U.S. District Judge Jack Weinstein nullified yesterday the federal government's first oil and natural gas leases in the Atlantic Ocean. The action forbids any drilling on the 214,000 acres, 50 to 90 miles off the coast, that were leased to 39 oil companies for \$1.13 billion last Jugust.

Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus said yesterday investigations of four natural gas fields in the Gulf of Mexico found reduced production, and he called for a sweeping study to see if he should order a speedup of gas production.

8,200 coal miners in southern West Virginia are now participating in a wildcat strike and a spokesman for the West Virginia Coal Association said yesterday they were losing \$450,000 a day in wages. The spokesman said the strike also was costing about 70,000 tons daily in production. The dispute was reported to have begun Feb. 4 when a dispatcher was named in preference to a miner with more seniority. Strikers said the worker with more seniority was qualified for the job but Eastern Associated Coal Corp. officials said appointments based solely on seniority, discriminated against men who might be better qualified.

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Misdirected policy supports S. Africa

Prospects for majority rule in Southern Africa have dimmed recently after diplomatic ventures by the U.S. and the British failed. And, the news that South Africa's nuclear industry has developed or is close to developing an atomic bomb doesn't bolster the hopes of majority rule proonents.

bomb doesn't bolster the hopes of majority rule proponents. The racist minority regime in South Africa cannot practically expect to use the bomb to halt the border skirmishes and urban black revolts that it has been subject to in recent years. Rather, Prime Minister John Vorster's government will use its nuclear capability as a diplomatic weapon. That diplomatic pressure will be directed toward the Soviet Union, which has made military and economic support of small Marxist governments in Africa a major aspect of its foreign policy. As the Russian aid increased, the South Africans allowed information about their nuclear capability, previously a top government in the properties of the strength o nuclear capability, previously a top gove secret, to filter ou

Secret, to Inter out.
Unfortunately, the South African government's resistance of majority rule will probably
gain momentum because of its nuclear
capability and immense supplies of uranium for

nuclear power production. South Africa nets about \$1.4 billion annually from uranium exports and, following the completion of a massive nuclear.plant in the mid-1980's, export revenues can be boosted by another \$500 million.

can be boosted by another \$500 million.

Sadly, the United States, as the world's leading dealer of nuclear arms, is to blame. American resources and American scientists made South Africa's nuclear capability possible. "We can ascribe our degree of advancement today in large measure to training and assistance so willingly provided by the United States," says South Africa's atomic energy director.

This massive U.S. aid points out the inexplicable misdirections of past U.S. foreign policy. The government has wrongly allowed nuclear industries to supply foreign governments, thus increasing with every sale the prospects of nuclear and to South Africa is not

Past U.S. nuclear aid to South Africa is not combatible with the stated policy supporting majority rule. Accordingly, President Carter has promised to undo policy which has made the U.S. the "world's arms merchant."

That's a campaign promise we hope he keeps

Consumer focus... Auto service rip-offs at peak in winter

The nasty Lexington winter has caused some changes we've all heard about—a gas shortage, a shutdown of schools, factories and retail stores. It also costs us all in terms of money, time, and

patience was taxed the most when I got into My patience was taxed the most when I got into my car in the morning and turned the key. More often thannot, the sub-zero weather produced a dull protest from each of the four cylinders. Repeated confrontations convinced me that the engine was on strike, and to do anything but leave a



afety light burning under the hood at night was tantamount to an unfair labor practice.

Not surprisingly, the cold weather was a boon to many tow truck operators and auto prepair people.

Most of them provided life-saving service when they came out in the bone chilling weather to start or move the contrary pieces of machinery we five. But others saw the cold as a convenient development allowing them to get customer into the shop for unnecessary repairs.

Dorne Brown, a L K grad student, met one of the bad ones. The firm she dealt with came out to start her car. It wouldn't start, they told her, because it needed a tume up. So they took it in and replaced the spark plugs and distributor points.

Even after paying \$40 to have this operation performed, Ms. Brown's car gave her problems. She took it to another shop and was told the car had not needed a tune-up in the first place, but that another operation needed to be performed. Many of us expect to be cheated when we deal with things we know very little about. And, unfortunately, kew people know enough about their cars to protect themselves from being had. But even the people who know a little something about their cars are often ripped off. To save money and protect yourself from truble with the repair people, a few basic tips are in order.

1. Do as many of your own repairs as possible: There are many things that can be done with a minimum of time, effort, and expertise.

An all change, for example, is an easy operation to perform. Any healthy car owner who pays a service station to drain the crankcase and pour in ewe of list was simple, though you have to work with slightly more sophisticated tools.

A number of books are available, some even written for a particular make and model of car, with pictures and instructions on repairs. I have used a number of those books, justifying my original investment the first time I made a repair. Consider the possibilities. A tune-up will run about 80. That's about how much it would cost to buy the book, the tools and the parts the first time you want to do a tune-up. After that, using the book to learn to perform even simple repairs or services represents a return on that investment.

2. If you take your car to a service station or repair shop, check out the business first. There are

will provide good service. Obviously, if you've dealt with a service station for years and the owners know they'll lose your business if they give you a bad deal, you're in good shape.

But if you don't patronize a station regularly, a good way to find out about them is to call the Better Business Bureau to see if if it has been subject to numerous complaints.

A problem with this method of determination is it might not reflect grievances about new businesses. Another problem is that others may have had trouble with the service but did not complain to the

BBB.

3. Steer clear of stations using "flat rate" manuals: There are two ways commonly used to figure labor charges. One way is to charge the customer for the number of hours it takes to perform a particular repair. That is, multiply the "clock hours" by the rate the station charges per hour to determine the labor charge. Under the other method, a standard manual is used, telling how long a particular operation ought to take. The charge is then based on that number of hours, not how long it actually took to perform the service.

service.

Proponents of the manuals defend their use because they allow the mechanic to guarantee ahead of time how long the job will take thereby protecting the consumer from slow mechanics. The fallacy of this argument is that most mechanics know how long it will take to do a particular job, simply because they've done it before.

Another problem is that the mechanics will always be able to beat the book, by as much as 50 per cent, according to some studies. So if the book

says it'll take 2.3 hours to replace a flyfrock on a flammerstat, and the mechanic does it in an hour and a half, he's making money. If he took any more than that to do it, you wouldn't want him working on your car anyway because it would show his inefficiency.

5. Use specialty shops on big repairs.

Repairs on the transmission, muffler work, and Repairs on the transmission, muffler work which specialize in particular types of work tend to be sightly less expensive because they are able to buy the parts in bulk and are able to train people to do only limited kind work. Another advantage of the specialty shop is that they I be less likely to find other things "that needed to be done while I was in there."

6. Get estimates: An important part of the pre-service estimate is that it allows the customer to force the station to stick to a price. It also gives the opportunity to take the auto to another station and see if the price or even the fault diagnosis is different.
This list can't possibly protect you from all possible car repair problems. But a basic un-derstanding of your car and a little common sense can make owning a car seem more like a con-venience and less like a burden.

The Upstart (row. 735 South Broadway, boasts one of Lexington's oldest bars, hand-carved and complete with griffin gargoyles watching customers from above It was made in Bulwaria, shipped to New Orleans and brought up the Mississippi River to Paducah.

From there the bar made an overland journey by covered wagon, destination Tyron, in Anderson County, At the turn of the century, the bar was packed up once again and brought to Lexington to be used in the old Dark Horse Tavern, where the Upstart Crow is

I bought the Dark Horse for a small sum, mainly to get hold of this piece," Adams said. "Today I could get \$10,000 for the bar alone at a West Coast auction."

Several other Lexington antique bar-owners bought their bars from Adams, He discovered the bars bought by Postlewaite's Restaurant and Greenstreet's. Each is over 100 years old.

"He was a big, fleshy man, a rich gambler with diamonds this big on his fingers. He didn't give a dem about anybody or arything. And on those hot, muggy nights he used to strip to the waist, and put his rocking chair on the cuts. He'd rock and cuss and drink beer all night. He didn't give a dern about anything. Collie was according." was awright.

Postelwaite's co-owner. Dudley Webb, bought Collie's bar for \$1,500 and had it refinished. Now the bar is worth \$20,000.

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Greenstreet's, also located on Vine Street, has a bar that is old, everyone knows that, but how old or where it came from is still a mystery. The bar was found in pieces, stored in a garage, Greenstreet's owners bought it from an old vending salesman, Lewis Bogie and it is affectionately called "Bogie's Bar."

"We kind of like being able to say we don't know where it came from or anything about its past," said co-owner Steve Silliman. "It adds to the thing's mystique."

The bar itself is solid oak, with a 27-foot counter and the original mirror intact. "I wish this damn thing could talk, cause millions of people have stood over it telling some sad stories," Silliman said.

Mac's Bar. 601 W. Main Street, also has an antique bar which "has been around," according to one bar stool warmer. But unlike the other antique bars in town, this one was not bought specifically for decoration. It just came with the building.

The bar used to be in the Mainspring, a neighborhood bar located on the corner of Main and Spring streets until urban renewal leveled the building. Before that if had graced the pub at the old Drake Hotel around 1914.

The bar has never been refinished and is black with age. Its countertop is marred with small dips worn from years of elbows and beer mugs. "This is a working man's bar, you know. Not a lot of millionaires here, just good people;" said one customer.

The bar's made of mahogany, walnut and cherry tood, with a marble base."It looks just like a pretty airl, smooth and friendly." the customer laughed. It's just not as warm."

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

THE GREAT GRAMMY GAME

Popular music fans can watch the music industry's exercise in self-recognition tomorrow night at 9:30 on Channel 27.

The 19th Annual Grammy Awards will be broadcast live from the Hollywood Palladium so the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences can honor what it perceives as artistic and technical achievement for 1976.

You can knock the Grammy Awards all you want. Most people do, it's great sport. But it's also fun to see who's in the audience, who bothers to show up to accept awards and, for what it's worth, to see who wins.

Monumental bloopers are commonplace on these kinds of awards shows, too. For instance, one year Mel Torme pronounced Chick Corea's first name as "Chuck." And

at this year's Don Kirshner Rock Music Awards, hostess Diana Ross referred to Natalie Cole as "Natalie Wood."

The selection process for Grammy nominees has come under attack for harboring conflicts of interest and for its questionable pool of nominators. Another questionable aspect, pointed out by Rolling Stone critic Dave Marsh, is the staggering list of artists who have never been included for Grammy recognition.

A few of these are the Rolling Stones, Allman Brothers, Bob Dylan, Joan Baez, Rod Stewart, Jackson Browne, The Band, Randy Newrant, the Byrds and Led Zeppelin. Hard to believe, huh?

Nevertheless, some Kernel staffers—including myself, assistant arts editor Tom Clark and reporters Chas Main and Walter Tunis—decided we'd like to get into the act. On page 3 of this section is a compilation of our choices—who we think

ought to win and who we predict will win in the major ca tegories.

For fear of massive arts staff defections, let me point out that we generally don't go along with the Grammy nomination choices. I mean, how can you talk about 1976 without mentioning Jackson Browne's Pretender album or LP's by Dylan, Steely Dan, Eagles, Santana, Wings, Jeff Beck, Weather Report or Bob Seger also released in 1976? 


