Students challenge free speech policy

Changes: 40-year-old policy stifles student speech, some say; Student proposal would lessen restrictions

It was born in the 1960s and has survived unchanged for 40 years.

UK's free speech policy has been a recurring problem during the past two years — years that have seen students stage a sit in at the Administration Building and work to create a sidewalk

But behind the issues and the protests is a policy that has been static ... until now.

A group of students has drafted a place the policy, which they say is fraught with project with the policy and the proposed changes include setting a clear definition of what free speech is and where on campus it can take place. The proposal is still in an early stage, though, said Dave Newton, a member of the Student Government Student Rights Committee, Campus Progressive Coalition coordinator and history senior.

Newton said the main problem with the current policy is that its language is too ambiguous and does not clearly state if free speech activities can take place the proposed of the proposed control of the student Center patio.

But it requires advance notice of demonstrations if they are to take place in UK buildings, open lawns, parking lots or residential areas.

Not included are the outdoor areas around buildings, which have proved in the past to be contentious areas, according to UK faculty.

Standing outcast science professor Ernest Vanarella recounted the need for change in UK's free speech policy.

"Word got around to campus police that a group of people had assembled outside Miller Hall." he said. "They (members of UK Police) were encircling the crowd and were about to move in when a person with a bullhorn announced that the next speaker would be (former UK) President Charles Wethington. When they heard that, UK police) just sort of went on their way." Yanarella said incidents such as this have proven UK's free speech policy to be "ludicrous." "If s silly that an institution of higher learning doesn't provide open access to knowledge," he said.
"College is a time to develop critical thinking skills. But that can't happen when rights to free speech are constricted."

The students' proposal would clearly state that people have the right to speak, post filers and set up tables to advocate issues. Newton said the main objective is to increase free speech opportunities, as long as class work and other university activities are not impeded. Some University dicitals said they were open to the proposed change. "If we are the free marketplace of ideas, we should at least be open to conversations about how those proposed ideas would look on our campus," said Victor Hazard, dean of students.

But others are more wary of the changes.

Bradley Canon, a political science professor, said he thinks the proposal would make only a "marginal difference."

"I don't see many students exercising free speech as it is," Canon said.

But Yanarella said the policy is as critical for the university as for students.

"Just as scientists engage in experiments in a laboratory, the UK community should be a laboratory for democracy," he said.

Bush signs airline security law
WASHINGTON — The government began
taking charge of airport security Monday at the
start of the holiday travel season. President Bush
signed legislation that will have more screeners
seering in passengers' bags and more sky marshals flying on planes. The new law will put airport screening in the hands of 28,000 federal
workers and require inspections of all checked
baggage. The signing of the most comprehensive
air security bill in the nation's history came
three days after passage by Congress and three
days before Thanksgiving. Fewer Americans
were planning to travel by air this Thanksgiving,
according to the AAA. The group, formerly
known as the American Automobile Association,
forecast 4.6 million people traveling by air, a 27
percent decline from last year's 6.3 million. The
new law, said Bush, "should give all Americans
greater confidence when they fly."

Four journalists missing, feared dead JALALABAD, Afghanistan — Four international journalists were missing and feared dead Monday after gummen ambushed a convoy of reporters in a narrow mountain pass on the road to the capital. Kabul. The six gummen stopped the cars and led the journalists away, then opened fire, witnesses said. Those missing included a television cameraman and a photographer working for the Reuters news agency: a journalist with the Spanish daily El Mundo; and a journalist with the Italian daily Corriere della Sera. An Afghan translator working with the journalists also was missing, and his fate was unknown.

U.S. accuses countries of bio warfare

U.S. accuses countries of bio warfare

GENEVA — The United States accused Iraq,
North Korea and four other countries on Monday
of building germ-warfare arsenals, and said it
worried one of them might be helping Osama bin
Laden in his quest for biological weapons. John
R. Bolton, undersecretary of state for arms control refused to say which government might be
involved. The existence of Iraq's program is "beyond dispute." he said, while stopping short of
making a direct linkage to bin Laden. Nor did he
say whether any of the five other countries he
cited as being at various stages of germ-warfare
development - Libya, Syria, Iran and Sudan as
well as North Korea - are suspected of trying to
supply bin Laden. Iraq immediately rejected the
allegation it was violating the global ban on germ
warfare and said the United States was making
the claim as a pretext for an attack on Baghdad.





More to flag than politics

Lexington Mayor Pam Miller recently decided to decrease the fly ing time of the POW/MIA flag at the Fayette County Courthouse from every day to six days a year. She took action based on the requests of some citizens who feel the flag "represents a group of extremists, many of whom are neither veterans nor families of veterans missing

in action."

The mayoralty of Lexington is a full-time job, so it might be possible that in her down time Miller actually believed that upsetting Central Kentucky veterans on thin reasoning sounded like a strong

She's still wrong, though, for reasons almost too varied to mention in one editorial.

For one, it is difficult to imagine how someone can be labeled an extremist by virtue of having been imprisoned and tortured by enemy

extremist by virtue of naving been imprisoned and for due to yetenly troops. It is even more baffling how citizens advocating the search and rescue of soldiers still missing can be cast aside in the debate.

Calvin Coolidge once remarked, with respect to veterans of World War I, that courage bought and paid for is not courage. He said that soldiers undertake a major sacrifice when they serve their country, and that sacrifice should be rewarded not with cash, but with honor,

The POW/MIA flag is a symbol of that respect. Our soldiers have at times been labeled heroes and killers. They have been accused of both valor and cowardice. Those who returned home safely have never been fully compensated, and that is part of the sacrifice.

Reasons for war not as obvious as we may think

In a testimony by John J. It is the shortest route to the sea and has relatively favorable terrain for a pipeline. The route through Afghanistan is the one that would bring Central Asian oil closest to Asian markets and thus would be the cheapest in terms of transporting the oil.






around you." Collins said. "I like to think I have good players."
