resident McVey came to the University in 1917 when our school, like other universities, was going through a dangerous period, caused by the war. In addition to this there was a certain amount of internal disorder that was making itself felt. In truth the University of Kentucky was on the verge of a decine. President McVey, seeing all this, set himself to the task and at the close of his first year this difficulty shad been students which in itself was to a certain degree demoralising to the collegiate standards of the schools of the country as a whole. This difficulty, had to be met and worked out. In the fall of 1919 came the largest enrollment in the history of the University of Kentucky. The university was hard put to find class room to take care of the students. Every available foot of space was called on and many classes were forced to meet in basements. Since that day there has been a rapid increase in the enrollment of stidents at the University until now the number has more than doubled itself since President McVey began his administration.




