**In-class techniques**

**Ombud, a buddy for students**

Students and faculty have a place to go for a dose of fairness and guidance.

The UK Academic Ombud.

Who is this Ombud? Dr. Jeff Dembo, a faculty member and oral surgeon at the UK Medical Center.

The Academic Ombud at UK gives students and faculty a place to turn when conflict arises in their classes.

Established in 1970, UK's Ombud provides a neutrality between students and faculty. Dembo has served as the Ombud for three years now and said it appoints representatives on a yearly basis.

Dembo, or better yet know as the Ombud, is the general mediator in disputes among students and faculty.

"The Ombud is not an advocate for the students and we are not an advocate for the faculty. The Ombud is an advocate for fairness," he said.

Dembo said all the information presented to the Ombud is completely confidential, and before any information can be released, the student must give the Ombud permission.

"The Ombud can go to a teacher and try to resolve the conflict for the student without using any names or personal information that would identify the student," Dembo said.

Dembo serves as the Ombud, but also spends time guest lecturing to academic orientation classes in order to encourage students to use this academic service.

"Ombud's primary goal is to mediate and resolve any conflicts there might be at

UK that deal with the academic arena," Dembo said.

Dembo said the Ombud helps students and faculty with problems.

"The Ombud deals with problems such as unfair or incorrect grading, progress or promotion and unfair suspensions," he said.

Dembo said the Ombud offers many alternatives to common complaints. It offers students help through personal appointments, phone calls and the Internet.

Unfortunately, some problems subsist that the Ombud can't solve.

In that case, Dembo said the service guides students and faculty members in the right direction.

"The Ombud can put students in touch with who they need to talk to about anything," he said.

Dembo said the Ombud welcomes anyone to visit the Office of the Academic Ombud.

In fact, Dembo said some students get referred to the Ombud for guidance by faculty or advisers.

Dembo said students come to him for a variety of reasons. To resolve the issues, he said he simply goes to the instructor and discusses it with them.

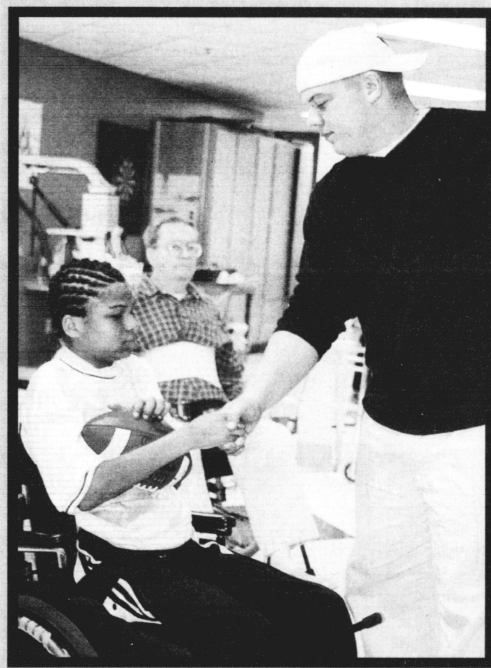
"Students have come to me with concerns of grades not being correct and I do my best to check out everything," he said.

**Plasma saves lives, earns cash**

**Why you should care: Students can donate plasma to fight diseases and earn money**

Many students who see advertisements for plasma donations think one thing — money.

But many do not know that donating plasma in exchange for those greenbacks can help more than 40 million hospital patients with plasma-based medicines to fight diseases such as hepatitis, rabies and chicken pox, also assisting patients with bleeding disorders such as hemophilia.

Millions of healthy adults donate plasma to help others. Their donations ensure a continuing supply of plasma, an essential ingredient in many lifesaving medicines.

"Plasma donors are saving lives," said Bruce Farley, Nabi senior vice president of manufacturing operations.

Nabi, a biopharmaceutical company that develops plasma-based medicines, has sites across the nation for donation of plasma.

"We should be all grateful for their generosity. Any of us could need medicine made from plasma some day, and plasma donors make sure there is a continuing supply of this critically important substance," said Farley.

Plasma is 90 percent water and 10 percent vital substances, which includes antibodies, clotting agents and proteins, where plasma donors donate only plasma, so they can donate up to twice a week, according to Nabi.

The process of donating plasma is very simple. The Nabi web site said it only takes about one hour to give plasma.

**Fighting alcohol with the Internet**

**Click of a mouse: Students can participate in alcohol awareness event to prevent underage and binge drinking**

Some college students binge drink. Some become the victim of sexual assault cases. Many get arrested for violations involving alcohol intoxication.

Autobytel.com, a leader in online automobile commerce, wants to let students know it doesn't have to be that way.

Melanie Webber, director of public relations for autobytel.com, said for the first time, students have the opportunity to participate in an annual event to prevent underage drinking.

"This is an extremely important initiative for autobytel. We are a leader in online commerce, and feel a tremendous responsibility regarding automobile safety issues," she said.

Especially to college students, we have a lot of young people that we want to

promote responsibility to," she said. "This event is an educational forum to provide an opportunity to bring about change and responsible behavior."

Webber said that a partnership between MADD's National Youth Summit and autobytel.com established a webcast for students to voice their opinions about underage drinking.

"College is a time when you encounter a lot of new experiences — the first time when many students are away from their parents when driving a car," Webber said. "We want to be out there to educate those students on college campuses."

Webber said the interactive forum will bring 435 delegates together from across the country to discuss issues concerning underage drinking, as well as propose their own solutions to these problems. On Oct. 3, the proposals will air at a national news conference on Capitol Hill.

"The idea is that they are coming to-

gether to come up with proposals and recommendations, which could involve proposing legislation on an issue," she said.

Webber said the event allows students to communicate globally, while interacting with politicians, celebrities and doctors.

"As a leader, we have the opportunity as a communicator to communicate to the world," she said. "We are most interested in broadcasting across the U.S."

Webber said since the event is through a webcast, students will have more accessibility to participate.

Steve Picklesimer, a business management sophomore, said the webcast seems to provide a great service to students at UK.

"If it helps to spread awareness, then it would definitely be a good way to go about it because the Internet is so widely used," he said.

Webber believes the event will not only provide students with an interesting civic lesson, but also with a political lesson.

"This is a way for students to go online and not only listen, but to actually interact and contribute to discussion, as well as have their voice heard (about alcohol use)," she said.

**By the numbers**

Approximately 240,000 to 360,000 of the nations current undergraduates will die from alcohol related causes.

35 percent of college women reported drinking to get drunk last year. That's up 10 percent from 1977.

Each year students spend \$5.5 billion on alcohol, more than soft drinks, milk and books combined.

60 percent of those diagnosed with STD's were drunk at the time of contact.

More than 1/3 of college students reported to drive under the influence of alcohol.

Only 1.7 percent of those were arrested. The average student spends \$446 on alcohol. Nearly 1/3 of college students said they wished alcohol wasn't available on college campuses.

Students who made a D or F grade average, drank 10 drinks a week, while A students only had three.

## Clinton: Milosevic clearly lost

WASHINGTON — As a runoff election was being announced in Belgrade, President Clinton said yesterday it's clear the opposition party has defeated Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic and that if the will of the Serbian people is respected, the United States will lift economic sanctions against the nation. "Despite the government's attempts to manipulate the vote, it does seem clear that the people have voted for change," Clinton said. "The question is, will the government listen in response?"

## 38 states investigate tire recall

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Attorneys general from 38 states and Puerto Rico are jointly investigating how Bridgestone/Firestone and Ford Motor Co. handled the recall of 6.5 million tires, the tiremaker says. The combined effort could accelerate each state's investigation and allow Firestone and Ford to deal with a single group instead of individual states. John Lampe, executive vice president of Bridgestone/Firestone, the Nashville-based unit of Japan's Bridgestone Corp., said Tennessee Attorney General Paul Summers told him a group of several attorneys general are leading the investigation and plan to meet in Nashville later this week.

## Students shot at New Orleans school

NEW ORLEANS — An argument between 13-year-old and 15-year-old students escalated into a gunfight on the grounds of a New Orleans middle school yesterday, critically wounding both boys. Witnesses told police that after an argument, the 13-year-old got a gun from someone who passed the weapon through a fence. The 13-year-old shot the 15-year-old, then, the 15-year-old grabbed the gun and shot the 13-year-old, according to police spokesman Lt. Marlon DeFillo said. They were both listed in critical condition after undergoing surgery.

## Freeh, Reno defend Lee case

WASHINGTON — FBI Director Louis Freeh and Attorney General Janet Reno defended the government's case against nuclear scientist Wen Ho Lee today, saying the prosecution would likely have succeeded if they had gone to trial. "The Department of Justice and the FBI stand by each and every one of the 59 counts in the indictment of Dr. Lee," Freeh told the Senate Select Intelligence and Judiciary committees. Prosecutors ultimately dropped all but one charge in a plea bargain, and Lee was released. Freeh said a trial would have exposed some of the nation's nuclear secrets and might not have revealed what the sci-

## Down 160, Nasdaq down 43

NEW YORK — Stock prices fell yesterday after an earnings warning from Eastman Kodak intensified the market's worries about third-quarter results. Just before the close, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 160.55 at 10,647.60 and the Nasdaq composite index was down 43.42 at 3,897.80.

## Supreme Court disputes 'English Only'

WASHINGTON — By tackling an "English only" dispute from Alabama, the Supreme Court set the stage Tuesday for an important ruling on a federal law that bans discrimination based on national origin.

The justices agreed to decide whether private citizens can invoke the law, aimed at fighting bias in all federally funded programs. Their decision is expected by June, after arguments are heard in January.

At least 20 states in recent years have designated English as the official state language, but many of the laws appear to be symbolic and do not restrict government use of other languages.

## Bowling Green coach to resign

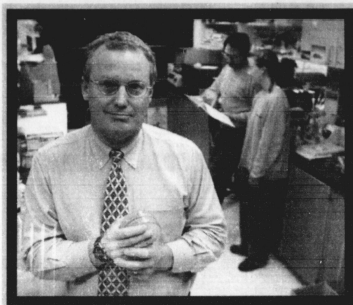
BOWLING GREEN, Ohio — Bowling Green football coach Gary Blackney, the third-winningest coach in school history, will resign at the end of this season. "I think there is a need for change, both for myself and the program," Blackney said yesterday. "I think this diverts attention away from my job status and hopefully puts it back where it should be, and this is on the accomplishments of our players."

## Court grants Microsoft request

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court delayed any quick resolution of the historic Microsoft antitrust case Tuesday, sending it to a federal appeals court in a tactical win for the software giant.

The action means a final decision on whether Microsoft must be broken up could be years away. The Justice Department had wanted the nation's highest court to hear arguments this winter and issue a ruling in the spring, but the justices granted Microsoft's request to send the case to the federal appeals court.

"This is a serious setback for the government," said William Kovacic, a George Washington University law professor and antitrust expert.

Donors need to be between the ages of 18 and 59, age range does not apply to some specialty plasma programs, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in good health, said representatives from both Nabi and Centeon, another plasma donation center.

New donors must have a Social Security number and a picture ID with their current address and a military or college identification card is acceptable at most donor sites. A brief physical examination

will be given to new donors. Then a technician will take a blood sample from a finger to examine your iron and protein levels.

The donation should take about 30 to 50 minutes, so you'll have time to watch TV, study for a mid-term or relax. And last, but not least, for your time for helping thousands of people such as hemophiliacs, newborn babies, and surgery & trauma patients with donating your plasma, you'll be compensated with cash.


Certain medical histories could preclude you from donating, such as recent tattoos, body piercing, cancer or other medical conditions.



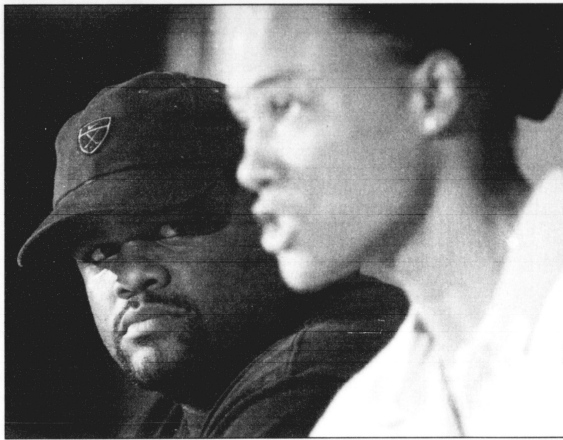

# IOC ridicules Hunter for use of steroids

## 'The usual excuse': IOC says United States is in denial about drug use in the Olympics

SYDNEY, Australia — Top IOC officials ridiculed the doping defense of world shot put champion C.J. Hunter and accused the United States of being in a "state of denial" about the problem of performance-enhancing drugs.

Hunter — husband of sprint superstar Marion Jones — was using the "usual excuse" by blaming nutritional supplements, according to Dick Pound, vice president of the International Olympic Committee, and Jacques Rogge, an executive board member.

"This is the usual thing," Pound said. "Athletes always say, 'It's not possible.'"

Hunter tested positive for the steroid nandrolone in four separate tests this summer, the drug chief for the International Amateur Athletics Federation said.

These included two out-of-competition tests at the Bislett Games in Oslo on July 28, and the Weltklasse Grand Prix meet in Zurich, Switzerland, on Aug. 11.

"This appears to confirm

that he has been ingesting a banned substance over a period of time," said Arne Ljungqvist, chairman of the IAAF's medical commission.

Charlie Wells, Hunter's agent, declined to respond to the IOC officials' statements.

Hunter, choking back tears at a news conference, said he would have never knowingly taken banned substances.

"I don't know what has happened and I don't know how it has happened," Hunter said.

Conte said Hunter took the same supplement used by sprinters Linford Christie and Merlene Ottey, both of whom have tested positive for nandrolone.

Ljungqvist said he believed Hunter may have been taking 19-norandrostenediol and 19-norandrostenedione, banned steroids that produce nandrolone in the body.

Under IAAF and IOC rules, an athlete is responsible for whatever substance is found in his body, regardless of how it got there.

"He's been around long enough to know better," said Pound, chairman of the

World Anti-Doping Agency.

Ljungqvist said Hunter's Bislett Games sample had a concentration of nandrolone that was 2,000 nanograms per milliliter of urine — 1,000 times over the permitted level.

Rogge, vice chairman of the IOC medical commission, said it was impossible to reach such a high concentration of nandrolone by taking supplements.

"Even if they're spiked with nandrolone, there is no way you will have 2,000 nanograms," he said.

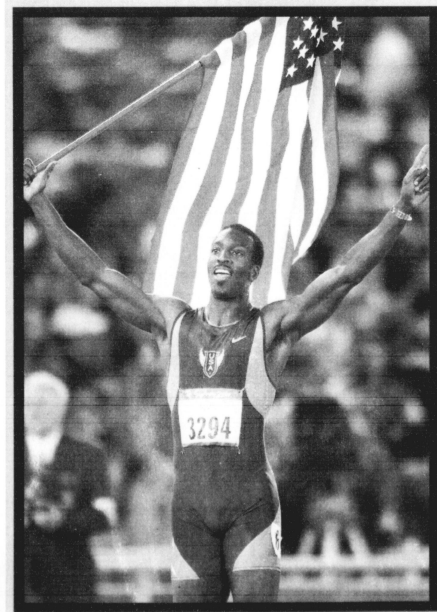
"It's the usual excuse," Rogge added. "He has to be disqualified and banned."

The Hunter case, which was disclosed only after media leaks, has led to renewed charges that the United States has a history of suppressing drug cases and failing to tackle doping.

"As long as you are in a state of denial, you can't move forward toward a resolution," said Pound, a Canadian.

"The U.S. has been very slow to recognize there is a problem in the U.S."

"This is an opportunity to embrace that there is a problem and, if they want to be the leader in world sport, to show they are in fact leaders."

## SportsBytes

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — Alabama coach Mike DuBose, whose team is off to its worst start in a decade, offered to resign 10 days ago. His offer was declined.

The Birmingham News and The Tuscaloosa News reported Tuesday that DuBose made the gesture after Alabama was beaten 21-0 by Southern Mississippi on Sept. 16. DuBose confirmed that he made the offer privately to athletic director Mal Moore in the locker room after the game.

Mike DuBose was the SEC coach of the year last season. "I did tell him after the Southern Miss game that I would resign, if that's what he thought was best for the university," DuBose said. "That was not intended for an immediate resignation. That was intended for the end of the year, based on what is best for this university and football team."

"It was a statement made in privacy, in the coaches' locker room that I never expected to get out."

Moore did not accept the resignation offer, which was made with several assistant coaches in the room.

"It's an emotional thing after the game," Moore said Monday night. "In a dressing room like that, it is not an official meeting in that context, and I certainly took it that way."

The Crimson Tide, picked No. 3 in the ESPN/USA Today pre-season poll, are 1-3 after two straight losses.

### McSorley trial continues

VANCOUVER, British Columbia — Marty McSorley's blow to Donald Brashear's head with a hockey stick did more damage than the Vancouver player's fall to the ice, a doctor testified at McSorley's assault trial Tuesday.

Dr. Rui Avelar, the Canucks' team doctor, said Brashear was unconscious and having a seizure when he reached Brashear's side. He was knocked to the ice after Boston's McSorley hit him across the head during an NHL game on Feb. 21.

The doctor testified the injury likely came from where McSorley's stick hit, not from Brashear's collapse to the ice.

McSorley was charged with assault and pleaded not guilty. The doctor testified he could find little evidence of an injury to the brain at the back of Brashear's head, where he hit the ice.

On Monday, referee Brad Watson, who worked the game said was surprised by McSorley's hit.

"It was a bit of a shock. I haven't experienced anything like that," said Watson, who worked his first season in the NHL last year.

McSorley and Brashear both are expected to testify before Friday, when the trial is scheduled to end.

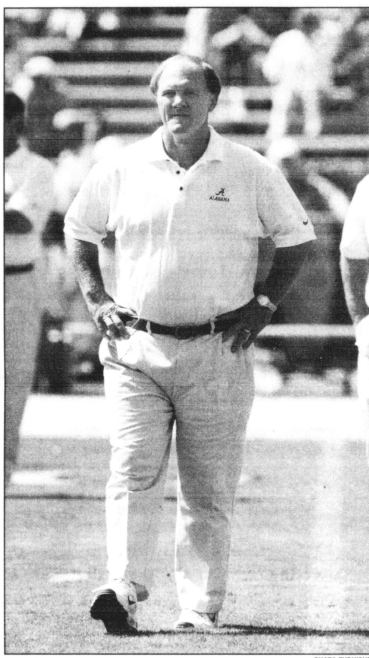

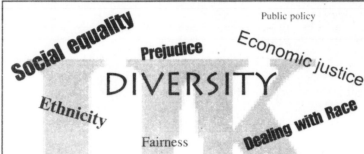

# Volleyball takes hard hit

**In harm's way: Stephenie Taylor likely done for year, Stacey Wallace out indefinitely**

Sitting out matches with an injury, sadly, is nothing new for UK senior outside hitter Stephenie Taylor.

Now, she must battle yet another wound. In game three of Friday's win against heavily favored Mississippi State, Taylor jumped to spike the ball, landed awkwardly and most likely had this season — her final year in UK's volleyball program — wiped out.

The crowd sat in stunned silence, as Taylor lay motionless save for a pain-clenched fist smashing the hardwood. The extent of her injuries is unknown as team officials await the results of a MRI, though it is suspected that Taylor's ACL will need to be repaired — ending her season.

Taylor's injury came after the Cats had already watched her fellow senior Stacey Wallace hobble off the court nursing a knee injury.

Wallace, a defensive specialist, had been averaging 1.85 digs a game for UK before the injury.

The suddenly undermanned Cats are unsure how long she will be out.

Junior setter Whitney Sample says the Cats will not falter despite concern for their teammates.

"We know the injuries are there, but we have to carry on although we are worried," said Sample.

The loss of Taylor and Wallace has hit the team hard. Like a family, what harms one hurts all.

UK coach Jona Braden said the injured Cats are giving what they can in the way of support.

"We have to try and take injuries well," said Braden. "We are getting a really positive feeling from Stephenie and Stacey and they are supporting the team well."

Taylor's experience on the court will be sorely missed, as will her 2.03 kills and 1.03 blocks a game.

After making a remarkable midseason comeback from injury in her junior year, Taylor whet the fans' appetite by giving them a taste of what to expect from her this year. Her reappearance in '99 rejuvenated the UK offense, as she tallied 1.54 kills and 1.07 digs a game.

Taylor's influence though will not end, as she will lend her support at games and will be able to use her experience to help guide the younger players who will try to fill the void born of her absence.

"Everyone is sad, but we are stepping up to fill the gaps left," said sophomore outside hitter Liz McCaslin.

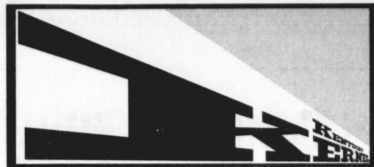
The Cats are hoping to get Wallace back with some degree of brevity. As the experienced member of the backcourt, she helped develop younger players in the defensive specialist position such as freshman Candace Cogan and sophomore Aleisha Craven.

Braden said that for now, the Cats would have to play without two-thirds of their captaincy on the floor.

"We have three co-captains on the court — Megan (Weiskircher), Stephenie and Stacey," said Braden. "They all truly lead and the team responds. We're going to miss their presence on the court, though they still have a role in this team."

# Accomplished poet at UK

**Campus visit: Harvard grad will read poetry as part of the Fall Series of Visiting Writers**

"It started with the clang of plates and girders, one last click of the rusted turnstile," poet Davis McCombs writes in his poem "Dismantling the Cave Gate."

One of the many writers to be visiting UK, McCombs is the first in the English Department Fall Series of Visiting Writers. Reading from his recently famed book *Ultima Thule*, McCombs is one of many famous writers to originate from Kentucky.

A graduate of Harvard University McCombs has proven himself to be a noteworthy artist of the word. Davis McCombs' work re-

lates in many ways to natural settings and aspects of the outdoors. His style resembles that of the original sonnet as seen in such writers as William Shakespeare. However, other influences stem from the likes of Walt Whitman and Henry David Thoreau. His works embody the elements of fanciful freedom in terms of lyrical poetry.

It is Mammoth Cave that has served as the inspiration for a majority of this poet's work.

"McCombs is deeply knowledgeable of underground passage ways of Mammoth Cave and the landscapes surrounding it," Gurney Norman said, an associate professor of English and head of the cre-

ative writing program. "He brings a sharp eye for accurate detail of the natural world and is able to make universal metaphors from local landscape."

However, the metaphor of the cave is far from being completely literal. Thus many of the poet's writings can be interpreted to relate to the lives of those able to read them.

There is beauty found in all elements of McCombs' work due not only to his calming word structure but also in the fact that his writing is easily accepted. While many writers compose their work in often densely laid fashions, McCombs relies upon the use of language and sentence structure.

"Davis McCombs mixes a contemporary sensibility with classical literature forms. His idiom comes off as modern," Norman said.

One of the many hopes of having such talent on campus is the hope of influencing future writers. Inspiration abounds throughout the writing of Davis McCombs. However he says it best in his metaphorical breaking point of an epiphany in the simple words described in the poem "Comet Hale-Bopp", "at the ridgeline, that someone picked their way down broken slabs, lit a torch, and marked the instant that a vast and inner darkness shattered."

Grade: A+

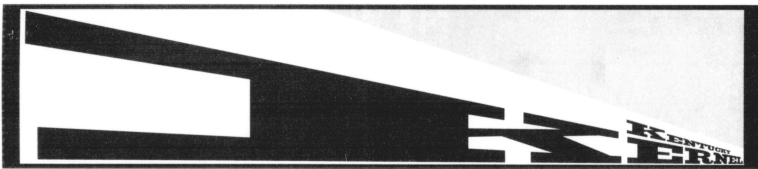

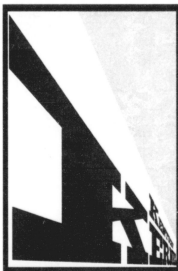

## City makes museum to honor socks

**FORT PAYNE, Ala.** — The community at the knee of Lookout Mountain boasts about 100 sock-producing mills. Local officials claim that one of every three pairs of socks are produced here. Now Fort Payne, where 60 million pairs of socks are produced yearly, has the Hosiery Museum to preserve its history. The evolution of odd-looking sewing machines fills one wall of the building, while blown-up black-and-white pictures illustrate how millworkers' lives revolved around the mill.

Historian John Chambers said the community would not have amounted to anything without the sock industry, which he said saved the city during an economic downturn at the beginning of the 20th century. In more recent years the city has modernized and grown.

"In Fort Payne, you can go on any street and if you know where to look you can find a hosiery mill with anywhere from two to 20 machines," said Elbert Lindsey, owner of the 88-machine FilsCoKim Inc., which produces socks for infants.

## I.D. mix-up gets baby charged with crime

**FREDERICK, Md.** — Marcos W. Vargas can barely walk but he's already in trouble with the Motor Vehicle Administration. A letter was mailed to Marcos shortly after his first birthday Sept. 10 notifying him that his failure to appear in traffic court could result in suspension of his license unless he paid a \$340 fine. The boy's father, William T. Vargas, took his son to the administration office to set the matter straight.

"What kind of computer system generates this type of threatening letter to infants?" he asked. The answer lay in the boy's state identification card. Marcos' parents had obtained the card when the boy was 4 months old.

When a man cited for driving without a license gave the name Marcos Vargas to police, police ran a check and retrieved the infant's state ID information, said JoAnn Fleishell, assistant manager of the MVA branch office.

Citations were then issued to the boy for driving without a license and without vehicle registration. Fleishell said the mistake would be corrected.

## Practicing bad medicine

*Insurance companies should stop delaying seniors' access to private fee-for-service plans*

Recently, the Associated Press reported that despite Congress mandating in 1997 that seniors be given access to private fee-for-service plans, the over-65 age group in Kentucky and several other states have just begun to gain such assistance.

We find this inexcusable. Seniors have needs like everyone else and it has taken nearly three years for these needs to be met.

If a contractor took three years longer building a structure at UK than was promised, that contractor would be out of a job. But if insurance companies decide to fudge around and mess people over, that supposedly is OK.

Many insurance companies have claimed that they would suffer the same fate of Medicare HMO's (many of which are having to shut down or cut benefits) if they offered a fee-for-service option to seniors.

However, the real question is whether these companies truly can't offer these services, or if the CEO's simply aren't willing to take a pay cut.

Right now, the only company offering private fee-for service options to seniors in Kentucky is Sterling Life Insurance Co., which operates out of Bellingham, Wash.

Hold up, Washington? Why can't companies located in Kentucky give seniors some aid?

Even if these companies don't want to play ball, it seems unfair to seniors to only have one choice for private fee-for-service options. Somebody needs to step up.

While problems with health care do not affect the average college student, they do have an indirect impact.

Many of us have grandparents and great-grandparents whom we love dearly and would like to see stay around a little longer. They need extra services to help keep them healthy.

If insurance companies keep playing games by denying and putting off their responsibilities, the future of people that matter to us remains very questionable.

Insurance companies need to start realizing that seniors are people, not statistics. They deserve to be treated with proper care. Insuring people's health should be about helping people, not about being a business and making a buck.

## Ups and downs of living without technology

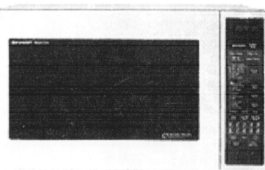

## Don't trust polls alone

These same voters then bitch and moan through the entire term of office that they wished someone else had won — too bad they wasted a vote. A vote for a minor candidate is not the wasted vote; a bandwagon vote is the wasted vote.

These two erroneous styles of casting ballots create a political system where career politicians, with the help of our beloved media, affect the mindset of America's voter. We catch

Voting as a lemming for the sake of saving time does as much to damage the future as not voting at all.

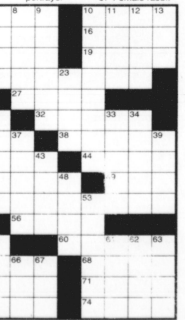
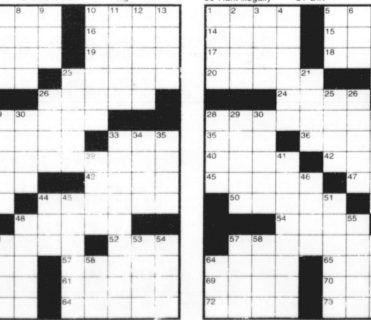

# Political 'no' to Milosevic

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Slobodan Milosevic conceded Tuesday that his challenger finished first in Yugoslavia's presidential election and declared a runoff — defying demands at home and abroad that he step down.

Opposition candidate Vojislav Kostunica rejected an Oct. 8 runoff, calling it a "fraud" and insisting that he won Sunday's election outright. At the same time, he warned against any moves that could raise tensions.

The opposition called for a rally Wednesday night in downtown Belgrade to "celebrate its victory" — apparently hoping for a show of strength to demonstrate to Milosevic the public's refusal of a runoff.

President Clinton said it was clear the opposition had defeated Milosevic, who has led Yugoslavia for 13 years. He said that the United States would take steps to lift economic sanctions if the election result is honored.

The announcement of a runoff raises the stakes in the confrontation between Milosevic and the opposition, which faced the choice of accepting

a runoff it considers fraudulent or trying to pressure the headline leader — believed to have a firm grip on the top ranks of the police and military — to back down.

Two days after the voting, the State Elections Commission released its first results Tuesday, saying Kostunica finished first with 48.22 percent to 40.23 percent for Milosevic.

Before the announcement, the Democratic Opposition of Serbia released its own tally, showing Kostunica with 55 percent to Milosevic's 35 percent.

State television said the turnout was 64 percent, far below the 74 percent figure given by the opposition.

"We are talking about political fraud and blatant stealing of votes," Kostunica said. "This is an offer which must be rejected."

But he said the opposition would avoid "careless moves which could raise tensions in society, which could lead to unforeseeable consequences."

"The truth is obvious, and we will defend it by all nonviolent means," the opposition leader said. "The people have given their political 'no' to Milosevic and his policies."
