The changing face of rape

Prevention: The Bluegrass Rape Crisis Center says 1 out of 3 women will be raped in their life

September is Sexual Assault Awareness Month in Kentucky, and organizations across the Bluegrass are working to inform the community about rape and sexual assault and the misconcep-tions concerning them.

According to the Bluegrass
Rape Crisis Center, one out of
three women will be raped in
their lifetime.

Since becoming a state organization, the BRCC has seen its
relationship grow with UK.

"A good number of our volunteers come from the student
pool," said Alexis Ball, a crisis

counselor and educator at the BRCC. "I encourage more UK students to get involved."

The BRCC services include a 24-hour crisis line, crisis intervention counseling, legal and medical information.

Ball said the center also offers educational programs, which stress methods of preventing rape but in a way that allows victims of rape not to be blamed.

"We do talk about safety tips; however, you can never be 100

percent safe," Ball said.

Ball said victims often blame themselves because "in our society an alleged perpetrator is presumed innocent."

BRCC, said 90 percent of rapes occurred between people who knew
each other.

Paying more: Board votes for increase

The price went up: Officials say tuition increase comparative to other universities

The UK Board of Trustees approved back to-back tuition increases for the 2002-2003 and 2003-2004 academic years at its meeting Tuesday by a 19-1 vote.

In-state undergraduate tuition will be \$1.740 per semester starting next year, an increase of \$106 or 6.4 percent. The following year it will rise \$80 to \$1.836 per semester, a jump of 5.5 percent. Nonresident undergraduate tuition will go up by smaller percentages but increase by approximately the same dollar amount.

Student Government President Tim Robinson cast the only dissenting vote. He voted against the increase, despite the board's unanimous adoption of an amendment he crafted in authorship with UK President Lee Todd.

Robinson said he voted no because of a campaign promise he made to students never to vote for tuition increases.

Todd said UK faces "significant expenditures" to maintain its current levels of operation. He said without this increase, UK would face having to cut back on some of its basic services for students. Inflated energy costs also factored into the decision, he said.

UK Senior Vice President for Administration Jack Blantons and increased prices for coal has created a \$1.8 million shortfall compared to the budgeted money, based on last year's prices.

The increased amount was decided based upon a comparison of UK's tuition rates compared with 19 other "benchmark" universities. Even with the increase. UK comes out at No. 14, ranking below schools such as Penn State, UCLA, Ohio State, Purdue and the University of Virginia.

Among the 20 total schools, Penn State ranked highest in utition costs and the University of Florida ranked lowest.

Board Vice-Chairman Steve Reed said UK has to know where it stands in comparison with other schools, but he said tuition increases should be carefully considered.

"We cannot increase ours simply because they do," he said.

FarmHouse Fraternity signed a contract Tuesday with Student Government to direct the student escort service, formerly known as SafeCats. It ended the Air Force ROTC's nine-year affiliation with the service.

Unaware their contract would und this fail, Air Force ROTC members immediately posted a \$10,000 dollar bid when the process began in August.

Both groups submitted the same bid for the service — \$10,000.

During the bidding process, Will Southard, a member of the Air Force ROTC said the ROTC saked SG if they could have a contract until a new one was signed, but SG said no.

SG President Tim Robinson chose a committee of the to review the bids; the committee voted unanimously in favor of Farm-House. He said he supported the committee's decision because it had a code of conduct for the service, as well as plans to advertise and set up free self-defense classes for students. LEXINGTON — A survey of more than 130 horse farms supports theories that caterpillars, cherry trees and unusual weather played a role in thousands of foal deaths this spring. The survey of 133 central Kentucky farms was done by University of Kentucky Gluck Equine Research Center scientists and veterinarians from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Researchers theorized that mares ingested cyanide toxins from weather-damaged wild cherry trees, substances that may have been delivered through the caterials of the control of the contro

Stocks steadier on 2nd day of trading

Stocks steadier on 2nd day of trading NEW YORK — Wall Street found some stability Tuesday, a day after the biggest one-day point drop in history. The Dow closed down 17.30 points at 8,903.40, according to preliminary calculations. The Nasdaq fell 24.47 to 1,555.08, and the Standard & Poor's 500 index declined 6.03 to 1,032.74. On Monday — the first day of trading since the terrorist attacks last week — the Dow lost a record 684.81 points and fell below 9,000 for the first time in more than 2 1/2 years. The reopening ended the market's longest shutdown since the Depression. A sign of the market's attempt to stabilize was apparent in New York Stock Exchange trading volume, which returned to a more moderate level of 1,65 billion shares after a record-breaking 2.33 billion on Monday. Still, analysts expect the market to be vulnerable this week because of fears of war and the damage done by the terrorist attacks to the economy — particularly the airline industry.

Afghans discuss extraditing bin Laden

Afghanisa of Afghanistan — Afghanistan's Taliban rulers discussed conditions for possibly extenditing Osama bin Laden to a country other than United States, a Pakistan government source said Tuesday, hours after the Taliban urged Afghanis to prepare for a holy war. The conditions, including international recognition of the Taliban government and lifting of U.N. sanctions, were discussed in a meeting Monday in Kandahar, headquarters of the Islamic millita that rules most of Afghanistan, the official said on condition of anonymity. No final agreement was reached, he said. But the Pakistan delega-

Agencies detain more for questioning

Agencies detain more for questioning WASHINGTON — U.S. law enforcement officials investigating last week's terrorist attacks are pulling in more people for questioning, stationing armed guards on commercial jets and asking Congress for new laws to clamp down on terrorism. As of Monday, the FBI had detained 49 people for questioning, holding them on immigration violations, double the number of several days ago. Some have asked for lawyers, and none have been charged in the attacks that may have killed more than 5,000 people. In addition, authorities are looking for nearly 200 other people to question in last Tuesday's attacks on New York City's World Trade Center and the Pentagon. The FBI is keeping a tight hold on its witnesses, jailing an unspecified number of them because they might otherwise flee. Courts have sealed all information about those arrested.

China to join World Trade Organization

BEIJING — Foreign firms, Japan's trade
minister and Chinese advocates of reform Tuesday hailed China's impending membership in
the World Trade Organization. Others fretted
that the country is ili-prepared for an onsiaught
of foreign competition. China's foreign and trade
ministries had no comment on the approval of
terms for China's entry to the rule-making trade
body. But China's chief negotiator at the talks in
Geneva, Long Yongtu, said membership would
be an "all-win situation" unleashing the purchas
ing power of 1.26 billion Chinese and leading to a
vast open market. Foreign businesses were excited by the prospect of greater access to China's
long-protected markets.

Amish man pleads guilty to sex crimes

Amish man pleads guilty to sex crimes CAMBRIDGE, Ohio — An Amish man charged with raping two girls pleaded guilty to sexual battery and may spend five years in a sex offender treatment center. Norman Byler, 69, of Birmingham initially was charged with 11 counts of rape and gross sexual imposition involving two girls in his extended family. They were 3 and 5 at the time. He had been scheduled to go on trial this week but instead pleaded guilty Monday to lesser charges, five counts of sexual battery. The case marked a rare example of Amish crimes being prosecuted in sectuar courts, county Prosecutor Keith Plummer and Cotober 1999. according to court records. Byler's at torney did not immediately return a call requesting comment on the case.

Robinson said he will evaluate the newly run program, adding that he can terminate the contract if he thinks it's necessary.





In the wake of last Tuesday's terrorist attacks, airlines have been doubling and redoubling their efforts to ensure that such an incident is never repeated. As a result bags are checked in

an incition is level repeated. As a result bags are checked in greater numbers, credentials are scrutinized far more closely and passengers are searched more frequently.

This is all part of a larger nationwide heightening of security, and some people have begun to ask what it will mean to our individual liberty. Is there a danger that the United States could slip into a state of martial law?

We doubt it Even though the steps taken since last Tuesday's

We doubt it. Even though the steps taken since last Tuesday's attacks have not indicated our liberty is in jeopardy, they do inconvenience our liberties a little.

As the freest country in the world, we have grown accustomed to certain niceties that make our lives easier. But curb-

side check-in is not a right. Carry-on luggage is not a right. Fly-ing on a commercial airline is not even a right.

They are privileges. Privileges that we could very well sacri-

They are privileges. Fivileges that we could very web sacrifice if doing so means lessening the chances of boarding a flight destined for a building instead of a runway.

That said, we must be careful not to cross the line from security into lockdown. As many have said, to do so would mean the terrorists succeeded in part, by harming the fabric of our country.

More importantly though, a police state would affect how capital — both human and monetary — flows to where it is most needed. If such mobility is hindered, the U.S. economy will suffer even further, rendering us even more vulnerable.

While certain actions have given us pause — strip searches, wire taps, etc. — most are matters of convenience. That is understandable, and probably even prudent.

But we must keep at least one eye open, because desperate times do not translate into reason for the government to take away the greatest rights we as Americans possess; social eco-

We in no way intended to make light of the tragedy; we were merely doing what we thought might help prevent similar future tragedies. Our strongest desire is to live in a world where tragedies like this never occur.

We are very sorry to have caused some people more stress in this trying time, and will try to be more careful in the future.

Claiming the need to combat terrorism, Attorney General John Ashcroft is now asking Congress for a grant of increased surveillance authority for the Justice Department. This is a move that would undoubtedly undermine many American's right to privacy, ushering in an era where warrantless searches deflie the Constitution and its guarantees of individual liberty in an over-reaction to a national security threat. In 1798 the Sedition Act allowed persons to be jailed for criticizing the government. This was an attempt to tighten national security in response to the hostile actions of the French government. And in 1918, Socialist party leader Eugene V. Debs was jailed for military conscription. Pinally, in a somewhat similar situation to the one we find ourselves in today, anti-war Vietnam protesters were subject to constant surveillance and harassment by the FBI during the 1960s.
