Turnover might

SGA President Melanie Cruz said this
turnover breaks the trend of previous

getting re-elected, she said.

"Hopefully whoever is elected president will take the initiative to inform new
senators and what kind of a part they need
to play in the process," said Carrie Feigel,
a marketing junior and senator at large
acnidiate. "If on't believe that people
aren't interested anymore."
She attributes the heavy turnover to
graduation and senators leaving their
posts for other offices on campus, rather
than the bill that required senators to
gather 400 signatures to be a candidate.

In fact, Feigel said, the signatures bill passed by a wide margin in the SGA Senate, with only four or five opposing the measure. Nevertheless the requirement might have discouraged some senators from running again, said Feigel, who took the responsibility in stride.

"I got to meet 400 people that I didn't know before," she said. "The whole purpose was not only to inform people of SGA, but make sure senators are motivated and willing to work for their constituents."

Rachel Bomberger, a nursing sophomore running for senator of her college, said the signature method puts elections in students' minds.

As for the number of inexperienced senators coming into SGA, Bomberger said it will present challenges to the old to help amalgamate the new.

The last two main players also carry HIV. Tom Collins, close friend of Mark and Roger, meets Angel, an eccentric street drummer and transvestite, and the two hit it off immediately.

Outside of the romantic involvements and character subplots, Rent takes on an us-against-them form of social politics with the seven characters leading a mini insurgence. Larson's knock-off on Puccini pays tribute to the bohemians of Don Giovanni with "La Vie Boheme" at the end of Act I.

Act II opens on New Year's Eve with the tenants all locked out, and proceeds to account the trying events of the year to follow. HIV carches up with a few characters came to appreciate life's every moment, "there is no future, there is no past. I live each moment as my last."

The young cast breathes a vibrant breath, bringing charm to desperation and excitement to

The show has its share of flaws, but it brims with such a convincing dynamism and permeating sense of good will that its eviction notice may be a long time coming.





# **Glenn wins GPAC backing**

The key topic of debate was the issue of dry houses for all fraternities and sororities. Knipp said the candidates' views on this issue were particularly important in deciding who to endorse.

"Because the campus is going dry, we need SGA officers who are going to work with us in making the transition to a dry campus easy for all Greeks," Knipp said. "The efforts of SGA and the Greek community must be going in the same direction to have an efficient and cooperative relationship."

Presidential candidate Nate Brown said working with Greeks on this issue will be a critical part of his administration.

"If we don't communicate, we can't cooperate," said Brown, senator for the College of Communications and Information Studies.

"I'm not a Greek. I don't have all the answers to the problems Greeks face," Brown said. "But I want to go to two or three student organizations a week, I want to communicate with every house on campus and talk about the things that affect you all the most."

While Brown said the importance of dealing with the possilization of the control of
