# New state budget means tuition hike, program cuts

**Better than expected:** After bracing for deeper cut, UK still scrambles for ways to make up for shortfall

UK fared better than expected under the new state budget, but the resulting cut in state funding will still force UK to reise tuttion, and make painful cuts to programs, administrators

a budget state lawmakers passed late Monday night.

The cut means UK must pay the state 8.6 million before July 1. Though UK will receive \$3.1 million from the state next fiscal year, the school will face a net loss of \$5.5 million.

Lawmakers allotted \$120 million for the Bucks for Brains research program and gave UK permission to sell \$46 million in bonds to build on-campus housing.

During the budget process, universities feared the way would take as much as a 9 percent cut. Dealing with the \$2.6 percent cut will still be difficult, said Jack Bill red administration.

# Nietzel, students debate proposal for new drop fee

Opposition: Students say dropped classes result from poor teaching, scheduling and missing information

A heated debate between Provost Mike Nietzel and students over a proposed drop fee at the Student Center Tuesday drew both cheers and angry accusations from students.

"Before you try to raise a fee, let's look at why students are dropping and the quality of the instruction," said Terri Seay, an elementary education sophomore, to a round of applause. Nietzel said that wasn't sufficient to explain why 8,300 classes were dropped during the fall 2002 semester.

"We still have the majority of students staying in classes with poor instruction," he said that with poor instruction, "he said Students staying in classes with poor instruction," he say Students Staying in classes Senate Monday would charge students 20 percent of the credit hour cost of the class being dropped. Nietzel said too many students are signing up for more classes than they intend to keep and that this behavior costs the university money in instructor salaries.

# **Committee updates** student conduct code

**Confusion:** Code's convoluted language and procedures befuddles even those who are seeking to change it

Not even the people who administer the student code can understand it.

In fact, one administrator called the Student Rights and Responsibilities code "a convoluted mess."

A committee is reviewing the code to find ways to get rid of its legalistic language and unclear rules and make it easier to understand.

"If you tried to diagram testies you'd go through for a certain procedure, it's a convoluted mess." said Patricia Terrell, vice president for student affairs and chair of the committee.

"We don't want to be punitive or adversarial here," he said.

The man was found searching in Cammers' refrigerator. Through a heat-ed discussion, Cammers said he learned the man's name, Mike Clark, and was told the man worked in the building.

45-day reprieve for Iraq proposed UNITED NATIONS — Britain and Canada took the lead Tuesday in trying to break the diplomatic impasse over how much time Saddam Hussein should be given to prove he has disposed of his weapons of mass destruction. Six countries that represent the key to a U.S. victory in the Security Council proposed a 45-day reprieve for Iraq. The Bush administration said it was willing to listen but wants a far shorter deadline. It said a vote will come by the end of this week, regardless, Tuesday was supposed to be showdown day, with a Security Council vote on an British-American resolution setting a March 17 deadline for disarmament. But the allies backed off. Without the nine votes they need, and with France and Russia pledging vetoes, they pulled their plan off the table.

Pelvises probed without consent
PHILADELPHIA — Some of the nation's leading medical schools have abandoned a little-known, decades-old practice of letting students perform pelvic exams on women without their consent while they are under anesthesia. The schools are now asking permission first. Previously, these institutions had routinely brought in students — sometimes as many as three or four — to conduct pelvic exams on unconscious women just before their gynecological surgeries and often without their conspiculation of the past five years after complaints from students who felt the exams without consent were unethical. "My problem was that if they found out about it, they might be really upset, and it was really only being done for my benefit." said Dr. Ard Silver-Isenstadt, who refused to examine aneshetized women as a student at the University of Pennsylvania. "I felt like I would be violating their trust," he said.

# **United States tests** 'mother of all bombs'

Mixed results: While bomb's test called success. results of diplomatic efforts still unclear

WASHINGTON — In a flashy debut for its biggest nonnuclear bomb, the Air Force on Tuesday dropped a 21,000pound behemoth onto a test range in Florida, hoping the
test would rattle nerves in Iraq as well.

The bomb test was declared a success, but movement on

faced the prospect of defeat for their resolution giving Iraq
until Monday to disarm or be invaded, and it appeared they



What they don't seem to take into account are the thousands of civilian lives that Saddam Hussein's government has taken and the thousands more who have been beaten or tortured, many of them children.

There are human costs in any war. They are always terrible results of miscalculations or simple mistakes, and they are always inevitable, especially when the brutal leader of the nation under attack places human shields at strategic sites he knows will be bombed.

Still others attending the rally claimed President Bush has not taken the diplomatic road to solving the crisis. I guess they

There is now talk of a second resolution in the United Nations. In actuality, this will be the 19th resolution since 1991 calling for Iraq to disarm. The previous 18 resolutions have been

minportant. From what you hear on the news, you might believe that Britain is our only supporter. Yet there are over 20 European nations supporting the war, as well as several Middle Eastern nations.

The Left thinks that if we don't have the support of France, we're acting unilaterally. This is simply not the case.

The protesters at the rally Wednesday seemed to be nice people, some of whom might actually be anti-war.

Those whose beliefs are not formed by the fact that the president is a Republicanshould be commended for their courage in demonstrating their views. They are rocksolid in their beliefs.

Yet they are wrong, If Saddam Hussein is left in power, he will only become more and more dangerous, not only to Middle Eastern nations, but to the United States as well. That is something we cannot stand for.



In this post World War I drama. we find Adolph Hitler (Noah Taylor) broke and lonely in and equally broken Munich.

Max follows Hitler as he comes back from the war to noth-

ing, except his art. He meets Max Rothman (John Cusack), a success-ful art dealer who lost his arm in the war. He has a lovely wife, Nina (Molly Parker), lovely children, a lovely mistress (Leelee Sobieski) and lives in a lovely house and has frequent dinners with in his obnoxious in-laws.

Max sees potential in Hitler's work and pushes him to dig deep-er and put his extreme emotions on the canvas. Hitler in-

stead puts his ener-

gy increasing into speeches en-couraged by his military leader. He continues to seek Max's advice and approval and the two eventu-ally form a bond, even though Max, who is Jewish, finds Hitler's strong views on anti-Semitism to be rather disturbing. After losing hope in his ability to be an artist, Hitler finds himself becoming in-volved in a new art – politics.

John Cusack received some bad publicity for accepting a role in a movie that actually humanizes Hitler. I applaud him for accepting such a challenging role against the face of The perfor-

mances in this film

are really good. Noah Taylor is especially good as the disturbed Hitler, even if he was over the top at times. That flaw can be accred ited to writer/director Menno Mey-jes, who did seem to lose focus from time to time in his directorial debut. Many points were left unexplored, such as Max's relation-ship with Liselore (Sobieski) and his dealing with not being able to create art because of the loss of his

Max is a good movie even if it has its weaknesses. It raises many questions for discussion and at times is moving. My biggest quarrel is how Meyjes made Hitler's eventual rise to power and the massacre of 6 million Jewish people a mere coincidence, or bad luck.

While this movie may not be on everyone's lips come Oscar sea-son this time next year, it is defi-nitely worth watching.

# MUSICREVIEWS

Indie-rock fans have developed quite a love-hate relationship with Reggie and the Full Effect. Either you revere Reggie's comedy and nerdy rock (think Weezer) amalgam or you abnor the ridiculously silly side project. In regards to the latter, Reggie's new release, Under the Tray..., is certainly not going to change your opinion of the band. Alas, if you happen to be a fan, this album may change yours. Reggie's ironically titled debut, Createst Hits 84-87, set the bar high. It employed primitive palm-muted power chord verses and soaring choruses, interspersing inexplicably simple rock songs with sappy lyrics about girls running away ("Cirl, Why'd You Run Away," "Another Runaway Song") with short, sometimes Indie-rock fans have developed quite a

other Runaway Song") with short, sometimes laughter-inducing skits ("Pick Up the Phone Master P," "Fiona Apple Can Kiss My Black

Ass").

The skits and a new electro-synth vibe began to take over on 2000's Promotional Copy, as Reggie introduced us to his synth-sensation al-ter-ego Fluxuation and Swedish hardcore rock-ers Common Denominator. Still, song quality remained at a premium. Tracks such as "Congratulations Matt and Christine" and "Megan gratulations Matt and Christine" and "Megan zki" proved mastermind and Get up kids key-boardist lames Dewees, er, Reggie, adept at creating hook-packed quirky pop-rock. With one wonderful album and one good album under their belts, where does "Under the Tray" fall? File under painfully mediocre. Of the nine actual songs on Tray, most (with the exception of "Congratulations Smack

Reggie and the Full Effect under the tray...

& Katy" and "Happy V-Day") fail to deliver the huge riffs and saccharine melodies of past Reg-gie efforts. "F.O.O.D. a.k.a. Aren't You Hungary" is an absurd declaration of the wonders of sus-tenance. Lyrically, it doesn't get much better, as manifested in the heavy metal grammar les

"Linkin Verbz."

Hell, the sheer dance-synth cheesiness of "MOOD 4 LUV" is enough to sever affiliations to

"Make sure that all your fluids are clean and topped off, you have good wiper blades and good brakes. These are your biggest safety-related items," said Ken Korhonen from Coodyear on Southland Drive.

Fluids include motor oil, wiper fluid, brake fluid, transmission fluid, antifreeze/engine coolant and norms topped off to the optimum level. Motor oil should be amber but clear. Power steering fluid is clear. Transmission fluid should be red. Brake fluid should be clear. Antifreeze/engine coolant should be green if it was filled before year, red after that.

A full inspection of your car can reveal problems with the aforementioned sections of the car as well as with the cooling systems and the fan belts. Be sure that your fan belts are not worn and that your cooling systems are properly maintained.

"Make sure to have an inspection and oil change and to check your cooling system," said Alfred Bailey at Midas on New Circle.


