## Pride Month Kick Off Pride Center Grand Opening June 2

You are cordially invited to the Grand Opening of the new GLSO Pride Center of the Bluegrass on Saturday, June 2 from 3 to 6 at 389 Waller Avenue, Suite 100. Come enjoy an open house with food, drink, and entertainment. See how the Pride Center has turned out and become a part of its history.

The Pride Center first became a reality five years ago after years of work by countless members of our community. The seeds were planted many years ago when the Stonewall Network coordinate Pride Month and then organized a committee dedicate to raising funds for a Pride Center for the GLBT community. As a result of the vision and dedication of many people, enough seed money was raised and turned over to GLSO to back the first Pride Center which opened in 1996.

Another important partner in the history of the Pride Center was Lexington's Metropolitan Community Church. GLSO started meeting in the

MCC room in the Actor's Guild building in 1995. When MCC moved to Waller Ave. in 1996, a favorable lease arrangement with the Church made space available for the first Pride Center. While the Church had no involvement in the day to day running of the Pride Center, their contribution was invaluable.

GLSO has managed the Pride Center for the last six years. In that time it grew from shared space to renting the entire second floor office and became a meeting place for many community groups.

When it became obvious that the Center needed to change again in order to better serve our community. GLSO began the arduous task of planning the new Pride Center. More money was needed, so grants were written and the community was asked to give more. New vision was needed, so a committee was asked to plan the future of the Pride Center and set priorities for serving our changing community. A new space was envisioned and a very hardworking and talented group came forward to make the new Pride Center a physical reality.



## Family Movies

## My Own Country

On Sunday, June 10 at 1:30 Diversity Films presents *My Own Country*, a film by Mira Nair. It will be shown at the Downtown Central Library Theater, there is free parking available behind Library. There is no charge for this film; it is sponsored by The Humanitarium: Center for Culture & Diversity.

Based on a the best selling Biography of the same name, *My Own Country* focuses on the life of Dr. Abraham Verghese, a physician from India who struggles to complete medical training in this country and then moves to practice medicine in Johnson City, Tennessee.

As his practice includes more and more patients diagnosed with HIV and AIDS, Dr. Verghese focuses his compassion and medical expertise on his patients and finds himself transformed in the process. There is a sense that Dr. Verghese uses his experience of being an outsider in this country to enhance his work with his patience.

Director Mira Nair includes a number of perspectives within this story, portraying Southern rural life, the Indian American community, doctor-patient relationships, gay and straight relationships, socio-economic differences, and the impact of all this on Dr. Verghese and his family.

This is a wonderful film and one that has not received enough notice. It concerns the early days of AIDS awareness but does not focus exclusively on gays. But when it does present gay characters, it does so with sensitivity and warmth.

#### Movies the Pride Center

Every Tuesday night in June, at 7, Interweave and GLSO will be showing documentaries and feature films at the Pride Center. On the first Tuesday, June 5, we will show *Not Just Passing Through*, an hour documentary about Lesbian Herstory. It is divided into four segments featuring activists from New York City based organizations including the Lesbian History Archives, Asian Lesbians of the East Coast, and the WOW Cafe.

The story of Marge McDonald who willed her diaries, papers, books, and records to the Archives is highlighted. Marge's lawyer notified the Archives of the legacy and warned them that her family might dump all her belongings meant for the Archives. Two Ohio State graduate students volunteered to drive to Ms. McDonald's small hometown and rescue the collection.

The diaries chronicled lesbian life in the early 1950's, including the choices Marge had to made about coming out butch in an era of police prosecution and McCarthyism. As part of this film, members of NYC's WOW Cafe perform a reenactment of Ms. McDonald's first visit to a lesbian bar.

We will follow the documentary with a short film by lesbian director

Nisha Ganatra, *Junky Punky Girl*. This is an early film by Ganatra who later went on the make Chutney Popcorn that will be showing at the Kentucky Theater later in June.

Another documentary of interest is *Scouts Honor*. KET has given us the opportunity to preview this film which is about "Scouting for All" and Steven Cozza's work to fight the Boy Scouts anti gay discrimination policy. We are hoping to show this documentary on Tuesday, June 19. Along with this, we will show the short film *Trevor*, a high school trauma drama with a happy ending.

On the second and fourth Tuesday nights we will show feature films. One possibility is *The Broken Hearts Club* about a group of gay friends that help each other through the ups and downs of relationships.

# Directions To Picnic WINDY KNOLL FARM: 3263 Cleveland Road North;

From junction of New Circle and Winchester Roads, drive east on Winchester Rd 5 1/2 miles. Turn left (north) on Cleveland Rd. (Rt. 1973). Drive 1/2 mile, watch for David's Fork Baptist Church on left. The Windy Knoll driveway is contiguous to the church property. ## Dani and Nico

Looking for another Beautiful Thing? Well, search no further. *Dani and Nico* is the delightful story of two gangly teenage boys thrown together for the summer. It will be at the Ky. Theater the last week in June.

Dani (Fernando Ramallo) is left alone at his folks' beach house. His school pal Nico (Jordi Vilches) is invited to keep him company, but neither boy expected that the two would be left totally unsupervised. Besides fishing, biking, sunning and roughhousing, the two talk about sex... a lot. This leads to some experimenting.

Two local girls show up and Nico sees this as an opportunity to lose his virginity. Dani at first goes along with the idea, but then realizes that he is jealous; he doesn't want to share Nico with anyone. He begins to realize that he loves Nico, loves him so much he wants Nico to lose his virginity with him.

Nico prefers to think of their sexual play as part of adolescent experimentation, not as "real sex." But he doesn't want to loose Dani's friendship either. What to do?

Superb performances and a light, comic directorial touch make this a highly enjoyable, extremely sensual coming of age film. It will be hard for anyone who was ever a gawky, yearning teen not to relate to the amiable goings-on.

## Chutney Popeon

Chutney Popcorn, directed by Nisha Ganatra, will also be at the Ky the last week in June. It is the story of an Indian-American lesbian who impulsively decides to have a baby for her married, infertile older sister. Director Ganatra carries off the tricky feat of being wisecracking one minute and serious the next while staying true to the characters and sustaining a jovial easygoing tone.

The movie's likable but maddeningly stubborn main character, Reena (Ms. Ganatra), is a body artist and photographer who draws intricately beautiful designs on her subjects' skins and memorializes her handiwork in voluptuous photographic portraits. Her lover, Lisa (Jill Hennessy), is a free-spirited, antibourgeois lesbian who does not think much of the "Heather Has Two Mommies" lifestyle, as she calls it.

The story begins with the traditional Indian wedding of Reena's sister, Sarita (Sakina Jaffrey), to Mitch (Nick Chinlund). When Sarita discovers her infertility several months into the marriage, she is devastated.

Out of the blue, Reena, without consulting Lisa, volunteers to have a child for Sarita through artificial insemination. Surprisingly, Mitch, who has his heart set on being a father, is much more excited about the plan than his wife, who begins to question her desire to have children.

To complicate matters, Reena's lesbianism is a thorn in the side of her strait-laced mother, Meenu (Madhur Jaffrey), an Indian traditionalist who condescendingly refers to Reena's sexuality as a "disability."

"Chutney Popcorn" seems entirely predictable until the moment Sarita changes her mind about wanting to bring up the child, and Reena, without thinking twice, announces that she wants to have the baby anyway. The movie doesn't flinch from portraying the resulting emotional tumult. Lisa is forced to re-evaluate her relationship with Reena, while Mitch and Sarita must face a childless future and possible long-term damage to their marriage.

This film lives up to its name; it manages to be both sweet and salty, serious and funny, and a great way to spend an evening.




