at any old time. Ha! Ha!

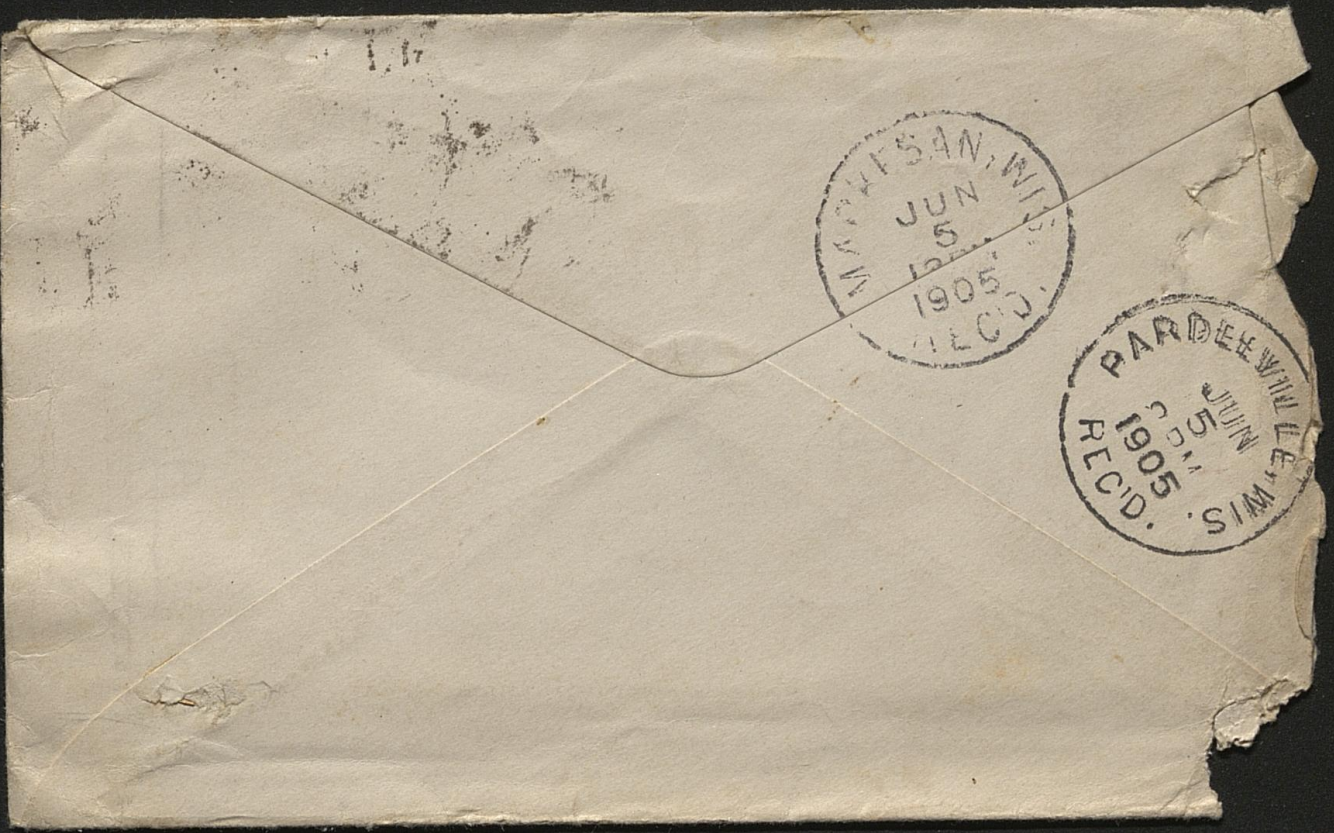

the shoot to spend the afternoon.

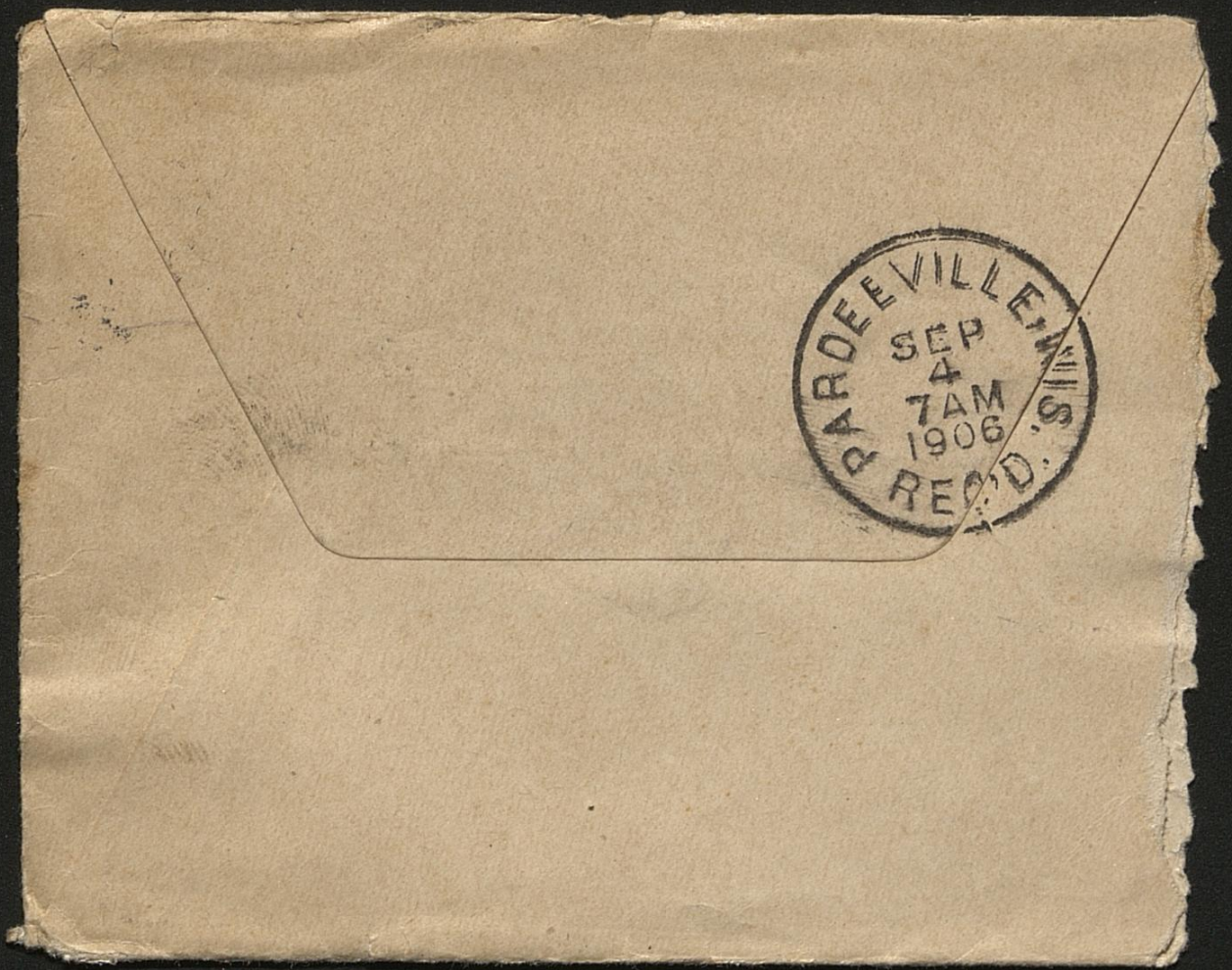
Last night five of us went launch riding

this morning expect to stick all week. have you got your corns all tucked if not call on me I am an expert at it.

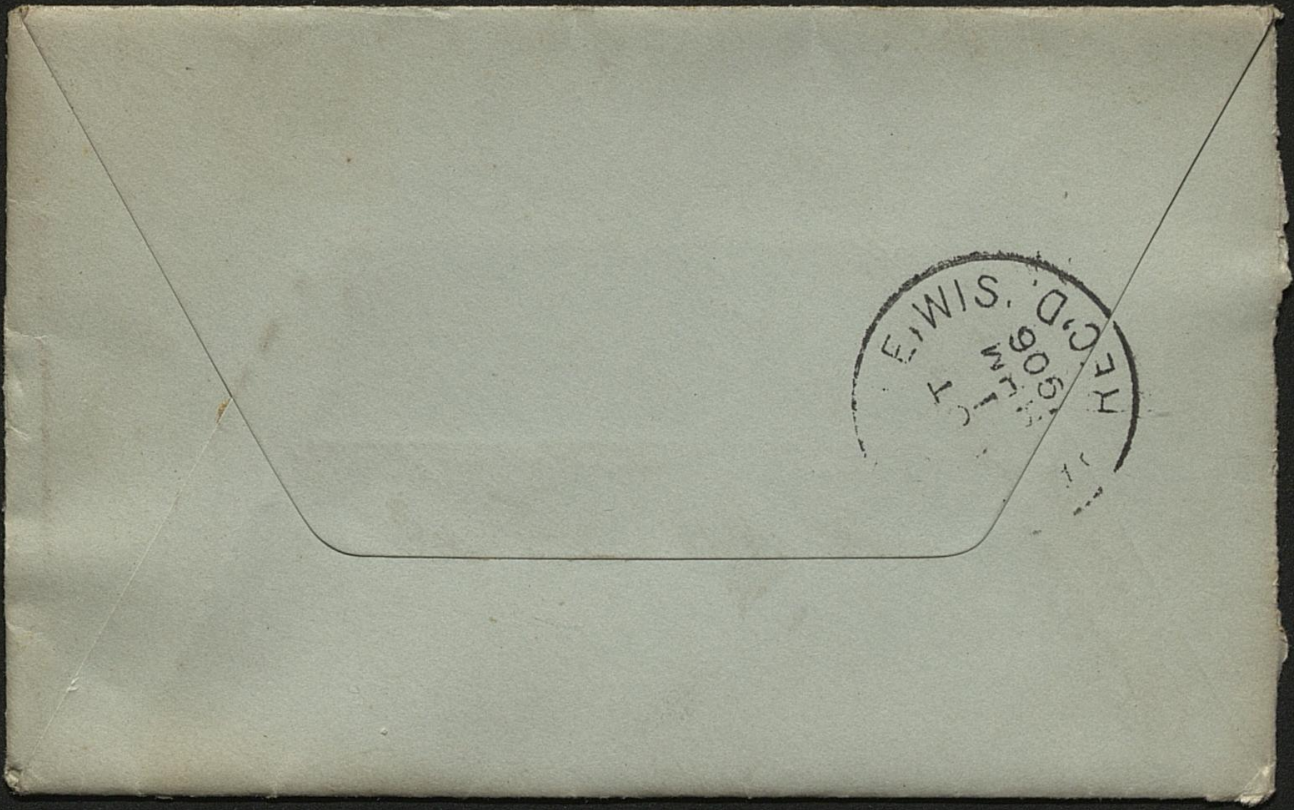
There is nothing doing at Cambridge the people are all afraid to turn around on account of the "small pox" well I don't think there is any more

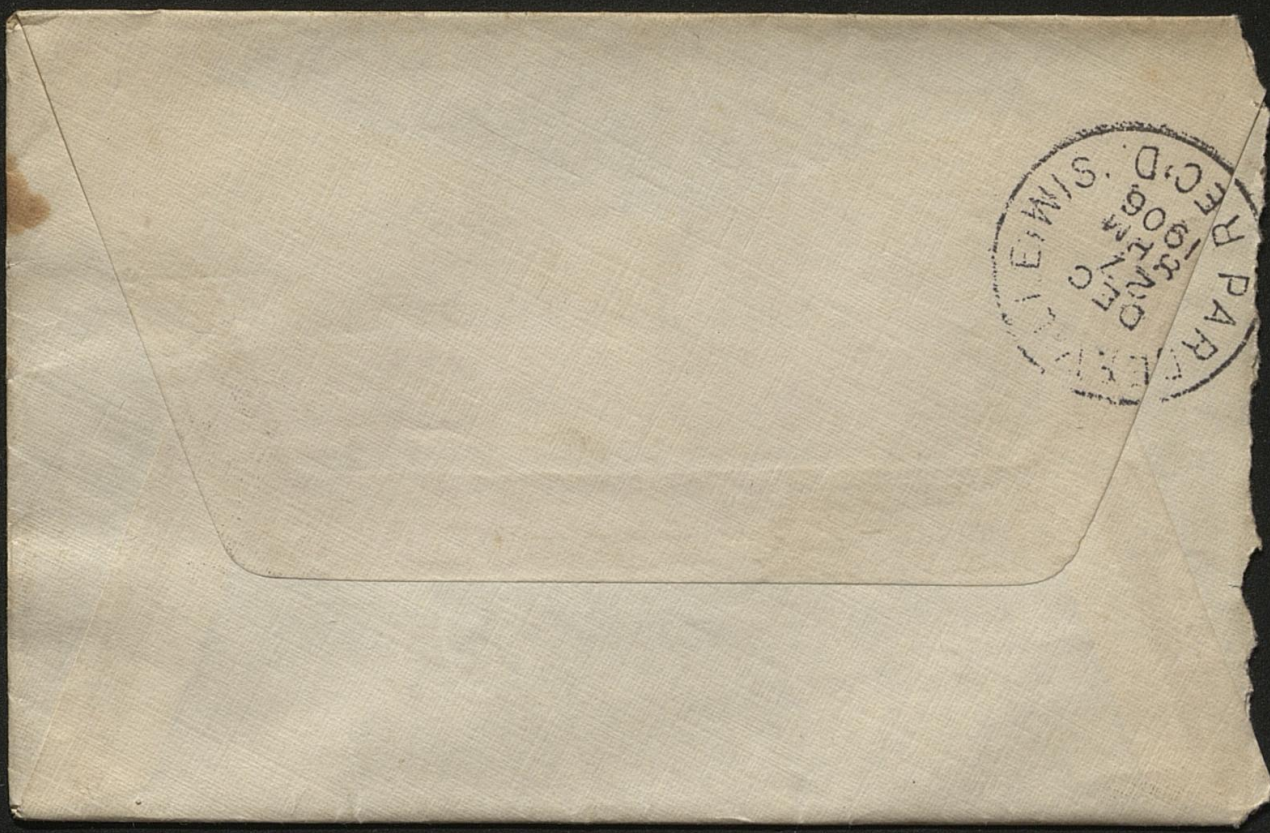
