Supervised Study Course Would Aid Freshmen

Would Aid Freshmen

For the past few years, the University of Buffalo has been experimenting with a course in supervised study, required of all entering students who ranked in the lower fifth of their high school graduating classes.

Given for a three-week period preceeding the opening of the university, the training includes drill in English composition, reading, note-taking, library reference work, and an introduction to the fundamental concepts in the social and physical sciences. There are also extensive tests and individual conferences to supplement the class work. Upon completion of the course, a few are not allowed to enter the university and doubtful cases are recommended for reduced schedules.

It is found that the trained students, in comparison with those who entered the University before the introductory course was instigated, showed an advantage with respect to persistent study, that they achieved a higher average, and that they remained in college loinger.

Universities are beginning to realize that growth in the ability, to study, along with development of the personality, are factors of supreme importance in determining the ultimate achievement of the student. At the same time, they are the surest test for efficiency of instruction.

If college students are dependent upon their professors as are high school students upon their teachers, then there is something wrong with the guidance system.

A well organized study course included in the freshman curriculum at this University would serve to acquaint new students with college requirements and would facilitate their intellectual advancement by enabling them to learn the technique of attention, application, and study.

Most dangerousSyphilis is the most dangerous of all communicable diseases, and if detected early and given prompt, proper and adequate treatment, it can be controlled and cured in 85 percent of the cases. It is caused by a germ called Spiro-tontea Pallida, a germ so small that two thousand laid end to end are required to make an inch. Having entered, they multiply with great rapidity and attack any and all parts of the body.

The disease is transmitted from a diseased person to a well person by close contact—the commonest forms of which are sexual intercourse and kissing. Sometimes, though seldom, it is indirectly transmitted through infected dishes, glassware, or bedlinen.

Prevalence—
Syphilis is also the most prevalent of communicable diseases in the United States. Taking the country as a whole, about one out of every ten adults is infected. The prevalence varies with the geographical location, economic level, and race.

In concluding the testing period Tuesday, the Kernel urges every University student to do his part in controlling the scourge. The official close of this phase of the Kernel's campaign is by no means the close of the individuals' campaign.




