## Death Comes To Mrs. J. E. Rogers

At the advanced age of ninety-seven years, Mrs. Jere Early Rogers died at her home, 120 North Hanover Avenue, at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon after an illness of six months.

Born January 16, 1860, Mrs. Nettie Howell Rogers was the daughter of David and Anna Gist Howell of Montgomery County. Of pioneer stock, she was descended from the Gist and Hammond families of Baltimore and Annapolis and the Howell family of Delaware.

She was educated at Sayre Institute and in 1883 married Jere Early Rogers, great-grandson of Joseph Hale Rogers of Bryan Station. Of their four children, Mrs. Rogers is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Anderson Gratz and Mrs. Harry Giovannoli of Lexington; three grandchildren, Mrs. George Stone Thomson, Dr. C. Edwards Case Jr., and Philip Case, and three great-grandchildren of Somerville, New Jersey.

One of the few remaining real daughters of a soldier of the War of 1812, Mrs. Rogers was a member of the Lexington Chapter of the DAR, a Gold Star Mother, an early member of the Woman's Club and until the past two years an active member of the First Presbyterian Church.

Services will be held at the W. R. Milward Mortuary chapel at 3 p.m. Saturday. Dr. William V. Gardner and the Rev. H. W. Alexander, officiating. Burial in the Lexington Cemetery.
