STATE Fire sweeps bourbon warehouses

Storm unleashes strong winds, floods
LOUISVILLE, Ky. — A potent fall storm packing damaging winds and heavy rains swept across Kentucky vesterday.
A tornado was reported in rural Simpson County but apparently did not touch down, the sheriff's office said. No injuries or damage were reported. A funnel cloud that never touched down also was reported in southern Taylor County in south-central Kentucky.
The storm unleashed high winds that toppled walls at an eastern Kentucky school and dumped heavy rains that caused flooding in western Kentucky. High winds overturned a small boat on the Green River in western Kentucky, and one of the three men aboard drowned, authorities said.
Mike Callahan, a National Weather Service meteorologist in Louisville, said the storm was trigered by a "strong, vigorous cold front."

Pitino assistants taking over SEC

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. UK won it all last year, it UK won it all last year, it wouldn't be surprising to see a lot of people steal a page from Rick Pitino's playbook.

steal a page from playbook. Having each spent time working for Pitino, Georgia's Tubby Smith and Florida's Billy Donovan already have a head start.

At least four times this year, when Pitino steps onto the court, he will see teams trying to do what his team did best last year — run, trap, trap. year — run, trap, confuse people and keep the ball

and you didn't know me, you wouldn't know who the head coach was. They have a major amount of responsibility. They're out there really coaching."

Donovan so much believes in Pitino's system that he's throwing conventional wisdom aside in Florida.

Most coaches without a lot of talented athletes would do what Lon Kruger did with the Gators last year — slow things down, shorten games and hope to be close at the end. But Donovan said he's convinced an up-tempo game based on Pitino's style will work better.

"I think you best camouflage those weaknesses by playing this style of them."



'Ransom', 'Faces' make the grade

A pack of high-priced movie stars, a conservative director and high expectations: the perfect setting for a bad film in Hollywood. Ransom, however, came up aces, thanks to some fine acting and a tension-filled script — or maybe it was just the pleasant shock of seeing mass quantities of blood in a Ron Howard film. Yes, the whiny-voiced redhead gets R-rared with a blood-gushing, gun-firing, kidnapping tale sure to make audience wince on more than one occasion.

Loosely based on the 1956 film of the same title, Ransom tells the story of a prominent, wealthy air-line owner, Tom Mullen (Mel Gibson), whose son is nabbed. The kidnappers want \$2 million, with no cops or FBI involved — or the kid gets sliced to pieces. Mullen and his wife (Rene Russo) panic, then decide to give up the

Mullen and his wife (Rene Russo) panic, then decide to give up the cash ... with the FBI's supervision. The plan fails for both sides, and tensions begin to rise. After trying to go through the usual channels of law and failing, Mullen gives the bad guys the finger by turning the ransom money into a bounty reward for their heads. The film transforms into a classic showdown between good and bad, with a little deception to keep audiences honest.

The all-star cast doesn't disappoint. Russo is weak in opening scenes but comes back strong, and Gibson has only a few lapses in an otherwise excellent performance. The best performances, however, come from the stellar ensemble of supporters. Gary Sinise is despicable as the mastermind behind the abduction, and Delroy Lindo is solid as the FBI agent assigned to the case. Dan Hedaya provides one of the more memorable

scenes, but his screen time is limited to about three minutes.

Sinisé's sometimes competent helpers are comprised of a talented group of young actors including Lili Taylor, Liev Schreiber, Evan Handler and NKOTB's Donnie Wahlberg. Of the four, Wahlberg's character stood out the most. Not because he was good, but because he's as New Kid and everything they ever do will be laughed at.



lancing at this year's UK men's bas-ketball schedule, one would get the impression that Coach Rick Pitino and his staff are not about to let the

and his staff are not about to let the national championship affect their opinion about scheduling top competition.

At least 12 teams who participated in last year's tournament dot the Wildcats' schedule for this season, including a rematch against championship game foe Syracuse on Thanksgiving night at the Great Alaska

The schedule is loaded with potentially difficult opponents at the beginning of the season.

The Cats' opener against Clemson in the Black Coaches' double-

header at the RCA Dome on Nov. 15 should give the team a tough test. It's the earliest a UK team has ever opened the season. The Tigers return their top nine players from last year's tourney team, which lost to Georgia in the first

round.

After Clemson and a home exhibition against Australia, UK runs through a stretch of five games away from the friendly confines of Rupp Arena. Included during this stretch are three games in Alaska, and then a trip to the home of the NBA Champion Chicago Bulls, the United Center, to play four-time Big 10 champion Purdue in the Great Eight.

Following the Boilermakers comes the annual border war at Freedom Hall against Indiana on Dec. 7, before the Cast finally return to Rupp to play Wright State and Notre Dame before the semester break.

While the team is enjoying the Christ-mas holiday, it will participate in a couple mas holiday, it will participate in a couple of pseudo-tournaments against Georgia Tech in the Jeep Cherokee Classic in Atlanta and Ohio State in the Rock & Roll Shootout in Cleveland.

After a likely butt-whipping of the Buckeyes, the Bluegrass will celebrate New Year's Eve by watching the state's two favorite teams — UK and Louisville — duke it out at Freedom Hall.
Following the U of L game, UK kicks off the Southeastern Conference against Tennessee in Lexington. The Big Orange could be one of the most improved teams not only in the SEC, but in the country.

The rest of the conference schedule really doesn't provide many interesting

The final frontcourt player on the team is Scott Padgett, who is back after sitting out a year to concentrate on studies.


He will be expected to provide minutes of relief for Simmons and Prickett at the power for-



Pitino said Anderson is an exciting player to coach because he is able to "make things happen." That's the main reason he will get the nod at shooting guard.


Waiting in the wings, however, is a supporting cast filled with, yet again, more experience.

This much is certain Anderson leads by example and has fun doing it.



Since his arrival at UK in 1993, many different forces aligned to keep Anthony Epps out of the starting point guard position.

As a freshman, Epps had to surrender a great amount of playing time to Travis Ford, who was a senior captain.

"I got to learn a lot from
Travis," Epps said. "Playing
behind him gave me the experience and maturity I needed."
Over the next two years, he
occasionally had to step aside

while the team experimented with Tony Delk, Jeff Sheppard

and Wayne Turner at the point.

During last year's championship run, however, it was Epps who solidified the point and led the team.

Jeff Sheppard will sit out the 1996-97 season as a redshirt, as announced by UK Coach Rick

announced by UK Coach Rick Pitino prior to the Cats' exhibition opener against Athletes in Action Monday night.

For years, San Francisco 49ers quarterback Steve Young played a back-up role to a heady player named Joe Montana. Peo-ple knew Young was good — he had proven himself prior to the NFL — and knew the day would come when he would lead his

come when he would lead his team to success.

Five years later and a world away, UK point guard Wayne Turner sits and waits for the call.

The 6-foot-2 sophomore received lofty ratings from many analysts coming out of Boston's Beaver Country Day last year. His agility and quickness led to predictions of big-time first-year contributions, but the emergence of Anthony Epps cut short Turner's playing time.

Although Epps led the Cats through the NCAA tourney, it's unclear who will be the starter. Pitino said the competition

Lots of hype goes along with winning a national title, and a lot of it centers around whether or not UK can repeat its championship feat this season.

If the Cats are going to win it all again, they will have to replace four highly successful players who have moved on to professional careers.

Tony Delk, Mark Pope, Walter McCarty and Antoine Walker were among the biggest keys to the Wildcats' success and now

they are gone.
The Boston Celtics snagged Walker early in the draft with their No. 6 pick. Delk, named the Final Four's Most Outstanding Player, now bombs away for the Charlotte Hornets. The New York Knicks grabbed McCarty in the 19th slot with one of their three first-round picks. Pope was drafted in the picks. Pope was drafted in the second round by the Indiana Pacers, but elected to play pro

ball in Turkey.
This leaves UK with some

gaping holes to fill.
"I don't have that many concerns defensively," Coach Rick Pitino said. "My concerns are a

lot more at the offensive end."
Pitino said he is afraid that the teams passing will not be as good as it was last season.

"We were averaging 24 assists per game," Pitino said. "We shot just a shade under 50 percent, because of our experience, and not just because of shot selection, but also because we were such a great passing team."

Pitino said one of the reasons the Cats were so good passing the ball was because of the big men, McCarty and Pope. When the two arrived at UK they were poor passers, but by last year each had learned to distribute the ball, he said.

Pitino was also proud of the way the team got high-percent-

"At some times it was actually hard for me to know if I was going to JV practice or if I was going to varsity practice," he said.


He also said there were He also said there were problems with knowing which games he would be playing in since the players were only allowed to play in a certain number of games under NCAA regulations. regulations

An up-and-coming South Car-olina team could claim second place behind the Cats in the SEC East. The Gamecocks have a terrific returning trio of guards in Larry Davis, B.J. McKie and Melvin Wat-

Son. USC also returns the No. 2 scoring center in the league in Nate Wilbourne.

The Gamecocks will likely parlay a second-place finish in the SEC into a birth in the NCAA Tourna-

In the past, when Tennessee bas-ketball was the subject, one always thought of UT's powerful women's program. But now head coach Kevin O'Neill has people in Knoxville thinking about the men's team as well.

The Vols lose four starters from a 14-15 team last year but make up for it with a stellar recruiting class. It is one of the best recruiting classes in the nation led by frontcourt players Charles Hathaway, C.J. Black and Isiah Victor.

This may not be the year for UT, but it's only a matter of time. After the top three in the East, it's a crapshoot between Georgia, Vanderbilt and Florida to see who

Vanderbilt and Florida to see who can avoid finishing at the bottom.
Georgia advanced to the Sweet Sixteen last season but all five starters from that team are gone. Head coach Tubby Smith begins the rebuilding job this year.
Vanderbilt is always Vanderbilt. The Commodores made it to the NIT last year and lost guard Frank Seckar who led the team in scoring, assists, steals, three-pointers and minutes played. The Commodores also lost Malik Evans, who led Vandy in rebounding and shot-Vandy in rebounding and shot-

The biggest problem UK might face is a lack of depth. The Cats have only 10 players and start the season with a couple of


But Mattox thinks the differ-

▼In the '90s, SEC teams have a 1,087-299 record against non-conference opponents.

▼Last year a conference-record eight SEC teams were ranked at one point in last year's AP and CNN/USA Today top

25 polls.
Playing a Top 25 team night in and night out makes it difficult for someone like UK head coach Bernadette Mattox to rebuild her team from the outhouse to

the penthouse.
"It's tough," Mattox said. "Any of the top eight teams in our conference in any other conference would probably be No. 1 or No. 2 in those particular confer-

This year the level of talent will be no

Alabama comes in as the favorite. Last year the Crimson Tide finished with a No. 10 ranking, a 24-8 record and a trip to the Sweet 16.

It was not a bad year for folks in Tuscaloosa by any stretch of the imagina-tion. But expectations are extremely high

Not only does Alabama return All-American Shalonda Enis and three other starters, but the addition of the state's Miss Basketball in Nicole Carruth and junior college player of the year in Nar-tausha Mills should be enough to keep the Tide rolling through the SEC. Most experts see Georgia falling right behind Alabama. The Lady Bulldogs are

behind Alabama. The Lady Bulldogs are coming off a disappointing 83-65 loss to Tennessee in the National Championship

game.

There is one key difference between last year and this year. The difference is Saudia Roundtree. UGA does return four

After the top three teams, take a pick between Vanderbilt, Florida and LSU. Perennial powerhouse Vandy is rebuilding this year after last year's trip to the Elite Eight. The Commodores must replace three starters this year, including All-American Sheri Sam.

Florida returns five starters from last year's 21-win team, which made it to the SEC Tournament semifinals.
LSU thinks it got robbed from an NCAA berth. The Tigers finished with a 21-11 overall record, but a 4-7 conference record kept them away from the dance. This Tiger team also returns four starters who should put them somewhere in the tourney.

Auburn, Arkansas and Ole Miss follow close behind the elite teams.

Last year Auburn advanced to the Elite Eight, but with only two returning starters, it could be a long year in Auburn.

Arkansas could be a sleeper this year. The Razorbacks went 21-13 last year and much of that was done without honorable mention All-American Christy Smith. Her season ended with a torn anterior cruciate ligament on Jan. 28. But she returns this year to lead the Hogs.

Ole Miss finished fourth in the SEC last year but lost two-time All-SEC player Yolanda Moore, who led Mississippi in scoring and rebounding for two straight years.





here's a trend in collegiate basket-ball that threatens to change the game as we know it. Each spring, college underclassmen face the decision to either leap into the professional ranks or continue to honor their

sional ranks or continue to hono commitment to the university. Basketball fans and mindful citizens everywhere continue to marvel at the salaries com-manded by these youngsters. Despite wide-spread attention given to the problem, the cycle continues to swipe young play-ers from the top of the NCAA talent pool.

Consider that in the '90s,
nearly 150 underclass studentathletes declared for the NBA
draft. Some of them (Juwan
Howard, Jerry Stackhouse)
have been selected and found
success. Some (Jason Osbourne,
Scotty Thurman) have not.

This whole thing hasn't been at
issue very long. A few guys in the '70s
elected to turn pro before completing
college — or in some cases, skipped
college altogether. But more than half
of all the early entries have come this college altogether. But more than half of all the early entries have come this decade, and the trend is more prevalent today than ever.

Before further pressing the issue, though, should these kids be able to do this? Is it reasonable for a student-athlete to break ties to the university and

pursue the big dollars the NBA has to offer?

offer?

If Stephon Marbury can get the big salary in the NBA, despite the fact that his game has not fully matured, why not get paid to improve rather than piddle in the college ranks?

In addition, a career-ending injury in college is every prospect's nightmare. If you are going to tear an Anterior Cruciate Legiment, do it while under a guaranteed professional contract.

But if the student-athlete is not

at fault, a decision must be made on how to curb the problem. The NBA is hereby acquitted. Talented players who draw con-sumers' interests are at the heart of the NBA's interest. Officials want players who can draw fans and if those players happen to be 18, it's not the league's fault. To its credit, the NBA has acknowl-edged the problem and has taken

proactive steps to ensure its new women's professional league doesn't

women's professional league doesn't end up this way. "We're going to have an age limit and stick to it — which is college grad-uates or 22 years of age," NBA Com-missioner David Stern said. "We're going to try to get this one right at the beginning."

The poster child for supporters of early college exits is Michael Jordan. He left North Carolina early but cautions players who consider making the

tions players who consider making the same move.

"(The players) have to make their own decision — I can't say to not take that chance," Jordan said during a recent trip to Louisville. "They need to make sure they have a chance to go back and get their education. They need to be prepared for the rugged roles we have to go through at our level."

So now that we have discounted the

So now that we have discounted the players and the NBA, the only entity remaining is the NCAA. They have been inconsequential in the attack on underclass declaration. Now's the time they should begin to consider allowing universities to dole out stipends to the college athlete.

The idea has certainly met its fair share of critics. Yes, players in all varsity athletics should be eligible — the varsity gymnast and varsity basketball players ought to get the same amount of money.

And though the universities will have to foot the bill, it will hit all the institutions equally. Revenue, albeit meager, could cajole several players into staying in the college environment where they belong.

After all, any improvement would be welcome.

More kids are devoting their

More kids are devoting their efforts to basketball at the prep level, which allows smaller programs to land better recruits, thanks to a swelling talent pool.

If Charles Darwin were around, he would certainly be a college hoops fan. It is the truest manifestation of his "survival of the fittest" philosophy. The giants of college basketball (UCLA, Duke, Syracuse) no longer get easy games from the smaller programs (Tulsa, Eastern Michigan, Richmond). Everybody wants a piece of the championship pie — and they're willing to do anything to get it.

Though several teams will move through the Top 25 this season, there will be a handful of programs that will stay near the top of the polls.

Here's a few:

Kansas: My pick for the national championship, the Jayhawks theoretically return all five starters from last year's team that went 29-5. But All-America point guard Jacque Vaughn will be sidelined until December, the result of a wrist injury incurred during an offseason pickup game.

Robertson will run the show. Robertson

Robertson will run the show. Robertson lead the team in three-point percentage last season (45.2) but remains unproven in his ball-handling and leadership skills.

But Kansas' attack is hardly a one-man show. He will be surrounded by the likes of Jerod Haase, Paul Pierce, Raef LaFrentz and Scot Pollard.

Haase, who had a subpar season for the Jayhawks last season, claims to have dedicated the summer to improving his outside game and should regain his sophomore form.

Cincinnati: A major power that keeps getting stronger. The Bearcats are anchored again by junior Danny Fortson. Last season, as Conference USA's Player-of-the-Year, he shot 53.9 percent from the field and proved he can bang down low with the best.

But UC will need more than Fortson in the post. With Art Long graduated, Kentucky native Jackson Julson eases into

foot-9 may have some trouble stacking up against the bigger trees.

Two other key positions will be filled with JUCO stars. Highly-touted swingman Ruben Patterson moves into the three and Charles Williams replaces the steady Keith LeGree behind the wheel.

Also, don't forget Lexington native Darnell Burton. Though he will begin the season as the Bearcats' top reserve, he should snag nearly 30 minutes per game and be given the green light to bomb away from beyond the arc.

Duncan was the total package last season, averaging 19.1 points, 12.3 boards and 3.8 blocks per contest. Look for him to tear up the ACC this year as well.

After successful surgery to his knee in the offseason, Wake head coach Dave Odom says he's ready. Will he be a step slower? If not, he and shooting guard Ricky Peral may become the most productive backcourt in the NCAA.

Other notables:

UCLA: The Bruins return all five starters from last year. They had a solid regular season, but lost a memorable one to Princeton in the NCAA tournament.

regular season, but lost a memoratic one to Princeton in the NCAA tournament. An early season matchup with Tulsa will serve as a measuring stick. Look for them to run the table in the PAC-10.

Illinois: The Illini return all their starters as well, including Kiwane Garris — among the best point guards in the college ranks. Look for Lon Kreuger to edge Michigan for the Big 10 title.

Villanova: The Wildcats lost Eric Eberz and Kerry Kittles, but they retain the steadiness of point guard Alvin Williams, which should help them win the Big East. In addition, 'Nova managed to land super-frosh Tim Thomas, which equates into instant offense. But don't get used to seeing him in Philadelphia — he'll be in the NBA this time next year.
