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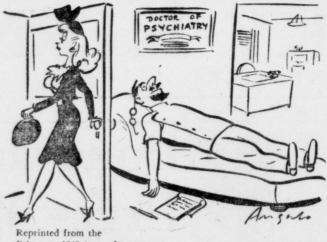
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### Letters To Editor




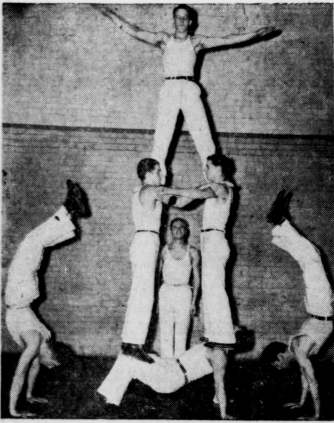
Colonel of the Week for this week is Johnny Crockett, pre-law senior from Mayville.

Phillippe used slides to illustrate his lecture on research on design of concrete pavements for heavy wheel loads.

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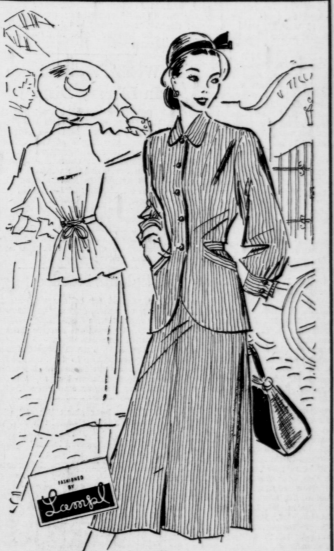

The University of Georgia baseball team, one of the best in the South will tangle with our Wildcats this afternoon at three o'clock, and Saturday at two o'clock on UK's Stoll Field providing the of weatherman gives his okay.

On this Georgia aggregation, which is coached by Charlie Trippi of football fame, is a second baseman named Eli Maricich, who might possibly become one of the greatest all-around athletes ever to attend the Red and Black of "Jawjuh." Maricich has joined the small but select group of men who have earned three varsity letters at the Athens institution. Only three before him were able to accomplish that. A javelin now, Eli has earned letters in football, basketball and baseball. He hopes to find time before his graduation to go out for the track and swimming teams of Georgia and become the first five letter athlete at Georgia. Only one man (Morion Hodgson) has been able to win four letters in the school's 146-year history.

### Fastest Man On Football Team

Eli Maricich, in the spring of 1947, raced such grid swiftness as Charlie Trippi, Rabbit Smith, John Donaldson and Billy Henderson with full football practice equipment on and finished first by a good six yards. In his first real test—the "C" Day spring grid game of 1947—Eli burst through a hole in the line and dashed 32 yards for a score and from then on he was Coach Batts' boy. Lack of experience has been his main drawback, but Maricich (born Maricich) is just about the size of Ralph Beard. He stands 5'11" and weighs 170 pounds. However his speed and natural ability more than offset any lack of size.

The 24-year-old Yugoslav was stopped cold by the inspired Kentucky Wildcats last October on Stoll Field when UK won 26-0, but that night the Cats would have stopped practically any back in the country by their savage play. Maricich, as a freshman in 1946, played No. 2 right halfback behind Donaldson. He played well in the Sugar Bowl game of January 1, 1947, as Georgia defeated North Carolina, 20-10. This fall he will be fighting it out with Floyd Reed for the starting right-half berth.

**Plays Guard**  
Although Maricich did not go out for basketball this past season, he played on Elmer Lampe's Bulldog cagers in the winter of 1946 and made one of the starting berths as guard. Coach Batts saw him in action and, liking his quick movements, asked the kid out for spring football practice the following March. It did not take long for Batts to realize that he had a real find in the speedy Chicagoan.

As a second sacker on the Bulldogs' summer team of 1946, he hit the headlines for a 615 average and last spring hit well over 300 to catch the eye of several baseball scouts who were around to watch Trippi play on the Bulldog baseball team.
