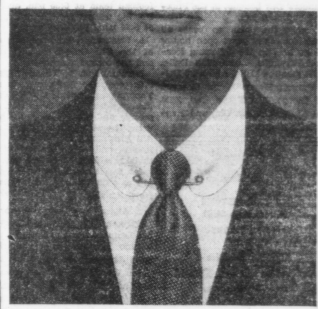

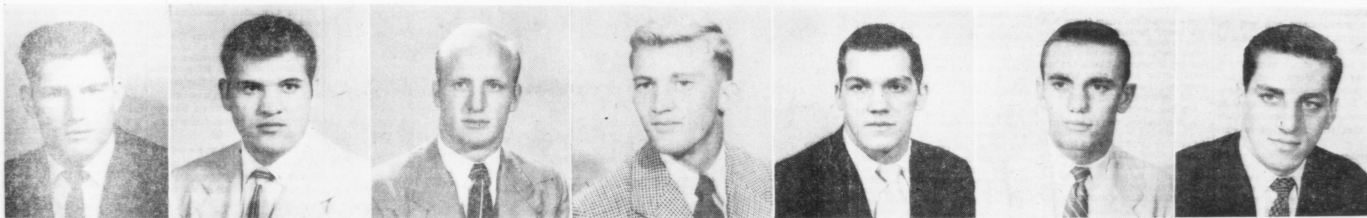

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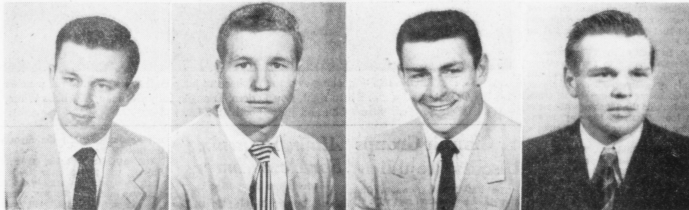

The Volunteers got on the winning way by trouncing the University of Chattanooga, Moccasin 40-7. The Crimson Tide of Alabama played them to a 0-0 tie. The University of Louisville Cardinals were then taken into camp to the tune of 39-6. Coach Harvey Robinson's charge then defeated the University of North Carolina Tarheels, 20-6.

Tennessee showed that they were still a power by trouncing a good Louisiana State Bengal eleven 32-6. Last week the Vols went down to Florida and took the Gators in an unexpectedly tight game. The score in this one was 9-7. The Vols just missed losing this one when the Gators missed a field goal on the last play of the game.

Wade Is Vol Star
The big gun in the Volunteer attack is tailback Jimmy Wade. This 183 pound junior leads the Vols in total offense. In the eight games played to date he has a total of 835 yards gained. On the ground he has gained 510 yards and has passed for 325. Wade also leads in scoring, 36 points; in punt returns; pass interceptions; kickoff returns; and in number of punts.

Both teams will be in good physical condition. All-America Ray Correll and Dave Kuhn, fresh center, were in the infirmary. Both are expected to be in playing shape tomorrow.

Forward Wall Tough
The Tennessee forward wall, always great, was slow to get started but finally has gotten rolling and

has made itself conspicuous on defense in the last five ball games that the Vols have played. The big men on the forward wall are, guards Frank McCroskey and John Powell. The single wing needs good guards in order to work and these two leads are terrific on defense as well as on offense.

The Orange Orge's tackles are manned by Bob Fisher and Darris McCord. These two played a terrific game on defense last week at Florida against the Gators. At center is Lamar Leachman. Assisting Jimmy Wade in the backfield are Bill Barbish, blocking back; Jerry Hyde, wingback; Ted Schwanger, fullback. The Vols have also been helped greatly in the backfield by Dave Griffith, second team tailback, who has relieved Wade capably on several occasions.

The Vols are not a passing team but when they do pass you had better watch out. Jim Wade has done the bulk of the Tennessee throwing and has hit 17 of 39 pass attempts. This gave him a very creditable 42 per cent.

In the standings before going into the game the Vols are rated first in the pass defense department. The Wildcats are currently rated second.

Cats Face No-Hedless Team
This will mark the second time that the Cats have gone on the field and not had to face a Neyland coached team since 1926. In 1925, General Neyland was called to Panama on army business and the Cats walked off the field with a victory. Tomorrow Neyland will be here but he will be in the capacity of Athletic Director and not as coach. It has been said in some circles that he is still doing the coaching.

The principle targets for Tennessee aerials are Jerry Hyde and wingman Roger Borroff. These two men have caught over fifty per cent of the passes and scored four of the six touchdowns that have been scored by pass.

Tennessee, like Kentucky has been plagued by the extra point and has made a little over half of them. The weatherman said that tomorrow will be wet and cold. The Tennessee and Kentucky bands will be there to warm you up.

Wildcats Trounce Vols, 27-0 --1935

Sacrificing an important offense and concentrating all the strength on defense, a band of Kentucky Wildcats held in check Tennessee's touchdown twins, Eugene McEver and Buddy Hackman, to score a 0-0 moral victory over the favored Volunteers. The game was played in Knoxville on Thanksgiving Day of 1926.

The tie thwarted the Vols' chances for the Southern Conference championship and marked the first Tennessee record in decades. This game alone placed the name of Kentucky on the roster of outstanding teams of 1926.

Realizing that his weak backfield stood little chance of scoring against

the powerful Tennesseans, Wildcat Coach Harry Gamadge devised a special defense designed to concentrate the UK power at the ends to stop the Vol's chief offensive threat, wide end evens by the swift running "Mack" and "Hack".

Excluding a 26 yard sprint by "Mack" following an attempted pass, Tennessee was effectively forced to register all its yardage on short time consuming power plays.

Although they rolled up 13 first downs to Kentucky's six, the over anxious Vols wasted scoring opportunities with numerous penalties.

Kentucky used only four substitutions, in displacing great team play and no outstanding individual while McEver was easily the star for Tennessee.

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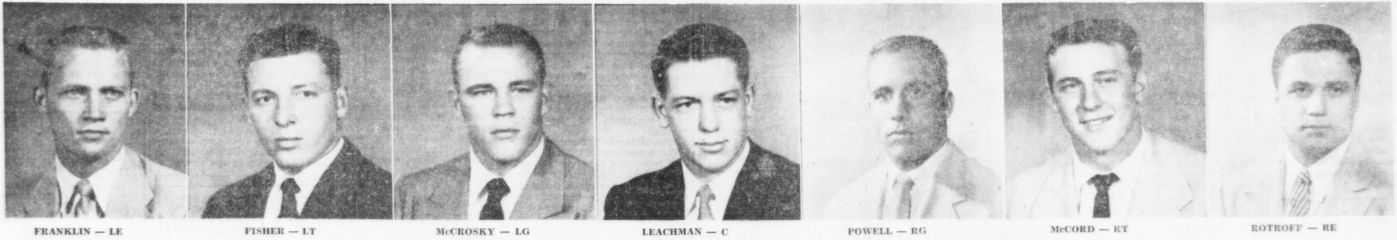
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For The Orange And White:



Well, that time of the year has again pushed upon us and all the papers in this vicinity will be comparing scores of this year's UK and Tennessee squads and bookies will be giving the Vols or the Cats so many points and everyone will be spouting off about how long it has been since the Wildcats have downed a Tennessee squad.

This all will make good reading but when it comes right down to it, isn't the game this week, and not in past years, the most important? So we will attempt to evaluate the squads in this space and leave history out.

The Cat line, over-all, will out-weigh the Tennessee line but by only two pounds. The total weight of the beef in the UK front line is 1339 pounds while the Vols total only 1337. That is an average of 191.2 for Kentucky and 191 for the Vols. There isn't much difference in that department.

In the backfield, UK tops the single-wing brothers from the southern state by 15 pounds per man, 195 to 180. This in itself isn't strange until you consider that the single-wing uses power and brute force in the backfield while the split-T formation is one of deception and less power with more speed.

Guard Ray Correll will outweigh his opponent at guard, Charles Coffey, by 25 pounds. He, no doubt, will spend quite a bit of time in the UT backfield as in past games. This may be the edge needed.

At ends for UK and Tennessee will be two of the smallest in major college football today. The Cats will have Larry "Dude" Hennessy who stands 5'8" and weighs only 175 but can move a mountain as well as the 200 pounder. On the end for UT will be little Roger Rottroff at 5'10" and 185 pounds.

One fellow whom we thought we would see a lot of this year after his performance in last year's 14-14 tie was tailback Pat Shires. He appeared to us as the class of tailbacks but upon observation of the starting roster and the three deep offensive line-ups, we find him running fourth string this year. His punching at the line last year continually put the Wildcats in a hole which they barely could squeeze out of for the tie.

With all these facts in mind, and an open mind at that, we will go along with a hunch that has been prying at us for the past couple of weeks and predict a Wildcat win over the brethren from Knoxville. When we say win, we mean a more lopsided win than most observers figure.

We'll keep our fingers crossed, toss salt over our left shoulder, watch out for black cats and ladders and anything else which might aid the Sugar Bowl-bound Bryantment, truly the greatest "Comeback Kids" in the past ten years.

There is talk going around campus concerning a holiday of one, two or possibly three days providing the Cats should whip Tennessee. We will go along with that. After all, a couple of days aren't too much in comparison with the 18 years since UK really had something to cheer about following a Tennessee game. What about it Mr. Ad Ministration?

If our hunting knowledge doesn't fail us, coon dogs are used to hunt Wildcats? Tennessee has a new mascot, Snokey, a thoroughbred blue coon hound dog who will make his initial appearance in Kentucky tomorrow afternoon.

It doesn't take a hound dog to hunt out the Wildcats this year. They can be found anywhere in the top 15 teams in the country. Maybe the Vols will need him to find their way back home, come

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Saturday night. The UT brochure says that Snokey doesn't like Wildcats but that can be turned around easily enough.

The Wildcat's most convincing win over Tennessee came in 1893, 56-0 while the best the Vols have managed is a 46-0 trouncing in 1938.

One of the great performers in last year's Tennessee game and during the season, Tackle Frank Fuller, is making quite a name for himself these days as the only rookie on the starting defensive team of the Los Angeles Rams. Last Sunday against the pro Chicago Cardinals, he played every minute on defense.

The game tomorrow will be the fourth straight Homecoming day period in which the Vols have participated. They have won the previous three, wrecking the Alum Days for North Carolina, LSU and Florida.

Kentucky's freshman squad walloped Vanderbilt's Baby Commodore 32-0 at Dudley Field last Friday, completing the Kitten season with a clean slate of two victories and no setbacks.

Delmar Hughes generated UK's sparking offense which scored three times in the first quarter and came back with two in the final period. Henry George led off the attack with an 88 yard scamper on the kickoff to put Kentucky in the lead which was never to be relinquished. Hughes missed the conversion.

A Vanderbilt fumble on its own 30 yard line and the exchange of downs was all that was needed to produce the second Kentucky marker. Hughes sneaked over from the one for the touchdown, after he had set the play up with a 12 yard pass to End J. T. Frankenberg. Hughes also converted the extra point.

Moran Sets Up TD
End Ralph Moran set up the next Wildcat score on a blocked Vanderbilt punt. Moran also scored the touchdown on a 30 yard aerial from Hughes. Hughes then lined up for the extra point kick, but he faked the kick and scooted across for the conversion.

The following two quarters went scoreless with the Baby Commodores on offense most of the time. Fumbles plagued the scoring drives of both teams. Kentucky threatened in the second period, but the drive was halted when Full-

back Jim Gibson fumbled on the Vanderbilt 14.

Kitten Offense Clicks

The Kitten offense began to click again in the fourth period on an intercepted pass and a 34 yard march which set the ball on the Vanderbilt one yard marker. Hughes then plunged for the score. Hughes conversion attempt failed.

Cat halfback, set up the next UK counter on an intercepted pass which he carried back to the Vandy five. George bulled his way over from the five on the next play.

Kentucky's leading ground gainer was Halfback Ivan Curran who racked up 45 yards in 11 tries. Fullback Frank Fetett, a converted tackle, gained 22 yards in eight attempts for UK's second place ground gainer.

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Digests Recap Past In Tennessee Rivalry

Editor's Note: Below is a collection of thumbnail capsules of Kentucky-Tennessee football games from 1901-1928. In spots, there are names and accounts lacking due to the absence of coverage complete enough to write short coverage.

1901-Kentucky 6, Tennessee 8
Brothers Hogan and W. B. Vance teamed up to give Tennessee a 6 to 0 drubbing at Knoxville in the second Kentucky vs. Tennessee game in history. Hogan was high scorer of the year with eight touchdowns to his credit. His brother was captain of the team that year.

1906-Kentucky 21, Tennessee 0
L. H. Cain scored twice in the second half to insure Kentucky of its second straight win over the Vols. The game was somewhat of a slug fest, but only one player, Right Tackle R. T. Brewer, was expelled from the game. Left Halfback McKinney also scored for the boys from Lexington. The crowd of 2,100 was one of the largest groups to have witnessed any ball game for several seasons.

1908-Kentucky 6, Tennessee 5
In this year the five-point touchdown was still in effect. The highlight of the game was an 84-yard run by Tennessee Halfback Calahan which put the ball on the Kentucky

15-yard line. And then Tennessee "by 30 tricks and line plunges put the ball over for the only touchdown.

1903-Kentucky 17, Tennessee 0
Tennessee had been highly rated all year, and were slated for the conference championship. However, a highly improved Kentucky football eleven went to Knoxville without looking at the Tennessee press clippings and gave themselves the same chance as the championship as the Vols had had prior to the game.

1910-Kentucky 10, Tennessee 0
No account available.

1911-Kentucky 12, Tennessee 0
Although greatly outweighed, and a cold wet day to cope with, Kentucky, behind the razzle dazle running of Left Halfback Gaiser managed to come out on top of a decidedly rough and tumble ball game. Gaiser ran 15 yards and 45 yards for the two Kentucky tallies.

1912-Kentucky 12, Tennessee 6
Left tackle and captain of the Kentucky football team, G. H. Harrison was the standout of this game. In the first quarter Harrison blocked a Tennessee punt, picked it up and ran 85 yards for the Cats' first touchdown. The game was characterized by numerous penalties against Kentucky, and "the hat"

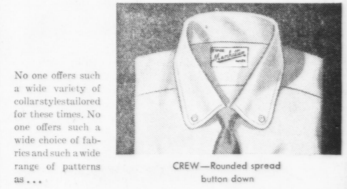
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Barristers Drop SAE For I-M Grid Crown

Basketball opened Wednesday night with 20 fraternity teams and 23 Independent groups. Games are being played in Alumni Gym and Memorial Coliseum.

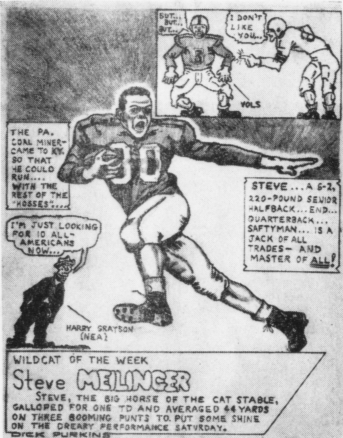

Kentucky's Wildcats, dreaming about tomorrow's war with Tennessee, were furnished with a nightmare as they fumbled and stumbled their way to a 20-7 win over "better-than-average" Memphis State.

Slightly more than 20,000 fans sat on the edge of their seats for two and a half quarters last Saturday afternoon before Steve "Horse" Melinger personally took charge of the contest. After scoring the Cats' initial TD from four yards out on a beautiful pitch out from Bob Hardy, Steve intercepted a Tiger aerial, setting up the second Wildcat score and choosing of a State scoring threat.

Punting is Great Besides running for 27 yards on five rushes, the Pennsylvania punter averaged 44 yards on three booming punts. Big Steve's punting has improved with each game.

Steve came to UK highly-rated, and in 1950, he showed why, catching every football thrown his way

for a good freshman team.

In 1951, as a sophomore, Big Steve continued his pass snaggng genius, hauling in 41 pitches for 576 yards and eight touchdowns. The combination of Steve and Babe Parrill was instrumental in carrying the Cats to the Cotton Bowl where they made the All SEC team (as a sophomore) and made honorable mention for All American from the AP, UP, and The New York Daily News.

Last season, playing for an up and down Wildcat team, the Bethlehem buster started his trouble shooting roll, first at end, next at quarterback, and then at halfback. Steve passed for 127 yards on four completions out of 17 throws for one touchdown; caught 16 arials for 326 yards and six TD's; averaged 6.3 yards per try rushing, totaling 282 yards in 61 carries; averaged 38.9 yards on 26 punts; averaged 30.3 yards on kickoff runbacks; and led in scoring with 48 points, the same total he garnered in '51.

Again Makes All-America He again made the All SEC team, made honorable mention for UP All American, second team mentions for INS, and first team on the New York Daily News, the NEA, and the Gridiron Record squads. Many All American selectors passed the big boy up because they were too lazy to take the time to figure out at what position to put him.

This season, the Horse has not been as spectacular, as most people expected him to be, because, as Coach Bryant pointed out, "everybody's pointing for Steve. They set their defense up to stop him." But Steve, if not the glory-gobler he was expected to be, has been a steady leader-type player.

Any All American group that omits the name "Steve Melinger" lacks the one thing that makes that squad complete—a player sound in all the fundamentals of football.

(Continued from Page 7) period was marked by frequent discussions arising from the employment of the visiting team ("Kentucky" of alleged irregular tactics."

1915—Kentucky 7, Tennessee 13 Tennessee scored all its touchdowns on long pass plays which covered a total of 125 yards, although the ground was wet and it rained intermittently during the game. Tuttle scored the single Kentucky touchdown and also added the PAT.

1916—Kentucky 6, Tennessee 23 This game climaxed the season for both teams and Tennessee claimed the southern championship of the SIAA, the predecessor to the present Southeastern Conference.

1917—Kentucky 6, Tennessee 9 "Doc" Rodes, playing with an injured shoulder, booted two field goals to give Kentucky this victory. It was the last game for Kentucky star fullback and captain, Charles Schrader. The game was played in Lexington before a record crowd of 5,000.

1918—Kentucky 6, Tennessee 6 A 65-yard run by "Doc" Rodes was denied Kentucky by the referee when he ruled the pass to Rodes an incomplete. Rodes, in the last quarter, tried a 25-yard field goal but the ball fell short by only inches. The 1918 team was composed entirely of native Kentuckians, and there were no substitutions for either team. Kentucky's ordinarily speedy ball club was slowed by mud and wet grounds.

1919—Kentucky 13, Tennessee 8 Junior Fullback Fuller scored both Kentucky touchdowns in the first quarter, one of the runs being for 75 yards.

1920—Kentucky 7, Tennessee 14 Fullback Williams intercepted a Tennessee pass and scampered 70 yards for the lone Kentucky tally. Bill Lane, Tennessee end, scored the first Tennessee TD on a pass, and the second score came on a line buck from the three-yard line.

1921—Kentucky 6, Tennessee 4 On a cold rainy day, both teams played an altogether listless ball game. The only real thrill came when a Tennessee halfback fumbled a punt on his own three-yard line and the ball was not recovered by either ball team for several seconds because of the wet ground.

1922—Kentucky 7, Tennessee 14 Although Tennessee showed the best pass offense the Wildcats had

UK Tips Memphis State, 20-7

The Whatnow Wildcats, after struggling through a scoreless first half, scored three times in the second half to squeak past a surprisingly strong Memphis State eleven, 20-7, before 20,000 surprised fans at Stull Field last Saturday afternoon.

The Wildcats could never get their offense started because of their inability to hold the ball as they fumbled consistently throughout the game. Time after time their scoring threats were stopped as Memphis State's defense blocked and Kentucky led 6-0.

Early in the fourth period Melinger intercepted a State pass and in six plays the Cats moved for and score as Herb Hunt passed to Howard Schellenberger in the end zone. Don Netoskie converted and the Cats led 13-0.

Pans began breathing a bit easier then, but before too long a breath could be taken, State came and in 11 plays, all on the ground. A

recovered the ball six times. The Cats' first TD came in the third period as they went 57 yards great take by Quarterback Bob Hardy topped the drive as he later passed to Joe Clayton in the end zone on fourth down to make it 13-7.

Halfback Joe Platt scored the final Cat TD as he made a spectacular 44-yard run with two minutes left in the game. Hardy made the try for the extra point good and the game wound up UK 20, MS 7.

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
